ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

CCBS secured funding from Cheshire East Council for short breaks for carers, siblings, early help and from Eastern Cheshire CCG. Contracted sources of funding have not changed dramatically in this year.

The number of children (159) being supported by CCBS continues to grow as well as carers (200) and siblings (35) etc. As a result of becoming a registered charity CCBS have attracted more support and help with fund raising. The number of activities continue to increase and CCBS are over delivering on all contracts for Cheshire East Council.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

In the financial year CCBS secured 4 contracts with Cheshire East Council and Eastern Cheshire Clinical Commissioning group including securing funding from Cheshire East Council to deliver short breaks for carers.

The contract value was £44,000 for a 12-month period to support 200 carers through 130 activity sessions (coffee mornings, days out, meals, keep fit, pottery workshops and shopping).

CCBS also secured funding from Cheshire East Council to deliver short breaks for siblings of a disabled child. The contract value was £10,000 for a 12-month period to support 30 siblings through 30 activity sessions.

CCBS has in place an Early Help contract to run activity sessions for children and young people with disabilities with Cheshire East Council for£25,000.

This is due for renewal in March 2017. Eastern Cheshire CCG funded CCBS £20,000 to deliver work under the Winter Pressures Scheme aimed at reducing admissions to A&E.

ccbs also received £13,000 from the European Social Fund to develop employment skills among adults with disabilities.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

To preserve and protect the health and well-being of children and young people with disabilities (up to the age of 25), their family and carers, living in Cheshire and the surrounding areas, by the provision of respite opportunities for parents and carers of a disabled child as a break from their caring roles and responsibilities, the provision of a range of support and recreational and leisure time activities, provided in the interests of social welfare designed to improve their conditions of life.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The organisation is a charitable trust managed by 7 Trustees who oversee the running of CCBS. The trustees meet quarterly to discuss and review the operations of the organisation. The Trustees remain unchanged for the year 2015-2016.

Management of risk is considered at Trustee and management meetings and steps are taken to mitigate as appropriate. These are kept under regular review. Procedures are in place for authorisation of transactions, contracts and projects. Safeguarding is always discussed at Trustee meetings and a review of safeguarding policies and procedures is conducted annually and submitted to Cheshire East Council. All staff are DBS checked and volunteers received both safeguarding and first aid training in this year.

CCBS employs 10 members of staff, 1 full time, 3 part time (18-32hrs) 6 seasonal staff (8hrs a month). In addition CCBS has 21 volunteers aged 15-60 years. The Trustees meet regularly with staff, volunteers, beneficiaries and local businesses. They are also involved in some of the activities and trips.

FUTURE PLANS

CCBS shall continue to support children and young people with disabilities and their families in the geographical area of Cheshire East through activity clubs, trips, days out and longer residential breaks.

These will be offered to the young people themselves, their siblings and their parents or legal carers. We intend to continue to deliver commissioned services for both Cheshire East and the NHS; and to build links with other statutory, voluntary and charitable organisations, such as the Morgan Foundation and the Williams Foundation, to secure funding and support our service users.

The Trustees of Central Cheshire Buddies Scheme present their annual report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2016 and confirm they comply with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011, the trust deed and the Charities SORP (FRS 102).

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention, with the exception of investments which are shown at market value, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities - Statement of Recommended Practice ("FRSSE SORP").

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds Designated funds Revaluation funds Restricted funds	These are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objects of the charity. These are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes. These are unrestricted funds which include a revaluation reserve representing the restatement of investment assets at their market values. There are no restrictions to funds imposed by the donor.
Income Recognition of income	Income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity becomes entitled to, and virtually certain to receive, the income and the amount of the income can be measured with sufficient reliability.
Income with related expenditure	Where income has related expenditure the income and related expenditure is reported gross in the SoFA. Voluntary income received by way of grants, donations and gifts is included in the
Donations and legacies	the SoFA when receivable and only when the Charity has unconditional entitlement to the income. Income from tax reclaims is included in the SoFA at the same time as the
Tax reclaims on donations and gifts Donated services and facilities	gift/donation to which it relates. These are only included in income (with an equivalent amount in expenditure) where the benefit to the Charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material.

The value of any volunteer help received is not included in the accounts.

Investment income This is included in the accounts when receivable.

Volunteer help

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Recognition of Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis. Expenditure includes any VAT which expenditure cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it

relates.

Expenditure on raising funds

These comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income, fundraising

trading costs and investment management costs.

Expenditure on charitable activities

These comprise the costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and

services in the furtherance of its objects, including the making of grants and

governance costs.

Grants payable All grant expenditure is accounted for on an actual paid basis plus an accrual for

grants that have been approved by the trustees at the end of the year but not yet

paid.

Governance costs These include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory

requirements of the Charity, including any audit/independent examination fees, costs linked to the strategic management of the Charity, together with a share of

other administration costs.

Other expenditure These are support costs not allocated to a particular activity.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from taxation on its charitable activities.
