TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT (continued) YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The Church Schoolmasters and Schoolmistresses' Benevolent Institution (CSSBI) was established on the 2nd January 1857, becoming a charitable company limited by guarantee in June 1894. It is governed by Articles of Association which were last amended on 11 May 2011.

The objectives for which the charity is established are to provide for necessitous present or former teachers/lecturers and those in teacher training who are members of the Church of England or of another recognised Christian denomination by giving financial assistance in times of affliction, disablement or other misfortune, and on their demise to provide for their financial dependants, such financial assistance to include (but not be limited to) assistance towards the cost of subsistence and education in each case anywhere within England and Wales.

We are extremely grateful to those members and friends who continue to support us and in particular our Patron, HM The Queen.

We always require more funding and for anyone wishing to make a donation a form is available by post from our registered office, or on our website at www.cssbi.org.uk. We are able to reclaim tax from HM Revenue and Customs on all donations made under the Gift Aid Scheme.

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. The scope of the Charity was revised in May 2011. We aimed to widen our remit without causing detriment to the current beneficiaries. We agreed that when considering applications for assistance we would use the Churches Together in England and the Churches Together in Wales documents listing recognised Christian denominations.

MEMBERSHIP

The CSSBI Council Members are all guarantors in a sum not exceeding £1 each.

New members are recommended to the CSSBI Council by current members, or by local clergy. It is preferable, but not altogether necessary, that they have an educational background. The Council must approve the nomination before the person takes up the responsibility of a trustee.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Applications for assistance are increasing and we have been able to help a wider range of people. Our web-site www.cssbi.org.uk is continually reviewed and updated. Visitor numbers to this site, both new and those returning, are slightly down on the previous year. They were: CSSBI direct 236, Google 257, Turn2us 278. 347 viewed website through NHS Direct, libraries, dioceses, Ask Lilly, BUPA, Family Action, StepChange Debt Charity, CAP and Community Directories.

We have raised awareness of the CSSBI by contact with organisations such as the Church of England and Catholic Dioceses. The 46 Dioceses in England and Wales are being contacted and CSSBI have been included in some of their E Bulletins and newsletters. We have also featured on the Turn2us charity website as Charity of the Month. Our advertisement in the Church Times produced an immediate response.

TRUSTEES' ANNUAL REPORT (continued) YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Details of the fixed assets are set out in the accounts.

The charity has reserves of £2,686,922 at 31 March 2016 (2015: £2,744,204). The CSSBI directors continue to take advice of a suitably qualified Independent Financial Adviser in order that the reserves are kept in a manner suitable for use by the charity. The principal funding source for the activities of the charity will be the income and or growth of the combined total of the cash on deposit and the investment portfolio.

The investment policy agreed by the trustees of CSSBI is:

- 1) to hold some 20% of the combined cash and investment portfolio on deposit for both normal running costs and the early years distribution of grants to the value of £60,000 per year.
- 2) the remaining 80% to be invested in a broad spread of assets combining both fixed interest and equity based holdings with a geographical split that would represent a realistic approach to investment risk and reward.
- 3) the target growth level for the capital invested remains at 3.5%. This benchmark plus the Consumer Price Index now standing at 0.5% was the target for the year. Overall a balance continues to be sought between capital growth and the potential for income generation.

The directors review financial and other risks when appropriate. They have established procedures to ensure that all transactions and projects are properly authorised.

The CSSBI is in a good position financially to help those in need.

We strive to improve our publicity and communications. We look at marketing activities regularly and continue to make our charity more visible to a greater number of people by, for example, making links to other appropriate websites and organisations such as Independent Age, Friends of the Elderly (FOTE), the Money Advice Service, StepChange Debt Charity and Education Support Partnership (formally Teacher Support Network, Recourse and Worklife Support).

Also during that year, we have joined the Turn2us Charity User Group – to find out how other smaller charities raise awareness of their charities and we have been considering updating our website.

We are approaching the 50 County Community Directories in England and Wales and many now have CSSBI listed on their sites. These comprehensive databases, containing up-to-date information on community groups and organisations, are used by family support workers, social workers, care and support at home services like Staying Put, NHS Direct and local Citizen's Advice Bureaus. They are also linked to Age (UK), StepChange Debt Charity, Money Advice Service and Society of Later Life Advisors. We are also investigating other areas such as Foundations and Home Improvement Agencies.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF CHURCH SCHOOLMASTERS AND SCHOOLMISTRESSES' BENEVOLENT INSTITUTION

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2016 which are set out on pages 7 to 12.

RESPECTIVE RESPONSIBILITIES OF TRUSTEES AND EXAMINER

The trustees (who are also the directors of Church Schoolmasters and Schoolmistresses' Benevolent Institution for the purposes of company law) are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the 2011 Act) and that an independent examination is needed.
