Trustees' Report

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2015. The trustees have adopted the provisions of the Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities' issued in March 2005.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity (RSPCA Clwyd and Colwyn Branch) is constituted as an unicorporated association. The charity operates as an autonomous branch of the National RSPCA subject to its rules for branches (updated in 2006).

A committee is elected at the AGM and governs the branch, who are trustees of the branch. All trustees are briefed on their responsibilities as trustees prior to their acceptance of the role. The trustees regularly review risks which the charity faces on a regular basis covering operational and financial reviews. The trustees also examine other operational and business risks which have been identified as:

- 1. Inability to operate the shops or the animal welfare clinic due to fire or other destruction.
- 2. Loss of reputation through error or fraud
- 3. Loss of income through fraud or error.
- 4. Insufficient funds to cover the cost of animal welfare activities.

The trustees hold meetings alternate months at which decisions are made. The management of the clinic is delegated to the clinic manager as is the Prestatyn shop.

OBJECTIVES AND PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The objectives of the branch are to promote the work of the objectives of the National Society of the RSPCA, with particular reference to the area of the branch.

The key aims are to provide low cost veterinary care to as many members of the public who are on means tested benefit, providing low cost neutering and microchipping for cats and dogs.

The main source of funding for these activities is from the two shops in Old Colwyn and Prestatyn. This income is achieved by a small group of hard working volunteers. The committee would like to express our gratitude for all the hours of work and their continued commitment.

Trustees' Report

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

2015 was another busy year for the branch and its committed volunteers. The need for our services and financial support continues

The Rhyl clinic treated a total of 1642 animals and 639 were treated at the mobile clinic at Peulwys. Our thanks to Jim Mason, veterinary surgeon and his volunteers.

The branch has supported feral cat communities by provided food and trapping, neutering and returning 34 back to their community.

In preparation for the new legislation on Microchipping several microchipping event were held and 245 animals were microchipped.

We have provided assisted costs for 654 neutering's 269 dogs, 380 cats and 5 rabbits. Boarding animals has been a costly business this year with £6,847.40 on cats and

£312-00 on a dog. Tighter control on what animals we will board have been introduced in 2016.

In the spring we joined the other 3 branches in North Wales (Wrexham, West Gwynedd and Aberconwy) and the Cats Protection and collectively neutered 1, 380 cats. In light of this success there is now a year round neutering campaign between The cats Protection League, RSPCA Cymru, and The Wales Board. And will commence in 2016.,

In May the branch supported the Bryn Y Maen annual dog show with its plant stall. Blessed with good weather for a change a good day was had by all and our plant stall raised £114-00 for the shelter.

The shops provide a continuing vital contribution to our branch funds and a huge vote of thanks must go to the volunteers for their wonderful work. The Old Colwyn shop had a refurbishment in July organised by Kirsty, the manager form Prestatyn shop All our devoted regulars have been pleased with the" new look" Thanks to Kirsty for the work at Old Colwyn and her own shop in Prestatyn. The Old Colwyn shop had some rewiring work done in November. The lighting upgraded has improved the shop and sorting room we can now see what we are doing!

In October, the branch appointed Kieren Barlow as its part time Volunteer and Events Manager. In the first three months, he exceeded all the target's he had been set.

He has seen all existing volunteers and has established regular communication links with a newsletter. A proper register of volunteers has been established all new volunteers have been interviewed and referenced. He recruited 8 volunteers in the three months October to December.

He established links with six venues, supermarkets and Pets at Home, to hold fund raising events and the provision of animal welfare information and the role of the RSPCA.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Fund raising is just starting to bring in money and our hope is for that to continue and improve into next year.

In the first quarter of 2016 the Branch identified some irregular financial activity that fell outside the usual Branch payment process. To this end the Branch is working with the bank to investigate these irregularities to understand whether further action needs to be taken.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2015

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005)', issued in March 2005, applicable accounting standards and the Charities Act 2011.

Fund accounting policy

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside at the discretion of the trustees for specific purposes.

Further details of each fund are disclosed in note 15.

Incoming resources

Voluntary income including donations and legacies is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Shop income is recognised as earned (that is, as the related goods or services are provided).

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Income from charitable activities includes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

Governance costs include costs of the preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £500 or more are initially recorded at cost.

Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:
