OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES FOR THE PUBLIC BENEFIT

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing Cardiff & Vale of Glamorgan Parents Federation (Learning Disabilities) aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

Our stated purpose is '...to promote the health and welfare of people with a learning disability in the areas covered by the counties of Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan...'.

We achieve this by offering a mix of direct support, information and coordinating effective carer representation in consultation processes.

Parents and close relatives are typically the prime source of support and assistance in a learning disabled persons life and our services focus around supporting the family carer to be better able to face the challenges of caring. This work compliments the aims of the recent Social Services and Well Being Act (2014).

All our services are free, including the provision of information, literature, individual assistance, organisation membership and newsletters, along with attendance at workshops or events. Furthermore, we reimburse members expenses when attending meetings or events on our behalf in a voluntary capacity.

Support

We aim to help families and carers to be better able to able to continue to cope, through the provision of a variety of carer-focussed support activities.

This includes coordinating carers' information workshops, social and training events and promoting activities that will benefit carers. We also coordinate the annual Understanding Disability awards that celebrate the inclusion of people with a learning disability in everyday life.

Carers and their disabled relatives are supported to enjoy a variety of social gatherings where they meet and exchange experiences, ideas and socialise. At these events, parents overcome social isolation and build confidence and skills to help them continue their caring role.

We are part of a Families First funded project that offers support, information and advice to families and young disabled individuals aged up to 25 and staff offer a hands on service as required to eligible families to help remove some of the barriers to accessing support and services.

We offer similar support to families that care for an adult. For some families this extends to offering an enhanced level of signposting support to ensure that they are put in touch with appropriate sources of support.

Information and Signposting

Information on how to access support or assistance is of critical importance to a disabled individual and their relative/carer. Family carers are very often the only advocate or representative an individual can rely upon to press for the support and services that they should receive.

Our work includes liaising with families to share information, highlight new ways of doing things and promoting new opportunities. This may include entertaining the idea of families 'taking risks' by trying new or better value approaches to facing challenges in daily life.

We produce newsletters, host a website, maintain and update a detailed information guide (Where You Stand) and hold parent meetings to ascertain their views, needs and experiences.

The online version of the Where You Stand website is updated on a daily basis and has been redesigned during this period. We also have a very popular social media presence.

Representation

Another aspect of our work is in pressing for better support services and increased opportunities for people with a learning disability.

This involves our working with many partner bodies and organisations to lobby for improvements, promote or instigate change and encourage new opportunities to be developed.

We support members to participate in key planning forums and networks that influence the strategic direction of existing or future services for people with a learning disability. This covers all age groups and abilities and includes participation in many cross-discipline strategic groups or frameworks at local, regional and national levels.

Members have representation on the Welsh Government and local authority planning groups and various other working groups. We also chair the Learning Disability Partnership Group (LDPG) that covers both Cardiff and the Vale of Glamorgan local authorities and are actively involved in a number of its sub and task groups as well as the Autism Strategic group across Cardiff and the Vale.

This has included leading on the development of a Respite Strategy for the two counties, chairing the cross county Learning Disability Partnership Group and parental participation in many statutory or third sector initiatives.

The Federation often consults its membership for their views on various consultations and surveys in order that we can offer families a means to have their views listened to.

Our consultation responses are recorded on the website so that members can review our consultation activity.

ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE AND FINANCIAL REVIEW

During the year 2015-16 demands for our services have risen dramatically and membership has risen to over 1200. This is in part due to increased referrals via our partners in the Families First project across Cardiff but also attributable to the work we have carried out as part of other projects supported by the Lloyds Bank Foundation grant.

An increasing number of families and disabled individuals are finding themselves unable to meet the stringent criteria for statutory sector funded support while at the same time facing losing DWP and other benefits income. This has resulted in an increased demand for our signposting and information services.

Feedback from families on the support we offer has been very positive and complimentary, suggesting that our services are well received. Feedback from professionals and agencies has been similarly positive.

Staff and volunteers have maintained a visible presence at the various forums and in consultations throughout this time, while volunteers have continued to successfully lobby for improvements in services and against changes and cutbacks. Our social gatherings that aim to link families and carers with one another to enable mutual support and overcome social isolation have been a great success. These continue to flourish with support from the Vale of Glamorgan Council and Lloyds Bank Foundation.

Our social media presence continues to grow with over 750 friends or followers, this offers an invaluable means to communicate with families in real time. Our membership has risen to over 1200 families. Visits to our website are now over 10000 per year and are generating new referrals and feedback from carers.

Ongoing support from the Cardiff and Vale of Glamorgan councils as well as the Families First team in Cardiff, Lloyds Bank Foundation and Consensus has ensured that we have maintained a high quality service and a visible presence during very challenging times.

Reserves Policy

We do not have a reserve contingency fund and have agreed that we need a minimum of 3 months running costs (approximately £26,000). We plan to achieve our stated target over the coming four years by close management of spend and ongoing reduction of overheads. During 2015 we moved offices and this will reduce total spend in years.

Going Concern

Our financial situation is still difficult but we anticipate balanced budgets for the coming year (2016-17) after having covered the small deficit incurred in the period to March 2015. We have secured around 80% of projected income requirements for the current year (2016-17) but trustees are mindful of the uncertainty of future funding and shall take whatever steps are required to ensure that expenditure stays within income at all times. This may involve implementing cuts in services that are not explicitly funded or reducing staff levels, but trustees are confident that the organisation will still be in a position to fulfil its core obligations.

Fundraising remains a priority and several bids are in hand including more consortia bids while others are awaiting an outcome. Other income raising encouraging either direct donations or raising income through members using an online shopping 'portal' are being promoted as trustees have identified these mechanisms as ways carers can support us without needing to pay a membership subscription. Trustees meet to review the financial situation as required and regularly meet to monitor budgets.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

We are involved in several partnership bids for funding that would ensure our longer term sustainability. These include third sector organisations within and outside the disability field. Funding is currently being sought from Welsh Government as well as grant making bodies and we are investigating or piloting various ways in which we can generate additional income from fundraising initiatives.

Our services are constantly changing to reflect needs of our members and in order to ensure best value and efficacy while pursuing our goal of reaching even more difficult to contact families.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee and is governed by a Memorandum and Articles of Association. The company was incorporated on 14 June 1995 and amended by special resolution on 13 July 1999. The charity was registered on 2 August 1999.

The directors of the company also serve as trustees of the charity. Trustees can be voted for at the Annual General Meeting annually by the members or can be co-opted by the board of trustees at any time.

The trustees are developing a policy on risk. In order to address the risk of financial loss, the trustees have a statement on reserves and aim towards building on the current level of reserves. There are procedures in place to help deal with risk in the workplace such as health, safety and security and the relevant insurance policies are in place.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain fixed assets and investments measured at market value. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015), and the requirements of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015).

Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income, any performance related conditions attached have been met or are fully within the control of the charity, the income is considered probable and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Donations and legacy income is received by way of donations, legacies, grants and gifts and is included in full in the statement of financial activities when receivable. Where legacies have been notified to the charity but the criteria for income recognition have not been met, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity, being the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market.
- Investment income is included when receivable.
- Income from charitable trading activity is accounted for when earned.
- Income from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Costs of raising funds comprise the costs associated with attracting donations, grants and legacies and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the sofa on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis, as set out in the notes to the accounts.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued)

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the purposes of the charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for specific purposes. Transfers are made from unrestricted funds to designated funds under the instruction of the trustees.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor.

Netting off of income and expenditure

It is not the policy of the charity to show incoming resources net of expenditure.

Fixed assets

All fixed assets are initially recorded at cost. Items costing less than £200 are not capitalised, but written off directly to the income and expenditure account.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost of an asset, less its estimated residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Office equipment 20% straight line

Debtors and creditors receivable / payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

16. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS
