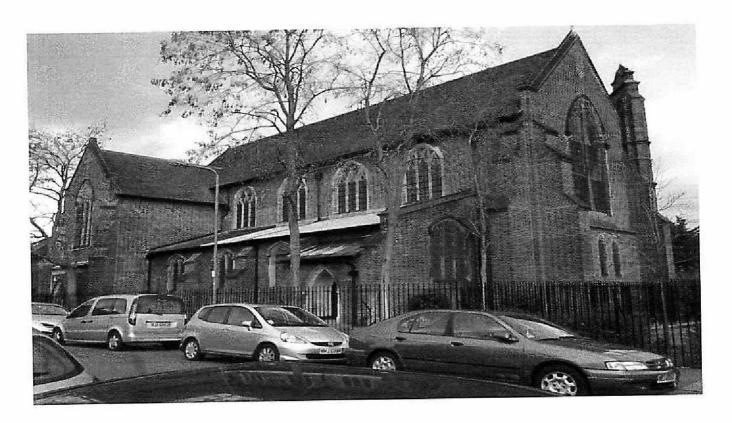

TENTH ANNUAL REPORT 2015-2016

"And I tell you, you are Peter, and on this rock I will build my church, and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. Matthew 16:18

We must learn that whatever we give up for the obedience and glory of God has tremendous potential to be turned into a miracle that will not only bring freedom and deliverance to us, but to others as well. As Moses threw down the rod, it was almost like a throwing down of his past efforts, abilities, and works. Then, God began to work miracles, and in the picking of it back up, God was preparing Moses to see powerful miracles as now HE was the one in control!

The Executive Committee has pleasure in presenting the TENTH Annual Report of St. Peter's Mar Thoma Church East Area, London- UK for the year ended 31st March 2016.

INTRODUCTION:

The Mar Thoma Church owes its origin to the evangelistic works of St. Thomas the Apostle, who came to India in AD 52. The Church is Eastern in worship, Episcopal in tradition, Democratic in administration, Ecumenical in vision and Catholic in mission and follows a modified version of St.

James's liturgy. The relationship between the Anglican Church and the Mar Thoma Church goes back to the reformation of the Church in India in 1836. The two churches have since 1974 been in full communion with one another and are frequently represented at each other's celebrations and conferences. The Mar Thoma Church is a full member of the World Council of Churches and always plays active roles including the Presidency in WCC. Mar Thoma Church was granted membership of the Churches together in England (CTE) and the Churches Together in Britain and Ireland (CTBI). The Marthomites started worshipping in the UK in 1957. St. Peter's Mar Thoma Church was originally formed as the Mar Thoma Congregation East Area - UK in April 2006 and then as a Parish from May 2007.

MISSION, VISION & OBJECTS:

St Peter's Mar Thoma Church East Area, London- UK is a Parish of The Mar Thoma Syrian Church of Malabar, which has its head office in Thiruvalla, Kerala, India. This church is fully committed to serving the spiritual needs of the Malayalee Christians residing in the East Area of England, and promotes Christian harmony and fellowship in the local community. We aim to play an important role in passing our faith, traditions, culture and beliefs to our future generation. In particular, this new church helps and supports new families to the U.K. and welcomes their active participation in Sunday school and various other church activities.

The vision of the Mar Thoma Church is "Lighted to Lighten". St Peter's Mar Thoma Church will endeavour to become the beacon in the UK especially in the East Area in providing spiritual enrichment to individuals and families through Fellowship, Prayer and Worship under the vision of the Mar Thoma Church. We will seek to support evangelistical work where Christianity is promoted. The Parish has a mission to reach people in the East of London and England and provide pastoral care and serve their spiritual needs.



PARISH HISTORY:

St Peter's Mar Thoma Church was first formed as a Mar Thoma Congregation in the East of London & UK. A committee was established in November 2005, and its aim was to establish a new Parish, geographically based in the East Area of UK.

The committee then organised 2 public meetings during December 2005 and January 2006, at the St. Michael's Church, Froud Community Centre, Manor Park where families and individuals residing in the East were invited to express their views. Due to the immense positive backing of these families during this meeting, the committee was subsequently able to collect 35 signatures of support.

The meeting held on 31st January 2006 with our Diocesan Bishop, the Rt. Revd. Dr. Euyakim Mar Coorilos, at St. John's Mar Thoma Church, we have forwarded the signed list of names to the Bishop and effective as of April 2006, our Bishop issued a directive (kalpana) formally establishing a Congregation in the East Area. Revd. Benu John, was appointed by our Bishop as the first Vicar. On 2nd April 2006.

PARISH STATUS:

On 4th March 2007, the General Body unanimously authorised the management committee to request our Diocesan Bishop to establish us as a Parish. Again, a signed list of names was forwarded to our Diocesan Bishop. Following a synod meeting in 2007, a directive was sent from His Grace the Most Revd. Dr Philipose Mar Chrysostom Mar Thoma Metropolitan establishing us as a Church, effective as of 1st May 2007.

St Peter's Mar Thoma Church East Area, London- UK is a Registered Charity in the United Kingdom (Charity Reg. No: 1123807).

PLACE OF WORSHIP:

Our worship services are being held at St. Luke's' Church, Baxter Road, Ilford, IG1 2HN from September 2009. (From April 2006 to August 2009 we were worshiping at St. Michaels Church, Manor Park, London). Revd. John Brown, Vicar of St. Luke's Church, Ilford is so kind enough to provide us the church and its facilities for our regular worship from September 2009. Occasionally we hold special programs at 'Desmond Tutu Hall' beside the Church.



We take this opportunity to express our sincere appreciation and gratitude to Rev. John Brown, The PCC of St. Luke's Church, Ilford and Chelmsford Diocese of Church of England for their unremitting support to us.

RESERVE POLICY:

The parish will set aside reserves to provide financial stability and the means for the sustaining and development of our mission and objectives. As the flow of income is not uniform throughout the year we need reserves to be set aside to meet the expenses, which is more regular in pattern. The Executive Committee has determined that the approximate level of free reserves should be equivalent to four months expenditure. We are pleased to report that the required reserves have been maintained and we continue to operate prudently to build up funds for our future endeavours and developments.

CHILD PROTECTION POLICY:

We have adopted a policy from the Diocese of Chelmsford, based on the requirements of the Children Act 1989, which will be monitored and reviewed as necessary. Key members of the parish and those working with children have undertaken CRB checks in line with legislative procedures

HEALTH AND SAFETY POLICY:

A Health and Safety Policy has been adopted by our church and a manual which is updated regu larly is maintained.

SPONSORSHIP LICENCE:

As a registered charity, according the new UK Immigration laws, our parish is required to obtain the Sponsorship Licence from the UKBA (United Kingdom Border Agency) for bringing our Vicar under Tier 2- Minister of Religion category which will be granted on the basis of certain eligibility criteria set up by the UKBA. The Home Office granted us the Sponsorship Licence with the Rating A.

Our vicar and family were granted entry visa on the basis of Sponsorship Certificate under the Sponsorship Management System. The General body elected Mr. Kurian John as Authorising Officer and Mr. Raju Paul as key contact person from October 2015. As a registered charity, according to the UK immigration laws, this year our parish has successfully renewed Sponsorship Licence for another three years.

MEMBERSHIP:

All baptised persons who have their names in the Parish Register of St Peter's Mar Thoma Church East Area, London - UK are members. All members over the age of 18 years and who partake in the Holy Communion in the parish constitute the General Body of the Church, which currently stands at 129.

Our membership as on 31st March 2014 is 55 Families. In total there are 205 Members in the parish, including children.

Rev. Vinoj Varghese resides in London and also renders outreach work at Birmingham where he extends evangelical guidance to Hermon Mar Thoma Church, Midlands, Birmingham.

VICARAGE

The purchase of a Vicarage of our own has always been a long term goal for our Parish. The Annual General Body Meeting of St. Peter's Mar Thoma Church held on 17th August 2014 suggested the executive committee, to study the feasibility of the purchase of a parsonage through a Bank Mortgage payment. A subcommittee consisting of 5 members to find a suitable house was constituted. A house on sale at Collier Row (154, Clock House Lane RM 5 2TJ), at a distance of 7 miles from the St Luke's Church was selected as the new Vicarage.

The purchase was completed on 30/06/2015 and by the grace of God the Parsonage was dedicated on 14/08/2015 by our Diocesan Bishop Rt. Rev. Geevarghese Mar Theodosius Episcopa. Achen and church members from other UK sister parishes were also joined the Parsonage dedication service.

Our Parish is a contributing member of Council of Marthoma Parishes in Europe (COMPE) which is formed in 2009. Mr. Varghese Mathews is our church representative to COMPE.

CTE & CTBI Membership

We, St. Peter's Mar Thoma Church, London have membership in both Churches Together in England (CTE) and Churches Together in Briton and Ireland (CTBI) and our Vicar, is representing Mar Thoma Church in the CTBI network organization of Faith & order.

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES:

Worship Services

The Holy Communion services are celebrated in Malayalam and English on the first and the third Sundays of the month respectively. Divine services are conducted on second and fourth Sundays. During the year we conducted 70 services of which 43 were Holy Communion services (including 6 at Chelmsford), 27 Divine worship services, 1 Good Friday Services, 1 Christmas Carol Service , 1 Year-End Watch night service and 1 joint service with St. Luke's Church.



Parish Day

The Nineth Parish Day was celebrated on 03 May 2015. Isaac Mar Philoxenos Episcopa (Chennal-Bangalore Diocese) conducted the Parish Day Service. A brief report of Parish activities was read.

Parish Convention

Parish Convention was held from 26/02/2016 to 28/02/2016, at St. Lukes Church and the main speaker was Rev. Dr. Jacob Thomas from Belfast.

Students' Thanksgiving & Dedication Service

Students' thanksgiving and dedication service was held on 06th of September 2015 along with the Holy Communion service.

Christmas Carol Service

The Christmas Carol service was held on 20th of December 2015. The Christmas message was delivered by *The Ven. Dr. John Perumbalath*. The programme was attended by few members from our sister parishes. The choir, under the leadership of Mrs. Jyoti Santhosh

To make the programme more colourful our Sunday school children displayed their talents with some excellent performance. We appreciate the dedication and hard work of the Choir and all others behind the scenes who made it a memorable programme.

House to house caroling was done during the Christmas season where members from all areas actively participated irrespective of their domain. We express our sincere thanks to the convenor Mr. Gimmy Jacob and Mr. Shekhar Ambetkar for the effort to make house caroling to joyful events.

Watch Night Service

We had the Watch Night service on 31st December 2015 at 10.30pm at St. Luke's Church. The service was well attended by many of our members with their families and was a time of thanksgiving, testifying and worshiping.

Harvest Festival:

The Harvest Festival took place on 05th September 2015 at Fanshawe Hall, Barnmead Road, Dagenham, RM9 5DX. The Sevika Sangham organised various stalls with Kerala delicacies. The youth league organised various games and other activities. Auctions of home-made products and other items were the key fund raising activity of the day. We raised a total amount of £ 10,833.00. We express our sincere thanks to the convenors Mr. John K.John & Mr. Sam P.George for their effort to make the Harvest Festival a grand success.

Cultural Program:

This year we had our cultural programme, named 'Kerala Cultural Festival' on 17th of October 2015 at Fanshawe Hall, Barnmead Road, Dagenham, RM9 5DX, which was an opportunity for our children, youths and other members to showcase their talents. Every one enjoyed the traditional Kerala meal served on banana leaves which truly was an opportunity to reminisce our time back home during the season of harvest. The endeavours of Mr. Alex Lukose & Mrs. Sajini Johny who took active part in organising the programme are well appreciated.



Family Sunday:

On 01st of November 2015 our parish celebrated as Family Sunday and Rev. Roney Cherian Vic. Of Carmel Marthoma Church, Liverpool was lead the Holy Communion Service and soon after the service Achen conducted a Family retreat and deliver the speech about the importance of family relationship. During the service parish members were offered Family tithe.

VACATION BIBLE SCHOOL (VBS)

A VBS (Vacation Bibles School) was held under the leadership of Sunday School from 28th May to 31st May 2015 at St. Luke's Church, Ilford. A total of 80 children, attended the VBS. The VBS theme ws The Promise and the VBS Director Mr. Stanley Mathew John from St. John Marthoma Church gave an excellent leadership to the VBS. We express our sincere appreciation to Mr. Gimmy Jacob (VBS-convenor) and all those who supported to make the VBS a very meaningful and memorable one for our children.

From the amount collected through VBS offertory, a sum of £530.00 was given to St.Luke's charity.

CHURCH ORGANISATIONS:

<u>Sunday School</u> - Sunday School is the future church. Sunday school classes are being held every week under the guidance of a dedicated team of teachers. There are 40 students and 15 teachers in our Sunday school which takes an active part in the church services especially during the Christmas Carol programme. They meet regularly after church service between 5-6 pm where classes based on a curriculum designed by the Sunday school board of our North America & Europe Diocese are followed. Mrs. Omana Koshy is currently serving as the Head Master of Sunday School. Mrs, Binitha Rinosh worked as the Secretary during the reporting period. On 04/10/2015 Sunday School has organized a quiz competition after the service at St Luke's Church. Sunday School Anniversary was conducted on 15th November 2015. Our Sunday school celebrated the World Sunday School on the 30/10/2015 at MTC Manchester, where they performed a song and skit.

<u>Sevika Sangham (The Women's Mission)</u> - Sevika Sangham day was also held on 20th of September 2015 along with the service. One day fasting prayer held on 16/01/2015 at St. Luke's Church and the main speaker was Mr. Abraham Thomas from St Johns MTC, Hounslow. Sevika Sangham have regular Bible studies, fasting prayers on Saturdays and prayer on Fridays, where members pray for others based on the prayer request forwarded to all members. Sevika Sangham organises the refreshments after church service every Sunday and they also take a prominent role in the Harvest Festival. Mrs. Gigi Benoy was the Sevika Sangham Secretary for 2015-2016.



<u>Youth Fellowship</u> - Youths have regular meetings after church service. They also have bible studies and take active part in the choir and worship services. It has to be noted that Youth League members have participated in programmes organised by our sister parishes. They also help the parish by arranging the altar for Holy Communion service, monthly cleaning of the church etc. Youth Sunday was celebrated on 18/10/2015 a special dedication service was held for the youth Mr. Sibin Babu Philip worked as the Secretary during the reporting period.

<u>Church Choir</u> - Choir takes active part in leading the regular Sunday Services. The choir practices one hour every Sunday before the worship service and provide the lead role at the Christmas Carol Service. They also participated in the ecumenical service held at St Johns Mar Thoma Church, Hounslow on the 26th of December 2015. We value the dedication of all choir members in ensuring that we have a graceful service on Sundays. Mr. Sam P.George was the Secretary of our church choir for the reporting year and Mrs. Jyoti Sntosh Mrs. Susan Shekhar and Mr. Suraj Alexander served as the Malayalam and English choir leaders respectively. The choir has also taken initiative to learn the new hymns and tunes published by the DSMC of Marthoma church.

<u>Edavaka (Parish) Mission</u> – Edavaka Mission is active in organising Prayer meetings and bible classes. They also give leadership in organising Family Retreats. One day family retreat held on 14/11/2015 at Chelmsford and the main speaker was Rev. Thomas Philip, Vicar of Sinai MTC.
