REPORT OF THE DIRECTORS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2016

The Directors have pleasure in submitting the Report and Accounts for the year.

Objects of the charity

The object of the Centre for Theology and Community Limited is 'to advance public knowledge and mutual understanding of the teachings, traditions and practices of different faith communities including promoting good relations between persons of different faiths in particular but not exclusively by providing education and training, developing a network in order to share good practice and experience, by facilitating supervised placements for students and by engaging in research.'

Our main area of operation is East London, and our work is primarily with Christian congregations – equipping them to work with their neighbours for community transformation, through the practices of community organising, theological reflection and prayer, and helping them to use their resources more effectively to fulfil this mission. A key partner in this work is Citizens UK, and its local affiliate, London Citizens.

Government

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 15th June 2006 and registered as a charity on 21st November 2007. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established its objects and powers, and is governed by its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up, its members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

Recruitment and appointment of members of the Trustee Board:

The directors of the company are also charity Trustees for the purposes of charity law. At the end of the first year, all Trustees are required to retire, and one third will do so at subsequent Annual General Meetings. The Trustees have all received training on their responsibilities, and the Chair of Trustees is responsible for the induction of new Trustees, when the occasion arises. This involves ensuring awareness of a Trustee's responsibilities, the governing document and the work of the charity.

Organisational Structure:

The Trustees are responsible for setting policy and strategy. Day-to-day management and running of the charity is delegated to Canon Dr Angus Ritchie, the Executive Director.

Membership:

The membership of the charity currently comprises the original signatories to the Memorandum of Association.

Achievements and Performance

Our work is now divided into three main streams:

1. Community Organising

Our year-long **congregational development** programme engaged 7 churches, helping hundreds of local people apply their faith to public life, building relationships of solidarity and trust with neighbours of other faiths and of none. The programme will double in size in the year ahead.

Our month-long summer **Urban Leadership School** trained 15 young leaders in community organising, and our year-long **Buxton Leadership Programme** placed 3 people in both Westminster and local churches to learn Christian political leadership.

We also continue to run the East London **Near Neighbours** Programme for DCLG and the Church Urban Fund, and have developed it to focus more intentionally on supporting organising at a very local level.

2. Reflection and Resources

We published 8 reports including original research and reflection on **church planting**, **London's housing crisis**, **monasticism** and **community organising**. We also published **Keeping the Faith** jointly with Theos.

We also produced new bible study guides and resources to help churches think through how to respond to the housing crisis in London – **Building Something Better** and **Who Is My Neighbour?** – and produced prayer and worship resources for **Living Wage Week** in November.

3. Enterprise

The London Missional Housing Bond – which we have developed with the Diocese of London, the Eden Network and Mission Housing – purchased its second house and has now raised nearly \mathfrak{Llm}

We played a key role in developing and then project-managing **Clean for Good**, a new ethical Living Wage cleaning company for London

Our pilot **Church Credit Champions Network** met its targets, had Credit Champions commissioned by the Archbishop of Canterbury and is to be rolled out nationally by the Church Urban Fund

In planning the activities the Directors have had regard to the guidance on public benefit issued by the Charity Commission in December 2008.

Financial Review

The Charity's accounting period ended on 5 April 2016. Unrestricted free reserves at 5 April 2016 were £20,312 (2015 - £10,805).

Note on Net Movement in Funds

The net movement in funds for this year shows a deficit. This is a result of the charity expending nearly all of its Restricted Funds this year as some of our major projects neared completion and was intentional. The charity also has a significant amount of deferred income for projects which is due to be recognised in 2016-17 and which is explained in the Notes to the Accounts.

Principal Funding Sources

The main funders for the year and income relating to the year for each funder are outlined in the accounts.

Investment Policy

The funds received during the period under review were not sufficient to justify separate investment.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees recognise the need for a reasonable level of reserves to protect the charity from fluctuations in funding and sudden emergency requirements. It is our aim to build up a reserve representing three months' annual expenditure from unrestricted funds. We are seeking to increase the amount of income which is either grants towards CTC's core costs or earned income, enabling us to make significant progress towards this target. 2015-16 is now the second successive year in which we have generated a modest operating surplus of unrestricted funds – and this is a trajectory we intend to pursue in future years.

Plans for future periods

We have appointed a new Director of our **Urban Leadership School** – Revd Richard Springer – who will be leading its expansion with new streams:

- o Cardinal Manning Programme, for Roman Catholics
- o William Seymour Programme, for Pentecostals and Baptists

In the autumn, we will run the third year of our pioneering **Congregational Development Learning Community** for churches engaged in community organising – including a new stream helping churches to grow numerically through organising.

Autumn 2016 will see the launch of **Clean for Good**, a new ethical cleaning company for London, which we have been project-managing.

Forthcoming research reports include Property for Mission, Ministry on the Margins and Music for Mission.

Risk Statement

A comprehensive review of risks was carried out in 2012. The responses to these have been implemented, and risks are kept under continuous review. The Trustees have commissioned a further comprehensive review, which is now underway.

Directors' Responsibilities

Charity law requires us as Directors to prepare financial statements for each accounting year which give a true and fair view of the state of the charity and of its income and expenditure for the year.

- 1. Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently
- 2. Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- 3. State whether the applicable accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the accounts.
- 4. Prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

We are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable us to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006.

We also have a responsibility to safeguard the assets of the charity and to take reasonable steps to prevent fraud or any other irregularities.

Preparation of the report

This report of the Board of Trustees has been prepared taking advantage of the small companies exemption of section 415A of the Companies Act 2006.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE TRUSTEES OF

CENTRE FOR THEOLOGY AND COMMUNITY LIMITED

I have examined the accounts for the year ended 5 April 2016 on pages 7 to 13 following which have been prepared on the basis of the accounting policies set out on page 9.

Respective Responsibilities of Directors/Trustees and Examiner

The directors/trustees of the company are responsible for the preparation of accounts; they consider that the audit requirements under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 do not apply but that an independent examination is needed. I have been appointed to conduct an Independent Examination required by section 145 of the Charities Act 2011 and to report in accordance with the regulations made under section 145 of that Act. It is my responsibility to examine the accounts, without performing an audit, and to report to the trustees.

Having satisfied myself that the company is not subject to audit under company law and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:

- (1) examine the accounts under section 145 of the Charities Act 2011;
- (2) follow the procedures laid down in the general Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145(5)(b) of the Charities Act 2011;
- (3) state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

The charity's gross income exceeded £250,000 and I am qualified to undertake the examination

Basis of Examiner's Statement

This report is in respect of an examination carried out under section 145 of the Charities Act 2011, and in accordance with the general directions given by the Charity Commissioners. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charity, and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes a review of the accounts and making such enquiries as are necessary for the purpose of this report. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.

Examiner's Statement

Notes to the Accounts FOR THE YEAR ENDED 5 APRIL 2016

1 Accounting Policies

The accounts have been prepared under the historic cost convention, in accordance with applicable accounting standards and follow the FRSSE Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting by Charities 2015.

The directors consider that sufficient finance will be available for continuing operations into 2017 and the accounts have therefore been prepared on a going concern basis. The following are the accounting policies which have been applied in dealing with material items:-

a) Donated and grant income:

Donated income and grants receivable are taken into account when received by the charity. Income received in circumstances where a claim for repayment of tax has been or will be made to HM Revenue & Customs is grossed up for the tax recoverable. Any amount of tax reclaimed from HM Revenue & Customs but not yet received is shown within the charity's debtors.

b) Other income and expenditure:

Investment income is taken into account when receivable.

Expenditure, including irrecoverable VAT, when incurred by the charity, regardless of when payment is made. Most projects make a fair and proportional contribution to overheads as agreed with the relevant funder. Grants payable are taken into account at the earlier of when they are paid or become constructive obligations.

c) Funds:

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income received or generated for the objects of the charity without specified purpose and are available for purposes as directed by the trustees. Restricted funds are amounts received where the donor has specified the purpose for which it should be used.

d) Fixed assets and depreciation:

Fixed assets acquired for use by the charity are capitalised and depreciated over their estimated useful life unless they cost less than £500 when they are written off on purchase.

Depreciation periods are as follows:

Equipment Between 3 and 7 years

e) Pension costs:

The company operates a defined contribution scheme for certain of its employees. Pension premiums are charged as they are paid.

f) <u>Taxation</u>

The company is a registered charity and is exempt from taxation under the Income & Corporation Taxes Acts.

g) <u>Cashflow statement</u>

The company has taken advantage of the exemption provided by the Financial Reporting Standard 1 and has not prepared a Cash Flow Statement for the year.
