STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The organisation's original name was Teenage Information Network established by a Trust Deed dated 26th March 1981. The organisation became a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 17th January 1997. In 1997 the organisation changed its name to Faces in Focus and re-registered the charity in the new name as from 14th August 1997. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association, which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed by its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up, members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The directors/trustees actively review the risk, which the charitable company faces on a regular basis and will endeavour to maintain the reserve levels around its current figure. The review of the controls of the financial systems will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The trustees have also examined other operational and business risks faced by the charitable company and confirm that the trustees have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The Company shall have a Management Committee comprising not less than three and not more than fifteen persons as follows:

- (a) Not more than ten persons elected by and from the membership at the Annual General Meeting: and
- (b) In addition, the Management Committee shall have the power to co-opt up to two persons who are not members of the Company for their specialist skills and or knowledge to the Management Committee.

Trustees are recruited through advertising in the community and voluntary sector resources such as the Southwark Volunteer Centre and Do-it-All websites, the NCVO Trustee Bank, service users and networks. The Management Committee has eight trustees with a diverse range of backgrounds including finance, business sector and human resources.

New trustees are required to fill in an application form, visit the organisation and meet the Operations Coordinator to discuss the services and operations of the charity and are invited to observe a Management Committee meeting before their application is accepted and confirmed. There is no entitlement for any other external person or organisation to appoint trustees.

Trustee Induction and Training

The new trustees/directors are provided with a Management Committee induction pack which includes the following: The main document which set out the operational framework for the charity including the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The job description of the roles and responsibilities of being a director and trustee.

Resourcing and the current financial position as set out in the latest published accounts.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Our charity's purposes as set out in the objects contained in the company's Memorandum of Association are to: Promote the moral and social welfare and preservation of the health of young persons aged between 11 and 25 years old living or working in Greater London in particular in the London Boroughs of Southwark, Lambeth and Lewisham by any charitable means.

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

Faces In Focus provides an integrated service, with counselling, information, advice and guidance (IAG) and careers advice all under one roof. Of these services, counselling and the IAG service are provided directly by Faces In Focus; other services are provided by London Borough of Southwark, Connexions service.

This integrated service ensures the organisation delivers its stated aim of providing a comprehensive information, advice, counselling and volunteering organisation.

Comprehensive client records are kept for each service, whether they come to the organisation via referral or drop in, using a case management system, in line with the Data Protection Act.

Evaluation of services is undertaken regularly. The counselling service adheres to NHS and BCAP guidelines.

The focus of our work

The focus of the organisation's work is young people 11-25, living in the London Boroughs of Southwark and Lambeth. However, diversification of our funding for both IAG and Counselling now means we can see more clients from Lewisham and other London boroughs.

How our activities deliver public benefit

Our main activities and who we assist are described below. All charitable activities focus on providing a comprehensive service of information, advice, counselling, volunteering opportunities and resources for young people aged between 11-25 years.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Currently the organisation provides one main area of service provision:

Counselling Project

The counselling service has seen an increase in the referral of young people with complex needs, especially those with eating disorders, self-harming and historic sexual abuse. We have continued to expand our partnership working and have delivered outreach sessions at Blackfriars Settlement and the Salmon Centre. Our referral base has also increased and we receive referrals from a range of statutory and voluntary agencies. We continue to provide a confidential, listening space allowing for reflection during a very traumatic time in the individual's life. We have continued to work with young women who are themselves, victims of this gun and knife culture, as they may be having relationships with the young men who are either victims or perpetrators

Faces In Focus Independent Examiners Report to the Trustees For the year ended 31 March 2016

The Trustees, who are also directors for the purposes of company law, are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the charitable company and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit and consequently no opinion is given as to whether the accounts present a 'true and fair view' and the report is limited to those matters set out in the statement below.
