1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

Chairperson report for year ending 31st March 2016

2015-2016 has seen yet more growth for the charity as well as changes within the trustee team and staff. The trustees have met 4 times a year in person and held numerous online meetings. Tony resigned his position as a Trustee at the 2015 AGM and the remaining Trustees request that he accept the position of Patron, which he graciously did. Additionally, following a meeting with her in Plymouth the Conservative peer, Baroness Julia Cumberledge also accepted a Patronage for the charity. Abigail Briggs, Shazia Zafar and Majeet Shehmar joined the board of trustees which has added significant strength to the professionals represented on the board as Abi is a midwife and Manjeet is a consultant obstetrician and gynaecologist. I continued in the role of Chairperson, Roger accepted the role of Vice Chair and Treasurer and Caroline accepted the role of Secretary.

The office and appointment of Karen as a full time employee has been a great success for the charity and resulted in steady growth. In the calender year 2014-2015 the charity received in the region of 600 calls to the helpline, around 50% of which were matched with one of our peer support volunteers. This is anticipated to have increased by an additional 50% by the end of 2016. Volunteer numbers has also increased steadily. In the Autumn of 2015 a physical phone line was installed in the office so that for the first time in the charity's history the helpline moved from and answerphone-callback system to an instant response service during office hours. Messages can still be left outside of these hours and call backs are made the following morning. This has been a huge success.

The forum has also continued to grow and offers a unique and safe environment for women to access peer support online 24/7. Our social media strategy remains proactive and strong and is working to promote our reputation and awareness of the condition.

The Charity's income has remained steady from the previous year and is predominantly from private donations. Lottery bids remain unsuccessful but avenues are being explored.

A healthcare professional conference was held May 2015. This was deemed a great success with attendance of over 50 healthcare professionals from across the country.

A number of Trustees attended the RCM Conference again in November 2015 which was an excellent opportunity for networking and education for midwives. The charity has also published a number of articles in the medical and lay press over the last year. In particular the charity has conducted it's own research on the impact of suggesting ginger for women with HG and has collaborated with the British Pregnancy Advisory Service to produce a research report on women's experiences of terminating pregnancy for HG. This was met with a massive and positive media response making headlines for a full week including a front page of the Times article and a feature on Women's Hour.

We were shortlisted for a number of awards in 2015 including Third Sector Awards: Small Charity, Big Achiever; Charity Partnership (for our work with bpas); Charity Chairperson of the Year. The latter of these was won and the shortlisting for the rest was a huge boost to moral. We were also shortlisted for the RCM Charity of the Year but did not win.

A number of Trustees attended the first International Colloquium for Hyperemesis Gravidarum in Norway in October 2015 which saw researchers from across the globe come together to further research and service development. This was a great opportunity to improve international collaboration and promote our unique peer support system which many other countries would like to emulate. I am keen that PSS host the next International conference in 2017 in the UK and will work to achieve this ambition through 2016.

The RCOG Guidelines are still in process, which Roger Gadsby and Margaret O'Hara regularly update us on, they will be launched in the summer of 2016. It is hoped these guidelines will have a significant impact on the care women across the UK receive and will be a welcome addition to the information we can provide to sufferers and Health Care professionals. A media strategy is being planned for this.

Further growth is anticipated in 2016 and numerous publications, conferences and further awards are in the pipeline. We are also looking to produce a short promotional film about our work.
