The above objectives were achieved due to a dedicated team of volunteers investing their time in Charls Tiwala and three part-time staff; working on the frontline with vulnerable women, and doing administrative tasks.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year	<ul> <li>Between April 2015 and March 31st 2016 Charis Tiwala has supported people who have been affected by human trafficking or sexual exploitation within the sex industry. This is primarily through outreach to sex establishments, and also working with Herts County Council doing online outreach.</li> <li>Charis Tiwala has built links/partnerships with other agencies, charitable bodies and institutions to help provide the best holistic care for the people that they support.</li> <li>Outputs achieved by Charis Tiwala: <ul> <li>1456 hours of volunteering. 587 hours of which were outreach to sex establishments, reaching 33 women; 79% UK born, 18% Eastern European and 3% Asian.</li> <li>Charis Tiwala chaducted online outreach for five months (42 hours) and contacted 453 people working in the sex industry in Hertfordshire; 39% UK born, 38.2% Eastern European, 3.5% Asian and 21.4% other.</li> <li>Charis Tiwala chadulished a project called Forte Bakery (teaching women in the sex industry basic baking skills and life skills). Three six week courses were run during April 2015 - March 31st 2016 and 9 women completed the courses.</li> <li>Charis Tiwala has supported 1 woman who exited the sex industry, and helped them re-locate and find employment.</li> <li>Charis Tiwala had a stand at two conferences to raise awareness about human trafficking and sexual exploitation to other professionals and community groups</li> <li>Charis Tiwala had a stand at two conferences to raise awareness about human trafficking and sexual exploitation within the sex industry, the charity and to generate income.</li> </ul> </li> </ul>
