

Our Mission

For Life's mission is to bring life and lasting change to disabled children in Thailand. We bring the love of Jesus by tackling the root causes of the injustice and abandonment that they are facing.

Our Vision

For Life's long-term vision is to see disabled children flourishing in their communities and secure in their families.

Our Aims and Objectives

We are transforming the lives of over 600 disabled children, many of whom are abandoned and stigmatized because of their disabilities.

For Life achieves its mission by partnering with the Christian Care Foundation for Children with Disabilities (CCD) - a Thai registered NGO established in 1997. CCD's projects include a purpose-built residential home (Rainbow House), day-care centres within Government-run institutions, and community-based rehabilitation projects (CBR). CCD is also working with young adults to develop vocational training, financial independence and full integration into society.

For Life's main areas of activity are:

- 1. To provide financial aid for the disabled and abandoned children in Thailand by raising funds for CCD.
- 2. To raise awareness for the plight of disabled children in Thailand and to educate the general public in the UK about disability in Thailand, and disability rights.
- 3. To screen and train volunteers to go to work with the children in Thailand.

Our Values

The values of selflessness, compassion, humility and servant-heartedness are at the core of the organisation.

Structure

For Life is a Charitable Company Limited by Guarantee, with Articles of Association dated 10th April 2011. For Life Trust ('For Life') incorporated from the original charity For Life (Registered Charity Number 1104291) on 1st February 2012. The Official Transfer document was signed 28th January 2012 and came into effect after close of business on 31st January 2012 when all monies, IP rights and policies were transferred across from the unincorporated Charity Number 1104291.



Management

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the trustees, who have delegated day-to-day powers to the Managing Director according to agreed policy.

Julia Burns stepped down as Managing Director on 31st December 2015 and Andrew Cooper started on 18th April 2016. During the interim period, Susie Doyle and the other Trustees took an active role in the day-to-day running of the charity.

Governance

The existing Board of Trustees are responsible for the appointment of new directors/trustees. Following a recruitment drive we are pleased to welcome two new board members: Ms Justine Clifford and Ms Olubukola Fashade. As planned, Lydia George (one of the founders of For Life) also joined the Board of Trustees.

REVIEW OF ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Fundraising for our Partner Charity CCD

Through our grant making activity we aim to support and strengthen CCD as they deliver services to disabled children in Thailand. This year has seen a drop in our income; this was expected and is a result of staff changes. We have also had increased costs in the UK as we have taken on full-time staff. This has subsequently resulted in a reduction to the amount given to CCD.

Our priority continues to be to increase our regular givers. This regular income, in particular the standing orders, enable For Life and CCD to work strategically and focus on sustainability. Total standing orders are lower than last year, but we expect this to begin to rise as new staff establish new relationships. As before we have found that standing orders generally come from people who volunteered in Thailand, adopted children or are friends and family of volunteers.

Sponsored challenges are another key way that our supporters raise money. We use platforms including Virgin Money and Just Giving to do this. We are still moved by the number of supporters who are still willing to work hard to raise money for the work; they all express a very personal commitment to the children, either because they have witnessed it themselves or heard of the plight of the children through friends or family.

Our Christmas gift list continues to bring about a very positive response from our supporters and this year was the seventh edition. This is an excellent source of income, but perhaps most importantly, it also helps to maintain a strong relationship with our supporters and it enables them to feel personally connected to the work as they provide a very personal gift.

The money transferred to Thailand this year was £45,000 through two separate grants. This is a significant drop from last year, but we were able to give CCD advanced warning and explain that we expect it to rise again next year. For all of the transfers made, a detailed breakdown of the restricted



giving was sent to the Executive Director, Wasan Saenwian, so that the money was spent on the restricted items in accordance with the Charity Commission regulations. An annual report is produced by CCD each year showing their audited expenditure figures. Our staff made two trips to CCD this year ensuring accountability between For Life and CCD as to how the money is spent.

Case Study: Meet Boi

Boi's name has been changed to preserve his privacy as he lives in the Feung Fah government orphanage home.


Boi is an eight-year old boy with a dual diagnosis of Cerebral Palsy and Autistic Spectrum Disorder, living on a ward of the government orphanage home alongside sixty other children with similar physical and cognitive disabilities. Boi loves to be active and to explore his surroundings, he is a quick crawler and enjoys throwing objects, whether that be toys, balls, shoes or anything else he can get his hands on! The ward staff are unable to manage Boi's behaviour.

The CCD Daycare Centre is where Boi is able to find his freedom. He is allocated a one-to-one staff member to ensure he can play and explore safely. Staff take time to help Boi to develop his ability to engage in a wider range of activities. This includes using the outdoor area where Boi has found another place to be active and have fun on the sunken trampoline, whilst also discovering a calming activity in using the big basket swing. In addition to this Boi receives physiotherapy through CCD and has access to specialist equipment, such as a

standing frame to support his physical development. Boi can walk short distances with support from an adult and his physio program has been tailored especially for him through incorporating a big yoga ball for him to push whilst walking.

Additionally day care staff have the time and patience to encourage Boi to walk between different activities and to develop independence as much as possible. The transformation for Boi has been remarkable and the gifts from For Life's supporters have made this possible.







Case Study: Meet Bet

Bet, full name Jakkreit Pramai-Ngam, was born in 1992 with a congenital limb abnormality which means his right leg is only half length. Aged 4, he was left by his mum, and first went to Baan Fuang Fah and then Baan Nonthapum, the government institutions in Pakkred.

"I wanted to give something back to CCD."

Bet's future was looking hopeless, but then he came to live in CCD's group home called Vision House when he was 8 years old. He was able to go to school with support and help from CCD, and graduated from High School in 2011 (pictured right with Khru Ning, Rainbow House Manager). Thanks to help and support from CCD's educational fund, he then went to Suan Dusit University for four years to get a degree in Computer Business. He finished at the end of 2014 and then chose to work for CCD in the office rather than getting a job elsewhere. When asked why he is now working at CCD he says 'I wanted to give something back to CCD, so when Khun Wasan asked me where I wanted to apply for a job, I said "I want to work for you dad".'

With the gifts from For Life's supporters, young people like Bet have the opportunity to gain independence and to integrate into mainstream society.



Volunteer Screening and Training

Volunteers continue to be a huge asset to the work of CCD and form a significant part of For Life's partnership with CCD. For Life continue to screen and train volunteers from the UK and Europe to ensure that they are suitable for working with children and vulnerable adults, but also to prepare them for living and working within the CCD context and Thai culture. This training is usually provided by For Life, however, in the case of very short term visitors (less than two weeks) who are accompanied by a former volunteer or visiting a current volunteer, CCD provide basic training instead. This is arranged on a case-by-case basis, in discussion with the CCD Volunteer Coordinator.

Biz Boyle has taken on the role of CCD Volunteer Coordinator (since October 2015), and communication between CCD and For Life regarding volunteers is clear with smooth procedures overall. Biz provides much-needed pastoral support for volunteers whilst they are at CCD, and gives constructive feedback to For Life regarding individual volunteers and teams. We are grateful for this



input and the opportunity it gives for improvement in our recruitment to ensure a high calibre of volunteers who will be an asset to CCD.

Volunteers are placed in the CCD day care centres or alongside CCD staff in the government wards, working Monday-Friday from 8am-4pm. Volunteers assist CCD staff in providing care and delivering activities, or sometimes taking the lead in activities they themselves have prepared in consultation with CCD staff.

This year For Life has screened and trained 33 volunteers on behalf of CCD. Of those, 5 were long-term volunteers (three months or longer), and 2 were returning volunteers. Of the total 33 volunteers, 22 were from the Leeds University RAG Project, forming four teams - two teams were placed in the Pakkred projects, and two at CBR Manarom. Each RAG volunteer also had a minimum fundraising requirement of £700 set by the Leeds RAG Project.

The volunteer screening service is provided free of charge to volunteers, and For Life pay the cost of Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS) checks. Volunteers cover their own costs for all travel arrangements.

Biz Boyle continued in the role of For Life Volunteer Coordinator until the end of May 2015, after which it was absorbed into the Managing Director's role, held by Julia Burns, until 31st December 2015. Charis Todd was then appointed as part-time (two days) Volunteer Coordinator (and Fundraising Support) from 24th March 2016. In the interim period from January-March 2016, Biz Boyle managed the role remotely from Thailand, with support from Susie Doyle in the UK.

What do volunteers say?

"Volunteering for me at CCD has had such a huge impact on my life. It's a charity that I just keep coming back to and this is now my 4th time in Thailand. I first came out in 2010 for 5 months and now have committed to a year at CCD with my husband. From my experience, the love you can give to the children and adults under CCD through volunteering and serving goes such a long way. It has certainly changed my life for the better"

Future Plans

The Trustees are pleased with the level of expertise on the board at present. However, they are still in need of a HR specialist and the search for someone continues.

The Trustees are keen to see For Life's level of income increase and further grants being made to CCD. For Life hopes to explore and apply to grant making trusts, but also to continue to grow the



number of individuals giving regularly to For Life. Since For Life's inception, this has been a significant source of income and reflects the personal relationship that For Life has with CCD.

Whilst the Trustees are pleased with the number and quality of volunteers being screened, trained and sent to Thailand, they are keen to ensure that this process is constantly being reviewed. The Trustees are particularly focused on ensuring that volunteers are supported as they leave Thailand and transition to being back at home.

CCD's significant plans for next year are to:

- open a new Community Rehabilitation sub-centre in Chai Nat province
- refurbish the main Community Based Rehabilitation Centre in Nonthaburi province
- build a new outdoor sports area

Public Benefit

The trustees have complied with their duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 and have paid due regard to public benefit when preparing this report. The benefit provided to the public is consistent with the aims of the charity.

Financial results for the Year

For Life's income this year was £94,681 and expenditure was £98,107. The deficit of £3,427 was financed by drawing on reserves, leaving total reserves of £16,730. This is slightly lower than the Trustees' target level of reserves. In last year's Annual Report, the reserves figure was incorrectly stated as £5,525.23; reserves at the end of the last financial year were £20,157.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees' policy is to maintain reserves sufficient to cover six months' operational expenditure and to meet contractual obligations, e.g. redundancy costs, in the event of having to close the business. On this basis the present target figure is £18,645.
