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DIRECTORS' AND TRUSTEES REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2016

The trustees are pleased to present their annual directors' report for the year ended 31 August 2016 which are also prepared to meet the requirements for a directors' report and accounts for Companies Act purposes.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association, and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standing applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16 July 2014.

Aims, Objectives and Activities

As a registered charlty Circomedia's aims are 'to promote vocational training in circus skills, physical theatre, and education and training in the creative and artistic application of circus skills and physical theatre in artistic performance'.

Circomedia set out in its 2013-18 business plan that it will pursue these aims by providing:

- a training academy that is driven by a commitment to high professional standards, that offers
 creative opportunity to students and is delivered through the skills and techniques of circus
 theatre
- a creation centre that offers circus and circus theatre practitioners support in professional development, education, training, rehearsal and performance space to artists and companies from across the UK
- a professional booking agency that provides employment and professional development opportunities for our students and practitioners
- a performance venue showcasing new and emerging work that focusses on physical performance and which puts Bristol at the heart of this work in the UK
- informed and credible advocacy for circus theatre in the UK and strategic leadership for the sector.

Introduction

Circomedia, the Centre for Contemporary Circus and Physical Performance, was established in 1993 as a response to the growing international interest in new approaches to popular performance. It has grown into one of only two organisations in the UK providing full time, degree-level, education for those who are interested in contemporary circus. At the end of their course, students attain not only their optimum level of physical expertise but also an understanding of how these skills can be used to create both physical theatre and quality entertainment. Circomedia is unique in the UK for its provision of high calibre professional education which focuses on the artist as a creator, integrating traditional circus skills with dance and physical theatre to create a performance style which transcends barriers of age, education, language gender and culture.

DIRECTORS' AND TRUSTEES REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2016

Alongside its formal education activity, Circomedia offers other routes for people to gain knowledge and understanding of circus and physical theatre and to benefit from participating in its activities – physically, emotionally and socially. These include a thriving youth circus, a range of classes for people of all abilities, a performance programme of community, student and professional work, and contributions to other organisations' events through leading workshops, participating in performances and other inputs. It also supports graduates and other artists in establishing careers and furthering their knowledge and understanding.

Summary of main activities of the charity in relation to its objects

The principal activities of the company during the period were that of the promotion and education of circus skills and physical theatre

Review of Development, activities and achievements during the year

Circomedia runs a three formal courses, a two year Foundation Degree in Contemporary Circus with Physical Performance, and a BA Hons top-up year, both validated by Bath Spa University; and a BTEC National Diploma in Performing Arts (Circus) for which Circomedia is a registered Pearson Centre, accrediting the qualification itself and partnered by Weston College for funding and quality assurance. It also offers a one year vocational course at Level I and Level 2, and a three month introductory vocational course. Graduates of the vocational full time courses receive a certificate of attendance from Circomedia but no formal qualification.

94 students attended, across the five full time courses, during the year.

Full-time students are aged between 16 and 39 with 84% under 25. 82% of students describe themselves as white European, with the other 18% being of other heritages. 27% of students report some form of disability, primarily dyslexia. Previous years' experience suggests that two thirds of them will succeed in finding work within the industry as teachers and/or performers and directors.

Circomedia also runs a popular Youth Circus, with 400 young people benefitting from skills and social development under its aegis during this year, each attending 10 sessions on average.

On average, 16 classes in informal education took place each week, benefitting 373 adults, each of whom attended 13 sessions on average.

A number of projects took place outside of Circomedia's two sites, with several thousand people witnessing the work of students and participants at festivals, and a further thousand participating in introductory activities in parks and open spaces.

The professional performance programme at St Paul's Church grew by 65%, in the number of performances, and the audience by 97% in 2015/16 compared to 2014/15.

Applications for revenue funding were submitted at the beginning of 2014 to Arts Council England and Bristol City Council, and Circomedia was successful in securing a further three years of funding from both organisations for the period 2015-18. The full amounts due under each agreement were received in the 2015/16 year. In addition, an application to Arts Council England for a grant to support Circomedia's development of its fundraising capacity, and so improve its resilience, was successful in August 2016 and will provide additional income up until August 2019.

DIRECTORS' AND TRUSTEES REPORT FOR YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2016

Some changes to the staff structure were implemented in 2015/16. These clarified roles and responsibilities amongst academic staff, and strengthened the development agency side of Circomedia, thus improving the company's delivery of education, community engagement and income generation.

Circomedia plays an important role in the Bristol Circus Forum, and during 2014/15 contributed significantly to the Circus City Festival held in October 2015.

There were 5,547 attendances at the festival overall, of which a quarter were to performances at Circomedia. 70% of the audience for the first event were new to Circomedia, and the festival increased awareness of the organisation significantly.

Circomedia's representative on the Forum also contributed to the national steering group of Circus 250, the planned celebration of 250 years of modern circus in 2018, and to facilitating the participation of other Bristol and regional organisations and artists in this major event.

Financial Review

Circomedia's income from its activities increased again in 2015/16, its grants from Arts Council England and Bristol City Council stayed at the previous year's level and its income from trusts and foundations was reduced compared to 2014/15. Core costs rose in line with the increase in activity that led to the increased turnover.

Overall course income increased again as improved marketing during 2015 led to an increase of 60% in student numbers for the 2015-16 Foundation Degree intake. Retention rates on all other years were also good.

Use of St Paul's Church has grown year after year with BTEC Diploma education, youth circus sessions, a busy adult recreational class schedule, an increased programme of professional and student performances and commercial hires taking place. These strands all makes a contribution to core building and staffing costs.

The total of grants received from Arts Council England as part of the National Portfolio funding programme, and that from Bristol City Council's Key Arts Provider programme, have now reduced to 15% of annual turnover, with both grants remaining at the same level as the previous year.

Net income and expenditure for 2015/16, although in deficit, show a reduction in net deficit compared to 2014/15. A prior year adjustment in relation to deferred rental payments was necessary in the light of Information gained after the previous year's inspection.

Investment Policy

Aside from retaining a prudent amount in reserves each year most of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term so there are few funds for long term investment.

Reserves Policy

Circomedia's Reserves Policy aims to hold adequate reserves as follows:

To provide adequate cash flow to fund activities

To ensure continuity of activities during periods of change

To enable Circomedia to fulfil legal obligations should it cease to operate

The Trustees consider it appropriate to maintain free reserves representing 2-3 months of core activity.

Optimum target level reserves are therefore £174,000, and minimum £116,000, relative to 2015/16 costs. At 31 August 2016 free reserves in net current assets stood at £89,000, significantly below target level.

More robust steps will therefore be taken in 2016/17 to ensure that there is an adequate level of contingency within budgets to mitigate exceptional costs or absorb changes in funding levels that are increasingly likely in the current climate.

To develop plans for improved teaching, creation and rehearsal space.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 13/05//94 and registered as a charity on 16/07/96. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.00.

Recruitment and Appointment of Management Committee

One third of the members of the Board (or the nearest to one third) shall retire from office at the Annual General Meeting. The members of the Board to retire in every year shall be those who have been longest in office since their last election. Retiring members of the council shall be eligible for reelection.

Trustee Induction and Training

No new trustees were appointed during 2015-16.

Risk Management

As part of the Business Plan, the Charity's trustees have given consideration to the major risks to which the charity is exposed and also procedures designed to manage those risks. Operational risk registers are also in place and assurance provided to trustees by the executive.

Organisational Structure

The Academy for Contemporary Circus and Physical Theatre (trading as Circomedia) is constituted as a non-profit making Limited Company. It has operated as a company limited by guarantee since May 1994 and became an education charity in 1996. A trading subsidiary, Circomedia Enterprises, was set up in 2008 to conform with Charity Commission rulings on levels of trading and to allow Circomedia to maximize its trading capacity.

The Company's overall strategy is supervised by its Board of Trustees. The management team of three is responsible for the day to day management of the charlty. This comprises the Artistic and Managing Director, the Artistic and Education Director and Finance and Services Director.

In the last year there were 18 non-teaching staff, one who also had teaching duties, and 21 core teaching staff. Only 5 of the 39 were full-time.

Reviews and systems to mitigate risks

As part of the Business Plan, the Charity's trustees have given consideration to the major risks to which the charity is exposed and also procedures designed to manage those risks. The trustees and senior management have developed a pro-active risk register which is shared with stakeholders, and discussed and updated at each Board meeting. The Health and Safety policy is up to date and implemented in all aspects.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2016

1 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

The principal accounting policies are summarised below. The accounting policies have been applied consistently throughout the year and in the preceding year.

1.1 Basis of preparation of accounts

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

The Academy of Contemporary Circus and Physical Theatre meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

1.2 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost or valuation of fixed assets, less their estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives on the following bases:

Plant, Machinery and Vehicle

- 25% reducing balance

Property Improvements

- over the remaining term of the lease

1.3 Income recognition

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

Investment income is included when receivable.

Incoming resources from grants are accounted for in relation to the stipulated period of the grant,

1.4 Expenditure recognition

Expanditure is recognised on a accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expanditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered and is reported as part of the expanditure to which it relates:

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of any indirect nature necessary to support them.

All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resources. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are appointed on a appropriate basis.

1.5 Operating Leases

Rentals payable in respect of operating leases where substantially all the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities as incurred.

1.6 Stocks

Stocks consist of goods for resale and bar stock. Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and not realisable value.

1.7 Fund Structure

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objectives of the charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment.

Restricted funds have been provided to the charity for particular purposes, and it is the policy of the board of trustees to carefully monitor the application of those funds in accordance with the restrictions placed upon them.

A fixed asset register is maintained which represents the written down value of tangible fixed assets, and is divided into a restricted fixed asset fund representing the written down value of those assets subject to restrictions, with the balance being in a designated fund representing the written down value of those assets free of restrictions.

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds or on the allocation of funds to designated funds, other than that described above.

Any other proposed transfer between funds would be considered on the particular circumstances.

1.8 Pensions

Employees of the charity are entitled to join a defined contribution 'money purchase' scheme. The charity contribution is restricted to the contributions disclosed in note 7. There were no outstanding contributions at the year end. The costs of the defined contribution scheme are included within human resources costs and are charged to the unrestricted funds of the charity.

The money purchase scheme is managed by General Life and the plan invest the contributions made by the employee and employer in an investment fund to build up over the term of the plan. The pension fund is converted into a pension upon the employee's normal retirement age which is defined as when they are eligible for a state pension. The charity has no liability beyond making its contributions and paying across the deductions for the employee's contributions.
