# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Students' Union's charitable objectives are to promote the interests and welfare of its students and representing, supporting and advising students; being the recognised representative channel between students and the universities and other external bodies; providing social, cultural, sporting and recreational activities and forums for discussion and debate for the personal development of its students.

The Unions principal governing document is its Constitution agreed by the members in a General Meeting or in a referendum. It is also ratified by the University Board of Governors. Copies of the Constitution are available from the Union's offices.

The trustees of the Union are the four Officer Trustees; President Exeter, President Falmouth, President Student Experience, President Community & Welfare; two selected student trustees and two selected, independent, external trustees and one other Trustee who will be either a student trustee or an external trustee.

The Officer Trustees are elected annually by a cross-campus ballot of all student members and are full time remunerated officers, as authorised by the Education Acts. The Officer Trustees are only permitted to remain in post for a maximum of two years and receive comprehensive training on appointment. This is organised by a designated staff member with the help of the Union's Senior Management team, the National Union of Students and both Universities. Each officer has specific responsibility for aspects of the Union's activities and is supported by permanent staff who are organised in three departments - Activities, Student Voice and Advice.

Accountability of the Officer Trustees is performed via our Student Council whose members are elected each year in a cross campus ballot for one year only. Council meets on average six times per year and is provided with reports from the Officer Trustees. The Trustee Board meets at least three times each year and is responsible for maintaining legal, financial and reputational integrity and for setting strategic direction. The Chair(s) and a designated external Trustee from the Trustee Board has delegated responsibility from the Board to monitor the performance of the Chief Executive Officer and make recommendations to the board relating to the Chief Executive Officer's annual performance review.

The finances of the Union are also reported to the Universities.

The Officer Trustees and the Senior Management Team meet weekly to discuss on-going operational issues and to provide effective oversight of Union activities. FXU also employs a number of non-student full time staff to ensure effective management of its many activities and to implement the policy decisions made by the Trustees. There is delegated authority through the Chief Executive Officer for operational decision making and accountability within the departments of the Students' Union in accordance with its organisational structure. When reviewing our objectives and planning our activities, we have given due consideration to the Charity Commission's general and relevant supplementary guidance on public benefit.

# Relationship with Falmouth University and The University of Exeter

The Students' Union receives a block grant from the Universities and part-occupies a building owned by the Universities, which also pays for utilities and any structural maintenance. This support is intrinsic to the relationship between the Universities and the Students' Union and has not been valued. Although the Students' Union runs some minor trading activities, which may be developed, it will always be dependent on the support of the Universities.

There is no reason to believe that this support will not continue for the foreseeable future, as the Education Act 1994 imposes a duty on the Universities to ensure the financial viability of its student representative body. The Universities therefore require notification of any changes in the governance of the Union and regular reports on the Union's activities, management and financial situation.

### **Governing Document**

FXU gained full charitable status on 11th January 2012. Prior to this date FXU continued to operate under its Memorandum of Understanding. From this date the new charitable Constitution was adopted in full. A series of bye-laws have developed to support the implementation of all commitments and legal obligations as outlined in this governing document. All Bye Laws reflect informed good practice in the students' union sector and are developed in consultation with the FXU Trustees and approved by the Student Council as a representative body of the student population. Aspects of delivery not yet ratified as bye-laws are implemented under the terms of the Memorandum of Understanding. In 2013-14 the Constitution was updated and approved by a student referendum.

### **Appointment of Trustees**

In 2012 the FXU Board of Trustees and FXU Student Council approved an FXU Appointments Committee. One key role of this committee is to appoint up to two external trustees, two student trustees and one trustee who may be either a student or external trustee. The Appointments Committee appointed 2 x student trustees and 2 x external trustee from 1st July 2016 for 12 months. An additional External Trustee joined the Trustee Board in July 2016.

# **Trustees Induction & Training**

This year, the Presidential Officer Trustees received training regarding their responsibilities and duties from the NUS and FXU staff.

# How FXU achieve public benefit

In pursuit of these aims for the public benefit, FXU will ensure the diversity of its membership is recognised, valued and supported and has established departments and services for use by its members and to support its work with the Universities and other organisations on behalf of students. These include the Advice Team, the Student Voice Team, Sports Clubs, Societies and Volunteering & RAD. Trustee and Executive Officers of FXU sit on all relevant committees of both universities and meet regularly with the local authority and other providers of public services affecting students.

FXU continues to represent the students of both universities on relevant local, national and international issues by maintaining a high proportion of student representatives. Student representatives now sit and contribute to many of the universities committees and academic programme forums which allow the union to cater effectively to the needs of students.

#### **Related Parties**

FXU has close relationships with Falmouth University, University of Exeter, Cornwall Campuses and Exeter Guild of Students. In addition, FXU works closely with Falmouth Exeter Plus (known as Tremough Campus Services (TCS) until 2<sup>nd</sup> July 2012) the organisation established to deliver combined services on behalf of the institutions (IT, accommodation, student support services etc.), in order to provide effective services to its membership.

During the year these relationships have continued to strengthen and the elected representatives have been fully involved in consultation, planning and decision-making processes at all levels of both institutions and Falmouth Exeter Plus.

# Risk Management

The Union's Trustee Board is responsible for the management of the risks faced by the Union. Detailed considerations of risk are delegated to the heads of each department. Risks are identified, assessed and controls established throughout the year. A comprehensive risk register has been established and is reviewed and updated by the Board of Trustees annually.

Budgetary and internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers and participants on all activities organised by the Union. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

During the course of the year, each service area has worked closely with the Institutions' Health & Safety Adviser based at the Penryn Campus, and relevant Estates staff at the Falmouth Campus, to ensure that all potential risks involved in activities undertaken by FXU have been considered and appropriately managed. In terms of emergency procedures, FXU complies with those relating to the relevant campus and Institution(s).

FXU commissioned an independent Health and Safety Audit by Josh Bourne of Cornwall Risk Management on 5<sup>th</sup> August 2016.

It is recognised that systems can only provide reasonable but not absolute assurance that major risks have been adequately managed.

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 July 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective 1 January 2015).

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### Objectives and aims

The Union's objects are the advancement of education of students at Falmouth University & the University of Exeter's Cornwall Campuses for the public benefit by:

- promoting the interests and welfare of Students at Falmouth University & the University of Exeter Cornwall Campuses during their course of study and representing, supporting and advising Students;
- being the recognised representative channel between students and Falmouth University and University of Exeter (Cornwall Campuses), and any other external bodies; and
- Providing social, cultural, sporting and recreational activities and forums for discussions and debate for the
  personal development of its Students.

# FXU's key areas of activity are:

- Student representation (e.g. through the work of the Officer Presidents, Executive Officers and Student Council);
- Democratic activities including referenda, general meetings, debates and elections;
- Supporting students in planning and participating in sports and recreational activities;
- · Co-ordination of social events and entertainments including freshers' activities;
- Supporting students in planning and participating in voluntary opportunities and RAD
- Provision of advice, support and guidance through the FXU Advice Service and Officer Presidents.

During 2015-2016, FXU's combined student population was as follows:

Falmouth University: 4,780

University of Exeter, Penryn Campus: 2,152 Total: 6,932

### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

This year our main social events were again Freshers' events, the Garden Party and the Graduation Ball. Feedback has been largely positive and the events were improved following recommendations from the previous year. The money raised through these events was used to support other activities during the year including student led events. All the events were delivered by FX Plus under the Memorandum Of Understanding. Whilst the events were successful the management and relationship with colleagues in FX Plus is sometimes testing, while we continue to try make the agreement work longer term we are looking at alternative options.

This year we again hosted the FXU Awards ceremony, providing the opportunity to recognise and celebrate students' achievements outside of their academic studies and the significant contributions of individual staff members to the student experience, as well as raising the profile of FXU in the community. Achievements included sporting prowess and contributions to the community through volunteering and fundraising as well as Academic Rep of the Year, FXU Rep Legend, Best Contribution to Student Voice Activities and Student-Led Campaign or Project of the Year. The decision was taken to move the event back to the previous location of the National Maritime Museum.

This year has seen greater representation in institutional meetings and FXU now have direct input into the governing bodies and senior management teams at both institutions.

FXU continues to feed student opinion into the operational management of the campuses via the Student Experience and Engagement Group and CSLG Liaison Groups.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

FXU continues to work hard to ensure FXU and the student voice in Penryn and Truro is represented at all relevant University meetings follow the signing of the Memorandum of Understanding between the FXU and the Students' Guild in 2014-15. FXU now sit on all the major board meetings of Falmouth and FX Plus; Exeter Senate and Council; budget scrutiny groups; and stakeholder meetings. It was a challenge to gain access to these meetings but we have lobbied since 2008 and both institutions recognise and appreciate the importance of a successful working partnership. Access to these Boards means that students studying in Cornwall now have a voice within all the institutional decision making groups.

Most of the FXU team attended the Disability Awareness Training which looked at how to improve the student experience through creating an accessible environment and inclusive practice.

# HR & Staff

The Design & Marketing Intern assistant Beth Hall's contract was extended until the 30th June 2017.

Widening Student Participation Intern, Alice Nicholls left on 29th July. Her replacement George Perry - BSC Conservation Biology and Ecology from the University of Exeter starting on the 19<sup>th</sup> July.

Rob Gofton presented a paper to the board in July 2016 as the following areas in FXU were finding themselves under significant pressure. This is mainly due to an increase in their services to students.

- 1. The Activities team has seen a substantial increase in the number of clubs & societies affiliating and this increase is greater than the rate of student number growth. Our business plan does highlight this as a potential issue and if this continues we have a degree of flexibility to ask for an increased grant to cover this growth. However, this will not be negotiated until next year so until then we need to find an alternative solution. SMT have re-forecasted their individual budgets for 2016-17 and through a reallocation of resources and priorities we are in a position to add a member of staff to the Activities team. The proposal is to have a 1-year, fixed, term time contract which we will be reviewed after 6 months. If successful we will then ask for long-term funding from the Universities. The post will be Grade 3 at a gross cost of £21,000
- 2. Student Voice has developed a number of new initiatives such as the Leadership Team and a reward and recognition scheme for Reps. We are unable to fully exploit these ideas due to the existing workload of the marketing team. The proposal is for a small increase in the marketing hours per week to cover this work. Again, we have keep to within the overall budget window but through the prioritisation and reallocation of some resources we are able to increase the marketing resource by an additional ½ day. A gross cost of £2,000

The Board approved the re-forecast (presented in the finance paper) to allow additional staff resource at a zero impact on the overall budget envelope.

# **National Student Survey**

Falmouth University: FXU achieved a score of 77% satisfaction among Falmouth students; a 3 percentage point decrease on last year, and 9 points above the sector average of 68%.

### Course Reps

- Elections were held in the summer term for returning reps. All Exeter Reps were nominated and voted for online (with the exception of Truro due to ongoing IT issues). Falmouth Reps, wherever possible were nominated online and voting took place in lectures either by paper ballot (preferable) or hands-up (with candidates out of the room). Whilst every effort was made to recruit all returning year's Reps we didn't quite manage it but this is certainly a preferable approach regards timing of elections for returning positions. The methods for electing Reps will be repeated for all first year, postgraduate and any unfilled returning year positions in September.
- Training was updated with focus given to the key aspects of being a Representative, the academic structures of both universities and a more scenario based workshop approach to feedback. Reps are provided with a range of 'feedback' and discuss in groups: the quality of the feedback (and if it is of a poor quality why, and how could it be made better), which students might be most affected, what they would do to progress the issue raised, what a solution would look like, what barriers might there be to achieving that, and how one might still arrive at a positive resolution.
- Subject Chair training took place with a very valued input from Prof. Tim Quine (Deputy VC).
- A combination of having some very engaged and proactive Reps (and tutors), alongside an increased FXU
  presence and introduction of lunchtime drop-in meetings at the Falmouth Campus, resulted in higher
  engagement from students based there in many FXU campaigns and in providing feedback on academic
  and non-academic related issues and was reflected by the Fine Art Reps winning 2 categories at the FXU
  Awards.
- FXU will be liaising with Falmouth's academic departments in July to develop a short training / briefing session for Department Reps with regards their role on Department Boards.
- Working closely with Truro Medical staff to continue enhancing the student experience and representation there.

# Research & Engagement

#### **International Students**

On May 17<sup>th</sup>, we celebrated Norwegian Constitution Day as part of the newly established Cultural Events Calendar. Over 50% of Norwegian students attended the celebrations and feedback from the day included "You make all us Norwegians very, very happy by arranging this event as it is the best day of the year, so thank you a lot for making this happen."

We are also working on creating a Trans/Non-Binary society, business cards for trans students with information that will be useful to them, and are nearly there with actually getting the words 'Gender Neutral' on all bathrooms.
- Celebrate Diversity & Promote Inclusion: Establish a calendar of events that celebrate and educate; including Black History Month (hosted by the ACS); Islamophobia Awareness Month (hosted by the Islamic Society); Mental Health Week; Don't DisAbility Week (the students who did work experience with us on this have turned it in to an official society); International Women's Week (co-hosted with the Feminist Society), and LGBTQ+ Pride Month (hosted by the LGBTQ+ Society and Liberation Committee).

### **Activities Report**

- RAD total raised (at time of report 24/06/16) £60,127.59 (with an extra £10,000-£15,000 expected from challenges abroad income). This time last year the total was £37,067.25 which shows an increase of 62.21% on 2014-15.
- Falmouth volunteer engagement has increased by 3.39% 2014-15 figures, rising from 113 to 166. This has also been seen as main development point by many of our Student Led Volunteer Projects so we hope to see a larger increase again next year.

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### Challenges:

The biggest challenge facing the team is supporting the growth in student activities in terms of the number of clubs, societies, Student Led Volunteer Projects and RAD events. When you consider the number of student groups we now have and with only one member of staff dedicated to each area it is easy to see the strain on the team members who are striving to continue the quality service the Activities Team and FXU have prided ourselves on. The students are increasingly coming up with ambitious events, trips and projects which are starting to be recognised nationally and which we are very keen to continue to facilitate. To address this we would like to build our team by introducing an Activities Event Assistant who would have the skills to support one off events and trips, freeing up the existing team members to dedicate more time to the support and development of the groups and committee members.

#### **Advice Service**

# REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2016

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Advice Service

April saw a big increase (107%) in the number of appointments attended by students, probably as a result of operating an appointments service during the Easter vacation. Similarly, May and June have seen significant increases (24% and 28% respectively). Given that the appointments service will continue through the summer, I anticipate that the percentage increase in appointments throughout the year will continue to increase.

Case management: Since the last Board of Trustees meeting I have continued to meet with FX Plus's Stephen Hickling to discuss the Advice Service's needs in relation to Compass online. As indicated in previous reports, I am enthusiastic about the system's introduction.

National Association of Student Money Advisers (NASMA): By the time of the Board meeting, Jo Barrett and I will have attended this year's NASMA annual conference is Solihull. The 3-day conference is the main source of training updates for Jo and me.

Marketing: In April I finalised a marketing plan for the Advice Service, which is now being implemented. In my last report to the Trustees I referred to liaising with Falmouth's new Head of Animation, Andy Joule, about the possibility of commissioning a series of short animations to promote the service. Unfortunately, no students expressed an interest in taking on the work. However, I have since commissioned 3 short animations from a recent graduate from the BA Animation and Visual Effects course. The animations will be used to promote the Advice Service in September.

At the same time we are likely to rebrand the Advice Service Facebook page, which, in particular, we'll publicise at Freshers' Fayre.

Conclusion: The Advice Service has continued to operate effectively during 2016. In this respect, staff productivity and the Service's general profile continue to improve – factors that should provide a solid base from which to develop the service further during 2016-17.

# FINANCIAL REVIEW

### **Reserves Policy**

The FXU trustees have set a reserves policy. Reserves are built and maintained at a level which ensures that 3 months of organisation's core activity could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty.

- A proportion of reserves are maintained in a readily realisable form.
- To develop a Designated Reserve for the purpose of:
  - 1. Maintaining the objectives of the Union through the payment to the elected Officer for 3 months.
  - 2. Payment of FXU designated staff for 3 months (non-Falmouth University contracted)
  - 3. Payment of immediate liabilities, creditors control
  - 4. PAYE & NI
  - 5. Accountancy and legal fees
  - 6. Costs in disposal of FXU assets
- A Designated Reserve of £32,700 is set aside for this purpose and is set aside from the unallocated reserves. 100% of reserves are maintained in cash.

# NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2016

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

# Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRSSE) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (the FRSSE) (effective I January 2015)', the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

#### Income

Voluntary income is grants that provide core funding or are of general nature, are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Activities for generating funds are recognised as earned.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

Income from charitable activities includes income from Freshers, events and sporting activities and are recognised as earned. Grant income included in this category provides funding to support the sporting activities, it is recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

#### **Expenditure**

Expenses are recognised when a liability is incurred. Costs are analysed as follows:

Costs of generating voluntary income are those costs incurred in activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities include, all expenditure associated with student welfare and includes direct, support and governance costs.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources e.g. allocating staff costs by time spent and other costs by their usage.

Resources expended are inclusive of any VAT arising, which cannot be recovered.

# Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life

Plant and machinery

- 20% on cost

Motor vehicles

- 25% on cost

Only assets costing over £250 are capitalised.

#### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

# Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Investment income and gains are allocated to the appropriate fund.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Minibus - funds designated for the purchase of an additional minibus.

**Dartington** - this amount (Dartington's funds pre merger) is to be ring-fenced to develop services and facilities for performance students and is administered through the Dartington Society.

Reserve account - funds designated as a financial reserve in accordance with the reserves policy as detailed in the Report of the Trustees.

Student Led Event - funds designated towards particular student events and projects which have been awarded to students but remain unspent at the end of the year.

#### Restricted funds

Active Community Fund - Funds received from Falmouth University, University of Exeter, Cornwall Campus and various other sources to cover costs incurred in supporting students in undertaking volunteering activities.

Sports Fund - Funds received from Falmouth University and University of Exeter, Cornwall Campus, as well as income collected as student memberships, to cover costs incurred in the running of various sporting activities for the students.

Green Living Project - Funds received from NUS which are provided with the aim of producing a generation of environmentally aware students through education, engagement and employment.

#### 18. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

# **Falmouth University**

During the year Falmouth University (Falmouth) provided total grant funding of £464,290 (2015: £429,171). This includes £30,000 (2015: £30,000) towards sports and the remainder is an unrestricted block grant. At the year end there was a total amount of £nil, (2015: £1,400) due from Falmouth and £nil (2015: £82) due to Falmouth.

# University of Exeter, Cornwall Campus

During the year University of Exeter, Cornwall Campus provided total grant funding of £222,391 (2015: £213,906). This includes £30,000 (2015: £30,000) towards sports, in 2015 £4,555 towards student voting and green initiatives and the remainder is an unrestricted block grant. At the end of the year an amount of £550 (2015: £1,000) was owed by the University of Exeter and £302 (2015: £nil) was due to the University of Exeter.

### **Falmouth Exeter Plus**

FXU have an investment of £10,000 in a cafeteria owned by the above. At the year end the return on this investment was £20,197 (2015: £19,227) these balances were outstanding at their relative year ends. In addition to this £210 (2015: £210) was also due in respect of various items of recharged expenditure. FXU owed £1,131 (2015: £279) to Falmouth Exeter Plus at the year end in respect of various items of recharged expenditure.

# 19. ULTIMATE CONTROLLING PARTY

During the year the FXU was under the control of the FXU Board. The ultimate decision-making body of FXU is the combined student body.
