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Community work in the UK

Our new project this year is working on overcoming cultural and languages barriers around the Somali community. We hire the IT room with full facilities twice a week on a suitable time for mothers the room has over 12 computers. We started IT lessons for beginners such as the usage of Microsoft Office and how to set up an email. We believe this is essential for the Somali mothers as we live in a generation were technology is very crucial.

Educational programs

Our number one project that will always be ongoing is providing education for children and youth. We aim to build more schools and provide free education. We are also aiming on building further educations. We remind our scholars and teachers the importance of equal opportunity and the opportunity for every child to find free education. We have now succeeded on building two secondary and primary school in Mogadishu and are planning to build more school in other villages.





Community development and livelihood

MAF's programme activities address a full range of complex needs: immediate requirements within vulnerable households, such as nutritional supplements, bedding and shelter, in addition to the longer-term capacity building approach of family and individual counselling, promotion of child rights and child health, community food security, nutrition and training in income-generating activities for households and community support groups. We aim to empower community members to be the agents of change in their own lives, to build resilience and to help them to be healthy and self-sufficient.



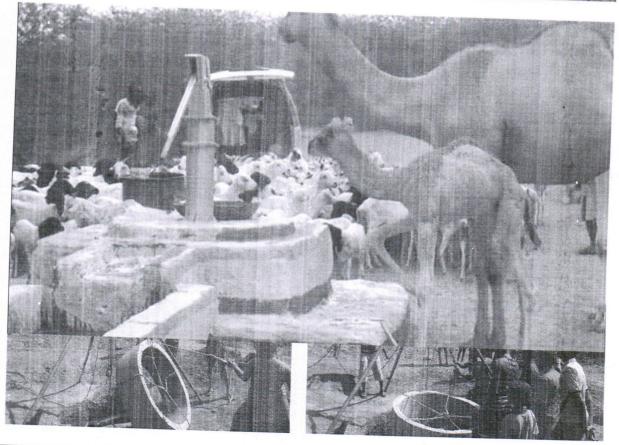


Water projects

Our main goal last year was to expand the water project and we have successfully achieved that by digging more wells and providing more water to the driest villages. We have active trained drilling team and experienced workers that has done a wonderful job by digging over 50 wells around Somalia. We aim to increase this number this year.







Health care Project

Our focus this year was to decrease the number of individuals suffering from kidney failure and individuals with life threatening diseases. We have successfully saved one particular individuals life by providing the cost of transport for her to travel to India and the cost of her operation and health assessment. All funds were collected on a live television appeal.

Notes to the Accounts

for the year ended 31 July 2016

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008).

Turnover

Turnover represents the value, net of value added tax and discounts, of goods provided to customers and work carried out in respect of services provided to customers.

Depreciation

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the assets over their estimated useful lives.

Plant and machinery

20% straight line

Deferred taxation

Full provision is made for deferred taxation resulting from timing differences between the recognition of gains and losses in the accounts and their recognition for tax purposes. Deferred taxation is calculated on an un-discounted basis at the tax rates which are expected to apply in the periods when the timing differences will reverse.

Foreign currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. All differences are taken to the profit and loss account.

Leasing and hire purchase commitments

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts, which are those where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset have passed to the company, corresponding lease or hire purchase obligation is treated in the balance sheet as a liability.

The interest element of the rental obligations is charged to the profit and loss account over the period of the lease and represents a constant proportion of the balance of capital repayments outstanding.

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Pensions
