The trustees are pleased to present their annual report for the year ended 31st August 2016.

The financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011, Companies Act 2006, Accounting and Reporting by Charities; Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their account in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Small Entities and Accounting and Reporting by Charities, in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16<sup>th</sup> July 2014; updated 2<sup>nd</sup> February 2016, and the Charities Act 2011.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The organisation was established to promote general charitable purposes for the benefit of the community of Netherley, Liverpool and to provide facilities for education or in the interests of social welfare for the recreation or other leisure time occupation of persons who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity, financial hardship or social circumstances with the object of improving their conditions of life.

In considering the objectives and activities, the Trustees have considered Charity Commission guidance on Public Benefit to ensure that the organisation is meeting its Public Benefit requirements.

#### **ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE**

In the past year, Netherley Youth & Community Initiative Limited (NY&CI) has delivered vital and essential projects for families tackling hardship. NY&CI are based within the heart of the Netherley estate and is the blood flow to the community tackling poverty, antisocial behaviour, and crime. Providing recreational and educational courses improving skills, development and community cohesion.

NY &CI main service users are either heavily reliant on low income or universal tax credit (benefits).

As Chair I am honoured to be part of NY&CI unique services of support and how they are offer vital services to the community all under one roof, making it easier for the families to access support within our community.

NY&CI have an ongoing volunteer program, where we reach out to adults who are No Education Employment Training (N.E.E.T). We provide access to development, opportunity for people to obtain training and increase skills confidence and self-esteem at NY&CI services.

NY&CI have established strong links within the area and have 20 years' experience reaching out to families at grass roots level. So much so, NY&CI have expertise, knowledge, understanding and compassion in supporting disadvantaged families.

For example, tackling poverty; we offer a vital Food Bank distribution service, now opening five days a week due to ongoing demand. The *Clothes Swap Shop*, reducing debt and addressing needs of families – providing free suitable clothing and footwear. Both food bank and swap shop are essential and vital services for our families tackling poverty in our community today.

NY&CI have a brilliant team of staff and volunteers providing excellent work and have established 20 years of success in supporting families. Promoting support network, opportunity and vital services to improve individual's quality of life.

We have adapted and implemented an open door policy providing instant access and support, addressing people's needs and issues as and when they arise. NY&CI have built a strong network and reputation over the years to make a difference! Providing invaluable support and signposting service to alleviate and address issues that may occur.

The Project Manager, staff and volunteers have achieved outstanding work this year and have gone above and beyond to make NY&Cl a success. Promoting dedication empathy, passion and commitment to help and improve our services to benefit local families quality of life.

We offer a unique breakfast club providing a bus pick up service supporting families seeking child care either due to ill health, accessing employment, training or education. NY&CI services help to resolve and alleviate some of the pressures faced by families in everyday life.

We have established Good in all our Ofsted reports. Providing quality breakfast and afterschool club provision within the area, aiding parents to have the opportunity to develop and increase employability.

Further to the above we offer a vast amount of services – providing valuable resources to the community people can access free wifi and 10 computers. NY&Cl offer, free recreational and educational courses through the year too.

Over the years we has obtained 12 adult bicycles where we offer community cycling and additional service of transport support for people who are seeking employment and have no means of transport for example attend a job interview.

This year NY&CI has opened a parent and toddler group, creating further connection with parents and listening to their needs.

We adapt our services around the families and make a difference to so many families.

#### Services provided:

- •Forget Me Not Carers Group, supporting local families caring for loved ones with dementia or Alzheimer's disease.
- •Youth provision, increasing individuals' self-esteem, confidence, knowledge and development to reach their full potential in life. Reduction of antisocial behaviour within the area.
- •Gym -resources available to the public
- •Bicycles -free transport facility available
- •Providing Community events, reducing isolation and improving Community cohesion.
- •Workshops strengthening young people's knowledge and understanding of communication in areas of good and bad relationships Domestic Violence, Alcohol and Bully Busters etc. Due to extensive cuts and no LCC youth provision it is essential for NY&CI to continue their vital youth workshops to ensure the safety of our younger generation.

NY&CI has benefitted over two and half thousands families this year achieving outstanding significant outcomes for local families to overcome everyday life tribulations.

#### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

Income for the year totalled £183,561 (2015: £139,302) of which £135,453 (2015: £94,016) related to funding for projects upon which restrictions are placed.

Expenditure for the year totalled £164,512 (2015: £141,106), leaving an surplus for the year of £19,049 (2015: deficit £1,804).

At 31<sup>st</sup> August 2016 the charitable company's reserves stood at £69,826 (2015: £50,777) of which £10,545 (2015: £19,459) represented restricted funds. Details of each restricted fund are shown in Note 10 to the accounts.

#### Risk management:

The main risks to which the charity is exposed as identified by the Trustees have been considered and systems have been established to mitigate those risks.

#### Reserves Policy:

It is the policy of the charitable company to maintain unrestricted funds, which are free reserves of the charity, at a level which will allow the charity to cover redundancy costs and continue its activities for six months should no further funding be received.

As at the end of the financial year the unrestricted funds totalled £59,281. The charitable company requires £12,816 for redundancy and £34,528 for six months running costs, plus £2,500 for rental lease agreement, (total £49,844). The balance will be utilised for the ongoing centre improvements and maintenance.

### **PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS**

NY&CI are looking to address young people's education and create additional support for young people – We are looking into three areas

- •Due to cuts within the youth service we are in need of extending our services as a detached team to reach out to young people on the streets, providing alternative activities.
- •Providing additional workshops for young people aged 13-19 years.
- •Create allotment and gardening beds to grow fruit and vegetables to support Life skills and provide free healthy produce for the benefit of families accessing Food bank.

### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee (registered in England and Wales, No.05531622) incorporated on 9<sup>th</sup> August 2005 and was registered as a charity (number 1112225) on 22th November 2005.

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the company and is governed by its Articles of Association.

The organisation's board of trustees are also its directors. Members are elected at the Annual General Meetings of the members of the council, with casual vacancies being filled, as required, by the Board of Trustees in accordance with the Council's Articles of Association.

Netherley Youth & Community Initiative Limited (Formerly known as St Gregory's Youth & Community Initiative) is managed and governed by a management committee, consisting of trustees and a number of advisers and staff members. Management committee meetings are held monthly and agenda items include finance, health & safety and staff reports.

#### 1. Limited Liability

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. Each member's liability is limited to £10.

#### 2. Accounting Policies

#### Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities, in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) issued on 16<sup>th</sup> July 2014; updated 2<sup>nd</sup> February 2016, the Charities Act 2011 and Companies Act 2006.

#### Going Concern

The Trustees have reasonable expectation that the charitable company will be able to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future.

#### **Funds Accounting**

Unrestricted funds are free reserves available for the trustees to distribute in accordance with the charitable company's charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific restrictive conditions imposed by the donor. All restricted funds are accounted for as restricted income and expenditure for the purposes is charged to the fund.

#### Income recognition

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, there is sufficient certainty of receipt and so it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations and legacies comprise of donations and general grants which are recognised in the accounts when received, with the exception of known legacies which are accounted for when their receipt is certain.

Income from charitable activities is recognised on an accruals basis. Grants receivable are recognised on the date on which their unconditional payment is confirmed by the donor.

Income from investment relates to bank interest receive and is recognised when the amount is certain.

#### Expenditure recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charitable company to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses, including support costs and governance costs, are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings in the Statement Of Financial Activities. Support and governance costs are applied to unrestricted funds unless specifically included in the restrictions, as specified by the donor.

Cost of charitable activities relate to the operation of the charity comprising all management and operational overheads. Governance costs relate to compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements and specifically include all costs incurred by the charity in producing the annual report. These are dealt with in the Statement of Financial Activities when payment had been approved by the charity.

#### **Fixed Assets**

Capital expenditure of £250 and above is stated in the balance sheet at cost less accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life as below:

Computer Equipment

25% per annum straight line basis

#### **Taxation**

Income and gains are exempt from taxation as they are applied for charitable purposes only. The charitable company benefits from various exemptions from taxation afforded by tax legislation and is not liable to corporation tax on income or gains falling within those exemptions.
