Introduction

The trustees present their annual report and the audited accounts of The Medlock Charitable Trust (the charity) for the year ended 31st July 2016. The board of trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities published on 16 July 2014, in preparing the annual report and accounts of the charity, which also comply with the requirements of the charity's constitution and applicable law.

Structure, Governance and Management

Constitution

The charity's objects and regulations are regulated by a trust deed dated 1st July 1985, together with a Deed of Variation dated 5th December 1996 and, under the deed, the charity is constituted as an unincorporated association.

Organisation of The Charity

The trustees meet on a regular basis. At each meeting, the trustees monitor the progress of current projects in respect of which the charity is to provide the funding.

The trustees also seek independent advice as to the policies relating to the investment of the charity's funds and seek other independent professional advice from solicitors, accountants and other professionals, when required.

If the trustees are in doubt on an any complex matter, this is always referred to the Charity Commissioners for a decision and advice before any action is implemented.

The charity's administration is centred in Bath and is carried out under the supervision of the trustees by competent personnel.

At each regular meeting, applications for grants are considered and duly dealt with.

In accordance with a Deed of Variation signed on 5th December 1996, the power to appoint new or additional trustees now vests in Mr D J Medlock following the death of Mr L Medlock in April 2013.

Any transactions between the charity and related parties are disclosed in note 13 to the accounts.

Objectives and Activities of The Charity

Objects

The objects of the charity are:

- to make donations to other registered charitable trusts;
- to make donations to universities or other establishments for educational purposes; and
- to make donations to local community charities in any part of the country.

Policies Adopted to Further The Charity's Objects

The trustees have identified the City of Bath and the Borough of Boston as the principal, but not exclusive, areas in which the charity is and will be proactive. These areas have been specifically chosen as the founder of the charity had strong connections with the City of Bath, the home of the charity, and had family connections of long standing with the Borough of Boston.

To date, the charity has supported and funded a number of projects in these areas by making substantial grants. These grants have been made to fund projects in the areas of education, medicine, research and social services all for the benefit of the local community. The trustees also receive many applications for assistance from many diverse areas in the United Kingdom. These are all considered sympathetically. The list of grants in the Schedule to the Statement of Financial Activities indicates the diverse areas in which the charity has made grants.

Grants to individuals and students cannot be considered.

There have been no changes in the charity's objects or policies during the year.

Public Benefit

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit when reviewing the Trust's aims and objectives, in planning future activities, and setting the grant making policy for the year.

The general scope of the charity's objectives ensures that a diverse range of deserving applicants will benefit from the charity's funds, as reflected in the list of grant recipients shown in the accounts for the year under review. As previously stated, the trustees have identified the City of Bath and the Borough of Boston as the principal areas of the charity's activities. However, applications for assistance from areas throughout the United Kingdom are considered sympathetically.

Operations Review

The trust made 130 grants over the year from almost 1,000 applications and 110 of those were for £10,000 or less, continuing our policy of trying to support smaller charities. The total of £1,149,754 was down on our previous year when we celebrated 30 years of charitable giving. Our biggest donation was to The Boshier-Hinton Trust whose annual report I can recommend and they too specialise in smaller grants to local charities.

Of the remaining larger grants we gave £70,000 to Aspire to assist six local schools with exclusion problems, £50,000 to the local hospital cancer unit for a new scanner, £50,000 as a final contribution to the education unit for the new aerospace museum in Filton and £50,000 towards St Saviours Community Hub project. All of which we trust will make a significant difference to their local communities.

There are many small donations which we trust will help those small groups whose fantastic work keeps are communities together.

Financial Review

The trustees closely monitor the financial situation and have managed to increase the capital base to $\mathfrak{L}31.75m$ as well as making grants totalling $\mathfrak{L}1.15m$ during the year.

Investment Policy

The charity's investment objective is to maintain or grow the portfolio assets, in real terms, after spending on average 5% per annum.

The trustees continue to keep a firm grip on the investments with regular reviews with our advisors, Cambridge Advisors, and will seek to appraise what alternatives the market has to offer in regards investment advice.

Reserves Policy

Since the charity's inception in 1985, the aim of the trustees has been to meet the charity's grant-making objectives out of investment income generated by the charity's reserves.

The charity has power to accumulate funds under the Trust Deed, but this power expired on 1st July 2006.

The Trustees are happy to continue to use up the reserves and will review annually whether this policy continues. With investment returns being particularly poor and the likelihood of this not changing, then we will prioritise our grant making procedures.

Risk Management

The trustees have examined the major risks which the charity faces. They have identified that these risks are limited in number and, as such, have documented and reported these risks at a trustees' meeting and have taken action to minimise the charity's exposure to these risks.

The trustees will continue to report on and review these risks at future trustees' meetings.

In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business; and
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements.

The trustees are also responsible for maintaining proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with regulations made under the Charities Act. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation of the accounts

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), published on 16 July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), and the Charities Act 2011 and applicable regulations.

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention as modified by the revaluation of freehold land and buildings and fixed asset investments.

Incoming resources

Incoming resources are accounted for on a receivable basis, deferred where appropriate. Donations and voluntary income are accounted for gross when received.

Investment income

Dividends are included in the income and expenditure account when they are declared at an amount which includes the tax credit recoverable from HM Revenue & Customs. Rental income is included in the income and expenditure account gross of collection charges on a receivable basis.

Bank interest is included in the income and expenditure account on a receivable basis.

Recognition of liabilities

Liabilities are recognised on the accruals basis in accordance with normal accounting principles, modified where necessary in accordance with the guidance given in the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales .

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure.

Grants payable in furtherance of the charity's objectives

Grants payable are payments made to third parties in the furtherance of the charitable objectives of the charity. Single or multi-year grants are accounted for when the recipient has a reasonable expectation that they will receive a grant and the trustees have agreed to pay the grant without condition or when the conditions attaching are fulfilled or when any conditions attaching are outside the control of the charity. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end are disclosed as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Although there is no legal liability to pay any grant to any organisation, and, after approval, it is open to the board to withdraw an approval already granted, either before or after payment of a grant, the accounting treatment is to create a creditor for grants relating specifically to the client's activities in the current financial year of the trustees immediately upon approval, and to include grants relating to activities in subsequent financial years as financial commitments.

At 31st July 2016 there were £1,175,000 of such grants approved and unpaid (2015: £1,367,500), and a creditor for this sum is reserved in the accounts.

Costs of generating funds

These costs include investment management fees and certain running costs of the investment properties.

Governance costs

Governance costs represent expenditure incurred in the management of the charity's assets, organisational administration and compliance with charitable and statutory requirements.

Unrealised and realised gains

Realised gains and losses are included in the accounts on the date at which a contractual obligation is entered into.

Unrealised gains and losses are computed by reference to the market value of the investments at the balance sheet date, compared to the brought forward cost or valuation, and gains and losses arising on similar categories of investments are netted off.

Investment assets

Investment assets are included in the financial statements at their market value.

Market value is calculated as follows:

Listed investments - quoted mid-market price

Endowment policies - surrender value - professional valuation

Charities are exempt from the full provisions of SSAP 19. However, investment properties are revalued on the basis of the best estimate of the trustees on an annual basis and any surplus or deficit is transferred to revaluation reserves. No depreciation is provided on the investment property.

Fixed assets and depreciation

All tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the cost (less their estimated residual value) of each asset over its estimated useful economic life, as follows:

Freehold buildings 2% straight line

Freehold land nil

A regular annual review of the likelihood of asset impairment is undertaken.

Taxation

As a registered charity, the company is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only.

Funds structure policy

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity. Such funds may be held in order to finance both working capital and capital investment.

There are no restricted funds.

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds or on the allocation of funds to designated funds. Any other proposed transfer between funds would be considered on the particular circumstances.

2 Winding up or dissolution of the charity

If upon winding up or dissolution of the charity there remain any assets, after the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities, the assets represented by the accumulated fund shall be transferred to some other charitable body or bodies having similar objects to the charity.

13 Related party transactions

During the year, the charity received rental income amounting to £15,000 from Anglo Welsh Ltd (formerly Aquatravel Ltd), a company in which Mr D J Medlock, a trustee, has a material interest. The charity also received rental income amounting to £53,000 from Sitec Group Ltd, a company in which Mr D J Medlock has material interests. The trustees confirm that the rents charged reflect full open market rates.

The charity made a donation of £180,000 to The Boshier-Hinton Foundation during the year. Mrs T Boshier is a trustee of The Boshier-Hinton Foundation and is the sister of Mr D J Medlock.

During the period, professional fees totalling £14,525 (2015: £8,431) were paid to GS Solicitors. Mr M Goodman is a trustee and a partner of GS Solicitors.

The trustees have not received reimbursement for any expenses incurred during the year, nor have they received remuneration for their services as trustees.
