A company limited by guarantee was registered at Companies House on 25th June 2002 (No.4468629) under the same name with a Memorandum and Articles embodying the same objects as those in the constitution of the unincorporated body. The company was registered by the Charity Commission on 23rd December 2002 (No. 1095180).

The report of the trustees for the year ended 30th June 2016

The trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 30th June 2016.

Objectives

The objectives of ALM are:

a) the relief of refugees and asylum seekers in Merseyside and adjacent areas who are in conditions of need, hardship or distress, particularly, but not exclusively through the provision of information advice and assistance.

b) to advance the education of the public, other statutory and voluntary organisations, and asylum seekers in order to assist their inclusion into the wider community.

Principal activities

The provision of "drop-in" facilities for asylum seekers and refugees

The provision of office and teaching accommodation for teachers and professional advisers to asylum seekers and refugees. The provision of help and assistance to asylum seekers and refugees from our own resources and through projects funded by statutory organisations and charitable trusts

The making of grants of money in cases of extreme hardship

Health education projects, in particular around TB, HIV and Mental Health

Organisation of enrichment events such as trips, training, parties

Education and awareness raising amongst the public through talks and events

Consultation and co-operation with charitable organisations with similar objectives.

Trustees and officers

The board has welcomed new Trustee Paula Grey this year.

Further changes to the board between last year's report and the present AGM have been the appointment of Bridie Sharkey and Matthew Smith.

All bring with them particular skills and experience which will be of great benefit to the charity.

Attendance at board meetings, is approximately every six weeks and the work of the charity is further supported by the fundraising subgroup of Trustees who meet more regularly. Also small subgroups of trustees have been involved in various negotiations to obtain additional premises space for ALM, and in undertaking staff reviews.

Review of developments

The major issue we have faced this year concerns our premises. We were informed at the start of the year that the Parish wished to reclaim rooms at the back of the church for Parish use. We agreed for this to take effect from 1st March 2017. This would mean the loss of space which included that used for the clothes sales and the food store. The clothes sale contributes to Asylum Link Merseyside unrestricted income amounting to £30,000 per year and the food store provides nutrition for up to 50 destitute families per week. So we were put into a situation where we faced reduced space at a time when the demand for our services was increasing because of the deterioration in the European migration crisis and the policies of the British Government.

As a result we looked for new premises. Our first attempt was to investigate the possibilities of the United Reform Church on Earle Road. After considerable effort, we concluded that the cost of modifying and repairing the premises far exceeded our ability to afford the move. Later in the year we looked at Our Lady of Good Help Church and associated presbytery and parish centre in Wavertree. This was rejected because the Archdiocese would only accept a complete takeover of all the buildings. Again the Trustees concluded that we could not afford such an arrangement. At the same time negotiations were taking place with the Archdiocese with regards negotiating a new lease and funding the redevelopment of the 2nd and 3rd floors of the St Anne's Presbytery. A full survey was made by professional surveyors to cost the works necessary to separate the Parish and Asylum Link premises and services and to refurbish the 2nd and 3rd floors. This led to us requesting from the Archdiocese a 25 Year rent free lease plus an interest free loan of £80,000 to help us make the necessary improvements without negatively impacting on the services offered to our asylum seekers. Sadly, the Archdiocese rejected the interest free loan and offered only a 25 year rent free lease on a full repair and insurance basis. Given the 25 year duration of the lease, the current state of repair of the presbytery and the likely future maintenance and repair costs the Trustees felt unable to accept this offer. So at the time of writing we are transferring the clothes store and food bank to the presbytery and thus losing a significant amount of space for our services to asylum seekers. We are, of course, seeking funding for the refurbishment from alternative sources. In addition we continue to seek other premises and even a new build solution

Turning quickly to the good news, there are many wonderful stories of Asylum Link Merseyside and its network of friends and supporters responding to Pope Francis's call to help the poor and disadvantaged. Apart from the wonderful work of our 8 staff, all working in conditions of great stress and pressure, and the Trustees, including newly appointed Paul Grey, Bridie Sharkey and Matthew Smith the greatest thanks must be given to the many, many volunteers and supporters who provide the legal, health and humanitarian expertise and enthusiasm and financial support to allow us to provide services to our 3000 visitors from 74 countries, who make almost 31,000 visits, provide an annual caseload of 972 people and

consume an estimated 5000 lunches every year. All these volunteers are modest, many are unseen but always loved and appreciated. We house 17 destitute people in our 4 houses.

We have had several thrilling successes, most notably Moazzam's family gaining status, but some tragedies including the removal of 73 year old Baha Ulla and Nagul, and the deaths of Silvere Malonga, Arlette Johnson and a 20 year old young man Yikeaolo Girmoy in a foreign land......

With funding from Porticus UK we are now able to open on Fridays which means the gaping void between Thursday

With funding from Porticus UK we are now able to open on Fridays which means the gaping void between Thursday afternoon and Monday morning in the lives of our asylum seekers is reduced. We have started a very successful Women's Group. The ESOL programme has been completely reorganised and now has a progressive curriculum where over 30 teachers support 85 students. In addition, ALM volunteers have produced a booklet called 'Welcome the Stranger: Supporting English Language Learning'. Two thousand copies have been printed by CTMR/SAS with funding from the Community Good Fund.

Greater Manchester Immigration Aid Unit and Merseyside Refugee Support Network professionals, supported by ALM volunteers, started 2 new projects, one 'The Fresh Claim Project' to help destitute people and those who have had applications rejected to make fresh asylum claims and a second, 'The Family Reunion Project' to help refugees to reunite with their families.

Following the success of our table tennis initiative, we started working with Everton in the Community and later Liverpool City Council, Liverpool County FA and Liverpool Sefton Hockey Club on football and hockey projects. These were a great success. Our asylum seekers are coached by Everton legend Pat Van den Hauwe and others on 8 sessions per week and compete in the International Sunday League. They are well kitted out thanks to the generosity of many ALM friends in donating kit. Even more exciting is the fact that 6 of our lads were successful in becoming qualified referees and coaches and now officiate at Liverpool County FA matches.

These are just a tiny portion of the new activities of ALM. Other, longer established, activities should not be forgotten. The trips out and summer walks continue to be provided by local parishes and volunteers and loved by asylum seeker families as they escape from inner city Liverpool and reminisce of their homelands; the bikers provide a much valued service to increase mobility and reduce transport costs; the Roadshow, providing education and awareness programmes to schools and parish groups, flourishes. There is so much more but space precludes further mentions

Finally 2 stories and a thanks to warm our hearts on this cold March evening:

... Terry Connor, a great friend of ALM died prematurely. To mark his passing Costa Coffee, where his son works, collected over £8,000 in his memory at local outlets and which his wife, Jeanette, an ALM volunteer, presented to ALM in January.

.... at the end of the year Ewan received the following email: Hi Ewan, I wanted to thank you and your staff for the hard work you do to improve the life of most vulnerable in Liverpool asylum users community. I was just informed that an Iranian asylum seeker called XXXXX got refugee status. He had been suffering from severe depression and had tried to commit suicide while waiting for his case to be heard. Trying to help him was very challenging due to his mental health and some anger management issues. I witnessed how understating and helpful was Wole when XXXX was not well. I just wanted to express my gratitude to your team and asylum link. Some of you deserve knighthood more than David C. Beckham.

.... Lastly thanks to Susan and Zoe O'Hare our unsung housekeeper heroes who make our very busy building clean and tidy, at least for the start of each day!

Administration and finance

Our responsibilities as employers are overseen, reviewed and updated as necessary by the Board of Trustees. At present we have no support from external human resources but we hope to engage new support shortly.

Day to day management of administration and finance is at present carried out by the Centre Manager and the Treasurer and a few Trustees who frequently visit and advise.

The administration system is overseen by the Trustee Line Manager and the financial aspects are strictly controlled at present on a daily basis by the two Trustees, Jim McCrossan, the Treasurer assisted by Neil Cuningham, this allows a much closer control to be kept and ensures that a much clearer picture of the accounts is available.

Asylum Link Merseyside Independent Examiner's Report to the trustees of the charity Report of the Independent Examiner to the trustees on the accounts of the Charity for the year ended 30th June 2016

I report on the financial statements of the Charity on pages 6 to 19 which have been prepared in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 and with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE), effective April 2008, as modified by the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales, effective January 2015. (The SORP), under the historical cost convention and the accounting policies set out on page 8.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

As described on page 3, the Charity's trustees, who also have the functions of directors, are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements.

The trustees are satisfied that the audit requirement of Section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Act) does not apply and that the accounts do not require an audit in accordance with Part 16 of the Companies Act 2006 and that no member or members have requested an audit pursuant to section 476 of the Companies Act 2006, and that there is no requirement in the governing document or constitution of the Charity for the conducting of an audit. As a consequence, the trustees have elected that the financial statements be subject to independent examination.

Having satisfied mysef that the charity is not subject to audit under company law, or otherwise, and is eligible for independent examination, it is my responsibility to:-

- a) examine the accounts under section 145 of the Act;
- b) to follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 145 (5)(b) of the Act; and;
- c) to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of opinion and scope of work undertaken

I conducted my examination in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales setting out the duties of an independent examiner issued by the Charity Commissioners of the 2011 Act in relation to the conducting of an independent examination, referred to above. An independent examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the Charity and of the accounting systems employed by the Charity and a comparison of the financial statements presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the financial statements , and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning such matters. The purpose of the examination is to establish as far as possible that there have been no breaches of the Charities legislation and that the financial statements comply with the Statement of Recommended Practice issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales (effective April 2005 as modified in June 2008), on a test basis, of evidence relevant to the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.

The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and information supplied by the trustees in the course of the examination is not subjected to audit tests or enquiries, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the financial statements, and in particular, I express no opinion as to whether the financial statements give a true and fair view of the affairs of the charity, and my report is limited to the matters set out in the statement below.

I planned and performed my examination so as to satisfy myself that the objectives of the independent examination are achieved and before finalising the report I obtain written assurances from the trustees of all material matters.

Subject to the limitations upon the scope of my work as detailed above, in connection with my examination, I can confirm that

1 Accounting policies Basis of preparation of the accounts

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with all applicable accounting standards, as modified by the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities(FRSSE 2008) and the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales (SORP Revised January 2015). The accounts have been drawn up in accordance with the provisions of the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008, and include the results of the charity's operations which are described in the Trustees' Report, all of which are continuing.

The charity has taken advantage of the exemption in Financial Reporting Standard No 1 from the requirement to produce a cash flow statement.

The particular accounting policies adopted are set out below.

Accounting convention

The financial statements are prepared, on a going concern basis, under the historical cost convention.

Incoming Resources

Incoming resources are accounted for on a receivable basis.

Resources Expended

Resources expended are recognised in the period in which they are incurred. Resources expended include attributable VAT which cannot be recovered.

Allocation of support costs:

The methods and principles for the allocation and apportionment of support costs between the different activities are:-

30% Casework, 30% Destitution, 10% Education & Training, 30% Social Support

with the exception of Volunteers Expenses and Grants to Service Users which are allocated as follows:

95% Destitution, 5% Casework

These allocations are based on staff time, floor area and usage.

Fixed assets and depreciation

All tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the assets (less their estimated residual value) over their estimated useful economic lives.

Furniture

25% on a reducing balance basis.

Office Equipment

30% on a reducing balance basis.

Taxation

As a registered charity, the organisation is exempt from income and corporation tax to the extent that its income and gains are applicable to charitable purposes only. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the charity, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Funds structure policy

The charity maintains a general unrestricted fund which represents funds which are expendable at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the objects of the charity

Restricted funds have been provided to the charity for particular purposes, and it is the policy of the board of trustees to carefully monitor the application of those funds in accordance with the restrictions placed upon them.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purpose.

There is no formal policy of transfer between funds or on the allocation of funds to designated funds.

Any other proposed transfer between funds would be considered on the particular circumstances.

Accounting for Legacies

Legacies received are treated in accordance with applicable accounting standards, as modified by the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (FRSSE 2008) and the Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting issued by the Charity Commissioners for England & Wales (SORP Revised January 2015).
