The Trustees were in post for all or part of the financial year to which these accounts relate. All the individuals above were also Trustees at the date this report was approved.

Objectives and Activities

The objective of the Chorus is to promote, improve, develop and maintain public education in and appreciation of music in all its aspects by the presentation of public concerts and recitals to the highest possible standards.

Structure, Governance and Management

The governing document for the Chorus is the Constitution of Hertfordshire Chorus, the latest version of which was approved by an AGM of the members on 30th November 2011. The Chorus is run by a Council of elected members with annual elections at the time of the AGM. Council members are the Trustees of the Chorus. There is a Chairman and functional directors for each of the principal roles. Whilst the Trustees are elected, it is expected that they will only stand for posts for which they have the requisite knowledge and skills. No officer may serve continuously in the same post for more than six years. Under each of the Directors are other positions filled by volunteers. Approximately 50% of the Chorus Members are directly involved in helping in this way. The Musical Director attends Council meetings and the Council meets on a regular basis throughout the year.

Achievements and Performance: Chairman's Report on behalf of the Trustees

Hertfordshire Chorus has had another successful year. This season we sang in two venues new to the Chorus. Firstly, in October in St John's Smith Square, London, where we performed Pergolesi Magnificat, Bach Magnificat and Haydn Nelson Mass and then in May in Saffron Hall, Saffron Walden where we sang Hayden Te Deum and Berlioz Te Deum. Concerts at these venues were a success and we are returning to sing in both of them in 2017. In December we were in Haileybury College Chapel for our annual Christmas concert and, as always, there was a retiring collection for a local charity. This time £1312.40 was collected for the local charity, The Pepper Foundation, which funds 'hospice at home' palliative care nurses for children with life-threatening or life-limiting illness in the Chiltern area. In February we performed Tippett A Child of Our Time and Mozart Requiem in St Albans Cathedral. The chorus invited other singers from the community to join us to sing the Requiem and they rehearsed as the 'Sing Mozart!' choir.

Unlike previous years we did not have a summer concert in 2016. Instead we recorded with the BBC Concert Orchestra, two of our recent commissions, Will Todd Ode to a Nightingale and James McCarthy Codebreaker. This recording, over several days in late June at Watford Coliseum, was made in collaboration with Signum Records and the resulting CD will be released later in 2017. As well as our own promotions, we sang at the Willow Foundation annual Christmas concert in St Albans Cathedral.

We always plan the Chorus's musical programmes carefully within the budget without lowering the artistic standards or the challenges of the music. However, the income from members' subscriptions only pays for the Chorus's general rehearsal costs and apart from the Christmas concert, ticket sales do not cover the costs of concerts and we need to supplement our income in a number of ways.

The cost of recording Ode to a Nightingale and Codebreaker for the CD and its subsequent promotion was generated through special fundraising events (sponsored walk, Jazz Brunch and Auction of Promises) organised by two Chorus members and donations from members, patrons and supporters. The sum of £30,160 was raised for this project.

We also received a total of grants from the Williams Church Music Trust, The Simon Gibson Trust and from the Locality Budget Scheme of Hertfordshire County Council.

External engagements are a very valuable source of income and a good opportunity to promote the Chorus to new audiences. So this season we returned to sing at the Hatfield House event, Music for Christmas and also sang in July at an event sponsored by Chestertons Summer Reception at the Royal Academy of Arts, London. In addition, members from the Chorus, with other choirs, sang with Morricone at Blenheim Palace, with the Hans Zimmer and Noel Gallagher tours and Chorus members also contributed to various recordings.

As well as external engagements, we had a successful fundraising Ceilidh and also raised money from wedding choirs, grants, sponsorship, the Chorus Patrons and Friends scheme, refreshment profit, providing guest singers for other choirs, the Chorus lottery, cake baking and other initiatives by Chorus members.

In order to perform the full choral repertoire, the Chorus ideally needs to increase its reserve and recruit more men. These are continual challenges. However, this year we have increased both our General and our Restricted Reserve funds as well as recruiting (by audition) two more men (and five women) via Open Rehearsals, the University of Hertfordshire Freshers' Fair and personal contacts.

Hertfordshire Chorus believes it should contribute to the repertoire and support young composers and to that end we regularly commission new works, financed from the Restricted Reserve fund. So this year we have commissioned a piece from Roland Perrin, which we will perform twice next season.

Hertfordshire Chorus is an artistically ambitious choir and we want to develop further and be recognised for excellent singing not just locally but nationally and by an audience wider than family and friends. In other words, we want to become better known. We believe further recognition would lead to larger audiences, further paid engagements, increased income and the opportunity to be more adventurous with our programming. It would also extend our ability to attract soloists and orchestras of a high standard. As a start we decided to change our brand identity and image and to create a new website. These activities are now either finished or, in the case of the website, will be finished by the end of 2016. We now aim to look for further funding opportunities.

Hertfordshire Chorus has a dedicated and effective Council and I would like to thank the team, and all the Chorus members who help, for their hard work and commitment over the year. We are also very fortunate to have an artistically ambitious Musical Director, David Temple, and a talented accompanist, Charles Andrews. We all look forward to another great season of music making

Financial Review

It has been an extremely successful year both musically and financially.

The decision to substitute a major recording project for one of our concerts this season brought about some incredible fund-raising efforts which not only funded the venture but contributed in keeping our operating costs down. The outcome has been an overall rise in Reserves so that our General Fund now meets the Reserves Policy, for the first time in several years, and our Restricted (Commissioning) Fund is at a level that will help with the promotion of this new recording and a further new commission to be premiered in 2017.

In addition, the continued support of our Patrons and Friends and the efforts of a whole host of members has resulted in steady levels of income across most of our fund-raising activities and the continued success of the Grants Team has enabled us to fund a new website and pay for professional advice with our marketing effort.

My thanks go to all the people who help financially by giving generous amounts of their time with no other reward than in enhancing their own singing experience and in seeing the Chorus progress.

As always, my particular thanks go to Rhona Blyth who does daily battle with the accounting system and produces all the numbers which make this report possible.

The Council has set the required level of unrestricted reserves, or resources, for the organisation at the sum of (a) the total costs of the most expensive concert in the forthcoming budget and (b) the year's predicted shortfall if any.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT YEAR ENDED 31ST AUGUST 2016

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31st August 2016 which are set out on pages 4 to 6.

Respective Responsibilities of Trustees and Examiner
