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TRUSTEES' REPORT

For the year ended 31 August 2016

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 August 2016. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, the Companies Act 2006 and the Statement of Recommended Practice, "Accounting and Reporting by Charities", issued in March 2005.

Structure, governance and management

Oxford Philharmonic Orchestra Trust is a company limited by guarantee (Charity Registration number 1084256; Company Registration number 3608496), governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association. Its subsidiary company, Oxford Philharmonic Orchestra Productions Limited is a registered company (Company number 3592323), governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Oxford Philharmonic Orchestra Productions Limited is the trading body, and the directors act as the management committee for the orchestra. It is managed by a Board of Directors comprising: the Music Director Marios Papadopoulos who is the Chair of the company; the Chair of the Trust; the Secretary of the Trust, and Anthi Papadopoulos.

There are in addition eight full time staff.

The Finance and General Purposes Committee comprising three Trustees and three other members, who have experience in senior financial roles in other companies, provide advice and guidance both to the Trust and to the trading company.

The Advisory Council, chaired by a Trustee, provides advice and guidance on local matters.

Objects of the charity

The main objectives of the charity are the establishment and running of an orchestra known as Oxford Philharmonic Orchestra and the presentation of musical productions. In addition to giving regular performances of classical symphonic works in Oxford and beyond, the Orchestra has an important mission to bring music into the community in local universities, colleges, schools and hospitals.

Review of activities during the year

Our name change to Oxford Philharmonic Orchestra Trust took effect on the first day of the year, 1 September 2015, to coincide with the opening of the new season. The changeover went smoothly, and it is helpful that our informal designation as the Oxford Phil remains the same, as does our logo and website address.

The response to the change from all sides has been positive, with many comments that the Philharmonic name is much more suitable for an orchestra of our growing repute.

This year we have continued to grow and expand in line with the objectives as set out in our Business Plan. The standards of the orchestra have reached new levels of excellence and in this respect it has been a tremendously successful year.

We offered a programme of exciting and attractive concerts, embracing all musical genres spanning repertoire from the baroque to the contemporary, and it is clear that our reputation is continuing to grow, both nationally and internationally.

Our Celebrity series continued to attract huge audiences as well as the attention of the music world at large. This season saw appearances from luminaries such as John Lill, Maxim Vengerov, Nicola Benedetti, Vadim Repin, Renée Fleming and Sir András Schiff.

Our association with Maxim Vengerov, our Artist in Residence, continues to develop. He has been active in a broad range of our activities including concerts (both as conductor and soloist), recitals, tours and recordings.

The benefit to the Orchestra of working with artists of such international renown has been substantial, attracting huge sell-out audiences, raising our profile to unprecedented levels and having the additional benefit of enabling us to attract orchestral musicians of an ever higher standard

The financing of such a programme however, as set out in our Business Plan and budgets, requires us to generate significantly increased income streams.

These celebrity artists involve a considerably higher level of expenditure, as well as extra rehearsal time, and we will need to ensure our effectiveness as a fundraising organisation if we are to sustain this programme. Consequently, we recorded a loss of £385,826 and this is a very disappointing result after so many consecutive years of positive and improving financial results.

On the education and community side we have maintained a full programme of events including the Residency with Oxford University, the International Piano Festival, the Youth Concerto Competition, the Young Artists' Platform of pre-concert performances, our Apprentice Scheme, our outreach work in schools and hospitals, and for our very youngest audiences the FUNomusica concerts for those from 4 years old.

The Trust

New Trustees are proposed upon recommendation by an existing Trustee or by the Music Director. The recommended number of Trustees is 15 but this may vary according to circumstances. There is no formal induction or training for Trustees as at present this is not considered necessary. The Trustees appointed recently have held senior positions within commerce, industry or the professions, and use their experience to benefit the charity. Most are already experienced Trustees of other charities. In light of this the Trustees are aware of and have given due consideration to the Charity Commission's guidance of Public Benefit.

Fundraising and the University Development Office

In the absence of institutional funding such as the Arts Council, we remain dependent on the continued goodwill of our circle of individual donors, particularly at a time when we are investing heavily in our future development. It is a normal feature of the professional music business that income from ticket sales will rarely generate more than 20% of the amount needed, so dependence on major donors together with a successful fundraising programme is an on-going requirement.

We are now asking donors to commit to longer periods of giving and we need to secure commitments that cover a two or three year period.

We continue to reap mutual benefits from our formal relationship with the University of Oxford.

Management

We have had good staff stability this year, and have continued to maintain and develop our IT management and information systems, which are a key part of our decision making. To strengthen the management structure we established the new position of Senior Manager, and appointed Simon Wall on 1 February 2016.

Advisory Council and Honorary Members

We are reviewing the constitution and membership of the Advisory Council, under the chairmanship of Saphieh Ashtiany, one of our Trustees.

We have a distinguished list of names in our Honorary Membership category.

Concert activity

The season opened in October with a concert featuring Michael Barenboim playing the Mendelssohn violin concerto and Marios conducting Mozart's Symphony in G minor in both Bristol and Oxford. Next pianist John Lill and conductor John Nelson collaborated for the first part of our Schumann series featuring his Piano Concerto in A minor and Symphony No. 2. October also featured our New College Residency Launch with the Soloists of the Oxford Philharmonic and Marios performing Brahms and Borodin. This month marked the first of our FUNomusica Family Concerts - the next two of which occurred in January and March. November featured Artist in Residence Maxim Vengerov and cellist Leonard Elschenbroich, as well as Nicola Benedetti who performed Glazunov's Violin Concerto in A minor in Cheltenham and Beethoven's Violin Concerto in Oxford. In January we had the second concert in our Chamber Series at Merton College featuring a programme of Beethoven and Prokofiev. We also welcomed visiting violinist Vadim Repin for Shostakovich's Violin Concerto, with Mussorgsky's Pictures at an Exhibition. In February we held our Grand Viennese Ball in Oxford Town Hall featuring dances from the Strauss Family. Long Yu joined us later in the month with violinist Vera Tsu for a programme of Huanzhi, Bruch and Dvořák. April opened with Pinchas Zukerman in a programme of Tchaikovsky and Beethoven. Next came a concert with Renée Fleming in a programme featuring Wagner's Prelude and Liebestod from Tristan and Isolde and Strauss' Four Last Songs. The last Chamber Series concert took place at the beginning of May in the Ashmolean Museum featuring works by Schubert and Brahms and Ivo Pogorelich joined us later that month for the fourth part of our Schumann series which included Schumann's Symphony No. 1 and Chopin's Piano Concerto No. 2. Maxim Vengerov returned in June to Oxford and London's Barbican for the Sibelius Violin Concerto in D minor and Tchaikovsky Symphony No. 6. We finished the season with Sir András Schiff as both pianist and conductor with Christ Church Cathedral Choir and the Oxford Philharmonic for Beethoven's 'Emperor' Concerto and Haydn's Mass No. 14, 'Harmoniemesse'.

Recordings

Our two recordings with Maxim Vengerov, of the Brahms and the Sibelius concertos, as well as the Mendelssohn 'Scottish' Symphony have not yet been released and we are in the process of determining the plans for distribution of these recordings.

Educational Activity

i) University Residency

The current Residency agreement with the University of Oxford, our third, expires 30 September 2017 and negotiations for renewal next year are proceeding well. The Residency enables students to experience workshops, masterclasses, training and performance opportunities led by the OP and world-famous celebrity artists from our Celebrity concert programme. Workshops include conducting seminars and composers' workshops, a rare opportunity for young composers to hear a live performance of their own composition played by professional musicians. Throughout the season we run a series of concerts at Colleges of the University. In addition our Orchestral Apprenticeship Scheme enables students to perform live in some of the orchestra's concerts and to receive orchestral training by its professional musicians. Students also benefit from the rare opportunity to take part in masterclasses from renowned celebrities; this year for example with Anne-Sophie Mutter, Vadim Repin and Pinchas Zukerman.

ii) International Piano Festival

We had a record number of applicants for the limited number of much sought-after places from aspiring young participants from all over the world, and we were joined once again by a number of young scholars from the Lang Lang International Music Foundation. Distinguished international artists including Nikolai Lugansky, Marc- André Hamelin, Peter Donohoe and Menahem Pressler gave masterclasses and public recital performances.

iii) Oxfordshire Music Education Partnership (OMEP)

We continue as a key, founder member of the Oxfordshire Music Education Partnership (OMEP), together with the County Music Service and a small number of other local music organisations. The education and outreach programmes offered by the Oxford Philharmonic form an important contributory part of the collective output of the OMEP.

iv) Programmes organised in collaboration with the County Music Service

Youth Concerto Competition

In order to give younger musicians a better chance, we split the competition into junior and senior sections, and hold them alternately each year. This year's competition was for the senior section for musicians up to university level.

The competition attracted applicants of a very high standard with the eventual winner, Emma Lisney from Pembroke College, Oxford impressing the judges with her rendition of Prokofiev's Violin Concerto No. 2.

Young Artists' Platform, The Apprenticeship Scheme and Coaching

Our Young Artists' Platform provides a pre-concert opportunity for talented young school-age musicians to perform in a short recital at the Sheldonian Theatre.

The Apprenticeship Scheme affords the opportunity for selected young musicians to play in a professional orchestra during part of the afternoon rehearsal.

The OP players provide coaching opportunities to chamber groups and/or OCMS students, as requested by the OCMS.

v) Family Concerts

Our regular FUNomusica family concerts, organised in collaboration with Oxford City Council, provide an introduction to music for a growing constituency of young listeners in our area. As part of our formal recognition agreement with the Oxford City Council we now hold three concerts a year: in addition to the two concerts for 4-8 year olds, we hold one for FUNomusica 'graduates' for 8-12 year olds.

vi) Outreach and Community work

We have an ever-growing number of requests which our limited resources in money and time can never satisfy.

We concentrate on local Special Schools where we have established a strong bond with the teaching and pastoral staff. Principally we work in the Mulberry Bush School in Standlake, a national provision for seriously psychologically disturbed children, and at Northern House School, a similar Special School in North Oxford, where we usually involve additionally a local mainstream primary school, a sharing experience highly valued by both schools We continue to work regularly with the Blackbird Academy Trust comprising the three primary schools on the Blackbird Leys estate.

Additionally we offer open days for beginner instrumentalists from local primary schools utilising as the host venue the premises of both the County Music Service in Bayards Hill and occasionally the Dragon School in north Oxford. Typically one of these open days attracts up to 100 young children, from up 7 or 8 local primary schools.

In hospitals we hold regular workshops for severely physically disadvantaged clients at the Nuffield Orthopaedic Centre, as well as at the Cherwell Ward of the Fulbrook Centre providing care for people suffering from acute conditions related to age, and at the Oxford City Community Hospital.

We have occasional requests to carry out workshops in local private schools but we do of course charge the full costs for these.

Friends

The friends and patrons scheme numbers have remained relatively static at about 150.

Future activities

We anticipate building on the success of the first two decades of the orchestra. More specifically:

- gain wider recognition, nationally and internationally, as one of the country's leading orchestras
- continue to strengthen the quality of the orchestra by recruiting the best players available and increasing rehearsal time
- promote our Celebrity series to attract internationally acclaimed artists to Oxford
- maintain our education and community programme including the University Residency, the International Piano Festival, our collaboration with the County Music Service as an active member of the Oxfordshire Music Education Partnership, the Concerto Competition, our work in schools and hospitals and our series of family concerts
- Develop a regular funding model to meet the considerable costs needed to achieve our ambitious objectives.

Reserves policy

The trustees consider the current level of reserves to be too low and will endeavor to raise the level of reserves in the coming years to bring them back in line with the level of 2014/15.

Risk management policy

The Trustees have made an assessment of the risks faced by the charity, and the controls that should be in place to mitigate these risks. This will be reviewed regularly to assess whether these controls are sufficient. The Trust is conducting an audit on insurance and business interruption issues and will implement the necessary measures.

Statement of Responsibilities of the trustees

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards).

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 AUGUST 2016

1 Accounting Policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and include the results of the individual parent charity's operations which are described in the Trustees' Annual Report.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Companies Act 2006, the Charities Act 2011 and with the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005).

As shown in the consolidated statement of financial activities, group expenditure exceeded group income by £385,826 in the year and reserves were reduced from £789,910 to £404,084. The Trustees however have considered a period not less than twelve months from the date of approval of these financial statements and believe that additional fundraising opportunities have been identified and therefore believe the going concern basis of accounting is appropriate.

1.2 Basis of consolidation

The accounts consolidate the results of the charity and its wholly-owned subsidiary company, the Oxford Philomusica Productions Limited on a line by line basis. A separate Statement of Financial Activities and Balance Sheet has been prepared for the charity in order to distinguish the results, assets and liabilities of the entities.

1.3 Funds

Unrestricted Funds - these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds - these funds comprise of the Sir Ronald Grierson Fund (SRGF) and of the Concert Access Fund for Students (CAFS). The SRGF is designated to fund high profile and celebrity concerts. The SAF is designated to provide subsidies that will allow students to attend concerts and workshops at discounted prices.

Restricted Funds - these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purpose within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for a particular restricted purpose.

1.4 Income

Donations and similar income are included in the financial statements on a receivable basis.

Income from concerts and similar productions is included in incoming resources in the period in which the relevant production takes place.

All other income is included on a receivable basis.

1.5 Expenditure

All expenditure is included on an accruals basis and is recognised when there is a legal or constructive obligation to do so.

- Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the staging of concerts and similar productions and various community projects and educational programmes. It includes both the direct costs and support costs relating to these activities.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.
- Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

1 Accounting Policies (continued)

1.6 Investments

Fixed asset investments are stated at cost less provision for permanent diminution in value.

1.7 Taxation

The Oxford Philomusica Trust is a charitable company and does not carry out an activity sufficient to be subject to corporation tax.

The Oxford Philomusica Productions Limited, a subsidiary of The Oxford Philomusica Trust, is subject to corporation tax.

1.8 Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the costs less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Plant and machinery	10% straight line
Fixtures, fittings & equipment	10% straight line
Motor vehicles	25% straight line
Computer equipment	33% straight line

Fixed assets with a value of less than £250 are not capitalised.

1.9 Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

1.1 Foreign currency translation

Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. All differences are taken to profit and loss account.
