Representatives of the branches, regional and national organisations meet on an annual basis as a forum to consider all issues affecting animal welfare; and to develop policies for the future pursuit or their common aims.

The objects of the branch are to promote the work and objects of the National Society of the RSPCA – to promote kindness or to suppress cruelty to animals by all lawful means - with particular reference to the area of the Branch, in accordance with the policies of the Society.

The key aim is to find suitable new homes for as many animals as possible, and to provide proper care for those who have been mistreated or abandoned.

The Trustees have reviewed the outcomes and achievements of the Branch's objectives and activities for the year to ensure they remain focused on the charity's aims and continue to deliver benefits to the public. The Trustees complied with the duty under the Charities Act 1993 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission which can be illustrated as follows:

- The Branch supports the local Inspectors by taking in, free of charge, mistreated or abandoned animals including pets whose owners suffer ill health or financial difficulties or pass away. The Branch provides education, information and advice, benefiting the public by promoting compassionate human sentiments towards animals.
- The Branch provides subsidised veterinary treatment for animals which are sick or injured and belong to local people on low incomes. This is achieved through a voucher scheme and at the fortnightly welfare clinics held in West Norwood where we work closely with easipetcare a chain of low cost Vets.
- During 2016 29 welfare vouchers were issued to the public with a value of £3480.00 thus benefiting those on means tested benefits by giving financial help to obtain veterinary care for companion animals.
- The Branch offers subsidised neutering and free microchipping of companion animals for pet owners on means tested benefits or in receipt of a low incomes. This helps to control dog and cat populations and promotes responsible pet ownership. Animals in the care of the Branch receive veterinary treatment, vaccination, neutering and microchipping and are assessed for rehoming.

- Free animal care advice is offered to pet owners, and talks are given by invitation to local school children about caring for pets. These activities benefit the public through the promotion of responsible pet ownership.

This benefits local people, schools and companies by providing the possibility of doing work which is compassionate and rewarding.

The main activities to achieve this are the operation of an animal rehoming programme and a fortnightly animal welfare clinic to help provide affordable veterinary care to local pets in need. Our force of dedicated volunteers provides invaluable support and without them the Branch would be unable to function

We estimate that our volunteers (especially our team of charity shop volunteers) contributed 10,000 hours of their free time during 2016.

A regional structure also exists that is overseen on a national basis. This structure provides a team of specialist Inspectors and coordinates the policies and objectives of the branches. RSPCA London South East Branch provides volunteering opportunities for those who wish to support our work including trusteeship, fundraising and retail experience. This benefits local people, schools and companies by providing the possibility of doing work which is compassionate and rewarding.

The main activities to achieve this are the operation of an animal re-homing programme, low cost animal clinic to help provide veterinary care. Our force of volunteers provide invaluable support. We estimate that our volunteers contributed some 10,000 hours of their free time during 2016.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Once again we have experienced another busy year at the Branch with 10 dogs, 111 cats, 5 rabbits and 10 miscellaneous animals being rehomed.

The Management of the three charity shops remained the same throughout 2016. We would like to thank all the staff for their hard work and dedication throughout the year.

Our fortnightly clinic continues to be very popular. We held a low cost vaccination and microchipping clinic every other Sunday during 2016 where we vaccinated 3526 pets and microchipped 1135 animals. Except for the Vet, the clinic is managed by local Volunteers who give up their Sunday to help local animals. Usually we have a team of six volunteers and four Trustees on duty to cover all the required tasks.

The Branch held no fundraising events during 2016. We rely on our three charity shops to provide a sustainable source of income.

The Committee would like to thank the staff and volunteers at the shops and clinic for their hard work and support during the year.
