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TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

The Trustees present their report and accounts for the year ended 31 March 2017.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association under which it is governed, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016).

Objectives and activities

The charity's objects and its principal activities are to preserve the remains of the Cluniac Priory of St Pancras in Lewes in the County of East Sussex for the benefit of the public generally and especially the inhabitants of the District of Lewes, to facilitate public and archaeological access to the Priory and to advance the education of the public in the subject of the Priory and its importance in the history of England.

The Trust objectives are pursued in accordance with the principles set out in the June 2015 Development Plan which is available on the website.

The Trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Achievements and performance

Overview

2016/17 was a quieter year following the completion of two Heritage Lottery grants. However three major projects described below continue to be developed and links with other UK Cluniac sites and the European Federation strengthened.

Priory site

Priory Park continues to be maintained to a high standard thanks to the on-going work of Barcombe Landscapes Ltd. We are fortunate that the many members of the public who regularly use the site can be relied upon to flag up safety and other issues as they occur.

Events

The Trust organised or attended some 30 events in the year to April 2017 and twelve have been at Priory Park.

In September the Trust was able once again to put on the highly successful Priory by Candlelight evening. On the same day Arthur Franklin again led a guided walk around Lewes following the Priory History Trail. Both these events were part of the Heritage Open Days.

Other organisations also used Priory Park for their events. Audio Active put on the Green Light music performances and Priory Park was one of the locations for LewesLight festival. Southover Bonfire Society again held their popular May Fayre.

As well as numerous school visits, guided tours of the Priory were given to Uckfield Rural Interests Group, Friends of Reading Abbey, Aria Tours and Secondary School students from Germany. Talks were given to Brighton Forum Group and Kingston WI.

We are enormously grateful to Tracy Anderson, Helen Chiasson, Arthur Franklin, Tony Freeman, Kate Hickmott and Helen Poole, as guides and speakers, for giving their time and expertise to bring the Priory and its history to the public.

The fifth of our Study Days *The Cloister and the Gate* was organised last October on the subject of the monks of Lewes Priory and the laity. Four distinguished speakers attracted a wide audience in St John's Church Southover.

Education

Our education programme continues as a major part of the Trust's activity. Education & Community Engagement Officers Helen Chiasson and Kate Hickmott organised site visits and in-school events for Pells Primary School, St Andrews Prep School Eastbourne, a local cubs group, St Pancras Primary School and Southover Primary School.

They also represented the Trust at East Sussex Arts Partnership funding event, Pyecombe Church Downland Celebration, Horsham Learning Liaison Forum and the Business of Heritage Conference.

They also took a leading role in our continuing contacts with the European Federation of Cluniac Sites and the UK Cluniac Group described below.

Projects

Priory Stones Research Project

Under the leadership of Paul Benjamin with invaluable support from Andy Gammon the cataloguing of stones associated with the Priory has continued. There are now over 600 images in the database many of which can be seen on the website now including the 3D images produced by the European Federation. Further detailed work is scheduled to continue this year with assistance from the Corpus of Romanesque Sculpture in Britain and Ireland. Further research into the significance of Tournai marble carving in the cloisters and lavatorium is being undertaken with John McNeil of the British Archaeological Association.

Community Medieval Garden

Fundraising for this project has been enormously successful. The Mayor of Lewes' fund continues to grow. The Tesco Bags of Help appeal has realised £12,000. Sussex Community Foundation has contributed £1,000 and Lewes Town Council £1,700. We are very grateful to all these. Work so far includes clearing the site, building the raised beds & compost bins and installing perimeter wattle fencing. The first community gardening session is scheduled for 22 April and the official launch on 24 June.

Lewes Breviary

This is a project to develop an understanding of the liturgical music of Lewes Priory by research into and performance of the medieval manuscript in the Fitzwilliam Museum Library in Cambridge. It is being undertaken in cooperation with Andrew Robinson (Musiclal Director) and the Brighton Early Music Festival (BREMF) Community Choir . Professional musicians from Santiago de Compostella (who work with BREMF) have transposed some of the music including a Hymn to St Pancras which has not been performed for nearly 500 years. BREMF Community Choir has already held workshops which are open to all. As a result of our European education project contacts we were able to assist in arranging for the concert to be performed in the Cluniac Church of La Charité-sur-Loire in July, following a week's rehearsal in France. The concert will also be performed in Priory School Chapel in November of this year and as part of the Brighton Early Music Festival in Brighton in 2018. Thanks to the hard work of Kate Hickmott, £5,000 has ben obtained from the Chalk Cliff Trust to take the project forward including organising music workshops in three local schools and producing an educational film about the project and the music.

National & International Links

UK Cluniac Forum

A successful third annual conference was held in Dudley in October. Delegates from the other UK sites and English Heritage attended. The Trust is continuing to coordinate the development of and fundraising for the UK Group and will be hosting the 2017 conference in Lewes.

FESC General Assembly 2016

Tony Freeman and Kate Hickmott attended the conference organised in Palencia by the Fédération Européenne des Sites Clunisiens (FESC). Valuable contacts were made with other Cluniac sites in Europe and awareness of Lewes Priory developed.

European Education Project

Kate Hickmott attended the meeting of the Cluny Kids working group in Tyniec in Poland in August developing educational resources across Europe.

Council of Europe Cultural Routes

The Trust with the support of Councillor Ruth O'Keeffe is continuing to look for locations at the entrances to Lewes which will signal the UK Cluniac Cutural Route.

FESC UK Visit

The Federation has organised a members trip to UK in September which will come first to Lewes and then visit London, Stratford and Dudley.

Herb Garden

The garden continues to flourish. Tracy Anderson has again coordinated maintenance and development by our dedicated volunteers under the leadership of Sue Fitzsimmons. We welcome Angela Grove and Bridget Biden, two new and enthusiastic helpers. A hop obelisk constructed by Dominic Parrette of Sussex Willow has recently been installed. A useful link has been established with the Friends of Meads Parks & Gardens who made a visit to Lewes. Colin & Judy Brent have generously donated a stone tablet with appropriate carved text.

Lewes Priory Research Group

The trust is grateful for the support of the Research Group on whose wide knowledge it continues to rely. The Group is progressing its long-term aim to compile a complete record of material relating to the Priory and the location of primary and secondary sources of information. The Priory Stones research project contributes to this compilation of material relating to the Priory.

Emil Godfrey Memorial Lecture

This event continues to be a highlight in our calendar. There have been 35 lectures since Emil Godfrey's first in 1982 and we have been privileged to hear some distinguished speakers. We have yet to find someone for 2018 and will welcome suggestions.

Website and Social Media

The website <u>www.lewespriory.org.uk</u> continues to be expanded having a growing amount of information on history and education subjects and many photographs of events. The Trust Facebook and Twitter accounts keep the profile of the Priory prominent.

Publications

Our publications including free information leaflets continue to be organised by Helen Chiasson who ensures stocks are maintained at the Lewes Tourist Information Centre and Anne of Cleves Museum.

Membership

We are grateful to Andrew Norris in his role as Membership Secretary. Membership has remained steady in the last twelve months. Do please encourage friends and neighbours to join.

Volunteers

The Trustees are very grateful to all those who have given time and expertise during the year in the Herb Garden: as site wardens, as guides and at the various events. We are currently looking for someone to replace John Freeman as a trustee.

Financial review

The charity received the final tranche of the Heritage Lottery grant for the 'Putting Lewes Priory on the Map Project' during the year and this project has now been completed. Funds have been received for the Community Medieval Garden and the Lewes Breviary projects which are currently in progress. The results of the year have left unrestricted funds of £17,994 and restricted funds of £13,631.

Reserves policy

The charity's reserves are required for the purpose of providing adequate working capital for the efficient operation of the charitable company with particular regard to the future obligations and responsibilities accruing from the project supported by the Heritage Lottery Fund and others, to build upon the project and also to cover any financial obligations in the event of the charitable company ceasing operations. It is considered that current levels set aside are adequate.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee, and is therefore governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

Lewes Priory Trust is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Trinity House, School Hill, Lewes, East Sussex, BN7 1HH.

1.1 Accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the charity's Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102)" (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

The accounts are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \pounds .

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

These accounts for the year ended 31 March 2017 are the first accounts of Lewes Priory Trust prepared in accordance with FRS 102, The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland. The date of transition to FRS 102 was 1 April 2015. The reported financial position and financial performance for the previous period are not affected by the transition to FRS 102.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the Trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the accounts.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives unless the funds have been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds set aside at the discretion of the trustees for specific purposes.

Restricted funds are those donated for a particular purpose or else where fundraising has been undertaken for a particular purpose.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount. Income tax recoverable in relation to donations received under Gift Aid or deeds of covenant is recognised at the time of the donation.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2017

1 Accounting policies

1.5 Resources expended

Expenditure is included on an accruals basis.

Charitable activities - Charitable activities include expenditure associated with the objects of the charity and also include support costs relating to that activity.

Governance costs - Governance costs include those costs incurred in the governance of the charity and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

1.6 Stocks

Stocks are stated at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

1.7 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts.

1.8 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised..

1.9 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

1.10 Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised when the charity has a present obligation resulting form a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the Trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.

The Putting Lewes Priory on the Map fund consists of a Heritage Lottery Fund grant and a donation towards a range of activities and resources to promote Lewes Priory, including additional archaeological work, developing the visitor experience and the creation of a Priory model for teaching purposes. The final 10% tranche of the grant was received in the year and the project has now been completed.
