ANNUAL REPORT

FOR THE YEAR 2016

Since our last report, Vol. 130, *Reports of Sir Peter King, Chief Justice of the Common Pleas, 1714-1722*, edited by Professor Lloyd Bonfield and Professor L.R. Poos, has gone to the printers ready for despatch in July. The text of this edition is based upon three manuscripts, in Lincoln's Inn Library, the library of Harvard Law School, and the Lilly Library of Indiana University, and contains notes of some 330 cases, predominantly in the Court of Common Pleas. It includes an extensive introduction, which not only gives a fascinating insight into the substantive and procedural issues which came before this much understudied court in this era, but also (through the various annotations of the manuscripts) shows how the manuscripts were passed on and used by other lawyers. It is one of a number of volumes of eighteenth-century law reports and judges' writings which the Society is publishing, which will fill important gaps in our knowledge of the common law of this period.

We remain in arrears in terms of the production of volumes. Vol. 130 - the volume for 2013 – will have come into members' hands slightly later than we anticipated; for the final production was delayed as a result of some new manuscript material coming to light when the edition was already in proof. However, there is much material in hand, and we hope to be able to catch up relatively quickly with our arrears (see below, under *Publications*).

The past year has seen the publication of volume 19 of the Supplementary Series, *The Inns of Chancery 1340-1640*, edited by Sir John Baker. This work, which sets out what is known about the inns of chancery in their heyday as schools of law, provides texts of all the surviving written regulations by which the Inns of Chancery were governed, and includes some recent manuscript discoveries.

The Council express their deep regret at the loss of Professor Peter G. Stein, who died in August at the age of 89. Professor Stein first joined the Society in 1963, and was first elected to the Council in 1969. Among his many distinguished contributions to legal history was his volume for the Supplementary Series (completing the edition of the late Professor Francis de Zulueta), *The Teaching of Roman Law in England around 1200* (vol. 8, 1990).

In December 2016, Dr Michael Clanchy stepped down from the Council, which he first joined in 1975. The Council would like to express their thanks for him for his long service to the Society, which included acting as Trustee and editing vol. 90 (for 1972), *The Roll and Writ File of the Berkshire Eyre of 1248*.

The Council would also like to record their gratitude for the bequest of £1,000 left to the Society by the late Professor S. F. C. Milsom.

Publications: As indicated in last year's report, the next annual volume to be issued is the delayed volume 130 for 2013, *Reports of Sir Peter King, Chief Justice of the Common Pleas, 1714-1722*, edited by Professor Lloyd Bonfield and Professor L. R. Poos, and described in last year's report. It is regretted that production of this volume has taken some time, a delay having been caused by the discovery of further manuscript material while the volume was in proof, but it has now reached the final stages, and is expected to be ready for despatch to members during July 2017. With it will be included Professor Rebecca Probert's lecture, *Double Trouble: the Rise and Fall of the Crime of Bigamy*, delivered following the annual general meeting in 2013.

Since the last report it has been necessary to make a change in the order of annual volumes, in consequence of which volume 131 for 2014 will now be the edition by Dr Andrew Hershey of three of the six special eyre rolls associated with Hugh Bigod, chief justiciar of England between 1258 and 1260, described in last year's report. This volume is expect to go to press in summer 2017.

Volume 132 for 2015, Sir John Baker's *Selected Readings and Commentaries on Magna Carta 1400-1604* is already in members' hands. Volume 133 for 2016 will now be Professor Michael Lobban's edition of unpublished manuscripts of Sir Jeffrey Gilbert (1674-1726) on property and contract, described in last year's report, which is now in the hands of the Literary Director.

Professor Lobban's edition of Gilbert will be followed by Sir John Baker's edition of reports from the notebooks of Edward Coke, which is nearing completion. The edition will comprise cases in the period 1572-79 scattered through Coke's commonplace book, together with cases from Coke's first and second notebooks (1579-88), commencing soon after his call to the bar, and ending four years before his appointment as solicitor-general. The notebooks are

a record of Coke's forensic success, and of the evolution of his legal ideas, containing much that did not find its way into the printed *Reports*, and preceding the larger notebook which Coke called his 'Liber primus'. The notebooks were evidently much used by Coke himself, and intended by him to be read by others. The bulk of the material in this edition is such that it will be issued in two parts, comprising volumes 134 for 2017 and 135 for 2018.

Professor Thomas Gallanis's edition of the judicial notes of Sir Dudley Ryder as chief justice of the King's Bench 1754-56, described in last year's report, which has had to be delayed, will follow the second of Sir John Baker's volumes to form volume 136 for 2019.

Other annual volumes in preparation include an edition by Dr Nigel Ramsay of material relating to the High Court of Chivalry in the fourteenth and fifteenth centuries.

In the supplementary series Sir John Baker's *The Inns of Chancery 1340-1640, with an edition of the surviving statutes and orders*, described in last year's report, is now in print and available for purchase. In preparation for the supplementary series is an edition by Mr David Hoffman of the records of the northern circuit 1763-1802.

Publications on line: Individual members may like to be reminded that the whole of the Society's publications down to vol. 125 (2008) may be accessed via the Hein Online website. Members can receive the password on application to the Secretary.

Web site and Twitter: The Society is currently in the process of redesigning and updating its website, which we anticipate will be ready to be launched during the course of the summer. Report of the trustees for the year ended 31 December 2016

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the Society for the year ended 31 December 2016. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Society's governing document.

Constitution

The Selden Society is an unincorporated association constituted as a trust. The internal organisation of the Society is subject to a set of Rules, a copy of which is sent to every member. The Society is a registered charity (Registration Number 211536)

Objectives and activities

The purposes of the Society are to encourage the study and to advance the knowledge of the history of English law, especially by the publication of original documents, the reprinting or editing of works of rarity or importance, and the compiling of information as a tool for further research.

Achievements and Performance

During the year 2016, the Society continued its work of editing legal manuscripts for publication, and hosted a number of meetings in the United Kingdom and overseas to promote the study of English legal history. It also supported scholarship by the provision of a PhD studentship.

Structure, governance and management

The management of the affairs of the Society are vested in a President, Vice-Presidents, and the Council, who are elected at the annual general meeting for a term of three years. The officers of the Society are the Honorary Treasurer, Literary Director and Secretary, who are ex officio members of the Council. Three Trustees, also ex officio members of the Council, hold the copyrights and property of the Society. The Inns of Court and Law Society are each entitled to nominate one representative on the Council; and the British Academy may nominate two such.

1 Accounting policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 and the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The financial statements have been prepared to give a "true and fair" view and have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provide a "true and fair view". This departure has involved following Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 rather than the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice effective from 1 April 2005 which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and are on a going concern basis. The Trustees have reviewed reserve levels and cash flow forecast for the next 12 months and believe the going concern basis to be appropriate.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The charity has adopted FRS 102 for the first time in preparing these financial statements. The transition date to FRS 102 was 1 January 2015 and the last financial statements prepared under the previous reporting framework were for the year ended 31 December 2015. There were no changes required to be made to prior year balances as part of this translation, other than the reclassification of governance costs to charitable expenditure, hence the comparatives have been restated.

(b) Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the financial statements, the Trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required. No restatements were required. In accordance with FRS 102 a reconciliation of opening balances and net income/expenditure for the year is provided, with the net income under previous GAAP adjusted for the presentation of investment gains as a component of reported income.

Income

UK and overseas subscription income is recognised when receivable and applied over the relevant period. Subscriptions from overseas members are stated net of exchange gains and losses.

US subscriptions are recognised when received in the US. Subscriptions received in the United States of America are shown as subscription debtors until the money is transferred to the UK, until then these are held in a separate US bank account.

Voluntary donations are accounted for when received.

Investment income

Dividends from listed investments are accounted for when receivable. Interest on deposits is taken into account on an accruals basis. All investment income is stated inclusive of related taxation recoverable.

Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate ruling at the date of the transaction. All differences are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to a particular heading, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

The cost of publications is recognised in the year to which the publication relates. No value has been placed in the financial statements on publications stock.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with Governance of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Investments

Investments are stated at 'bid' prices at the balance sheet date. Any gains or losses on revaluation are taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

Funds of the Charity

The charity's funds are segregated between:

(a) Designated funds - represent monies, which have been designated for a specific purpose by the Council.

(b) General fund - represents undesignated monies retained, which provide the working capital to enable the Council to carry out its charitable activities.

The Council regularly reviews the level of Income Funds and the strategic needs of the Society. The publications produced by the Society require income to be generated by its investments at a level sufficient to supplement subscription income to produce the income required to finance the publications. As such, the level of reserves is monitored regularly by the council and maintained at a level appropriate to meet the ongoing objectives of the Society.
