Trustees' Report

This has been a great year when we have been able to build on the ethos of the school, strengthen and develop systems and put plans in place providing a safe and secure environment where our students can attain a good educational level and develop the social skills which will enable them to become confident young people in society of today.

This is due to the incredible efforts of our Head Teacher Julie Kelly bringing Great Oaks Small school back to its rightful place where it is valued by the state, parents and carers alike. The Board of Trustees offer her our thanks for the amazing changes we can see.

The emphasis on English and Mathematics has helped our students and enriched their understanding of other subjects. The further development of ASDAN gives them the advantage of obtaining a credited life skill leading to increased confidence and self esteem.

My thanks to all our staff, too, for the care, enthusiasm and commitment in embracing the new methods and training put in place. Their dedication is seen in the school at all times.

New staff have been recruited which is a big learning curve for them coming from a mainstream environment, and sometimes previous staff return. We were very pleased to welcome back Corron Osborn who runs a tight ship in the kitchen providing us with highly nutritious meals and is now, also, teaching cookery and food hygienic ensuring the students know both the nutritious value and the cost of food today. This enables them to gain life skill credits.

Our Senior Leadership Team have gone from strength to strength gaining confidence in their new roles making it possible for Julie to pass on responsibilities while maintaining a complete overview.

We, The Board of Trustees take our responsibilities very seriously, these include safe management, encouraging the growth and development of the school and good stewardship of our finances. GOSS should aim to spend public monies which are entrusted for the direct education of our students currently in school prudently. We have now been able to create a Reserve Account thus giving security of placement to the students currently at school. The reserve account, is an important part of financial management enabling the Board to plan strategies, cover the risk of unforeseen emergency, fall in source income due to student numbers, planned commitments which cannot be met by future income alone and the need for expenditure before a funding grant is received.

Many new systems have been implemented including the purchase and installation of SIMS a school management package. The staff have been fully trained and are able to use this system to plan their work and to monitor the progress of the students.

We are in communication with other educational organisations and official bodies for the exchange of ideas and strategies and developing relationships.

A formal evening for the presentation of certificates of achievement has never been easy for our students so this year a more casual approach was arranged in the common room. This was enjoyed by everyone and finished with a celebration of tea and home made cakes.

Christmas lunch was again a joyous affair with all students, staff and trustees. The staff involved in creating this feast made an incredible effort which was enjoyed by all.

Our aim at Great Oaks has always been to help our students, we know the challenges they face, and if we can get them to reengage in education and so gain confidence, improve self-esteem and help them deal with their anxieties we are a long way towards success. We feel we now have that team which will best help our students to reach their potential both in the world of learning and in everyday life skills.

Friday afternoons are still devoted to games which staff and students attend in Ramsgate Sports Centre. The facility is really suitable and they are able to enjoy various games and athletics both individually and in teams which are so beneficial in gaining fitness and social skills.

Trustees' Report

We continue to teach a small number of students off site as they build their confidence to join us in our school society.

We endeavor to include the interests of our young people in their education to develop their knowledge through their enthusiasm in any particular subject. We, therefore, teach a wide range of subjects, this year this includes Law, Government and Politics, Photography and Business Studies.

We had only four school leavers this year but they have achieved good results and, thanks to our dedicated Careers Officer Lorraine Vincent, have, either, secured college places or their individual ambitions.

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005)', issued in March 2005, the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective January 2015) and the Companies Act 2006.

Fund accounting policy

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustees' discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Further details of each fund are disclosed in note 15.

Incoming resources

Donations are recognised where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Deferred income represents amounts received for future periods and is released to incoming resources in the period for which, it has been received. Such income is only deferred when:

- The donor specifies that the donation must only be used in future accounting periods; or
- The donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the charity has unconditional entitlement.

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the statement of financial activities at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Investment income is recognised on a receivable basis.

Income from charitable activities includes income recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided) under contract.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Governance costs

Governance costs include costs of the preparation and examination of the statutory accounts, the costs of trustee meetings and the cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £50 or more are initially recorded at cost.

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Depreciation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:
