STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The branch is constituted as an unincorporated association. The branch operates as an autonomous branch of the National RSPCA subject to its rules for branches (as updated in 2012). A committee, elected at the AGM governs the branch, who are Trustees of the branch. All trustees are briefed on their responsibilities as trustees prior to their acceptance of the role.

The trustees hold bi monthly meetings at which decisions are made.

The branch operates within a national network of organisations that pursue the same objectives and which are known collectively as the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

The network comprises independent branches operating within a defined geographical area for the purposes of fundraising and the provision of animal care facilities and treatments. A regional structure also exists that is overseen on a national basis. This structure provides a team of specialist inspectors and coordinates the policies and objectives of the branches. Representatives of the branches, regional and national organisations meet on an annual basis as a forum to consider all issues affecting animal welfare; and to develop policies for the future pursuit of their common aims.

The branch also has links with other organisations committed to the same objectives.

The trustees actively review the risks which the branch faces on a regular basis through regular meetings of the trustees that cover operational and financial reviews. The trustees also examine other operational and business risks which the branch face and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks, which have been identified as:

- Loss of reputation through error or fraud
- Loss of income through error or fraud
- Insufficient funds to cover the costs of animal welfare activity

OBJECTS, OBJECTIVES AND PRINCIPAL ACTIVITY

The objects of the branch are to promote the work and objects of the National society of the RSPCA – to promote kindness or to suppress cruelty to animals by all lawful means – with particular reference to the area of the Branch, in accordance with the policies of the Society.

The key aim is to support the work of the local inspectorate and to provide proper care by means of welfare provision for animals whose owners cannot afford veterinary treatment.

The Trustees have reviewed the outcomes and achievements of the Branch's objectives and activities for the year to ensure they remain focussed on the charity's aims and continue to deliver benefits to the public. The trustees have complied with the duty under the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission which can be illustrated as follows:

- The branch supports the local Inspectors by financing the boarding of mistreated or abandoned animals, including pets whose owners suffer ill health or financial difficulties. The society's inspectorate (as well as providing education, information and advice) rescues animals in distress and enforces laws against the cruel mistreatment of animals in England and Wales by bringing prosecutions. This work is key to the 'prevention or suppression of cruelty' part of the RSPCA objects, and promotes humane sentiments towards animals which involves moral benefit to mankind as a whole.
- The branch provides subsidised treatment for animals which are sick or injured and belong to local people on low incomes. This is achieved through a voucher scheme and through referrals from local Veterinary practices. This work benefits those on means tested benefits and low incomes by giving them financial help to obtain veterinary care for companion animals.

- The branch offers subsidised neutering and micro chipping of companion animals for owners on low incomes. This helps control the dog and cat populations and promotes responsible pet ownership.
- Free animal care advice is offered to pet owners and talks given by invitation to local school children about caring for pets. These activities benefit the public through the promotion of responsible pet ownership.
- Within the terms of our governing document the branch supports the all Wales
 regional Board by providing funds for the Wales Inspectorate Boarding scheme, the
 equine rehoming project, Wales Inspectorate welfare voucher scheme, FIV/Felv
 testing kits for inspectorate staff, Project support and Development officer and
 essential items for inspectorate use in rescue of animals.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

The branch has continued to meet all eligible requests for assistance. During 2016 there were 128 animal welfare treatments funded by means of voucher, including neutering, microchipping and veterinary aid. The branch also provided additional assistance for 50 treatments or operations through direct referral from veterinary surgeons or local inspectorate staff. These animals ranged from domestic pets to wild life including badgers, seals and pigeons. During the year the branch funded boarding of local animals removed or picked up by the inspectorate. These animals were housed at Llys Nini animal centre in Swansea prior to being rehomed to new caring owners.

The branch participated in the annual rabbit awareness campaign, collaborating with local veterinary practices to encourage rabbit owners to receive a free health check and either neutering or spaying plus vaccination and microchip as appropriate. In all 66 rabbits received treatment and all participating veterinary practices have praised the scheme for providing assistance to rabbits which are very often a neglected pet.

FINANCES

The total incoming resources for the year amounted to $\pm 47,129$ and expenditure was $\pm 18,429$, bringing the surplus for the year to $\pm 28,700$.

RESERVES POLICY

It is the policy of the branch to maintain the free reserves of the branch at a level equal to one year's unrestricted expenditure. As the charity relies heavily on donations and legacies, both of which can fluctuate enormously from year to year, to fund its animal welfare work in the area it is felt prudent to maintain reserves at this level.

FUTURE PLANS

2016 was a difficult year for the branch with a dwindling number of trustees and the decision was taken by the remaining four active trustees to step down at the end of the

year after a campaign to recruit additional replacement trustees did not succeed as hoped. The result of this is that the branch is placed in to Council trusteeship and RSPCA National trustees act in locum of local trustees whilst the work of the branch is overseen on a day to day basis by Society Regional staff. All animal welfare work previously supported by the branch will continue whilst Society trustees and staff advisers decide how to best go about underpinning activity of the branch going forward.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the Trustees to prepare financial year. Under that law the Trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs and the net incoming or outgoing resources of the charity for that period. In preparing the financial statements, Trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the branch will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy, at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. They have general responsibility for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the assets of the charity and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

So far as the Trustees are aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the charity's auditors are unaware. Additionally the Trustees have taken all the steps that they ought to have taken as Trustees in order to make themselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the charity's auditors are aware of that information.

a. Accounting convention

h. Restricted funds

Restricted funds are incoming resources receivable or generated for the objects of the charity with further specified purposes and are only available for specific expenses or projects namely the running of the groups clinics.
