Financial Commentary

This year has seen a significant financial change to the level of support that the WYC receives from City of York Council with the loss of the grant from the Youth Service. The WYC has however met the challenge. In overall terms income is therefore reduced when compared with previous years but the costs have been controlled too and therefore only a small loss on the year was made where as in previous year we have been able to build up a surplus

The ice skating trip to Hull in November made a small profit (£32) and funds were also raised from holding a coffee morning £247.81, and from the sale of a donated computer game £34.

We are thankful for the grant from the Wheldrake Parish Council and their continued support and from the continued support of the City of York Council's Ward Committee. These two large grants are most welcome and provide a degree of security to the Youth Club and the withdrawal of these would be missed

If income and expenditure are maintained at these levels then we have funds for approximately two years

The main financial risks excluding the grants (as mentioned above) are a rent increase from the school and the National Minimum Wage increasing to a point where we need to increase the salaries paid. Currently the impact of either of these would be low.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

As is the case with many other charities, the past year has presented many challenges and demanded that we review and consider changes to the operation of our Youth Club to ensure both its ongoing longevity and continued success. The current economic climate is still uncertain and we remain flexible to allow changes to be made quickly should need arise.

It is to the great credit of our dedicated youth team that we have been able to maximise the impact of the revenues we generated and I take this opportunity to express my thanks to them all. I also wish to thank our trustees who give freely, both their time and expertise, to ensure that we comply with all aspects of our charitable work and operate with fiscal prudence.

Despite localised fund raising our income for the year dropped due mainly to the removal in automatic funding from York City Council and the subsequent transition payments, however we have continued to receive grant assistance from the Wheldrake Ward Committees and Parish council for which we are very grateful and also been successful in applying for and obtaining grant funding from Yor-Part. We have reviewed our expenditure and made cost reductions wherever possible but also minimally increased member charges where we can without jeopardising the purpose of the Youth Club which is to provide a safe social and leisure centre for our young people and is affordable for all.

We are very grateful to all of the volunteers who support our club and also the groups, individuals and organisations that support our work and without their generous assistance we could not function.

During the past year we have continued to support our members with fun activities both inside and out and supported their emotional and educational needs where needed. We have involved our members in decision making and also encouraged them to support the Youth Club in suggesting fund raising ideas, website design and logo creation but also their wishes for new activities.

We are in a better position than some similar charities and our careful management of resources means that we are both stable and viable in these uncertain and challenging times, we are searching for new funding and approaching other charitable organisations for support and also reaching out to other Youth Clubs to gain ideas and best practices that we can share to make our Club better and more efficient.

We were lucky enough to be able to have a coach from York City Football Club to do coaching sessions for 10weeks. This proved so popular we carried it on with one of our D of E volunteers who was a keen footballer.

In the summer we had our ever popular BBQ in the woods with 40 members. For the bouncy castle the following week there were 76! All very lively!

In September we were invited to try crown green bowling at the village hall. We took four members, who were made very welcome, and all enjoyed the evening.

We had theme evenings in the Autumn - Indian, Mexican and Chinese food for their New Year.

Again during the year we went to Red Goat climbing, to Hull arena ice skating and to the new trampolining centre in York, all very successful trips.

It had been suggested that we make enquiries re. funding from The Derwent Lions Club. In November Kirsty and I were invited to a meeting, the outcome of which was that they would like to fund sports equipment to the value of £200.00.
