Objectives and activities

The objects of the charity are:

- 1) To provide relief for refugees, asylum seekers, vulnerable migrants and their dependants living temporarily or permanently in particular but not exclusively in Oxfordshire who are in conditions of hardship or distress;
- 2) To preserve and protect the physical and mental health of refugees, asylum seekers, vulnerable migrants and their dependants;
- To advance the education and training of refugees, asylum seekers, vulnerable migrants and their dependants in need thereof so as to enhance their employment opportunities and assist in their settlement within a new community;
- 4) To advance the education of the public in general about the issues relating to refugees, asylum seekers and vulnerable migrants; AND
- 5) The provision of facilities for recreation or other leisure time occupation for refugees, asylum seekers and vulnerable migrants with the object of improving the conditions of life of those persons who have need of such facilities by reason of their youth, age, infirmity or disablement, poverty or social and economic circumstances.

The activities employed to achieve the charity's objectives are:

- A counselling service, offering transcultural counselling and psychotherapy, aimed at relieving distress
 arising from the after-effects of conflict, persecution or violence, and building confidence and empowering
 refugees, asylum seekers and vulnerable migrants.
- A service for women to provide support and network with others through a programme of educational, creative or recreational activities.
- Activities for men to provide support and network with others through a programme of educational, creative or recreational activities.
- A mentoring and coaching service to provide social support and to help with both mental health and employment needs as appropriate.
- An employment service, supported by bursary funding, to identify and extend the skills of refugees and facilitate access to employment, training and business opportunities in order to reduce dependency, promote mental health and facilitate integration with local communities.
- A training and consultation service to develop the capacity of local service providers and social services to respond appropriately and effectively to the mental health needs of refugees and asylum seekers who are at risk of isolation and social exclusion.
- Work with the media to present more accurate images of refugees and asylum seekers where possible.
- Through qualitative evaluation of our activities, we aim to share and promote good practice in relation to the psychosocial and integration needs of refugees and asylum seekers.

Overview of the year ended 31 March 2017

The corporate objectives which the Trustees set for 2016/17 were to:

- Continue to deliver and possibly extend our range of high quality therapeutic services with a view to empowering clients and improving their well-being;
- Consolidate and build on recent expansion by improving business management and communications systems to aid efficiency and effective working;
- Build our internal capacity by focussing on the professional development, and safeguarding the well-being, of our staff, trustees, volunteers and associates.
- Develop a marketing communications and media strategy to build the organisational profile, diversify our funding streams and help ensure the organisation's sustainability and relevance in an increasingly challenging external environment;
- Meet the outcomes set for different services and improve our systems of monitoring and evaluating our work, including eliciting feedback from our clients, in order to more effectively evaluate, report on and develop these;

 Develop new, and strengthen existing, partnerships with other organisations in order to develop and extend our range of client services and identify possible joint funding initiatives, while avoiding duplication of services.

Achievements and performance

Refugee Resource is the only service in Oxfordshire to offer a range of complementary services to support the psychological, emotional and social well-being and long-term mental health needs of refugees, asylum seekers and vulnerable migrants in Oxfordshire. Clients are referred to us by GPs, Social Services, solicitors and partner organisations, as well as by friends or family and self-referrals.

In 2016/17, we either met and or exceeded our service-delivery targets: more than 250 refugees, asylum seekers and vulnerable migrants of 29 nationalities made more than 1,300 visits to our offices to access support via our mentoring, counselling, social inclusion (advice/ advocacy) and women's services; 59% of these were women. We worked with over 45 partner organisations to help give clients the best end-to-end service to address and resolve a range of issues.

We also delivered training for other organisations on mental health, post-traumatic stress disorder and effective ways to work with refugees and migrants, to ensure our clients are treated with understanding and compassion when trying to establish themselves in the UK. In 2016/17, we worked with staff teams from the Oxford Job Centre and Oxford City Council Housing Office, as well as professionals from educational and mental health bodies. We also gave many talks to community groups, schools and religious organisations to raisie awareness and funds, dispel myths, and enable deeper insights into the circumstances of refugees and asylum seekers.

Highlights:

- Our Counselling and Psychotherapy Service expanded to include a schools-based therapy service which
 works with young refugees in a local school and supports the teaching staff. Our team of seven
 counsellors, including two new therapists, worked with 73 clients, including 23 children and young people
 during the year.
- Our Mentoring Service delivered over 678 hours of mentoring support via 39 active mentor/ mentee
 pairings, and 93% of mentees reported increased confidence after six months support. During the year,
 we delivered 21 training sessions for volunteer mentors, covering issues related to cultural awareness,
 understanding boundaries and ways to empower clients, supporting victims of trauma, understanding
 PTSD, listening skills and supporting people with English and Maths.
- In order to benefit fully from our therapeutic and mentoring services, many of our service users also need help to address a wider range of social issues, so in 2016/17 we established a new social inclusion programme to provide advice and, where necessary, involve other organisations in helping clients to resolve the issues that they face: 83 clients received advice and advocacy support through our social inclusion work; 53 clients received specialist advice from our Citizen's Advice Bureau service (CAB) and all (100%) of our CAB clients reported an improvement in their financial and/or accommodation situation.
- Our Women's Service grew its membership to 130 women, attracting 23 new members of different
 nationalities, and extended it's range of activities over three days a week (from one day a week
 previously). The emphasis was on increasing confidence and empowerment and 26 women took a lead in
 running group activities and/or accessing external training or employment opportunities.
- Ten people received bursary payments totalling £7764 (£6882 through our partnership with the Oxford University Hospital NHS Foundations Trust for medical training, and £882 through our Refugee Resource bursary for travel and course and exam fees, for example for IELTS).
- 56 young people were engaged with our weekly football group and other social or educational activities.
- We also took on a new Partnership Development Manager to help build and develop relationships with partners as well as excisting and potential funders.

Financial Review

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources for the charity for 2016/17 have been grants, primarily from the Big Lottery Fund, The Henry Smith Charity, The Esmée Fairbairn Foundation, The Rayne Foundation and Oxfordshire County Council.

Reserves policy

Our reserves policy dictates that we keep a relatively high level of reserves due to both the nature of our work and our income cycle. Our counselling and psychotherapy work with vulnerable and traumatised clients is long-term and it could be unsafe to end this abruptly; we therefore need a 9-12 month period to wind-down this service. The nature of the work also means we require premises with a reception and counselling rooms; we must provide clinical supervision for staff; and interpreters are needed for service users. We are currently dependent on a few major funding sources - if any of these were lost it could place us in a precarious situation, and as our ability to generate unrestricted funds quickly is limited, we need to hold reserves to cover a lost grant until we can find alternative sources of funding. In 2016/2017, we reviewed and revised our reserves policy (available on request).

As at 31 March 2017, the unrestricted funds of the charity not invested in tangible fixed assets or otherwise committed was £275,960.

Future plans

The current global refugee crisis is leading to more and more people arriving in the Oxford area, and we will continue to work with Oxford City Council to help support the new refugees arriving in Oxfordshire as part of the Government's Syrian Vulnerable Persons Resettlement Programme. We also plan to renew our contract with the Police and Crime Commission in order to continue to deliver therapeutic support to victims of crime from our client group.

Our three year strategic plan is in place and has several areas of focus for growth in the coming year:

- Our new school-based therapy service is through it's pilot phase and is now part of our counselling service portfolio; we will be building on it's initial success and there is scope to expand this service in the next 12-24 months if we can access funding.
- Demand for our expertise, especially the specialist skills of our counselling team, continues to grow and we will continue to scale up our training programme with service providers, such as the Housing Department and the Job Centre, to increase their understanding about our clients' behaviours and needs, so they can work more supportively. We are also aiming to monetise this service.
- We continue to develop our systems for monitoring and evaluating our work and plan to implement a new database system in 2017/18 which will improve the speed and efficiency of our reporting and evaluating.
- We also plan to extend our employment and training offer, giving more careers advice and building new
 partnerships with organisations such as Oxfam and the Shaw Trust to support refugees to access
 voluntary and paid employment opportunities.
- We will continue to review and improve our services with the support of the new Refugee Advisory Board
 that we set up in 2016/17 which ensures the voices and opinions of our service-users are heard and
 acted upon. We will also carry out an external evaluation into all our services in the autumn of 2017, as
 part of our contract with the Big Lottery.

Structure, Governance and Management

Refugee Resource is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 9 October 2002 and registered as a charity on 5 August 2003. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £10.

Refugee Resource was previously known as Oxford Refugee Support Project, which was established by a Declaration of Trust dated 14 October 1999. On 1 April 2003, the Trustees transferred the assets and liabilities held under the Declaration of Trust into the company limited by guarantee and from that date the organisation's activities have been conducted through the company limited by guarantee.

The governance of the charity is the responsibility of the directors who are also trustees and the sole Members of the company. They are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association which specify that a minimum of three trustees be appointed with no maximum number recommended. One third of trustees step down by rotation at each annual general meeting and, if eligible, may offer themselves for re-election

Efforts are made to recruit a range of trustees who can provide the charity with a broad spectrum of relevant experience and knowledge. There is an induction process for new trustees designed to help them understand how the charity works. The directors who served during the period of this report are set out on page 3.

The Board of Trustees meets at least five times a year. Individual trustees have responsibility for monitoring the Charity's activities in specific operational areas depending on their expertise. A Finance Committee, with responsibility for scrutinising financial performance, has been established and meets prior to Board meetings. A trustee-led fundraising working group has also been established to support this area of activity.

The Chief Executive Officer, who reports directly to the Board, takes a strategic lead and is responsible for the day-to-day management of the charity.

Public benefit statement

Refugee Resource's charitable activities focus on relieving distress and improving the well-being of refugees, asylum seekers and vulnerable migrants, and are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit. The Trustees have complied with the duty in Section 17(5) of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission

Responsibilities of the Trustees for the preparation of the financial statements

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the Trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). Under company law the Trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources of the charity for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- · make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the company will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities. In accordance with company law, as the company's directors, we certify that:

- as far as we are aware, there is no relevant audit information of which the company's auditors are unaware;
- as the directors of the company we have taken all the steps that we ought to have taken in order to
 make ourselves aware of any relevant audit information and to establish that the charity's auditors are
 aware of that information.

INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT TO THE MEMBERS OF REFUGEE RESOURCE

We have audited the financial statements of Refugee Resource for the year ended 31 March 2017 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet and the related notes. The financial reporting framework that has been applied in their preparation is applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards, including Financial Reporting Standard 102 (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

1 Accounting Policies

The following accounting policies have been used consistently in dealing with items which are considered material to the accounts of Refugee Resource.

a) Basis of accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with FRS102 and the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (FRS 102).

The trustees consider that the charity is a public benefit entity.

b) Fund accounting

- Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the Trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.
- Restricted funds are subject to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

c) Income

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Voluntary income is received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified.
 The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
- Income from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

d) Pension policy

Refugee Resource operates a pensions' policy in compliance with the requirements of autoenrolment. Employees may make a contribution and Refugee Resource contributes 3% of salary.

e) Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been listed under headings that aggregate all the costs related to that activity. Where costs cannot be directly attributed they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

- Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income.
- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities
 and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such
 activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
- Governance costs include those costs associated with meeting the constitutional and statutory
 requirements of the charity and include the audit fees and costs linked to the strategic management
 of the charity.
- All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the Statement of Financial Activity on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis e.g. staff numbers, time allocation.

f) Fixed assets

Fixed assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation. The costs of minor additions or those costing below £250 are not capitalised. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset over its expected useful life as follows:

Purposes of Restricted Funds

The Counselling and Mentoring Services offer therapeutic support to asylum seekers, refugees and vulnerable migrants via psychotherapy, counselling and an accrediated one-to-one befriending scheme. The main funders are the Big Lottery Fund, The Rayne Foundation, the Oxfordshire Clinical Commissioning Group and the Thames Valley Police and Crime Commissioner.

The Advice, Advocacy and Outreach Services support the work carried out via our therapeutic services by helping to reduce people's feelings of isolation and enable their integration into society via a range of activities.

These include a Women's Project, a men's service including a football club, a Citizen's Advice Bureau service, support with accessing training, education and employment, a hardship fund, and signposting to other services. These activites are funded by the Big Lottery Fund, the Rayne Foundation and other smaller trusts and foundations.

Core funding has been primarily provided by Oxfordshire County Council, The Henry Smith Charity and Esmee Fairburn Foundation.

The Capital Fund was set up to assist in identifying those funds that are not free funds and it represents the net book value of tangible fixed assets held by the charity.
