Structure Governance and Management

Governing Instrument

The charity is a charitable trust and a company limited by guarantee, not having a share capital. The charity is governed by a memorandum and articles of association, registered by the Charities Commission on 13th August 1998 and amended on 26th November 2008.

The charity is governed by a board of trustees, appointed by the existing trustees on an open-ended tenure. An Annual General Meeting is held in September or October every year. There are no subordinate managerial committees.

Recruitment and Induction of Trustees

Trustees are sought who expertise and experience are relevant to the work of the charity and complement the skills of the existing Trustees. The appointment of a Trustee is made at a Trustees' meeting. Trustees are given copies of the Charity Commission publication: "Responsibilities of Charity Trustees". The charity's governing documents, its accounts and minutes of recent meetings: they are then given a tour of the premises and meet the management team.

Organisation

The Trustees formulate policy. Operational control is managed by the Chair of the Trustees.

Risk Management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those relating to its finances and operations (including health and safety issues) and they are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate the Trust's exposure to such risks.

Charitable Purpose

The object of the charity is the study and performance of the arts of music, drama and dance by young persons and the encouragement of public appreciation of those arts.

The trustees are granted wide powers to achieve these objects which are set out in the governing document. Inter alia, these relate to: productions, equipment, buildings, fund-raising and appointment of staff.

AIMS and Intended Impact

The aims of the organisation are

- 1. To be a centre of excellence for musical theatre
- 2. To become the leading centre of opportunity in Cornwall for young people's creative development through the performing arts.
- 3. To improve continuously the quality and professionalism of the organisation.

The organisation exists to provide real and appreciable benefit to the community by developing skills and increasing confidence and maturity in young people; providing volunteering opportunities that are beneficial in the personal development of volunteers as well as the young people; and to provide year-round entertainment for the resident and visiting population of West Cornwall.

Objectives for the Year

The objectives for the year 2015-16 were to consolidate the existing work of the theatre and to explore new avenues in fulfillment of the aims of the organisation, specially:

- To consolidate and increase the opportunities for young people and adults from all backgrounds to participate in the highest quality performances.
- 2. To engage creative professionals and provide members with access to skills and experience that may not otherwise be available to them.
- 3. To appoint a Production Director for a 12 month period with responsibility for direction of the four annual shows with a view to increasing the professionalism of our productions.
- 4. To consolidate our core activities and to build on our reputation as a centre of excellence for Musical Theatre.
- 5. To develop our theatre building to improve the facilities available, in particular the kitchen and rehearsal rooms.

Strategies to achieve the year's objectives

These objectives were met by a focus on performance development and professional tutoring; the development of a recruitment plan and fund raising campaign to recruit a professional director; and the design of new kitchen facilities and new flooring for the two rehearsal rooms.

Principle activities of the Year

Our principle activities this year consisted of 4 major productions and one concert performed by Kidz. We continued our 4 day February workshop course.

Subscription membership of the organisation was maintained at a level of approximately 90 young people.

Review of achievements and performance of the year

Review of activities

Own Productions and initiatives

We presented 4 major productions this year. At The Minack Theatre, a small over-18 ensemble presented Some Enchanted Evening and revived this for the summer season. The production played for nine performances and was seen by a total of 989 people.

In the summer the older and younger groups staged Oliver!; 14 performances of the show were presented to an audience of 4,310 people. The over-18 group presented their production of West Side Story for the summer season and the 12 shows were watched by 2,935 audience members.

At Christmas we presented 'Robin Hood and the Babes in the Wood' a traditional pantomime which was very popular with cast and audience alike. The production involved both older and younger groups of Kidz with 65 young people participating in 12 performances playing to a total audience of 2,839.

We also presented Phil & Friends at Christmas 2015 featuring both Kidz groups and a number of soloists & musicians, several of whom were members or former members of Kidz. This was well attended and enjoyed by a total audience of 260.

The February workshops continued to do well, with 70 young people attending the four days of classes in acting, dancing and singing. Feedback from the participants was either excellent or good.

Other Productions

We hosted three visiting productions this year including Tom Carpenter, Gigspanner and The Big Dance Company.

Repairs and improvements

No major repairs were undertaken to the building this year although plans are in place to replace the kitchen and upgrade the flooring in the two rehearsal rooms.

Marketing

Our marketing presence continued to grow by regular targeted advertising, a wider circulation of leaflets and the development of a Kidz R Us Facebook page.

Volunteering

Kidz R Us is only able to function effectively because of the dedication of numerous volunteers who give feely of their time and skills to support the work of the charity and the young people it exists to serve.

This year, over 170 volunteers have given generously of their time to Kidz, contributing approximately 36,000 hours of work for the organisation, which is the equivalent to employing 20 full time staff.

Public Benefit

In planning our activities for the year, the trustees kept in mind the Charity Commission's Guidance on Public Benefit.

Training for young people through productions, concerts, classes and workshops were designed to improve self-confidence, teamwork and social skills as well as the discipline of learning practical stagecraft.

Investment performance against objectives

The Trustees may make any kind of investment which they could make if they were absolutely entitled to the assets of the charity. In exercising the power of investment conferred upon them, the Trustees must have regard to:-

- 1. The suitability to the charity of investments of the same kind as any particular investment proposed to be made or retained and of that particular investment as an investment of that kind.
- 2. The need for diversification of investments of the charity, in so far as appropriate to the circumstances of the charity.

The current policy of the Trustees is to keep their reserves on short term deposit and then apply them to the purposes for which they are intended. Investments generated interest receivable of £66.

Financial review and results for the year

- a. The trustees do not believe that any material difference between the book values and actual values of assets which may exist has any material effect on the ongoing activities of the Trust.
- b. The detailed results are set out on pages 12 to 17 and show net inflow in funds for the year of £36,866 [2015:£26,552].
- c. The Trustees confirm the availability of assets to fulfill the obligations of the charity without recourse to borrowing. No events have occurred since the end of the financial year that materially affects the position of the Trust.
- d. Voluntary income totalled £62,812 [2015: £57.086]. This heading covers the income from donations and subscriptions. In 2015 it included £23,087 which has been raised towards the purchase of the adjoining building.
- e. The Trustees thank all the many donors who have helped the Theatre throughout the year in particular those who made Gift Aid donations. Without funds raised in that way, we would be able to do considerably less for the young people of the area.

Reserves policy

All the charity's income has been used in pursuance of its objectives as set out above.

The Trustees seek sufficient cash reserves to fund the ongoing maintenance of

Kidz R Us and fund ongoing productions for the ensuing year in order to satisfy the objectives of the Charity. The policy on reserves is reviewed each year. The actual free reserves (that is those funds not tied up in fixed assets and restricted funds) at 31st March 2016 amounted to £93,208 [2015: £49,411].

Plans for future periods

In 2015/16 we plan to continue to consolidate the core activities of Kidz, to develop the skills of young performers and to create musical shows of the highest quality. The productions we hope to perform this year are Avenue Q, Jesus Christ Superstar, Jungle Book and our Christmas Pantomime will be Cinderella.

Since March 2015, three of our Trustees have resigned, one to take on the paid position of administrator..

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities

The Trustees, who are also directors for the purpose of company law, are responsible for preparing the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Charity law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the Trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law). The financial statements are required by law to give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming or outgoing resources of the charity for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the Trustees are required to:-

- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP 2015 (FRS 102)
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements
- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent
- prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The Trustees are required to act in accordance with the trust deed of the charity, within the framework of trust law. They are responsible for keeping proper

accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and the Group to enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with regulations made under the Charities Act 2011 and the Companies Act 2006. They have general responsibility for taking such steps as are reasonably open to them to safeguard the assets of the charity and to prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities.

So far as the Trustees are aware, there is no relevant information of which the charity's Independent Examiner is aware. Additionally, the Trustees have taken all the necessary steps that they ought to have taken as Trustees in order to make themselves aware of all relevant information and to establish that the Charity's Independent Examiner is aware of that information.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31st. March 2016

(1) Principal Accounting Policies

The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below and have remained unchanged from the previous year except for SORP compliance changes.

(a) Basis of preparation

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014, as updated by Update Bulletin 1 issued on 2 February 2016, the Companies Act 2016 and the Charities Act 2011.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

(b) Fund accounting

- [i] Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity.
- [ii]Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the Management Committee for particular purposes.
- [iii] Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure imposed by the donor or through the terms of an appeal.

(c) Income

Income is included in the statement of financial activities when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income.

- [i] Income received by way of grants, donations and gifts and is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.
- [ii] Donated services and facilities are included at the value to the charity where this can be quantified.
- [iii]The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included in these accounts.
- [iv] Investment income is included when receivable.
- [v]Income from charitable trading activity are accounted for when earned.
- [vi]Income from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

(d) Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered

- [i]Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income and the costs of trading for fundraising purposes.
- [ii] Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them [iii]All costs are allocated between the expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use of the resource. Costs relating to a particular activity are allocated directly, others are apportioned on an appropriate basis.

(e) Fixed assets

Technical items are depreciated at 20% per annum on the straight line basis. Other tangible fixed assets are written off over the expected useful life of the asset, at 10% per annum on the straight line basis for all items costing over £500. In order to comply with FRS102 and SORP 2015 the trustees have begun depreciating the building at 2% p.a..
