Report of the Trustees for the Fourteen Month Period Ended 31 December 2016

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Action Bladder Cancer UK was constituted as a Charitable Incorporated Organisation on 9th July 2015 and became registered charity on 12 November 2015. The charity is governed by its present constitution which was adopted on 9th July 2015.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Where there is a requirement for new trustees, these would be identified and appointed by the current trustees and elected by the members of Action Bladder Cancer UK at a General Meeting. The chair of trustees is responsible for the induction of any new trustee which involves a briefing on a trustee's responsibilities, the governing document and policies, administrative procedures, the history of the Charity and the philosophical approach of the charity. All trustees provide their services as trustees for free.

Key Management Personnel

The trustees consider that they, and the Clerk to the trustees, comprise the key management of the charity in charge of directing and controlling, running and operating the charity on a day to day basis. The trustees receive no remuneration. During this period the Charity has employed a full time Head of Fundraising to support the income generation and development of the charity.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. The Trustees have identified a register of risks which they review annually.

The trustees have reviewed the risk register, the risks identified and the processes to manage or mitigate any risk. The trustees are satisfied that all potential major risks have been considered and a mitigation management process identified. As part of this process, some of the key agreed actions are:

- regular strategic reviews and communication of core charitable messages
- a skills audit of trustees to mitigate loss of core skills
- annual review of accountants' and auditor's performance and regular review of charitable expenditure and financial delegations
- a clear process for back up and cyber security of data
- trustee training and clear guidance on governance responsibilities and regulatory requirements

In looking to the future, the trustees will continue to monitor the risks associated with its investments and continue to be vigilant as to other risks that might be associated with a grant making charity.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objects of the charity as defined by the constitution are the relief of sickness and preservation of health in particular but not exclusively by:

- educating the public about bladder cancer and raising awareness of its prevalence, diagnosis and treatment.
- working with healthcare professionals, patients and carers to improve the care of treatment of those with bladder cancer.
- promoting and supporting research into bladder cancer and disseminating the useful results for the public benefit.

Public Benefit

The trustees confirm that they have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives, in planning future activities and setting grant making policy for the period and that they have complied with the duty in section 17(5) of the 2011 Charities Act.

The trustees are satisfied that all charitable activities during the period are for the benefit of the public and the benefits of each and every activity are clearly identifiable.

- 1 Patient Support providing information and support on bladder cancer.
- 2 Continued development of website to provide comprehensive information about bladder cancer for patients and health professionals.
- 3 Continued development of network of regional Patient Support Groups to act on a local level. Linking with regional cancer and health networks to improve patient support.
- 4 Raising public awareness through campaigns, information materials, media and events.
- 5 Raising professional awareness through education materials, dissemination of information, targeted media and events.
- 6 Raising awareness with influencers including government and others.
- 7 Launching of a new bladder cancer research grants programme
- 8 Collaborating with other organisations with an interest in bladder cancer to ensure a coordinated approach to raising awareness of the issues surrounding bladder cancer and enabling change.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Charitable activities

The trustees normally meet four times a year to agree funding priorities, charitable activities, strategy and policy.

The Trust Partnership handle the administration for Action Bladder Cancer UK and also look after the financial affairs of the charity on a day to day basis.

The Charity is supported by an active network of volunteer staff and Executive who help deliver programmes, set up support groups and provide patient viewpoint on all materials produced by the charity.

Report of the Trustees for the Fourteen Month Period Ended 31 December 2016

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

It has been a period of great positive change for the charity. The executive undertook extensive work in the latter part of 2015 and early 2016 on planning a robust new strategy for the charity, reviewing governance, charitable activities and planning new programmes of work. This has resulted in important, and exciting, change and a stronger, more vibrant charity and an ambitious programme of new work.

The most significant activity for the charity during this period, was relaunching as Action Bladder Cancer UK in April 2016 and developing a completely new and improved website. This was a major development for the charity to both improve profile and provide a platform for our new programmes and activity in informing and engaging patients and supporters. The website is more patient-friendly, with increased content for patients on bladder cancer, treatments and support – the new site and the improved content and resources is already having an increased impact and has met a very positive response from patients and health professionals.

Our new strategy for programmes of activity – focuses on directly improving patient outcomes, improving patient support and improving research into bladder cancer. A summary Review of key activities and programmes is below:

PATIENT SUPPORT

Bladder Cancer Support Groups: a core activity is setting up support groups for bladder cancer patients. Attending a local support group can be of great help, both emotionally and practically, to patients. There is a great need for such groups, there were only 10 groups in Spring 2015 offering support for bladder cancer patients across <u>the whole of the UK</u>. Since then, we have worked pro-actively with major hospitals and patients to initiate groups and provide ongoing encouragement and guidance.

17 NEW GROUPS across the UK have now been initiated by ABC UK and are up and running, providing support for bladder cancer patients and carers. 9 NEW GROUPS are in process of being set up and arranging their first meeting.

More groups are planned and our volunteer Patient Support Advisors (all bladder cancer patients) continue to target hospitals in regions where no support is available and we respond to direct requests from nurses and patients. These new groups are listed on our website with a search function for patients to find their nearest group. We're very proud of our achievements in creating local, direct, support for those with bladder cancer, building strong relationships with major hospitals - and it continues to be one of our key priorities. Building this network of groups, and providing supporting resources and events will be an important area of activity in 2017.

Patient Information and direct patient support

We have continued to develop our new website, other resources and materials to improve the quality and quantity of accessible and authoritative information on bladder cancer for patients and healthcare professionals. We also provide materials direct to hospitals, urology departments, support groups and individual patients and are increasing our proactive contact with hospitals and urology cancer health professionals and our one to one support for patients. We are getting increasing rates of direct contact from patients asking for advice and support, which they are unable to find elsewhere, and provide direct support by phone or email.

AWARENESS RAISING

We now have an active social media profile and continue to build our following. We have developed and published awareness articles in public and professional media outlets, our patient representatives have appeared on broadcast media. We have continued our programme of mailouts of awareness leaflets to major hospitals and centres of bladder cancer treatment and have provided awareness leaflet drops at sporting events and attended well being events and cancer awareness events across the UK.

RESEARCH

ABC UK Improving Outcomes for Patients Programme 2017: In November 2016, we launched this new programme to encourage small, standalone projects to directly improve outcomes for patients. This is the only discrete funding programme for bladder cancer projects in the UK. Lack of research investment into bladder cancer is a serious problem with a direct impact on poor patient outcomes, and the reported low levels of satisfaction shown by bladder cancer patients. This unique Programme is designed to encourage applications from researchers, clincians, nurses and others and will contribute to knowledge about bladder cancer and improve patient outcomes, and also act as a catalyst to encourage further much-needed work. It will give ABC UK demonstrable evidence to support our campaigning, raise the awareness and highlight the unmet needs of bladder cancer patients and gaps in provision and knowledge. We are delighted to have recently announced that this will be an annual programme, growing in scope and impact each year.

We continue to support and publicise clinical trials for bladder cancer treatments, and assist with patient recruitment and provide feedback and input into trial development.

Putting the Patient Perspective

We regularly attend conferences, seminars and sturdy days for health professionals – such as urologists, cancer nursing specialists and urology nurses – where we work to raise awareness and present the patient perspective. We also provide patient input to clinical trials and consultations and provide patient briefing and viewpoint to many within the bladder cancer sector.

Supporting and Educating Healthcare Professionals

ABC UK works closely with health professionals. We work with nurses to set up and sustain support groups for bladder cancer patients; speak at health professional training days, seminars and conferences; provide articles and input for healthcare publications; provide information materials and advice. Current work includes: working with nurses and patients to develop new patient materials; health professional bladder cancer study days and workshops; e-learning online resources for nurses and GPs. We worked with Macmillan to produce an early diagnosis fact sheet for GPs.

Policy

We are regular contributors to NICE, PHE, NIHR consultations relating to bladder cancer. We lobby on bladder cancer related issues - eg in 2016 we contributed to lobbying to amend NICE guidelines to include the use of robotic surgery for bladder cancer cystectomy surgery and consultations on new treatments. An on-going priority is to raise the profile of bladder cancer with decision makers and to influence the healthcare agenda and we are already making good progress in engaging peers, MPs and relevant Parliamentary Groups and other influencers. We are a founding partner of the NHS PHE Blood in Pee Campaign (started in 2012, most recently run in April 2016) which continues to disseminate symptom and early diagnosis information to the public and medical profession. BCG shortage – a major concern for patients who require BCG treatment, and for health professionals, has been the fluctuation in availability of BCG supplies in the UK over recent years. We liaise with suppliers, and work with BAUS and PHE, to keep patients informed and raise awareness of the issue and the impact on patients.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

During the fourteen month period ended 31st December 2016 the charity received income totalling £82,062. The Charity holds its funds in a bank account with CAF. The day to day management of receipts and payments is handled by the charity's administrator and bookkeeper, with regular oversight from Trustees at meetings.

Total expenditure for the period, including fundraising, operational and charitable expenditure, was £45,924. Net income for the period was £36,138. At the end of the financial period unrestricted reserves were £36,138, approximately 9.5 months of charitable expenditure.

Income raising activities were restricted in the first half of 2016 due to the restructuring of the charity and the development of the new website, as had been anticipated. Planned charitable activity was also restricted for the first 6 months of 2016 for the same reason. New programmes were launched in the last quarter of 2016, with significantly increased activity planned for 2017. The relaunch of the website and strong strategic planning for new activity is already showing considerable success in terms of awareness raising, income and new programmes.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the trustees to hold sufficient funds in hand to cover grant commitments and expenses for the current financial period and to maintain an appropriate budget for future years to ensure that they could cover longer term commitments.

The commitments and liabilities within one year totaled $\pounds 3,333$ as at 31 December 2016. The Trustees considered that the cash balance of $\pounds 38,332$ as at 31 December was sufficient to cover these commitments.

Going Concern

The Trustees of the charity believe that there are no material uncertainties that may cast significant doubt about the ability of the Charity to continue as a going concern.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

Action Bladder Cancer UK received the remaining assets of the charity Action on Bladder Cancer (reg: 1138532) in June 2016. This was following the Trustee decision to change the structure to a more modern Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) and the Charity Commission advice to close the charity and register a new CIO with similar charitable objectives. Action on Bladder Cancer will file its final accounts and close early in 2017. Action Bladder Cancer UK as the new charity, will use the transferred assets as previously intended but will have greater flexibility and capacity to extend its charitable activities in the future.

The Trustees are delighted with the impact of our relaunch as Action Bladder Cancer UK and the new website, and the charity is now pushing ahead with a programme of new activity.

This exciting new programme of charitable activity includes programmes on well being for patients, early diagnosis, work building on our highly successful activity on patient support groups, and making the first round of grants as part of our Improving Outcomes for Patients Programme for research into bladder cancer in the Spring of 2017.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Fourteen Month Period Ended 31 December 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Accounting convention

These accounts have been prepared for the fourteen month period to 31st December 2016. The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policies below or the notes to these accounts. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014, Update Bulletin 1 issued on 2 February 2016, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011. The date of transition to the Charities SORP FRS 102 was 1st November 2015. This is the first set of accounts of the charity prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP FRS 102. The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The accounts are presented in sterling and are rounded to the nearest pound.

Critical accounting estimates and areas of judgement

Preparation of the financial statements requires the trustees to make significant judgements and estimates. The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty or any key judgements made in the preparation of the financial statements.

Assessment of going concern

The trustees have assessed whether the use of the going concern assumption is appropriate in preparing these financial statements. The trustees have made this assessment in respect to a period of one year from the date of approval of these financial statements. The trustees of the charity have concluded that there are no material uncertainties related to events or conditions that may cast significant doubt on the ability of the charity to continue as a going concern. The trustees are of the opinion that the charity will have sufficient resources to meet its liabilities as they fall due.

Income

All income is included on the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income, it is probable that it will be received and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy.

Expenditure

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Expenditure on grants is recorded once the charity has made an unconditional commitment to pay the grant and this is communicated to the beneficiary or the grant has been paid, whichever is earlier. Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the period end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure. Should circumstances arise where the grant is repayable, this is accounted for at the point when the grant is received. If this is after the balance sheet date and known about it is reflected in the accounts as a post balance sheet event.

Debtors

Debtors are recognised at their settlement amount, less any provision for non-recoverability. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid. They have been discounted to the present value of the future cash receipt where such discounting is material.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand represents such accounts and instruments that are available on demand or have a maturity of less than three months from the date of acquisition.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised when there is an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefit will be required in settlement, and the amount of the settlement can be estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are recognised at the amount the charity anticipates it will pay to settle the debt. They have been discounted to the present value of the future cash payment where such discounting is material.

Taxation and Value Added Tax

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities. Value Added Tax is recoverable by the charity and as such, any liability is recognized in the Balance Sheet at the year end.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Statement of cash flows

The financial statements do not include a statement of cash flows because the charity is exempt from the requirement to prepare such a statement under the Charities SORP FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1.
