
# THE PARISH OF ST. NICHOLAS, GUISBOROUGH IN THE DIOCESE OF YORK

#### Structure, governance and management

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All Church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC.

#### **Objectives and Activities**

Guisborough Parochial Church Council (PCC) has the responsibility of co-operating with the Rector, the Revd. Alison Phillipson in promoting, in the ecclesiastical parish, the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has maintenance responsibilities for St. Nicholas Church, the Church Hall and the Curacy situated at 16 Lealholm Way, Guisborough.

#### Achievements and Performance

#### Church Attendance

There are 358 parishioners on the Church Electoral Roll, 16 of whom are not resident within the parish. The average weekly attendance across all services is 227 adults and 29 children. This number is increased at Festivals. This does not include Funerals, Baptisms, Marriages, Prayer Space, Messy Church or Morning Prayer. There are also 90 home/house communions per month

#### PCC Secretary's Report

The PCC as at December 2016 consisted of 23 members, by law including the Rector as Chair, two Churchwardens and five ex-officio members by virtue of their election to the Deanery Synod. The remainder were elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting normally for a period of three years.

The number of members to be elected for three years is as determined by the previous year's APCM; for election in 2016, and the previous two years, the number had been five.

The PCC is required to report annually on the parish's finances, its fabric, the current Electoral Roll and the Deanery Synod and these reports will be found within.

The PCC has continued to develop our mission for the future in the following areas:-

- Develop Discipleship
- Develop different styles of worship
- Develop Generosity
- Develop Communication

**Develop Discipleship** - The PCC has led the roll out of the Leading Your Church into Growth (LYCiG) initiative designed to encourage and equip us to grow in numbers, in spirituality and in service to our community and the wider world. The approach to children and young people's work has continued. A Child Protection Policy has been created and the completion of a Diocesan wide audit was successfully undertaken. The "Messy Church" for the younger members of our congregation and community has continued to grow in popularity. A further Pilgrim course for the wider congregation, was run in the autumn and was well attended.

**Develop different styles of worship** – The year has seen the successful implementation of the changes to our regular services i.e. 9.15 Sunday service moving to 9.30 and the introduction of an "All Age" service on the third Sunday of every month. The recruitment of a new Director of Music has also seen a different focus being placed on the way that music dovetails with our worship.

**Develop Generosity** – The PCC agreed to increase our Freewill Offering to the Diocese for 2017. This has been supported by the success of the Giving in Grace Initiative and other areas where we have been able to increase the income to the Church. The PCC continues to be prudent when setting budgets and has had success in cutting costs. The PCC has also continued to take advantage of any grants that may be available to assist with the financing of the Church and Church Hall. The introduction of a Resources Group is taking shape and this Group will be important when coordinating the PCC's approach to Finance matters. The PCC has also continued to give to a range of Charities and good causes throughout the year.

**Develop Communication** - The website is now live and fully operational. The Church Magazine continues to be a key pillar in the PCC's communication plans and is continually reviewed for any improvements that can be made. Fellowship is also a key channel for developing our communication and this year has seen a busy year for all who have contributed in this area.

The introduction of LYCiG has been a key strategy for the PCC during 2016. Preparation began for this in the Summer and the PCC has held extraordinary meetings to understand the value that LYCiG will bring to this Parish. In 2017 the LYCiG approach will be discussed with the wider congregation and beyond. The Council are committed to realize the benefits that LYCIG will bring to this Parish.

During the year the PCC has been pleased to appoint and support the new Director of Music and are proud to see the development of the Choir under his direction. The PCC has been equally proud to support the inauguration of a new stained glass window in Church and thanks goes to all who arranged its creation – from funding to design and build.

Reports on the Council's committees and other church activities appear within and our thanks are due to the leaders who have contributed them.

#### The Rector writes

#### **Dear Friends**

This has again been a very busy year as well as one of change.

One exciting project that was started in February was our Messy Church, a service that focuses on children and families, encouraging them to feel welcome and at home in their church. This has been very successful, not only in the numbers of people who attend, but also in the number of people who make up the team of dedicated helpers, many of these are people who are relatively new into this congregation, and here they have found a way to help and support our mission. I am very grateful to Sue Hill who heads up this work, along with Geoff.

And whilst I'm on the subject of our Readers, I wish to thank them publicly here for all the hard work they do. They are both growing in confidence and ability, as well as being two very much trusted and valued colleagues, who I am very grateful to for all the support they offer.

During the year I was delighted that we appointed our new Director of Music, Chris Nixon. In the short time Chris has been with us he has become very much valued, not only for the exceptional work he has done in building up a mostly new choir and introduced some new music to sit equally and alongside the older more traditional music, but also in the way he has integrated himself into the whole life of the church and encouraged the new choir members and their families to do likewise. On a personal note I want to thank Chris for what has been a difficult task, sensitively carried out. He has done this with boundless enthusiasm and collegiality, making many friends in the process. I would also like to record my thanks to the faithful choir members who have remained loyal to this church, and have offered their support to Chris and the new choir members. We are moving forward and the vast majority of the congregation seem pleased to show their support and appreciation.

In September, myself, the Readers and Dave Harpham attended the LYCiG (Leading Your Church into Growth) Conference in Derbyshire. This was nearly 4 days of work and it has to be said, pleasure also, we received much inspiration from all we heard and learned. Along with many other parishes in the Diocese we were introduced and greatly enthused by this national project, which has enjoyed great success in many parishes throughout the country. The project requires a lot of work within the parish and that is now being rolled out with members of our congregation. It has been very encouraging to see many of you embracing this work, as well as many of our newer members of the congregation getting involved and being willing to speak up and offer your views and experiences alongside those who have been here for many years. This project requires a great deal of work and support from us all in order to create the required 'Plan for Growth'. It is generally recognised that unless we do something our church will head into decline as more and more of our older members find themselves unable to support and attend church as they have done for so many years. We are very grateful to them for all the work they have done and are continuing to do, but we have to be honest and realistic about this. We must be more open and willing to let new people in and work at being relevant to them. Certainly we are seeing some success in this. Over Christmas we welcomed more people to our services than we have done for many years. Also our numbers at our Sunday morning services continue to grow, we seem to welcome new people on a weekly basis, and they are now in regularly attending. So many people are commenting that when they look around the church they see so many new faces, and that's great to hear and something we should celebrate.

This is all part of the LYCiG process; working on how to attract people, offer them a good and appropriate welcome, and then the whole church working together. That way we hope to grow in numbers, grow in our own personal faith and grow in our service to others, either within our community or wherever we find ourselves.

The Archbishop of York has been quoted as saying:

'We are a people of worship, witness and prayer, constantly being renewed by the power of the Holy Spirit.'

We need to be attentive to this, recognising that we don't do anything, except in the power of the Holy Spirit. I commend to your prayers that the Holy Spirit would move in this place and move within our lives, constantly renewing us and encouraging us as we seek to do God's work and will, to allow God to grow his church here in Guisborough, and that we would be willing to grow and transform in order for that to happen; allowing God to be God in this church.

As I close this report I would like to record some words of thanks:

I would like to especially thank Dave Harpham as he comes to the end of his six-year term of office as Churchwarden. I have greatly valued Dave's wisdom, as well as his good humour during the time I have worked with him, as well as his commitment and service to this church and to God. This past year especially Dave has been a tower of strength and I am grateful. I also want to record my thanks to Alwyn Jones who became Churchwarden this year and was immediately thrown into the deep end, another tower of strength who offers such valuable and faithful service. Thank you to you both.

Finally I would again like to take this opportunity to thank all those who give so very generously of their time, talents and money to the life and work of this church, it is very much appreciated, too many to mention, but I am confident you know who you are. So much good stuff goes on in this parish day in and day out, and it wouldn't happen without you! I also want to thank those who do so much unseen work in our church; again I am sure you know who you are. Thank you.

Last but certainly not least, I want to offer my thanks to the PCC and the members of the Ministry Team whom I greatly value for their advice, support and willingness to do what they do. It is a great privilege for me to do the work I do, and I am so grateful for all the good and positive things we have done together for most of this past year. Now on to the next, which promises to be even better!

So let's get on cheerfully together with the tasks that God has called us all to do and let's always be ready to go out in peace to love and serve the Lord and with that love one another also.

#### **Churchwardens Report**

We would like to thank you all for the continued support and prayers you have extended to us throughout the last year. The year has not been without its challenges but these have been more than compensated for by the appreciation of our efforts by so many people, often quietly whispered in our ear — and hugely appreciated! We have also appreciated the number of Deputy Wardens being increased to four. It has eased the load with duties by sharing out our many sm



increased to four. It has eased the load with duties by sharing out our many small jobs, and their support has been very helpful.

As you all know the Churchwardens have two key roles (plus many others)

- 1 Supporting and cooperating with the Rector in building up the people of God.
- 2 Looking after the fabric and contents of the church.

During the year we maintained the fabric of the church. This was mainly through minor repair projects. We have started discussions on the future of the church, and how best it may be improved to meet the needs of our congregation over the next generation. People are often amazed when we point out that no major changes were carried out in the church for over 100 years — four generations ago!

Our communications to the world in general improved during the year by continuing work on the website, plus the sites on Facebook and Twitter. We also gained a new editorial panel for our Priority Magazine.

We continue to work on the welcome of everyone to our church, together with our team of Sidespeople. We try to ensure that lights, heating are available whenever we need them.

The year has seen continued change in services and their content as we continue to meet the changing times. We always appreciate comments on whether any particular change has been positive or otherwise to individuals' worship. We would ask you to consider the following: change sometimes seems to be difficult in our church, especially as Guisborough seems to be a place of constant change: but to change is to live, we change as we go through life and if the Church does not change it is not alive. We are trying to keep everyone informed of any changes being discussed, and to take the views of everyone into consideration.

We attempt to make the church available to welcome visitors outside service times. The signs for Churchwatch announce that the church is open and welcoming. We maintain the stocks of leaflets for visitors not accustomed to our traditions and encourage people from the local hotels throughout the year. It would be a good time to thank all involved with Churchwatch. So, thank you everyone.

Our family as a church is very special, and like all families it is unlikely that we all agree all the time, but as a family, we should extend love and support to everyone whoever they are. This is sometimes difficult, so let's pray for this in our new year. We are delighted to see so many new faces as regular attendees, let's pray for more and ensure we can help by providing a caring, friendly atmosphere.

Finally a plea to everyone to get more involved in church life. Many people do a lot, but no area is an exclusive club and there is room for more helpers and participants. Do welcome and let the new people in. Please be prepared to help our church with your talents, or even better, develop a new talent to help our church family's journey with Christ.

#### Safeguarding

Like all parishes in the Diocese, and with guidance from York, we are becoming much more knowledgeable about our responsibilities with regard to safeguarding children and vulnerable adults, the latter group which may include those who are ill, bereaved etc. A great deal of work has been done this year on raising awareness of the need for good safeguarding practices, and all groups are now aware of their responsibilities. Some training has been undertaken and more is planned. Information booklets have been supplied, and most PCC members are now DBS compliant, as they all are required to be. This work will continue until all requirements are met, then to maintain that standard.

St. Nicholas PCC has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have regard to the House of Bishops guidance on safeguarding children and Vulnerable adults).

#### **Fabric Group**

We have a maintenance plan for the church to which we work. Also a list of outstanding actions

The main aim of the fabric group is to keep the church water tight. To meet this aim any water that lands on the church needs to be drained away. This means keeping the gulleys on the roof, the gulleys at ground level and U bends, kept clear of tree debris and rubbish. A constant battle.



The growth of ivy on the church walls has been controlled.

The mice have been controlled by setting traps monthly, or more frequently if necessary.

The heating system has had a few problems this year. The system was not heating the church as efficiently as the installer predicted during the early months of the year. After much testing and conversations with the installer it was eventually discovered that the hot water system is fitted with a filter and that this was blocked. This was cleared and things have improved considerably for the latter months of the year. The boilers are serviced once a year so the clearing of the filter has been put on the service actions.

One or two small leaks with the hot water system have appeared. Two leaks remain and these are awaiting Byfield action early next year.

The church clock has been worked on by Redcar & Cleveland and is now working to specification.

The bollards controlling vehicle entry to the cenotaph area belong to Redcar & Cleveland but we now carry out a yearly service. A lot of small actions have been carried out as they have arisen. The spending has been within our budget.

#### **Messy Church**

Messy Church was introduced in February 2016 and continues to meet on a bi-monthly basis. At each session we teach the Gospel in a short worship slot that is very relaxed and designed to be accessible to children and adults alike. We then take part in a number of craft activities and games to explore each theme in greater detail. At the end of each session we all come together to sing some songs, and then share in food and fellowship.

So far we have covered the theme of Jesus' love (based on Valentine's Day activities), the theme of Jesus' Resurrection (based on new life activities), the theme of God the Father (based on Father's Day activities), and the theme of Jesus calling his disciples (based on Olympic and Paralympic Games activities and joining Team Jesus).

Our very first Messy Church in February, which was based on the theme of Jesus' Love, was very well attended, and we typically attract round 25 - 30 children and 30 - 35 adults during each session. However, our Messy Church in August, was poorly attended. August, we discovered in discussion with other parishes, is traditionally poorly attended, because it's the most popular family holiday period, and we have therefore agreed to avoid this month in 2017.

In addition to this, we also focussed on the welcoming and arrival time for Messy Church, as we felt that a lot of time was taken up at the beginning with 'welcoming' leaving less time for worship and craft activities, so we decided to change the 'welcoming/arrival time by half an hour, to commence our sessions at 9.30 a.m. instead of 10.00 a.m.

We have seen a really encouraging growth in the number of families who have been attending over recent months, and in particular have been blessed and encouraged by families who continue to return for each session, and for whom Messy Church is either their main Church involvement, or supplements the other Church services and activities they attend.

We have received lots of positive feedback from parents and children alike who comment in particular on the way that Messy Church offers a friendly and welcoming atmosphere, and is enjoyed by all members of the family.

The Messy Church Planning team feel very blessed to be leading the Messy Church congregation and are looking forward to continued growth both in numbers and spiritually.

We would, however, value any offers of help from those who feel able to. We have a lot of fun at Messy Church and it is an enjoyable way of sharing the Gospel.

Please pray for the Messy Church team, thanking God for continued growth, ideas and inspiration as we plan our future sessions. Also, please prayerfully consider whether you would be able to help out with sessions bi-monthly or SOS (as we need it!) basis and chat to one of the team for more details.

#### **The Ministry Team**

There are presently eight Eucharistic ministers who are licensed by the Bishop of Whitby to assist with chalices at Eucharistic services and to take communion services with consecrated bread and wine in peoples' homes and in the Residential Homes in the town. We read lessons, lead intercessions and work closely with the Servers and Choir in a Community of Service.

Those of us who have the privilege of going out into the community find that the services vary from a gathering in a communal room in one of the Residential Homes, joining in communion and singing hymns, to ministering to one person. This varied ministry can include chatting to residents, sometimes just sitting quietly, occasionally opening the door to deliveries, helping with jigsaws, taking letters to be posted and quite often enjoying tea and biscuits. We usually have a service once a month in each establishment; the staff in the Homes are very helpful in gathering people together, many of whom are disabled or infirm, and we try to be consistent so that we present a familiar face and style of worship to approximately 90 people per month.

#### **Choir Report**

Thank you everyone. This is my first thought when writing the choir report. Thank you for the welcome you have given me. Taking on the choir at Guisborough was always going to be an exciting challenge. Building on some firm foundations of traditional music but yet moving the church forward to make the music relevant, but also inspiring for the congregation, at the same time as doing something to everyone's tastes. The choir are succeeding. We have a varied diet of hymns now using the lovely new hymn books - thank you to those who kindly donated many of these. We never know how it's going to be accompanied. Organ, piano, keyboard and we have even thrown in a tambourine on odd occasions, it's always a surprise. It's lovely that members of the congregation are asking me to either use the organ or Clavinova for different hymns and of course asking for favourite hymns. It's all part of the family being involved in shaping our music in worship.

Anthems have been a challenge. We have a choir that is developing its abilities and numbers all the time. We have sang classics including Lead me Lord, modern pieces including Bless the Lord O My soul, Taize chants with Cantor parts, modern worship songs and more. Ideas are welcome. As the number of adults has grown the technical difficulty of pieces has steadily been increasing.

Christmas was a highlight in the church year. Record attendances, so many people commenting on how wonderful the music was, a very warm and loving atmosphere all worshiping together. Ideas for improving it for next year welcome.

I'm quite sure we can see how the choir is developing. It's almost the biggest it's been for years with over 30 regulars now. Yes we can get additional Singers to support us but our aim is a choir of 60 regulars leading the singing in our worship. This needs everyone's support. Spread the word, encourage children and adults who love singing. Let's make Guisborough choir the leading choir in the diocese - innovative, family orientated, a massively diverse and changing range of music, a choir that continually reflects on its practice and of course one that works with Clergy and leadership team.

This next year will continue to be exciting, challenging and of course fun! We have lots planned. Do come and join us. Spread the word about us. All welcome.

#### **Deanery Synod**

This year the three meetings which were held at Brotton, Dormanstown and Redcar followed the normal pattern of presentations, synod business and news.

At Brotton, the presentation focussed on St Peter's C of E Primary School which had been awarded 'Outstanding' by those who assessed the school's Christian ethos and work programme for the Statutory Inspection of Anglican and Methodist Schools. The Headteacher, Richard Unthank and Revd Rhodes, with the help of a video discussed the development of youngsters as worship leaders and showed how children can be fully engaged in leading and contributing to worship. The possibility of thus helping Sunday School groups 87 was explained along with details of Prayer Space and the schools contacts with other schools one in London, the Selby Abbey School and Coatham C of E School.

The Rev. David Tembey of Marske reminded the Synod members of the value of regular personal prayer and also how he as a new incumbent had valued a settled and knowledgeable team within the parish. His hopes of bridging the gap that often seems to exist between God's expectations and those of parishioners had been greatly helped by the team. Areas of parish life mentioned included occasional offices, pastoral visiting, work with children at the schools, Sunday Club and Messy Church and the Mothers' Union.

At Redcar the focus was on both Church activities and community interaction and how they had benefited from reviewing process as a result of attending the Diocesan conference on LyCIG. They are currently concentrating on areas already underway – fellowship groups, children/ young people and their families, a culture of invitation, community interaction and needs. This focus on God's people also included spiritual work with those new to the faith and those wishing to deepen their relationship with God.

Changes towards growth over recent years leading up to LYCiG were reviewed by the Archdeacon. She spoke of current plans, the vision for church growth, alongside recognition that funding within each church and the changes in diocese funding patterns were challenges to accept and overcome. The need for a network of relationships that will help deaneries adapt and work together in mission and ministry was emphasized. A later session followed by a further presentation on deanery development given by the Archdeacon, The Bishop of Whitby and the Rev. Gavin Wakefield, there was more opportunity for group discussion leading to a proposal for the Diocesan Synod.

Rev Andy Bowden, Children's and Young People's Consultant explained how well Darklite and its successor -Creation / Science / God's Universe / The Light of Christ – had been supported. In a different way the St Hilda's Pilgrimage Walk had offered a variety of support opportunities – walk with the team each day for the full pilgrimage – walk a section of the Pilgrimage – and hospitality at church rest points. Each of these became a part of a very successful Pilgrimage. Time was also given to the care and situation of curates and to a range of financial items.

The Rural Dean's installation as Canon of Bole (York Minster) was a very pleasing piece of news, as was Alan Gardner's acceptance of the role of Financial Advisor. His knowledge, experience and background will be extremely helpful to those who take on the role of parish treasurer in areas such as `freewill giving', Gift Aid and Grant Aid:

Also Synod now needs to find a new Secretary, as Claire Soderman, the Secretary for many years has asked for someone else\* to take over that essential communication position.



#### **Accounting Policies**

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 together with applicable accounting standards and the SORP (2005).

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention except for the valuation of investment assets, which are shown at market value. The financial statements include all transactions, assets, and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body nor those that are informal gatherings of Church members.

#### **Funds**

Endowment funds are funds, the capital of which must be maintained; only income arising from investment of the endowment may be used either as restricted or unrestricted depending upon the purpose for which the endowment was established.

Restricted funds represent a) income from trusts or endowments which may be expended only on those restricted objects provided in the terms of the trust or bequest, and b) donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the PCC for a specific object.

Unrestricted funds are general funds which can be used for PCC ordinary purposes.

The PCC has previously considered it sound financial management to maintain reserves of between 25% and 33% of annual turnover. This implies that reserves of between around £39,700 and £52,400 are required in respect of the proposed budgeted expenditure for 2016.

#### **Incoming Resources**

Collections are recognised when received by or on behalf of the PCC. Planned giving receivable under covenant is recognised only when received. Income tax recoverable on covenant or gift aid donations is recognised when the income is recognised.

Grants and legacies to the PCC are accounted for as soon as the PCC is notified of its legal entitlement and the amount due.

Dividends are accounted for when receivable, interest is accrued.

All other income is recognised when it is receivable.

All incoming resources (e.g. funds raised by the bazaar, craft fair and similar events, sales of books and magazines) are accounted for gross.

#### Other ordinary income

Rental income from the letting of church premises is recognised when the rental is due.

#### Income from investments

Dividends and interest are accounted for when receivable. Tax recoverable on such income is recognised in the same accounting year.

#### Gains and losses on investments

Realised gains and losses are recognised when investments are sold. Unrealised gains and losses are accounted for on revaluation of investments at 31 December.

#### Resources Used

#### Grants

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding obligation on the PCC.

#### Activities directly relating to the work of the Church

The diocesan parish share is accounted for when payable. Any parish share unpaid at 31 December is provided for in these accounts as an operational (though not a legal) liability and is shown as a creditor in the Balance Sheet. Amounts received specifically for mission are dealt with as restricted funds. All other expenditure is generally recognised when it is incurred and is accounted for gross.

#### **Fixed Assets**

Consecrated land and buildings and movable church furnishings Consecrated and beneficed property is excluded from the accounts by section 96(2) (a) of the Charities Act 1993.

No value is placed on movable church furnishings held by the churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal since the PCC considers this to be inalienable property. All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or benefice buildings and movable church furnishings, whether maintenance or improvement, is written off as expenditure in the SOFA and separately disclosed.

#### Investments

Investments are valued at market value at 31 December 2016.

#### Current assets

Amounts owing to the PCC at 31 December in respect of fees, rents or other income are shown as debtors less provision for amounts that may prove uncollectible.

Short term deposits include cash held on deposit either with the CBF Church of England Funds or at the bank.

#### Treasurer's Report 2016

This is my last report to the APCM as honorary treasurer, as I am stepping down from the position today. I would like to take this opportunity to thank Geoff Hill and the Gift Aid Officer, John Carr, in particular, for all their help and advice during the last year. In addition, I would like to thank members of the PCC, and the congregation for all the help and advice they have offered.

In addition, I would like to thank all those who assist with the weekly Gift Aid Envelopes and weekly cash counts, and those who have helped with the management and accounting of income and expenditure during the year, both in the Church and at the events, concerts, and fund raising activities.

Total funds in 2016 have increased by £51,359, with the general trading account increasing by £10,192 (including unrealised profits on the general trading account investments of £2,438). This is in contrast to the general fund deficit of £2,098 in 2015 (including unrealised profits on the general trading account investments of £295). There were total unrealised profits on investments of £6,521 in 2016 as the in stability of financial markets have continued (this compared to a total unrealised profit on investments in 2015 of £917).

The Parish's Freewill Offering (the amount that the Church pays to the Diocese) for 2016 increased by £1,800 from the 2015 amount. The success of the Giving in Grace stewardship programme helped the amounts raised through tax efficient and planned giving in 2016 to exceeded the budgeted figure.

The use of Gift-Aid envelopes in the pews has remained steady, and I would encourage any tax paying members of the congregation to use them whenever possible. Alternatively, you can give directly from your bank account using bankers standing orders, or you can request your own set of weekly giving envelopes, and if you are a tax payer and sign a Gift-Aid declaration, the PCC as a registered charity can recover the amount of tax you have paid on that (currently 25p for every £1 given in this way) at no extra cost to you.

While general fundraising in 2015 raised a net £17,217, the Bazaar continues to be our main source of general fundraising from a single event, raising over £6,100 in 2016. However, other fundraising took place during the year including regular coffee mornings at Sunnyfield House, monthly Craft Fairs, Beer Festival, Christmas Tree Festival, and numerous other events.

In 2016 the Parish Hall Kitchen refurbishment was completed with the assistance of additions grants of £3,000 which were received in 2016, and £45,000 was received in respect of Chancel Repair Liability.

The PCC has previously considered it sound financial management to maintain reserves of between 25% and 33% of annual turnover. This implies that general reserves of between around £39,475 and £51,711 are required in respect of the proposed budgeted expenditure for 2017. General Reserves at 31 December 2016 were at the top end of that range, at £51,275.

Once again, I would like to thank everybody who has assisted me, with advice, guidance, and the counting and banking of monies coming in and going out. Without your help I would undoubtedly have struggled.

Finally, many thanks to all those who support this Church, both financially (planned givers, tax efficient givers, those using Gift-Aid envelopes, and all those who put into the plate or give using bankers standing orders), and with their time, skills and talents. A sincere thank you all for giving so generously, in order that we are able to continue to maintain both this beautiful and historic building, and look to expand the ministry of our Church.

## Report of the Independent Examiner to the Trustees of the PCC of St Nicholas, Guisborough

This report on the accounts of the PCC of St Nicholas, Guisborough for the year ended 31 December 2016 which are set out on pages 6 to 14, is in respect of an examination carried out under Regulation 3(3) of the Church Accounting Regulations 2006 ("the Regulations") and section 43 of the Charities Act 1993 ("the Act").

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

As members of the PCC you are responsible for the preparation of the accounts; you consider that the audit requirement of Regulations and section 43(2) of the Act do not apply. It is my responsibility to issue this report on those accounts in accordance with the terms of Regulations.

#### Basis of independent examiner's report

My examination was carried out in accordance with the General Directions given by the Charity Commission under section 43(7)(b) of the Act and to be found in the Church Guidance, 2006 edition. That examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the PCC and a comparison of the accounts with those records. It also includes considering any unusual items or disclosures in the financial statements, and seeking explanations from you as trustees concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the view given by the accounts.
