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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 28 February 2017

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 28 February 2017. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims

The main object of the charity is to produce an annual Chamber Music Festival in August, contracting well known professional international musicians to perform in a series of concerts at different venues in Lincolnshire. The choice and location of the venues, plus the modest ticket prices, are an example of our aim to be accessible.

Other objectives of the charity are to produce a series of lunchtime concerts at Lincoln Drill Hall.

The artists performing at these concerts also participate in music workshops at schools in Lincoln and in the county.

Public benefit

The trustees have had regard to the Commissions Guidance on Public Benefit by providing the following:

Taking classical music concerts to market towns and rural areas of the County to enable local people to access and experience high-quality professionally performed music.

LICMF have a well established Friends and Patrons scheme, who, by their gift-aided donations provide a cash flow throughout the year, and together with specialised grants and donations we receive, aid our ability to offer modest ticket prices to the wider public.

Ensuring the ticket costs are affordable (within the range of £17 or £18) with £6 entry for under 16s and students.

An analysis of our audience data has shown classical chamber music is highly appreciated by our 'core' audience in the mature age range. Our long term aim has always been to widen the age range of our audiences by offering classical music workshops to students and school age children which we have done in the past during the festival period. However together with our Music Hub partners - the Lincolnshire Music Education Service - supported by the Arts Council, LICMF have booked a series of workshops in term time, on primary school premises, led by professional musicians, designed to educate and develop an understanding and liking for classical music played by ensembles. Thus we are actively 'growing and developing' our appeal to a wider age range audience.

The physical accessibility of each venue used for the concerts is checked, and information given on the availability of hearing loops, toilets, accessibility (ramped or level) and parking is stated in the Festival brochure.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Plans for the future

LICMF plan to continue to build on the success of the last 13 years, holding an annual Festival in August with an improving attendance and increased popularity. Over the course of previous years, popularity has increased due to the broadcasting by BBCR3. LICMF plan to receive more coverage and broadcasting going forward to attract more people to attend the Festival.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Achievements and performance

LICMF has produced 13 well received concert events in August performed by professional artists in various venues in the city and county of Lincolnshire. The end-of-Festival questionnaires provide very positive feedback regarding the quality of the performances and the choice of venues. The 2016 Festival concerts were well attended and three of the concerts were recorded by BBC R3 for broadcast in the week following the Festival.

LICMF are currently operating with a modest level of reserves which we plan to protect by keeping tight control over expenditure and planning that each concert has an audience capacity to breakeven. This will help us achieve our objective of continuing to carry forward reserves into the next financial year.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The level of free reserves held at the year end was £9,289 (2016: £13,056). These reserves are held as part of the major aim of the Festival to breakeven for each year and, for this reason, the budget contains a contingency percentage.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, its Memorandum and Articles of Association and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

The Lincoln International Chamber Music Festival (LICMF) has a board of Trustees, who meet regularly to discuss the major decisions for LICMF.

Advisors provide specialist support and a team of volunteers who provide hands-on help running the festival. LICMF have no paid employees, and the only benefit offered to volunteers is access to the concerts of their choice free of charge.

The registered office is Lincoln Drill Hall, Free School Lane, Lincoln LN2 1EY, a concert venue and box office staffed by arts professionals.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The company at the time of this report has five trustees. Trustees are recruited at times for specific responsibilities, from regular audience members who have these skills, from the Festival's Patrons and Friends and from our direct appeal for trustees in Festival Newsletters.

Induction and training of new trustees

LICMF has training workshop sessions for the trustees and volunteers, and individuals attend relevant training offered by the Arts Council, Visit Lincoln, Making Music and other specialist professionals

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Risk management

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

The Trustees meet regularly at which the present situation of the charity is discussed and any future risks which may affect the charity are identified and the appropriate action is planned.

Guided by major past grant providers, the Festival has several policies - Health and Safety/Risk Management, Volunteers Policy, Environmental Policy, Equal Opportunities Policy. The Festival also has Public Liability Insurance and procedures relating to risk management are continually under review to ensure that they still meet the needs of the charity.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Value added tax

As the activities of the charity are classified as exempt for the purposes of VAT, the charity is unable to reclaim the Value Added Tax which it suffers on its purchases. Expenditure in these financial statements is therefore shown inclusive of Value Added Tax paid.

Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of the economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP, the general volunteer time of the Friends is not recognised and refer to the trustees' annual report for more information about their contribution.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

No value has been put on the help received by Lincoln International Chamber Music Festival during the year.
