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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2016. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The main purpose of the company is to stimulate and promote the use and scientific understanding of acupuncture as part of the practice of medicine for the public benefit.

Public benefit

The Charities Act 2011 introduced the requirement for charities to show they provided public benefit. The trustees have reviewed the objects, goals, services and objectives of the charity in the light of this requirement and can confirm that British Medical Acupuncture Society serves the public benefit. This Trustees' Annual Report continues to evidence how the charity strived to meet need.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The Charity's policy for determining the level of income reserves, which it is appropriate to maintain in order to meet its needs effectively, is to maintain at least 1 year of expenditure costs in its reserves (excluding fixed assets).

The excess of expenditure over income for the year was £63,353 on the unrestricted general fund and £106 on the restricted fund.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The company is limited by guarantee, having no share capital. It is a registered charity. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability of each member is limited to £10. The company was incorporated on 16 August 1996 and is bound by its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

The Council of Management, a body of not less than five nor more than fifteen, two of whom must be trustees, control the company. Trustees and other members of the various committees are elected by a quorum of at least five Council Members from among the voting members of the society. All candidates for election must be proposed and seconded in writing to the secretary by a voting member.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

President's Report 2016

2016 has been an exciting year for BMAS, fired with the enthusiasm of new projects to benefit our members. I was honoured to take over the role of President of the Society from Graham Leng in June, as this was the first time Council has appointed an osteopath to the position. We are very aware that times are changing, sometimes faster than we would wish, but whilst acupuncture is being squeezed out of some NHS services, we appreciate just how much our members, and our patients, value acupuncture - and we are looking to the future.

Mindful of supporting acupuncture in daily practice, we are working towards developing more satellite Teaching Clinics, based upon the model of the London Teaching Clinic run by Mike Cummings - where our members can attend and get hands-on experience of acupuncture. We must acknowledge all the hard work of Carolyn Rubens over the last year, who developed a pilot BMAS Teaching Clinic within her GP surgery, attracting significant patient demand and a waiting list of BMAS volunteer practitioners. Her tireless work, and the learning arising from this, have led to a re-convening of the BMAS Development Committee. This sub-committee, chaired by past-President Jonathan Edwards, is tasked with developing the project from a pilot scheme, to a social enterprise business model - which can potentially be set up in various parts of the UK. As Carolyn has recently relocated, she will once again be setting up a similar BMAS Teaching Clinic, and is looking forward to hearing from any BMAS members wishing to volunteer and gain practical experience in the Eastbourne area.

The teaching centre in Northwich, opened at BMAS House in 2014, is proving its value. It holds regular Foundation Courses and teaching days, as well as hosting Trustees Council and Committee meetings. The ground floor of this premises is also an ideal site for developing a Teaching Clinic - which would provide easy access to hands-on experience for many of our members in the North West and the Midlands.

Over 2016 we have bid a fond farewell and many thanks to Chris Brian, who retired from the role of Regional Group Co-ordinator, but remains at the helm of his local group. Meanwhile, we welcome Gale Harvey who has taken over this role, supporting the healthy cohort of Regional Groups - which many of our members depend upon for local education, discussion and peer support.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

The BMAS lively social media presence on Facebook and Twitter continues - with posts of the latest news, events and photographs keeping you up to date. The BMAS website also provides further information about Regional Groups; booking for upcoming courses and Conferences; webcasts of previous Conference presentations; as well as links to the Forum for further learning (http://www.medical-acupuncture.co.uk).

The 2016 Spring Conference was held in Manchester, with speakers on the Saturday and a full day of interactive workshops on the Sunday; and the Autumn Scientific Meeting, held at the Royal College of Physicians in London, was a sold-out event - bringing together 130 members. Those who missed the 2016 events, including speakers Ari Moré, Jorge Vas, Esther Odetunde, Paul Gray and Kien Trinh, can access their lectures saved as webcasts on the BMAS website, and submit reflective learning to earn CPD hours. The hosting of webcasts has changed to a new provider, hence members using these for CPD purposes will notice a change from the previous post-lecture quizzes, to the current reflective-learning submission.

The journal Acupuncture in Medicine, under the editorship of David Carr, continues to fill six editions each year, with an increasing number of submissions to the journal, and publication of papers online before print publication (http://aim.bmj.com/). The journal has the highest Impact Factor of any pure acupuncture journal, increasing slightly over 2016, with a further increase anticipated in 2017.

There has been some concern regarding membership numbers which have been gradually falling over the last few years. With the Annual Report and Accounts of the Society reporting a deficit at the end of the 2015 (approx. 10% of turnover), we looked at a number of options to maintain Society income, and took the decision to raise the annual subscription rate by £5-/annum (4%), the first increase since 2005, which was approved by members in an EGM held at the Autumn Scientific Meeting. We are aware that the education programme has been profitable over the year, but that surpluses from courses and meetings are falling, reflecting a drop in booking numbers. Retention of membership with mentorship programmes, and future satellite Teaching Clinics are projects in progress; whilst delegates on Foundation Courses are strongly encouraged to remain members and work towards achieving the CoBC and Diploma, in order to consolidate their learning and support their clinical work.

Our plans for regional Teaching Clinics should further support members who struggle to practice acupuncture in their current clinical contexts. Here we must acknowledge the rapidly changing political circumstances, and we hope our plans will provide the support our members require for continued engagement with acupuncture, and the great benefits we know it affords our patients. Perhaps such opportunities will inspire some of our members to develop their own independent acupuncture practice?

Finally, I wish to extend many thanks to the dedicated staff in the London and Northwich offices; to Mike Cummings for his many years of commitment and hard work on behalf of the BMAS, both in the challenging UK environment, and internationally; to the Trustees who give their time on a voluntary basis; and to all the members who continue to support the Society.

Treasurer's Report

As a Society, we remain financially secure, despite the vagaries of the financial market following the political surprises at home and abroad during the past year.

As has been the trend in recent years, our income has reduced compared with that of previous years. The BMAS staff and Trustees have worked hard to ensure that our monies have been spent wisely and, as a result, our expenditure has reduced by more than our income, resulting in only a minimal deficit over the financial year to December 2016.

Membership fees have been held at the current rate, despite our reducing revenue from this source. A decision has been taken to increase them marginally in 2017. Members receive increasingly more help and support and an expanding range of services for this annual fee.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

Our educational courses, a major income source for the Society, have been closely monitored and scrutinised by the Trustees, Medical Director and administrative team to ensure that our income is optimised and that more costly venues are reviewed or dropped. We have excellent teaching venues in both London and Northwich, close to Manchester, and courses are increasingly centred here. A number of one-day courses were cancelled during the year due to low booking numbers and the Medical Director and Trustees continue to discuss options for new courses, relevant to current clinical practice.

The refurbished offices in Northwich provide an excellent venue for our courses in the North and a decision has been made to increase our potential revenue stream from this building by making a 'fit for purpose' clinic area on the ground floor. Work should begin in early 2017.

The Medical Director and Trustees continue to explore ways of promoting and expanding the Society to ensure that we fulfil our charitable aims and maintain our stability, but we are in a strong financial position and secure for the foreseeable future.

Once again, my sincere thanks go to Julie Cummings and the administrative team in Northwich and to Mike Cummings, our Medical Director, and Allyson Brown in London, as well as to all of my fellow Trustees, all of whom work very hard to ensure that our Society continues to operate efficiently and effectively and who provide me with invaluable support.

Education Committee Chair's Report

This year saw the further development of BMAS House at 2-3 Winnington Court in Northwich as a teaching space with plans now in place to adapt the building for this purpose. Once up and running it will provide a perfect spot for newly qualified acupuncturists to come and get more experience and increase their confidence. We also looked at different ways in which we can support members considering setting up acupuncture services outside of the NHS setting recognising that an increasing proportion of our new members are not working within the NHS.

The mentorship scheme is also being further developed to provide remote support and 43 mentors have already been identified. We plan to encourage all social media savvy acupuncturists to join the new Facebook page after their foundation course so that a mentor can be identified to support them in developing their acupuncture career. Going forwards the mentors have been asked to specify their particular preferences/specialisms, so that they can be found by location, profession, practice setting etc and indicating their availability (phone, online, personal), and whether they are willing to offer placements, for individuals or groups. It is envisaged that a web-page will be designed to function efficiently to allow mentors and mentees to be matched up.

We also welcome our new Regional Groups Co-ordinator Gale Harvey and thank Chris Brian for his many years of dedicated service to this brilliant scheme.

In 2017 BMAS members can look forward to further developments of the mentorship scheme and teaching clinics as a way to help support further training to achieve the CoBC and/or Diploma. We have recognised that whilst the Foundation Course is comprehensive, foundation course attenders can lack the confidence and skills necessary to be fully fledged acupuncturists and often need support in the early days to feel confident in their new skills.

Professional Services Committee Chair's Report

In 2016 we continued to develop on-line resources and benefits for members. Videos of scientific meetings have been transferred to Vimeo and are available on the website. These are free to watch for delegates who attended the meetings or may otherwise be purchased. The Points Resource has been redesigned and rebuilt and is available free to members on the website.

The Spring Conference was held in Manchester and attendance was disappointing - there were 41 delegates on the Saturday and 39 on the Sunday. As a result it was decided to make the 2017 Spring meeting a one day event in London. The Autumn Meeting 2016 was held in London and was more successful, being attended by 130 delegates.

Attendance figures for courses were generally low and some had to be cancelled due to lack of bookings. Ten Foundation Courses were held, the London courses having the highest attendance figures and the Northwich courses, although having smaller numbers, being the most cost-effective. Foundation courses are to be consolidated to focus on those held in locations which had the best attendance and which were more cost effective, in an effort to avoid courses with a single group and being led by a single lecturer.

Ten Supplementary Days were held on a range of topics including Women's Health, Back Pain, Headache, Electro-acupuncture, Palliative Care and Self-acupuncture. Sadly the Pregnancy day and one of the Palliative Care days had to be cancelled.

The Points Practical and Musculoskeletal Intermediate Days were cancelled due to lack of bookings. Alternative topics for intermediate or special interest days are being considered and will target the more advanced needler.

It has been noticed that it is becoming more difficult to integrate acupuncture into NHS work whether due to practitioners' reduced autonomy in NHS organisations or time constraints. Consideration is being given as to how to promote and support the use of acupuncture outside of the NHS for the future.

Journal Editor's Report

2016 was another productive year for Acupuncture in Medicine, and highlights its continued evolution into one of the leading academic journals in the field. The mix of articles has been influenced by the changes in editorial policy of 2015, which included mandatory prospective registration of all clinical trials and strict adherence to the ARRIVE guidelines for conduct and reporting of animal studies. The former requirement has inevitably led to an increased rejection rate of low quality trials (those with an inherently high risk of bias), but I am pleased to report that we published six prospectively registered clinical trials in 2016 (on average, one per issue) evaluating acupuncture for the treatment of ischaemic stroke, subsyndromal depression, fibromyalgia, lumbar spinal stenosis, chronic shoulder pain and myofascial pain syndrome.

Ever conscious of the professional make-up of the current BMAS membership, at Acupuncture in Medicine we have a policy of peer reviewing any clinical research submissions we receive with the intention of publishing all that is ethically and methodologically sound. In spite of this bias, regular readers will note an ever- increasing proportion of basic science, which is a reflection of the current mix of article types at submission, which is becoming overwhelmingly preclinical as our reputation as a scientific journal increases. China is now the country that submits the majority of manuscripts (43% in 2016) followed by Taiwan, the UK and the USA (9% each). Notably, however, Chinese research articles also have the highest rejection rate (81% in 2016), reflecting our desire for quality over quantity. The competitiveness of submissions is also increasing, indicated by the rising instant rejection rate (28% in 2016, compared with 5% in 2012) and falling acceptance rate (38% in 2016, compared with 84% in 2012). Online engagement is also increasing, with a record number of downloads in 2016. Furthermore, the time interval from acceptance to online first publication is its shortest ever at 13 days. Our 2015 impact factor (released in mid-2016) was up slightly from 1.500 to 1.592 and associated with a climb in our rankings from 10 to 9 (out of 24) in the category of Integrative and Complementary Medicine. Of note, we are the highest ranking acupuncture-only journal to date.

Given that our 2015 impact factor was reduced by a high "denominator" due to the large number of papers we published back in 2014 (the year in which we first went from quarterly to bimonthly), readers can expect a further climb in impact factor in 2017 that should help us attract more and more high quality authors. An upcoming change in the criteria for editorial board membership is also expected to result in a greater number of invited editorials and narrative reviews, which I hope will be warmly welcomed by the readership. Watch this space for other exciting developments.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

Medical Director's Report

In 2016 we trained 238 regulated healthcare professionals on our foundation course (FC). In terms of numbers this is similar to 20 years ago, but in those days all the participants were doctors - mostly GPs. Now we have very few GPs on our courses. Despite careful attention to efficiencies in our day-to-day running we continue with a roughly 10% financial deficit for the year - similar to 2015. This has been due for the most part to a reduction in income from fees and courses. The big change I have noticed in recent years is a reduction in autonomy of practitioners within the NHS such that now it is very difficult for FC trainees to get any experience in using acupuncture within their normal working environment. This is likely to be impacting on membership and retention. To address this we are focusing on ways that trainees can get experience for themselves outside the NHS, and we are also planning to expand teaching clinics both within the NHS and outside.

Another challenge of 2016 was NG59 - the updated and expanded version of CG88, the first NICE guideline to recommend acupuncture. NG59 recommends against using acupuncture in back pain. This is not because of a lack of efficacy, effectiveness or cost-effectiveness data - the data is pretty solid now, and it would take some big trials to move the estimate of effect size in meta-analysis. The excuse is the usual one used by NICE - the effect over placebo (sham) is not large enough to be clinically relevant. The interesting (new) thing about NG59 is that there were recommendations for a number of more orthodox interventions that did not achieve the same size of effect as that of acupuncture. So there was a clear difference in the height of the hurdle set for acupuncture compared with say exercise, manual therapies, psychological therapies etc. I am still investigating what was really behind these decisions, and whether or not they were influenced by financial conflicts of interest in the guideline development group. Some of the detail can be found on the journal blog at http://blogs.bmj.com/aim/

On a more positive note, the second edition of Medical Acupuncture was published in April 2016 after maybe 6 or 7 years of process and 18 years since the first edition. This is a landmark text in the field of Western medical acupuncture. A big thank you goes to Jacqueline Filshie for initiating the project all those years ago, and to Adrian White for driving through the work phase of this edition. I hope to have a good 10 years rest before someone suggests number three!

In 2016 I became a blogger for the first time. I am not a fan of bloggers in general, although editorial style blogs hosted by the BMJ can be very good. I am not so keen on the blogs written by professional sceptics. By the way, I had parts of one blog redacted after senior feathers were ruffled at BMJ when I referred to an emeritus professor from UCL as an old sceptic blogger.

The BMAS social media presence is slowly growing with 2389 likes on our Facebook page and 569 follows of @BMAS_News on Twitter. Please do like and follow if you are on social media - it is a great way to keep up to date with the latest research and events in the world of acupuncture.

We have audited the financial statements of British Medical Acupuncture Society for the year ended 31 December 2016 on pages ten to twenty. NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

Income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Subscriptions

Income in respect of subscriptions is accounted for on an accruals basis.

Courses and conferences income

Income from courses and conferences is accounted for on an accruals basis with adjustments being made for income received in advance.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible assets are depreciated on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives, at the following rates:

Acupuncture equipment 25%
Office equipment 15%
Computers 25%
Freehold property 2%

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

The society has two types of fund for which it is responsible and which require separate disclosure. These are as follows:

a) Restricted funds

Donations received which the donor earmarks for specific purposes. Such purposes are within the overall aims of the organisation. Each year the society allocates 1% of the total subscriptions received during the year to the restricted fund.

b) Unrestricted fund

Funds which are expendable are at the discretion of the trustees in the furtherance of the objects of the charity.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

Pension contributions are made by the charity to the employee's personal pension schemes at an agreed percentage of gross salaries.

Donations

Donations received from members are accounted for in the year they are received and allocated to a restricted or unrestricted fund subject to the donor's wish.

Grants payable

Grants payable are accounted for in the year they are due for payment. All grant applications are reviewed by the committee and then allocated accordingly.
