

his year's report focusses on our increasing reach in terms of geography and the types of educational settings that the programme has proved to be accessible to.

We continued our relationship with The Department for Education (DfE), year 3 and 4 with Birmingham City Council and years 2 and 3 with Durham County Council.

Our current trainers, Claire Patterson, Pauline Cayhill, Zed Lomax, Anna Gluckstein and Becca Grieg have all been lead teachers in their own schools and have achieved Best Practice status. They now pass on this knowledge to new schools in their respective areas. This approach has proved to be incredibly effective in terms of subject and local knowledge, sustainability and recruitment.

We offer Continuing Professional Development days for all to attend in London, Birmingham and Durham which can be booked via our website. We have expanded our reach this year by delivering CPD days in other areas of the UK, Channel Islands and Spain.

In December 2016, we received funding from Children in Need to create 150 Campaigning groups of students over the next three years. We call these groups PRIDE Youth Networks and the project is managed by a new member of the team, Jo Thompson.

The Best Practice Award Programme continues to go from strength to strength. We strive to ensure that the targets are relevant to school settings by gathering data through surveys and interviews with staff and students. For instance, policy examples, posters, trans guidance, lesson plans in 'hard to reach' subject areas, book collections, PowerPoints for assemblies have all been requested by our stakeholders and we have endeavoured to respond by providing the resources on the website for all to access.

We continue to have successful partnerships with all our schools in both the state and independent sector, federations, consortiums and academy chains alongside the Boarding Schools Association, teaching unions, Durham County Council, LGBT Leaders and developing relationships with Children in Need, Families LGTBI in Spain, Teaching Leaders and the Library Services.

I'd like to say a big thank you to our fabulous team, trustees, patrons and stakeholders who give their time willingly to support the charity. Please enjoy reading about our team's achievements in this report.

urham County Council had 10 schools participate in the DfE project and then went on to partner with us again for a third year in September 2016, creating a further 20 Best Practice Award Schools in the North East.

We have seen a growth in county councils and organisations booking us to deliver their CPD days, including Hampshire, Jersey, Guernsey, Lancashire and Northamptonshire. We have increased our delivery of PGCE training too through Universities and SCITT's by delivering sessions at Canterbury Christchurch, Ninestiles ITT, Goldsmiths University of London, Birmingham City University, University of Warwick, Durham University, Wadham College Oxford and Nottingham University.

Our CEO had an exciting year too by receiving an MBE in October for services to Equality and Diversity and a doctorate from Aberdeen University. This was followed by being invited to speak at the EU in November about LGBT+ Inclusivity in education. Well done Dr Elly Barnes MBE! The Best Practice Award Programme continues to go from strength to strength with 72 schools in July 2016 achieving their Award with another 38 who registered for the programme in September 2016 who will complete in July 2017.

We are also very proud of the emerging Ofsted reports citing our interventions. For example, Poynton High School Ofsted Report January 2016:

Pupils have many opportunities to contribute to school development and leadership. In an initiative led by pupils, the school has become an 'Educate & Celebrate' best practice centre for its work on ensuring that homophobic bullying or negativity is not tolerated. In January, learners in the sixth form will take leading roles on a student development day aimed at promoting tolerance and diversity.

- This year we reached **151 schools** with our Award Programme and staff meetings.
- A further 98 schools were reached through 12 CPD days in the UK and Channel Islands.
- That's a **total of 249** (150 primary and nursery / 99 secondary, college and special) schools that have received our intervention, leading to **129,090*** **students' lives** being impacted upon.

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects

The Educate & Celebrate charity equips and empowers school communities to tackle and reduce homophobia, biphobia and transphobia. We train staff in schools to effectively educate students in appropriate use of language and by increasing subject specific LGBT+ knowledge to ensure a confident delivery of an LGBT+ Inclusive curriculum.

Policy on reserves

Educate & Celebrate is currently not dependent on one source of income to sustain its activities. Educate & Celebrates reserves policy has been devised by analysing the charity's main financial obligations.

There is an agreed sum of unrestricted funds to cover all financial obligations for the short term (2 months). Trustees expect to ensure for the midterm (6 months) over the next two years, and will be monitored on a quarterly basis by the CEO and Chair of Trustees.
