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Board of Trustees Report

For the year ended 31 March 2017

The trustees present their annual report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2017.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charities Act 2011 and 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102)' (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016).

Charitable objectives and activities

London Friend has been at the forefront of gay and transgender activism and service provision since the early 1970's - celebrating our 40th birthday in 2012. London Friend is a vibrant and growing LGB&T health and well-being charity with a wide portfolio of well-established services and a rapidly developing range of new initiatives aimed at meeting the needs of the LGB&T community.

London Friend exists to improve the health and well-being of people who are Lesbian, Gay, Bisexual and Transgender (LGB&T), or in doubt about their sexual orientation or gender identity. Where necessary, support is also provided to families and friends of LGB&T people.

London Friend works to provide services to LGB&T people where those provided by mainstream services do not appropriately meet the needs of LGB&T people, for whatever reason.

The charity currently provides a helpline, one-to-one and group counselling, peer support groups, social groups and activities, drug and alcohol support and advice, training and consultancy, referral to other services and a range of other ad hoc support services.

The service also contracted the services of a finance office.

London Friend has a policy of engaging only LGB&T volunteers in the delivery of its services and it is dependent on the support of these volunteers for the running of the organisation. During the course of the year 212 people volunteered time with the organisation, 124 of which were in structured volunteering roles, providing around 11,600 hours of volunteering to the organisation.

Particular areas of involvement for volunteers were:

- the men's and women's social groups
- the coming-out and peer support groups
- office support
- one-one one counselling
- one-to-one and group drug and alcohol support
- group counselling
- training and consultancy
- Pride and LGBT History Month events

All the volunteers received a full induction, together with specific training relating to their area of work. The counsellors received fortnightly clinical supervision.

Public benefit

The charitable objectives and activities, and achievement sections of this report clearly set out the activities which London Friend undertakes for the public benefit.

Significant achievements within the year

- Income for the year was £320,573. This included grant funding from the Monument Trust, City Bridge Trust, Lloyds Bank Foundation, HIV Prevention England, The National LGB & T Partnership, Henry Smith Charity, London LGBT Domestic Abuse Partnership, RISE Partnership and Wandsworth Oasis.
- 2. We continued to deliver alcohol and drug support for LGBT people via our Antidote service. This service remains the main drug and alcohol service in the UK specifically run by and for LGBT people. Our expertise is this area has been shared through training and via sitting on various expert groups, including Public Health England's Novel Psychoactive Substances Clinical Network.
- 3. We continued to run SWAP the Structured Weekend Antidote Programme piloted in summer 2014. This was supported via a grant from Henry Smith Charity. In total nine programmes have been delivered up to the end of March 2017.

- 4. We won two awards during the year. In April 2016 we were announced as a winner of the GSK IMPACT Awards, given in partnership with The King's Fund. These recognise the impact of small and medium sized charities working in health and care. In June 2016 we won the Queen's Award for Voluntary Service. This recognises the contribution of volunteers and is classed as 'the MBE for voluntary groups'. Alongside the Award representatives of the charity were also invited to attend a Buckingham Palace Garden Party, and the Queen's 90th birthday celebrations at a party in The Mall.
- 5. In July 2016 we joined the London LGBT Domestic Abuse Partnership as a counselling provider. This work was previously delivered by Pace, an LGBT mental health charity which closed suddenly in early 2016. The Partnership, led by Galop with Stonewall Housing and Switchboard, was recommissioned from April 2017.
- The year marked our first as a member of the new RISE HIV and sexual health partnership delivering services in Lambeth, Southwark & Lewisham. The Partnership is led by Naz, with GMFA and the Race Equality Foundation.
- 7. London Friend continued as a key member of the National LGB&T Partnership, a group of England-wide LGB&T organisations working collectively as a member of the Department of Health's Voluntary Sector Health & Care Strategic Partners Programme. This is a mechanism via which the Department (DH), Public Health England (PHE) and NHS England engage with the voluntary sector. In 2016/17 London Friend was one of the members engaging through regular Strategic Partner Working Days hosted by DH. We contributed to projects including the delivery of the first Lesbian & Bisexual Women's Health Week in March 2017. We also represented the Partnership on an LGBT sub-group of the NHS Equality & Diversity Council, inputting into a plan of work on workplace LGBT equality in the NHS
- 8. We contributed to two events held by the Greater London Authority: our Chief Executive gave evidence to the Health Committee on HIV prevention in London, and we inputted into the planning of an LGBT mental health roundtable event, which produced a report for the Mayor.
- London Friend continued to be a member of the NHS England Gender Identity Stakeholder Group, attending regular workshops as the NHS and the Gender Identity Clinical Reference Group work to address issues affecting trans people such as access to specialist Gender Identity Clinics and to NHS services generally.
- 10. During the year London Friend maintained a number of innovative service delivery partnerships with NHS and other LGBT organisations. These include the CNWL NHS Foundations Trust's Club Drug Clinic; Code Clinic at 56 Dean Street; and cliniQ, the trans sexual health and wellbeing partnership also at 56 Dean Street. We also worked with the Imperial NHS Foundation Trust to develop their competence around chemsex at the GUM clinic at St Mary's hospital, helping establish and deliver the Limit clinic.

- 11. London Friend continued to be a local delivery partner in the national HIV Prevention England programme, delivering brief and structured interventions to gay, bisexual and other men who have sex with men (MSM) affected by chemsex.
- 12. London Friend continued as one of a number of London-based LGBT organisations supporting the production of an LGBT Narrative for London. Funded by Trust for London through the LGBT Consortium, the report was published as Still Out There in June 2016, bringing together the support needs of LGBT people in London so that commissioners, funders and LGBT organisations can better work collaboratively to meet these. We attended a multi-agency meeting to discuss the report and the sustainability of LGBT services in July 2016.
- 13. In March 2016 we began to collaborate with other organisations delivering work on HIV to campaign for PrEP availability on the NHS. This developed into becoming a member of the United4PrEP coalition. The coalition continued to lobby for PrEP to be available on the NHS in England, and assembled a coordinated presence on the London LGBT Pride march in summer 2016.
- 14. We supported the HPV Action campaign, which calls for HPV vaccinations for boys as well as girls. Through this we supported a call for vaccines to ensure men who have sex with men are protected.
- 15. We were a member of the Metropolitan Police's Sexual Offences, Exploitation and Child Abuse (SOECA) sub-group, providing input on chemsex and sexual assault with our partners Galop. We also published a resource for gay and bisexual men on chemsex and consent with Galop and Survivors UK.
- 16. We continued to share our experience and knowledge with others. In April 2016 we delivered training and conference presentations to the first European Chemsex Forum, and following this established the London Chemsex Network, which aims to provide a professional development opportunity for drug services and others working with gay and bisexual men.

Charitable activities within the year

London Friend's core client services within the year included:

Counselling

220 clients received contracted counselling. A total of 17 volunteer counsellors and five clinical supervisors provided the counselling service throughout the year. The counselling service delivered almost 3900 hours of volunteering.

Antidote - Drug and Alcohol Services

Our drug and alcohol service, Antidote, continued to deliver during this year. We provided advice, information and treatment through 6 weekly clinic sessions across 5 sites, including partnerships with NHS substance misuse and sexual health clinics. We provided one to one support for 485 people. Two paid staff and 20 volunteers supported delivery the services, representing over 3600 hours of volunteering. Presentations for support for chemsex continued to be the most significant reason people presented to the service, with 89% of clients identifying as gay or bisexual men. The three drugs most associated with chemsex continued to account for the majority of support: 61% requested support for GHB/GBL; 60% for crystal methamphetamine; and 54% for mephedrone. 13% of clients stated alcohol was their primary issue, up from 10% last year. 94% of clients reported improved control over their drug or alcohol use; 83% of clients reported an improvement in their overall health and well-being, and 92% reported an improvement in their psychological health.

SWAP

In summer 2014 we piloted SWAP, the Structured Weekend Antidote Programme, the first high-intensity programme for gay and bisexual men engaged in chemsex, the sexualised use of certain club drugs. The programme has been funded by the Henry Smith Charity for 2015-17. During the year 37 men attended the programme.

Social and Support Groups

The organisation ran a number of support groups and social activities within the year. These included; TURNING POINT, a coming out group for gay and bisexual men; CHANGES, a coming out group for lesbian & bisexual women; MATTRIX, a safe and sober space for men of all ages to socialise and meet new people; T ON TUESDAY, a social and support group for trans people; a weekly drop-in every Friday at our Kings Cross centre, providing a space for LGB&T people to meet; PINK INK, a creative writing group; and a group for older (55+) LGB&T people in partnership with Opening Doors London, UNIQUE a group for people with disabilities and weekly Conversational English Classes for people who want to improve their written and spoken English. There were a total of 1945 attendances at these groups of these 404 were new individuals These groups were provided by 70 volunteers representing over 2,230 volunteering hours.

Domestic Abuse Counselling

London Friend joined the London LGBT Domestic Abuse Partnership in July 2016. The Partnership is led by Galop and also includes Stonewall Housing and Switchboard. 44 clients accessed counselling or workshops through this specialist service during the remainder of the year. The service was recommissioned by London Councils from April 2017.

Administrative Support

The organisation was supported by 5 admin volunteers, providing over 794 hours of support throughout the year.

Community Centre and Meeting Space

The organisation continued to provide free and subsidised meeting and social space for external groups and organisations within the LGBT community to use. Some of these groups who meet in the centre regularly included Beaumont Society, Families Together London, Bent Bars, Say It Loud Club, Stonewall Housing, CHE, Brothers Healing and Kenric.

Training

97 volunteers attended in-house training; 24 volunteer training courses were provided during the year. 16 training sessions were provided to external agencies, with 212 attendees, including from sexual health and drug and alcohol treatment agencies. 100% of training attendees would recommend our training. We also spoke at 11 conferences to approximately 1200 people. This included the Royal College of Psychiatrists, the European Chemsex Forum, and the Police Expert Drugs Witnesses.

Financial review

The Trustees are pleased that the organisation has maintained a strong financial position and has continued to attract support of funders, including a number of new funders during this financial year. The CEO has maintained a level of income and represented the interests of our service users at a national strategic level. The Finance Officer has contributed significantly to the improvement of financial record-keeping and to the charity's financial governance.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees review its policy and reserves position on a regular basis. They believe a minimum of 3 months resources expended will enable the charity to continue to meet its objectives if it faces loss of income, increases in costs or delays in receipts,

At present the unrestricted income funds stand at £158,626 of which £40,000 has been designated as the salary cost commitment on the charity's behalf and £3,800 for the Oasis designated fund.

Looking forward to 2016/17

From April 2017 London Friend is a partner in a new community sexual health service. The SASH Partnership will deliver community sexual health interventions in the 'Tri-Borough' area of Westminster, Kensington & Chelsea, and Hammersmith & Fulham. The Partnership is led by Turning Point with Naz, Metro and Marie Stopes.

From April 2017 we will also be delivering new services for LGBT asylum seekers and refugees, building on our partnership with Say It Loud Club.

Structure, governance and management

London Friend is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 22nd December 1977 and registered as a charity on 18th December 1989.

London Friend is governed by a Board of Trustees who are recruited openly and who meet at least six times a year together with the Chief Executive. Trustees serve for a one-year period and may be re-elected.

Trustees receive a full induction, are briefed on their roles and responsibilities within the organisation and subsequently have access to a range of governance and financial management courses. The trustees develop and oversee the strategic planning and all new developments are approved by the Board before work progresses.

The trustees delegate day-to-day management of the charity to the Chief Executive who regularly reports on all areas of organisational performance to the board. There is also regular strategic review and planning sessions.

Governing document

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company, and is governed under its Articles of Association.

Risk statement

The Trustees review risk management annually. This involves identifying the types of risks the charity faces (financial, operational, governance etc.), prioritising them in terms of potential impact and likelihood of occurrence and identifying means of mitigating the risk. As part of this process the Trustees keep the adequacy of the charity's internal controls under review.

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty in section 4 of the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission in determining the activities undertaken by the charity.

Statement of trustees' responsibilities

1. Accounting Policies

Charity information

Friend Counselling (London) Ltd (know as London Friend) is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 22nd December 1977 and registered as a charity on 18th December 1989. The company is governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association which established the objectives and powers of the charitable company.

The charity is registered with the Charity Commission of England and Wales with the charity number 299307. The principal address is 86 Caledonian road, Kings Cross, London N1 9DN.

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statement are as follows:

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounting in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (as amende for accounting periods commencing 1 January 2016). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102. The charity has taken advantage of the provisions in the SORP for charities applying FRS 102 Update Bulletin 1 not to prepare a Statement of Cash flows.

The accounts have departed from the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 only to the extent required to provided a true and fair view. This departure has involved following the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities applying FRS 102 rather than the version of the Statement of Recommended Practice which is referred to in the Regulations but which has since been withdrawn.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency for the charity and rounded to the nearest £.

These accounts for the year ended 31 March 2017 are the first accounts of the Friends Counselling (London) Limited (Known as London Friends) prepared in accordance with FRS 102. The date of transition was 1 April 2015. The reported financial position and financial performance for the previous period are not affected by the transition to FRS 102.

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal policies adopted are set out below.

b) Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis for accounting in preparing the accounts.

c) Charitable Funds

Unrestricted general funds comprises those monies that may be used towards meeting the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are monies raised for, and their use restricted to, a specific purpose, or donation subject to donor imposed conditions.

1. Accounting Policies - continued

d) Income

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable certainty. The following specific policies apply to categories of income:

- Any income from fundraising is shown gross.
- Donations are included in the financial statements when received, with any associated tax reclaim being included in the financial statements at the same time.
- * Grant income is recognised when receivable except when it is for a specified period, in which case the income is spread over that period.
- * Gifts in kind are included in the financial statements when they involve an expense by the donor and that expense can be quantified.
- * Legacies are included in incoming resources when the charitable company is legally entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. Entitlement is the earlier of the charitable company being notified of an impending distribution or the legacy being received.
- * Investment income is included when receivable and includes interest from deposits.

e) Resources expended

Resources expended are included in the Statement of Financial Activates on an accrual basis as a liability is incurred. They are reported as part of the expenditure to which they relate:

Costs of fundraising comprise the costs associated with attracting income and the costs of generating ancillary income.
Expenditure on charitable activities comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of itrs activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.
All costs are allocated between expenditure categories of the SoFA on a basis designed to reflect the use ofthe resource. Costs relating to particular activities are allocated directly, others are apportioned an appropriate basis e.g. staff time and estimated usage.

f) Operating leases

Rentals applicable to operating leases where substantially all the benefits and risks of ownership remain with the lessor are charged against income as incurred.

g) Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided to write off the cost or valuation, less estimated residual values, of all fixed assets evenly over their expected useful lives. It is calculated at the following rates:

Land and Buildings - 2% on buildings Refurbishments - 20% straight line

Equipment - 20% reducing balance or 33 1/3% straight line

Furniture and fittings - 20% reducing balance

No depreciation is charged on land

The charitable company has a policy of capitalising assets which cost more than £100.

1. Accounting Policies - continued

h) Impairment of Fixed Assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss.

j) Cash and bank

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash or the opening of the deposit or similar account.

k) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any discounts due.

I) Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

m) Pension

The company operates defined contribution, externally funded pension schemes. The pension cost charge represents contributions payable by the company to the fund.

n) Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

o) Company Status

The company is a company limited by guarantee. The members of the company are the trustees named in the Trustees report. In the event of the company being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the company.
