Trustees Report for Year 2016 to 2017

The Trustees present their report along with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2017 The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in our governing documents and applicable law.

Constitution and Objects

Kent Refugee Action Network is a charitable company limited by guarantee and is governed under the Companies Act of 1985 by a Memorandum of Association and Articles of Association agreed at an Extraordinary General Meeting held on December 19th 2002.

The objects of the charity are to promote the benefit of refugees, asylum seekers and ethnic minorities and to promote racial harmony in the wider community, particularly in Kent but elsewhere when appropriate, by supporting voluntary groups working with such persons and by liaising with statutory agencies, local authorities and other interested parties.

Organisation

The trustees named on page 2 served during the year, supported by a Management Committee. During the year as part of KRAN's education work with UASC the charity ran Learning for Life, School Ready and College Ready projects together with a youth work service in the Canterbury and Folkestone areas. The various areas of UASC support work were consolidated into an Advocacy and Support project that continues to provide an established Mentoring service, a Drop In and a Casework and Advice service mainly in the Canterbury area but reaching into the Folkestone and Ashford areas as needed. The appointment of a CEO in July 2016 enabled the overall administration of KRAN to become more streamlined and effective and for the first time we were able to appoint a part time financial administrator in January 2017. KRAN employs 14 members of staff both full and part time and all the projects are supported by a large number of volunteers. The Officers of KRAN are Trustees and were recommended to supporters of KRAN by the Management Committee at the Annual General Meeting and their appointments, together with the election of other members of the committee, were approved by the meeting. Early in 2017 three people joined the Management Committee as co-opted Trustees and these will be presented at the AGM for ratification in December 2017.

Review of the year to 31 March 2017

The year 2016–2017 has been a year when KRAN has continued to work hard to strengthen its Trustee Board and improve its governance as it took forward the review of its aims and objectives as part of the Strategic Plan for 2017 – 2020, and a restructuring process begun last year aimed at improving and expanding its work with the vulnerable young people who are our clients. Much has been achieved in all areas this year and significant progress made. However due to the recently introduced Dispersal Scheme we have had to adapt the ways in which we support the young people as the age profile of the UASC living in KENT has risen bringing with it a new and challenging range of problems. I would like to thank all our project managers, their staff and all our volunteers for their leadership, enthusiasm, passion and sheer hard work with which they faced the rapidly changing situation. They enabled us to

work through this change process, placing as always, the young people with whom we work at the heart of what we do allowing them to grow in confidence and understanding and to give all the young people the opportunity to take their lives forward in a positive direction. Two longstanding members of staff left us during the first three months of the financial year and we would like to thank them for the invaluable contribution they had made over many years to the work of KRAN. A more recent recruit also decided to move on and we would like to thank her for the contribution and new ideas she brought to our work in the short time she was with us.

In the summer of 2016 we appointed two members of staff to replace those who had left and they have brought fresh ideas and new ways of working to us. At the start of the year we began working with Virtual Schools Kent on a new pilot project to help prepare Under 16 UASC to take up places in local schools. In order to do this we appointed two qualified teachers to work in the project with funding from VSK. However due to the fact that young people arriving are no longer being settled in Kent the project was ended early in October and the efforts were concentrated in working with UASC already living in the area on a College Ready project

Following successful fundraising bids aimed at obtaining the finance for a new Chief Executive Officer we were delighted to appoint Razia Shariff to the post in July. Taking this step has brought tremendous benefits in all areas of our work and enabled us to take forward our restructuring plan in a very positive and productive way.

It has been a year of change but the dedication to, enthusiasm for and belief in our work by the staff, volunteers, trustees and friends of KRAN gives me hope that we will succeed in our aims and that we will continue to serve the young people who so greatly need and rely on our support. We have been successful in recruiting three new trustees, and the board has been considerably strengthened by the professional expertise they have brought to its work. In December three trustees stood down. Two of them had been with KRAN almost from its beginning and I would like to thank them for their dedication and enthusiasm for the work we do. The third trustee resigned, after a two year stint, due to taking up an opportunity abroad. During his time with KRAN he brought much energy, expertise and thoughtfulness to his work and we thank him for his valuable contribution

Funding

During 2016 to 2017 we have been in the last year of three year funding grants from the Tudor Trust, Comic relief and, for the second time, Children in Need and have benefited from substantial funding from private Trusts, KCC, organisations and individuals that enabled our work to continue. We were also very grateful to the Henry Smith Trust for the second year of generous three year grant given in 2015 that enabled us to continue to employ a much needed Caseworker to the Drop In project. We obtained a grant from the Lloyd's Foundation Invest scheme to part fund the salary and related costs of the CEO and this was matched by funding from a private Trust. Kent Community Foundation gave us a grant for our work with Wives and Children, which has developed significantly as a result.

We would like to thank these major funders, together with the many smaller funders, organisations and individuals without whose generous support we could not continue to help our young people so effectively.

The financial position at the end of the year shows a small increase in the funds carried forward. However the fact that several of our major funding streams come to an end during

2017 to 2018 means, that although sufficient funds are available to fund a budget for this year, it will be essential to make a significant effort during 2017 to 2018 to obtain funding to enable us to continue successfully into 2018 to 2019.

Reserves Policy

Sufficient amounts of unrestricted and restricted funds are maintained throughout the year to cover management and administration costs for a three month period. This is done in order to provide time to seek new funding if possible or to ensure a smooth closure process if that was necessary.

Trustees' Recruitment

As the KRAN is a charity and a company limited by guarantee all trustees are directors of the company. The experience and skills of the existing trustees/directors are reviewed annually and an advert is placed in the local press and on our website in order to recruit new trustees with the relevant experience needed. Applicants are interviewed by a small sub group of the existing Board and if successful are then invited to join the Board as co-opted members until their appointment can be ratified at the next AGM. Trustees/ Directors have to stand for reelection after three years

Statement of Trustees' responsibilities.

The Trustees are required by law to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of its results for that period. In preparing those financial statements the trustees are required to:

- a) Select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- b) Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether the policies adopted are in accordance with the Charities Act 1993 and with applicable accounting standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- d) Prepare financial statements on a going business concern basis unless it is inappropriate to assume that the charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 1993. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Notes to the Accounts for the year to 31 March 2017

Accounting Policies 1

1.1 Basis of preparation of accounts

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', financial Reporting Standard 102 The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under historical cost convention, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost of fixed assets over their useful lives as follows:

1.3 Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

1.4 Expenditure

Liabillties are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed

1.5 Value Added Tax

Value added tax is not recoverable by the charity, and as such is included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

1.6 Fund Accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees. Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
