Structure, governance and management

Background Information

Kielder Water & Forest Park Development Trust ("the Charity") is a company limited by guarantee. It was incorporated on 29th October 2010 and registered as a charity with the Charity Commission on 15th December 2010. Its Articles of Association were last amended on 4th February 2013.

Governing Documents

The company is a charitable company limited by guarantee and does not have share capital. The company is governed by its Articles of Association.

Organisational Structure

The charitable company is administered by a board of trustees which meets quarterly.

Appointment of Trustees

In accordance with the Articles of Association, the trustees must be a minimum of three and a maximum of 20 individuals and all must be directors.

The first directors shall be the appointees of the founding members. Each member (including the founding members) shall be entitled to appoint two directors and to remove and replace such directors from time to time. A director must be a natural person aged 18 years or older.

The directors may from time to time by unanimous agreement co-opt as a director any person willing to act (for such term as the directors shall think fit). Co-opted directors may serve for up to one year, after which time they shall cease to hold office. Such directors may serve for further one-year terms by the unanimous agreement of the directors.

A director may not appoint an alternate director or anyone to act on his or her behalf at meetings of the directors.

Objectives and activities

The Charity was established:

- (1) To promote sustainable development for the benefit of the public by:
 - (a) the preservation, conservation and the protection of the environment and the prudent use of natural resources in the area surrounding Kielder Water and Kielder Forest ("Kielder"); and
 - (b) the relief of poverty and the improvement of the conditions of life in socially and economically disadvantaged communities at Kielder; and
 - (c) the promotion of sustainable means of achieving economic growth and regeneration at Kielder;
- (2) To provide or assist in the provision of facilities for public recreation and other leisure activities at Kielder in the interests of social welfare with the object of improving conditions of life of those using such facilities;
- (3) To educate the public in all aspects of the natural environment at Kielder; and
- (4) To advance the Arts by promoting the creation of works of art and presenting musical and dramatic performances.

Achievements and performance

The charity has had a successful and productive sixth year of operation. There have been a number of highlights including strong partnership work on our natural heritage offer and our innovative work with Newcastle University through the Art & Architecture programme, which is engaging local communities and helping to develop skills and talent in young people.

We have had continued success in raising the area's profile, with regional and national media coverage and a number of awards recognising the quality of the experience offered.

The Northumberland International Dark Sky Park designation and Kielder Observatory have continued to attract media attention and public interest, which has helped to develop year-round visitor numbers. Going forward, the plans to expand and enhance the Observatory provide a tremendous opportunity to attract more people to explore and experience Kielder's natural environment, encourage education and learning about science and astronomy and to preserve one of the area's greatest natural assets.

Funding from a variety of sources has helped us to achieve our aims. This has included support from Arts Council England, Heritage Lottery Fund, Locality and Northumberland County Council's Community Chest fund for the delivery of specific projects and initiatives.

Membership of the Trust is growing, with the Northumberland National Park Authority the latest organisation to agree to join the Trust, recognising the benefits of working together in areas such as Dark Skies, cycling, walking and natural heritage.

The charity continued to work with its Affiliated Organisations and the wider community to achieve against each of our charitable objectives and the areas to highlight are:

Learning about the natural environment

Ospreys - 2016 was the most successful ever breeding season for ospreys since they first began nesting at Kielder Water & Forest Park in 2009, with 11 chicks fledging. Osprey Watch was once again very successful with excellent support from our volunteers. Osprey Watch 2016 operated on weekends from June until mid August with additional Wednesdays in July and August. Approximately 3,500 people visited Osprey Watch and the wildlife cruises operated by partners also proved popular, with additional cruises being organised to meet demand.

Living Wild at Kielder - In October 2016 the Trust secured a £336,300 grant from the Heritage Lottery Fund towards a £½million natural heritage project. The two year partnership project aims to animate Kielder Water & Forest Park's amazing wildlife for visitors and residents, helping them enjoy, learn, share and immerse themselves in nature, whilst also contributing to the long-term protection of the area's special plants and animals.

In the first six months of the project a project coordinator was appointed and a significant amount of development work undertaken, with contracts put in place to deliver a number of elements of the project. Designs were developed for a new wildlife themed exhibition at Tower Knowe visitor centre and new interpretation and signed planned for trails near Kielder Castle and in Bakethin Nature Reserve. Plans were also progressed for a year round activity programme, including the first ever 'Wild at Kielder' Festival in May 2017.

In partnership with Newcastle University School of Architecture, a new hide was created at Bakethin Nature Reserve. Bakethin Hide was designed and constructed by Master of Architecture students, providing them with practical experience along with valuable communication, negotiation and presentation skills. The hide comprises two, spacious, timber-built, hexagonal pods - the "lake view"

which offers the more experienced birdwatcher a more elevated view of the osprey nesting pole and upper lake, and the "forest view" which gives full views of the lake and the lower forest view.

Although the two pods are on different levels, both are fully accessible and wheelchair users can enjoy exactly the same experience as other users, due to carefully designed space under window ledges. The hide responds to visitors' wishes to widen their wildlife experiences and have opportunities to observe birds and animals in the forest at close quarters.

Restoring Ratty - In September 2016 Trust partners, Northumberland Wildlife Trust, Forestry Commission and Tyne Rivers Trust, obtained £422K from the Heritage Lottery Fund for a project to reintroduce water voles to Kielder after an absence of over 30 years.

Arts - Arts Council England supported the delivery two phases of the Art & Architecture programme during 2016/17. The first was the completion of a series of projects to enable the Trust to build on Kielder's success as an award winning cultural destination and lay the foundations for the growth and development of arts activities which inspire and engage people.

Highlights included activities, realisation of temporary and permanent works and preparatory work for future projects:

- Artist Fiona Curran's temporary artwork 'The Grass seemed darker than ever', was launched in May; a result of the Forestry Commission's ambition to engage artists to respond to Kielder Castle and bring new audiences to the north end of the Park. This sculpture explores the enclosure of the English landscape in the C18th and the draconian Black Acts passed at the time to deter poachers from foraging on the newly sequestered lands.
- Launched at the same time was 'Kielder Onsite', an exhibition of 10 specially commissioned temporary works by Newcastle University Fine Art students. These were mostly situated along the Duchess Trail near Kielder Castle, thus opening up access to families or other visitors not wishing to walk too far.
- Artist Simon Watkinson produced designs for utility screening structures as part of Northumbrian Water's lodge development at Kielder Waterside, ensuring that high quality design/public realm remains core to partners' capital development plans.
- FleaFolly Architects completed designs for a new sculptural osprey perch, which now forms part
 of the HLF funded Living Wild at Kielder project.
- In order to engage the public, further curator-led art tours operated during the season. These popular tours enabled visitors to experience some of the more remote works in the company of experienced curator Peter Sharpe.
- Our collaborative work with Newcastle University's School of Architecture resulted in the launch, in August 2016, of a new facility developed with the community of Rochester in the Redesdale valley. Rochester Roundhouse features internal and external performance and workspaces, developed from discussions with community groups throughout the valley. This initiative has enabled students to work on a live project; gaining creative, practical and life skills and working alongside members of the local community with opportunities for team building and skills transfer. The community has been fully engaged with the project from the start and there is a lasting legacy in the form of a contemporary, purpose-built community facility.

In October the Trust secured £49,300 from Arts Council England to deliver a programme of activities to:

- Explore new ways for audiences, partners and stakeholders to think about, experience and engage with high quality art and architecture in Kielder's unique environment,
- Build on Kielder Water & Forest Park's success as an award-winning cultural destination by enhancing existing assets and creating new artworks to inspire and delight audiences, and
- Provide practical opportunities for creative learning, skills development and engagement with children and young people.

During the winter period work has taken place on the planning and development of activities and commissions which will be realised in 2017/18.

In March the Trust and Newcastle University were shortlisted in the Best Arts and Business Partnership category in the Journal Culture Awards, for our joint work on the Art & Architecture programme.

Dark Skies - Northumberland's International Dark Sky Park status and its reputation as one of the best places in the UK to view dark skies has resulted in a sustained growth in the popularity of the Kielder Observatory. We are therefore continuing to work with the Kielder Observatory Astronomical Society (KOAS) to support plans to expand; building on its success to create a world leading centre of excellence for outreach in astronomy, which will inspire, enthuse and educate people of all ages to think about their place in the universe.

KOAS successfully raised over £200,000 for a new fully accessible observatory to supplement the existing facilities. This will include an automated telescope with retractable roof, presentation room, kitchen and toilet facilities. Planning permission was obtained during the year and the new observatory will be constructed in 2017/18. The development will add to both the capacity of the facility and the quality of the visitor experience.

Planning and development work for a larger, more ambitious expansion to include a planetarium, lecture and catering facilities continued with Trust partners providing support and advice.

The Trust director chairs a partnership group set up to promote, preserve and protect the dark skies within Northumberland International Dark Sky Park and to widen access enjoyment and learning about the night sky. This group has coordinated PR and social media activity about dark skies, with a particular focus on the third anniversary of the Dark Sky Park designation.

The group has encouraged tourism businesses to participate in a Dark Sky Friendly accreditation scheme and continues to encourage partners and businesses to install dark environmentally friendly lighting, to minimise light pollution. As part of Northumberland County Council's modernisation of the street lighting, new downward-facing LED lanterns were installed in the village of Kielder, whilst shielded external lighting was incorporated into the plans for the new lodges being developed by Northumbrian Water at Kielder Waterside.

This type of activity has meant that Northumberland still has the highest proportion of pristine dark skies in England at 72%, in the new maps of Great Britain's light pollution and dark skies published by the Campaign for the Protection of Rural England.

Sustainable Development - We continue to support partners and businesses in our work on our charitable objective of promoting a sustainable means of economic growth and regeneration. The visitor economy is key here and we were delighted that Kielder Water & Forest Park received more accolades demonstrating the quality of the visitor experience. Kielder Waterside won gold in the Best

Holiday Park category in the 2016 North East Tourism Awards and was named the best Go Active Park in the UK by Wyndham Worldwide. One of Kielder Waterside's activities assistants was also awarded the title of Best New Instructor in the UK by Wyndham Worldwide. Rochester Roundhouse, part of Kielder's Art & Architecture programme, was one of two projects nationally to be awarded Highly Commended in the RIBA Journal's MacEwen Award, which is for 'Architecture for the Common Good'.

The Trust and its trading subsidiary, Lewisburn Ltd, has continued to look into options for the provision of a serviced accommodation facility in Kielder village, to meet the needs of visitors who wish stay overnight when coming to the Observatory and other events in the Park. This could assist the sustainability of local facilities within Kielder village and provide an income to help increase the resilience of the Trust. A viable scheme has not yet been identified, but work continues in this area.

Promotion - During the year the Trust worked with partners to deliver our communications and social media plan. Our social media presence is growing, with 30,000 people 'liking' our Facebook page at the end of March 2017 (a 14% increase on the previous year) and Twitter followers increasing by 18%. There were 406,000 visits to the VisitKielder website in 2016/17 a 15% increase on the previous year, due to targeted activities to increase traffic.

Partners play an active role in our marketing activities and we have worked alongside Northumberland Tourism to take advantage of county campaigns, including 'It's in our Nature' and 'The land that's just as good with the lights off'. The Trust also worked with partners to organise a promotional stand at the Blyth Tall Ships Regatta, an event which attracted an estimated 500,000 visitors.

Joint work with partners also helped to increase Kielder Water & Forest Park's profile in the media. The value of media coverage obtained over the year was approximately £8 million compared with £6.8 million in 2015/16. A variety of stories were covered including wildlife, art & architecture, the Kielder Observatory/dark skies, awards, and events such as the Kielder Marathon and Winter Wonderland.

Visitors - With the continued activity and promotion in the area, we are pleased to see that the Park remains an attractive destination for visitors. During this year there were in excess of 400,000 visitors to the Park, spending approximately £25 million in the local economy.

Friends Scheme - We have continued to promote our 'Friends of Kielder Water & Forest Park' scheme to encourage support for and inform and engage people about the wider work of the charity. Whilst the number of Friends remains small, this provides an opportunity to create a wider group of ambassadors and to contribute to the sustainability of the charity.

Achievements and performance (continued)

Events and Activities - We have worked with local people and businesses to create a diverse array of events and activities at Kielder Water & Forest Park. The Park is a particularly good environment for challenging sports events such as open water swimming, long distance running and walking, mountain bike events for adults and children and the Kielder Marathon, which is sponsored by Northumberland County Council and Active Northumberland.

As well as testing sports challenges, the programme offers a variety of other experiences from family events such as Winter Wonderland and family bushcrafts, to wildlife watching in the forest, activity taster sessions or star gazing at Kielder Observatory. A vast array of events took place throughout the year providing relaxed and fun opportunities for educating the public in all aspects of Kielder Water & Forest Park's natural environment. However they also increase the social opportunities for local people in one of the remotest areas in England and by working with local providers, we are helping to create opportunities for local businesses thus promoting sustainable development. Once again the charity promoted the full programme throughout the year through the website, events leaflets and social media.

With the support of other partners, the Forestry Commission has created a new events car park to support the provision of existing events and enable the Park to attract a greater number of high profile, large scale events in the future.

Financial review

The charity surplus for the year, as shown in the Statement of Financial Activities, totalled £5,709. This amount includes a deficit on restricted funds of £12,222.

Pay Policy for Key Management Personnel

The board, who give their time freely and trustees received no remuneration in the year. The board have considered who the Key Management Personnel (KMP) of the charitable company are and conclude that there are none aside from the trustees themselves.

The charity does not employ any staff directly and they are provided on a service level agreement between the members and the Trust. The rates of remuneration are set by these member organisations and recharged to the charity. The member organisations also provide core funding and as a result of these arrangements the charity is not responsible for review or benchmarking of the seconded staff.

Reserves policy and going concern

The calculation of free reserves is based on the definition included in the charity statement of recommended practice (SORP), which provides recommendations for accounting and reporting for charities. The trustees have examined the requirements of the charitable company/charity to hold free reserves - those reserves not invested in tangible fixed assets, excluding long term liabilities, or designated for a particular purpose. This exercise considered both the normal requirements for working capital and the loss of income of a hypothetical but reasonable reduction in the scale of operations. It also considered the need to retain capacity to deliver the current programme to which the Trust is committed. Resulting from this, the trustees considered it would be appropriate to hold the equivalent of four months' core expenditure, which would equate to holding approximately £45,000 in free reserves.

At the year end, free reserves were £29,610 (2016 - £11,679), an increase of £17,931 in the year. The trustees will continue to work with funders to budget for future surpluses in order to provide improved organisational sustainability.

The trustees have prepared a budget and cash flow forecast and have concluded that the charity continues to be a going concern for the foreseeable future. On that basis they have continued to adopt the going concern basis when preparing the financial statements.

Plans for future periods

The charity will be progressing a number of initiatives and development areas during 2017/18 including:

Learning about the natural environment

Living Wild at Kielder - We will continue to deliver the Living Wild at Kielder project with the following activities planned:

- a) Enhancements will be made to trails, interpretation and signage and a new exhibition will be completed at Tower Knowe Visitor Centre. A launch event will celebrate the creation of the new Bakethin Hide. Additional wildlife themed geocaches will be installed on walking trails and an app will be developed to add to the interpretation for visitors whilst they are in the Park.
- b) Wildlife trails from Stonehaugh, Greenhaugh and Falstone will be created or enhanced with local community involvement.
- c) An events and activity programme will be delivered in conjunction with local businesses. This will include the first Wild at Kielder Festival. Osprey Watch will be extended and enhanced.
- d) Wildlife ambassadors will be recruited to help us reconnect people with nature. Businesses, front-line staff and members of local communities in and around Kielder Water & Forest Park will be offered training/briefings appropriate to their needs to enable them to promote KWFP's wildlife offer and signpost visitors to new experiences.
- e) Educational opportunities will be increased through the development of a young ecologists club, a travel subsidy to engage new schools and enhanced online resources.

Future priorities - We will work with a wide range of partners to review our priorities in relation to natural and cultural heritage, in order to enhance and celebrate our special landscape and further increase the public's understanding and enjoyment of our wildlife and heritage.

Arts

Explore and Create - We will continue to deliver the latest phase of the Kielder Art & Architecture programme, supported by Arts Council England, The Henry Moore Foundation and Northumberland County Council's Community Chest fund. This will include:

- a) The creation of new commissions:
- Castles, Follies and Elephants: a series of eight inspiring installations by Newcastle artists and architects Oliver Perry, Claire Harper and James Perry, which seeks to highlight the influences that have shaped the landscape of the North Tyne Valley.
- Plashetts Rising: a sculptural osprey perch designed by FleaFolly Architects, bringing creative design to the interpretation of the natural environment (linked to the Living Wild at Kielder project).
- Shapling: Simon Watkinson's sculptural illuminated screen for utilities designed to enhance the public realm within the Kielder Waterside lodge development programme.
- b) Strengthening the value and reputation of existing assets through enhancement to James Turrell's renowned Kielder Skyspace and also to Silvas Capitalis (the Forest Head).

- c) Continuing our partnership with Newcastle University to provide opportunities for children and young people to develop their creative skills. A visitor welcome point will be installed at Bakethin Nature Reserve to complement Bakethin Hide and a new pavilion area developed with Calvert Trust Kielder. In addition, we hope to expand our educational activities enabling greater engagement with schools across the region.
- d) The development of the next phase of our trans-media storytelling project 'A Kielder Fairytale', which will enable us to explore how digital media can help us reach new audiences.
- e) The provision and enhancement of the curator led art tours to widen access and broaden audiences.
- f) Inviting proposals for a new permanent commission at Kielder Water & Forest Park, which meets partners' objectives.

Future plans - We will work with partners to develop future plans for advancing the arts, including feasibility work on Antoine Bertin's sound installation proposal 'Human Den' and identifying sources of external funding to assist delivery.

Sustainable Development

Dark Sky Park - We will support Kielder Observatory Astronomical Society in its plans to build on the success of the Kielder Observatory. This includes the creation of a new fully accessible observatory in 2017/18 and the longer term proposals to build a state of the art planetarium, lecture/classroom and catering facilities will enable us to inspire and educate more people, create additional employment and enhance business prospects in the area.

Accommodation development at Kielder - We will continue to look at options for the development of a serviced accommodation facility, in order to help the future sustainability of both the charity and the community facilities within Kielder village.

PUBLIC BENEFIT

The trustees have referred to the guidance in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the aims and objectives and in planning future activities. The charitable objectives are also set in order to provide a clear and demonstrable public benefit.

1. General information

The charity is a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is Northumbria House, Abbey Road, Pity Me, Durham, County Durham, DH1 5FJ.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The charitable company meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

The trustees have prepared budgets and forecasts which give them adequate comfort that the charity is a going concern. Therefore the trustees are of the view that the charity has sufficient resources for at least the next 12 months (from the date of approving the financial statements). As a result, the charity's financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis.

Transition to FRS 102

The entity transitioned from previous UK GAAP to FRS 102 as at 1st April 2015. Details of how FRS 102 has affected the reported financial position and financial performance is given in note 22.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

There are no key judgements or estimation uncertainties contained within the accounts.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular future projects or commitments.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

Incoming resources

Income includes amounts received under contract or where entitlement to grant funding is subject to specific performance conditions is recognised as earned (as the related goods or services are provided).

Donations and grant income included is recognised where there is entitlement, the receipt is probable and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

In the event that a donation or grant is subject to conditions that require a level of performance before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that those conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Income from subscriptions is recognised as income upon receipt and is then deferred where the amount received is in respect of a period beyond the year end. Gift Aid in respect of subscriptions is recognised when the subscriptions are paid.

Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis. All expenses, including support costs and governance costs, are allocated or apportioned to the applicable expenditure headings in the statement of financial activities. Refer to the Support Costs note for further information on the basis for allocation.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or payable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Gifts in kind

Where a gift in kind is given to the charity and it can be reliably measured, the gift is shown in both voluntary income and charitable activities.

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provision are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within section 505 of the Taxes Act 1988 or section 252 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992 to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects.

4. Limited by guarantee

The charity is a company limited by guarantee. The directors of the company are the trustees named on page 1.

In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per director of the charity.

The Calvert Trust Kielder has made contributions to incoming resources of £11,825 (2016: £11,593) in the year. The charity has incurred costs from the Calvert Trust Kielder of £3,664 (2016: £nil).

Kielder Observatory Astronomical Society

The Kielder Observatory Astronomical Society made contributions to incoming resources of £3,420 (2016: £6,000) in the year.

Forestry Commission

The Forestry Commission has made contributions to incoming resources of £37,100 (2016: £36,685) in the year.

The charity has incurred costs from the Forestry Commission of £635 (2016: £135) in the year.

The Forestry Commission provides the charity with PR support and does not charge the charity for the costs. This gift in kind has an estimated value of £2,500 (2016: £3,000) for the year which is included in income and expenditure within the Statement of Financial Activities.

Northumberland County Council

Northumberland County Council has made contributions to incoming resources of £33,257 (2016: £38,958) in the year. The charity has incurred costs from Northumberland County Council of £483 (2016: £nil).

Northumberland County Council host the finances of the charity and at the year end the balance held by Northumberland County Council on behalf of the charity was £141,074 (2016: £161,363), which is included in other debtors. As described within the debtors note, this amount represents cash held by Northumberland County Council on behalf of the charity (less amounts recognised by the charity as accruals). Northumberland County Council does not charge the charity for the costs of administering the finances. This gift in kind has an estimated value of £7,600 (2016: £9,600) for the year and is included in income and expenditure within the Statement of Financial Activities.

Northumbrian Water Limited

Northumbrian Water Limited has made contributions to incoming resources of £84,897 (2016: £48,896).

The charity has incurred costs from Northumbrian Water Limited of £101,019 (2016: £96,010). At the year end £531 (2016: £24,758) was outstanding and is included within creditors.
