TRUSTEES REPORT

Introductory Note

Stony Stratford Community Church registered as a charity in its own right in 2009. We changed our name to help us become more accessible to the local community but remain a member of the Baptist Union and operate according to Baptist principles. The Ministers, Rev Jacqui Green (Senior) and Rev Stuart Earl (Associate) are both accredited by the Baptist Union. They work with a team of elders to enable the church to fulfil its commission - namely to make disciples of Jesus Christ. Decisions are made according to Baptist practice by the Church Membership which meets 4 times a year. The ministers, elders and Treasurer are managing Trustees of the church and accountable to the church in decisions they make.

Each year this report provides an opportunity to reflect on the Ministry that we as a church have the privilege of offering to our community – to celebrate the successes and to learn from the challenges. We continue to grow in our passion for God and we look for new ways to make Jesus known to those around us.

THE LEADERSHIP TEAM

The Eldership were joined in June by Rev Stuart Earl who was appointed as Associate Minister in March 2016. Stuart's main focus is Mission and Outreach, helping the church to engage in meaningful inter-action with our community. Chris Pitts, Belinda Grant and Stuart Griffith continue to serve as elders with Chris' appointment having been renewed for a further two years. In March 2016 Colin Bowles stepped down from his role as Treasurer after 13 years. He has given many, many hours of his time to serve us and we are grateful to him. He has been succeeded by Neil Hughes. Colin continues to offer support during the transition in this significant role.

BUILDING PROJECT

After a year of much upheaval we were grateful to see Phase 1 of the Building Project completed. Newport Pagnell Construction (now Wilford and Dean) will continue to address any snagging issues for a further period of one year. We have received many positive comments from members and visitors alike about the result which includes new carpets and chairs in the Sanctuary. The redevelopment of the former offices has provided a space which is used for Creche on Sundays but also functions as a multi purpose room. It has a sink and basic kitchen facilities which mean it can be let to community groups as a self-contained space. Giving for the Development remains good and we hope to pay off the loan in approximately 4 years instead of 10 years. The challenge now is to begin to raise funds for Phase 2 which is the larger section of the project so that we are ready to begin soon after we complete the first loan.

CHURCH FAMILY

Our vision states that God wants to grow us into a loving family. One of the things we do well, and which is often remarked on, is care for one another. We have again shared in a variety of family celebrations – 1 wedding; five baptisms, 3 dedications, a 60th Birthday party and, sadly, we have also mourned with those who have lost loved ones including two of our own regular attenders. There are many who willingly cook meals for people who have had babies or been in hospital or who just need a bit of support. We have families who foster and find the interest and practical support of the church family invaluable. In our desire to develop this sense of family/church community further we have a team of people planning a Church Weekend which will take place in September 2017. It is hoped that we will grow together spiritually and create a stronger bond in which everyone feels included and knows they are valued. We also want to encourage everyone to press into all that God has for them.

Our Church membership numbers remain much the same as last year – we have seen new people join the congregation and a few people leave. Membership is less important to people in the 21st century than a sense of

belonging and this presents a challenge to all Baptist churches. People show their commitment through being present, giving and sharing in the church activities rather than a formal application.

GROWTH

Growth is not always easy to measure, except numerically, but having said that we sense that an increasing number of people are hungry for more of God in their lives and to be more effective in reaching others with the Good News of Jesus Christ.

The monthly evening "worship" services are well attended and give opportunity for people to take risks in sharing Prophetic Words, words of knowledge etc and on those occasions to experience more flexibility in how we worship. Our Life Groups (midweek groups) also provide opportunities for people to grow spiritually. As well as the more traditional groups we have one which has been studying and practising the Prophetic gift.

We now have more regular opportunities for people to go out on the streets to meet people and chat with them — Saturday morning "Treasure Hunting" being one. We always try to join in with community events such as Apple Day, Folk on the Green. Lights On etc when we have lots of opportunity for conversation It is encouraging to see more people looking forward to these kinds of opportunities rather than feeling fearful of them.

CHILDREN'S AND YOUTH WORK

The younger age continue to meet for midweek Bible study or a 635 kids club if they wish to in addition to their Sunday programme. The Sunday group is called God's Super Heroes -a name chosen by the children. There was no holiday club held in August 2016 because of the Building work but we plan to hold one next year as it usually draws in a number of children do not normally attend church.

The Young People are much fewer in number than we have been used to and we are currently undertaking a review of how best to reach out to the young people in our community. We sense both an urgent need to connect with young people but also an encouragement from Prophetic words which have been given the church that God has great plans for the young people here.

FINANCE

By God's grace we continue to resource ministry and mission although the challenges are much tougher than they were. We are currently trying to understand what the impact of the Baptist Pension deficit will be upon the church. On paper we have had a very stretching year financially and the new Treasurer has come up with a series of austerity measures which are necessary. We are believing the situation will improve and we have seen some increase in giving. Our confidence in is the fact that God will provide for what He wants done as we play our part.

SUMMARY

This year has been a year of bringing to completion some things which have been important for us resulting in the appointment of an Associate Minister and the completion of Phase 1 of the Building Project.

It has also been a year of reviewing the things we are doing – sometimes because we have not had enough volunteers to sustain them and sometimes simply because we want to do new things and we cannot do everything I hope that by the time next years report is written it will contain a number of "new" things which God has initiated through His people.

It has been a privilege to spend another year with the leadership team serving the amazing people who make up Stony Stratford Community Church and who love God and love their community. May He be glorified as we remain faithful to all He calls us to do in the coming year.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Preparation & Assessment of Going Concern

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP - FRS102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The Charity meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Assessment of Going Concern

Preparation of the accounts is on a going concern basis. The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Transition to FRS102

This is the first year the Charity has presented its results under FRS102 and Charity SORP (FRS102). The trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 a restatement of comparative items was not needed. No restatements of the previous period results were required.

Incoming Resources

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising or contract income) the incoming resource and related expenditure are reported gross in the SOFA.

Recognition of Incoming Resources

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when:

- the charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- the trustees are virtually certain they will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

Incoming Resources with Related Expenditure

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SOFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Grants and Donations

Grants and Donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Tax Reclaims on Donations and Gifts

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SOFA at the same time as the gift to which they relate.

Contractual Income and Performance Related Grants

This is only included in the SOFA once the related goods or services has been delivered.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SOFA as incoming resources when receivable.

Donated Services and Facilities

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity of the service or facility received.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST MARCH 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES (Continued)

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

Investment Income

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

Investment Gains and Losses

This included any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

Expenditure and Liabilities

Liability Recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources.

Governance Costs

Include costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of the trustees' meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Grants with Performance Conditions

Where the charity gives a grant with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the recipient of the grant has provided the specified service or output.

Grants Payable without Performance Conditions

These are only recognised in the accounts when a commitment has been made and there are no conditions to be met relating to a grant which remain in control of the charity.

Support Costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of the resources, eg allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capital, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Fixed Assets

Tangible fixed assets for use by the charity, these are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt.

Investments

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange are valued at market value at the year end. Other investment assets are included at trustees' best estimate of market value.

There has been no change to the accounting policies (valuation rules and methods of accounting) since last year.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated at a rate to write off the cost of all tangible fixed assets on a straight-line basis over an assumed useful life of four years. The rates applied per annum are as follows:

Equipment, Fixtures and Fittings 25%

PA Equipment 25%

Motor Vehicles 25%

No depreciation is charged to freehold property as the properties are maintained to such a standard that the estimated residual value is not less than cost.

Manse - In buying the new manse (75 Boundary Crescent) it was deemed necessary to raise additional finances since the existing fund would be insufficient. This was achieved by a special appeal to the congregation. When this was agreed at the church meeting it was also agreed that any funds remaining after the completion of the purchase would be used for the future development of the Church premises on the Horsefair Green site.

These funds were previously held in the 'Coventry Building Society – Manse account'. This account has now closed and the funds transferred to the SSCC CAF account, though their surplus remain held in the 'Property Development' fund for the purpose outlined above.

It should also be noted that the fund value reflects the recorded value for the tangible asset that is the property at 75 Boundary Crescent.

Alpha - The Church runs Alpha Courses three times each year. Some donations are received to support this activity, hence the restricted fund.

On Trust - there are some donations made for specific causes (notably but not exclusively, personal support of some of our missionaries). Income for these purposes are held in & disbursed from this general on trust fund

Family - this fund operates in a similar fashion to the Mission Support Group. In this case, however, there is no formula for the income to the fund. Funds are provided via a communion offering plus personal specific donations. The fund is used to assist those in the congregation experiencing unexpected financial difficulties.

Mission Support Group (MSG) - is categorised as a restricted fund in these accounts. It is the practice of the church to use 20% of the giving to the general fund in support of mission activities. Each month the sum is transferred into the fund, & administered by a team appointed by the church.

Restricted funds in deficit are considered to be on-going activities and are replenished during the coming financial period.

The restricted funds held are represented by the Charity's cash reserves and fixed assets investments and are to be expended as specified above.

BU Corp Building - This has been nominally categorised as a restricted fund in these accounts, and relates to the Baptist Union Corporation (BUC) loan documented in Note 8A. Whilst this has been categorised as a restricted fund, this is only to reflect that the BUC loan was for the specific purpose of making payment for a proportion of the building redevelopment costs. The BUC retained control of these funds and no BUC monies related to this loan have been received by any SSCC bank account. Further details can be found in Note 8A.

BU Corp: Manse Account Funds – These funds are held on trust by the Baptist Union Corporation for SSCC. The fund value arises from the surplus of funds received from the sale to Rev. J. Green of SSCC's share in her manse property at 7 Breton, Stony Stratford. The remainder of the received funds were used to pay off the outstanding mortgage on SSCC's remaining manse property at 75 Boundary Crescent, in accordance with the agreement of the Baptist Union Corporation.

No other payments were made to the custodian trustees or any persons/organisations connected with them during this financial period. No other material transaction took place between the charity and the custodian trustee or any person/organisation connected with them.

Ministers:

Payments made to Ministers as Salaries and Pensions are shown in Note 9, and in Note 4a under Staff Costs, Transport Costs and Manse. Any other expenses paid to them or any person connected to them were reimbursements of expenses incurred whilst carrying out their activities for the Church.

11. RELATED PARTIES

The custodian trustee of the church is the Baptist Union Corporation Limited which is a registered charity (number: 249635), and which is controlled by the Baptist Union Council. The church is also a member of the Baptist Union of Great Britain.

12. RISK ASSESSMENT

The Trustees actively review the major risks which the charity faces on a regular basis and believe that maintaining the free reserves stated combined with the annual review of the controls over key financial systems carried out on an annual basis will provide sufficient resources in the event of adverse conditions. The Trustees have also examined other operational and business risks which they face and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks.

13. RESERVES POLICY

The Trustees have considered the level of reserves they wish to retain, appropriate to the charity's needs. This is based on the charity's size and the level of commitments held. The Trustees aim to ensure the charity will be able to continue to fulfil their charitable objectives even if there is a temporary shortfall in income. The Trustees will endeavour to not set aside funds unnecessarily.

14. PUBLIC BENEFIT

The Trustees acknowledge their requirement to demonstrate clearly that the Church must have charitable purposes or 'aims' that are for the public benefit. Details of how the Church has achieved this are provided in the Trustees report. The Trustees confirm that they have paid due regard to the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit before deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

DEFINED BENEFIT PENSION SCHEME DEFICIT

Stony Stratford Community Church (SSCC) is recorded as being an employer within the multi-employer Defined Benefit Baptist Pension Scheme (BPS). This scheme is now closed to new members and further accruals, however, like many other such schemes, it finds itself in deficit when its current assets are measured against its current liabilities. SSCC therefore carries a proportion of the whole deficit liability as calculated by the Pension Trustees.

The accompanying document to these accounts – "Estimated Employer Debt - Mar 2017 - Stony Stratford Community Church (Milton Keynes).pdf" – records the actuarial assessed scheme deficit, and the method by which SSCC's proportion of the deficit is calculated. The Employer Debt is the calculated cost to SSCC should SSCC wish to either voluntarily leave the scheme, or inadvertently cause a cessation event to arise.

As of 31st March 2017, SSCC's Employer Debt is calculated to be £329,700 – which includes an estimated cost of £4,500 for the administration of any exit from the scheme. Until this year this figure has been unavailable for reporting purposes, however changes to the management of the scheme has now yielded this report.

The Trustees of SSCC are understandably concerned at the level of this liability, especially when it is recognised that this figure can fluctuate as a function of the prevailing trends in the financial markets, and the strength of the employer covenant of all employers within the scheme (circa 1200 employers). However, as a member of the BPS, the SSCC Trustees have felt limited in the actions they can take until the sponsoring trustee of the scheme - Baptist Union of Great Britain (BUGB) – and the Pension Trustee have agreed a recovery plan for the scheme. These discussions are ongoing, and we have been told that an agreed plan should be in place by March 2018. Once the details of the recovery plan are published the Trustees will then make an informed judgment of the impact of the recovery plan on the finances and operations of SSCC.

One contingency being considered by the SSCC Trustees relates to the possible sale of the former Manse (75 Boundary Crescent) to raise (at least in part) the funds necessary to exit the BPS in an orderly manner, paying the Employer Debt. Any shortfall in funding would look to make use of the funds held by the Baptist Union Corporation on our behalf (£54,748), plus additional funds raised through the congregation. It should be stressed that this is not our preferred option as it could have a significant impact on the churches ability to continue with the current staffing levels, and may require protracted discussions with the Charity Commission regarding the sale of the former Manse. However, as a last resort option, the Trustees believe this to be a viable solution to the liability that SSCC carries.

Until an agreed recovery plan has been published, the original recovery plan remains in operation. This sees all employers within the pension scheme making additional deficit contributions in order to address the scheme deficit over a 25 year period. However, in light of the continued poor performance of the pension scheme, and a change in how the Pensions Regulator views 25 year recovery plans, BUGB and the Pension Trustee have concluded a new plan is required, and hence the discussions outlined above.

Notes 9 records the additional pension deficit contribution costs as being included within the standard employer's pension contributions.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT ON THE ACCOUNTS

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

Basis of independent examiner's statement
