Dear Friends,

We are delighted to present our annual review for 2016 - 17. This year saw Kala Sangam founder and long standing Artistic Director Dr Geetha Upadhyaya step down after an illustrious career of leading the organisation through many years of successes and achievements, not least of which was the acquisition of St Peters House as Kala Sangam's base. We are extremely proud that Dr Geetha's achievements were also recognised by Her Majesty the Queen with the award of an OBE for her contribution to arts and culture.

This year has once again been filled with creativity. Amongst the many artistic achievements we can look back on, the Passage to Punjab exhibition by Hardeep Singh Sahota, accompanied by the stunning and vibrant imagery of Sara Rizvi, really filled the foyer at St Peter's House with colour and splendour. Elsewhere at the National Centre for Early Music, the arrival of autumn was serenaded by the sounds of both the sitar, played by Nadeem Mehboob and the Dilruba, the 'robber of the heart'- a bowed instrument, played by the talented Surjit Singh.

Music and dance is at the very heart of Kala Sangam and the highlight of the season was undoubtedly the Chitravina concert by internationally acclaimed Chitravina wizard, Ravikiran. We were also delighted to present a contrasting Korean dance ensemble from Hanyang University who presented traditional and contemporary Korean dance with absolute precision.

Recognising the need to develop new and diverse audiences has placed young people at the heart of our work this year. The signing of a Memorandum of Understanding with Bradford College has enabled a visual arts exhibition, and a jazz music evening with performing arts students from a range of HND courses at the college.

Regionally significant festivals such as WOW Bradford and The World Curry Festival saw record numbers of people in the building at these high profile events, raising the profile of our centre. The launch of Toshakhana happened here in Bradford and led to Kala Sangam artists being invited to record music at Buckingham Palace for the Splendour of the Subcontinent national tour.

Finally, and by no means least, we have been busy with the Arts Council England National Portfolio Organisation funding application. It gives me great pleasure to announce we were successful in securing core funding for the next four years (2018 - 22). We will use this money to deliver a new creative vision for Kala Sangam, as well as continuing to improve our facilities.

The appointment of a new Creative Producer, Alex Croft, will enable us to build on the successes of the past and to move forward with renewed purpose. We would like to thank our funders Arts Council England and Bradford Council as we strive to build upon the tremendous legacy of Dr Geetha Upadhyaya.

Finally, we should like to thank you all for your continued support.

Programme and Box Office

The season started with 'Sthree' which reflected on the similarities between women in classical Indian mythology and in the moving poems of the Brontes. Each woman is different in her identity and mythical journey, yet they were united in a shared narrative of love, duty and self-sacrifice. Arunima Kumar, the award winning Kuchipudi dancer, exquisitely executed 'Sthree'.

'Passage to Punjab' celebrated Vaisakhi, the Sikh harvest festival with vibrant Dhol drumming by Punjabi Roots Academy. Stunning art and photography by Hardeep Singh Sahota supported the Vaisakhi theme, followed by a talk by Nima Poovaya-Smith on the textiles of Punjab. Finally this year we were delighted to launch Dr Raminder Singh's book 'The Future of UK Sikhs'.

Kala Sangam artists, in collaboration with the Bronte Museum, wove the colourful performance tapestry 'Season of Life' in response to the lyrical treasures of the Bronte sisters.

Kala Sangam's production 'Dance Divine', which presented the company's artists, was a real family entertainer. This show was based on the Japanese Goddess of light who reflected the divine presence of light in one's life.

In collaboration with the World Curry Festival, the 'Sounds of Sitar' resonated through the reputed sitarist Mehboob Nadeem and Manjit Singh Rasia while the partnership with NCEM presented Surjeet Singh on Sarangi accompanied by Surdarshan Singh Chana in 'Serenade with the Sarangi'.

Inspired by Indian Iullabies, Supriya Nagarajan, Duncan Chapman and Mike Mcinerney created an immersive musical experience in 'Lullabies'.

The Bradford College partnership with Kala Sangam presented the 'Northern school of Creative Industries' featuring all the interesting work of the students in performing arts, jazz, technology and theatre.

Chitravina Maestro Ravikiran has a steady following in Yorkshire and made sure he did not disappoint his audiences by treating them with his soulful music and brilliant accompanists Prakash and Prathap in 'Sur Sangam'.

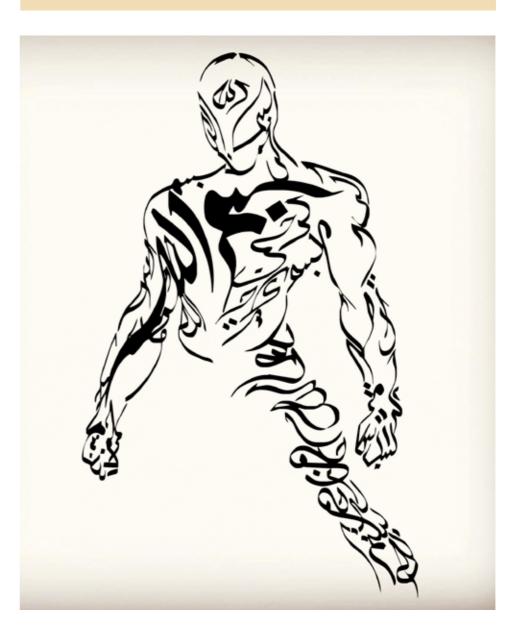
The KUM dance company from Anyang University treated the audience to a once in a lifetime experience of traditional and contemporary Korean dance.

Exhibitions

Jill Boyd's 'Resilience' was interesting whilst Shy Burhan displayed a photographic documentation of 'Butterfly' artwork.

This was followed by an interesting video installation by Shanaz Gulzar and Steve Manthorp called 'Temple of Science' which attracted new audiences to Kala Sangam.

Razwan-ul-Haq captured the spiritual significance of the Islamic calligraphic in his unique 'Breathing Calligraphy'.









Academy

'Kala Utsav 2016' was, as ever, a great platform for our students to showcase their achievements which was enjoyed by their parents and audiences alike.

Kala Jagran drew dancers and musicians, both upcoming and professional, to present their best to a full auditorium.

We continued to deliver classes in Bharatanatyam and Tamil on Saturday mornings, and new Bollywood Dance provision started in partnership with Trishool Dance Academy in January 2017.

Children, Young People and Families

The dance and music workshops for a range of schools continued and enabled the company to take a variety of South Asian arts to young people and teachers.





Near Neighbours project

In September 2016, Kala Sangam was awarded a small grant from Near Neighbours (Church Urban Fund) to deliver an Interfaith Community project with the Anand Milan Centre, a Gujrati community centre, and members of Soka Gakkai International, a Nichiren Buddhist organisation. In this project we aimed to explore the fundamental similarities and differences between these faiths and communities and create a piece of art to reflect our discussions. Preparations for this project began in November, and we delivered four Kathak workshops at Anand Milan Centre. The preparation work delivered here helped us to lay the foundation for future work.



Venue Hire

2016/17 saw a significant increase in the use of the venue by both artistic and non-artistic bookers. The building was more fully utilised during the day in the evening and at weekends.

Room Hire

We saw an increase in bookers across all sectors – Arts, Community and Charity, Public Sector, Private Business and Individuals – wedding parties etc.

The highlights included The Challenge - National Citizen Service – for six weeks in August, The World Curry festival weekend in September, Women of the World festival in November and The Anne Frank exhibition for four weeks in March.

We also had many regular and repeat bookers including: ESOL language classes, NHS Wellbeing groups, The Prince's Trust – Young Entrepreneurs course, CBMDC – training courses, CCG's – trust board meetings.

Tenants

FoodWorks – continued to operate the café and provide our on-site event catering. Dance United Yorkshire - used our venue as an administrative base and delivered a number of projects here.

The Demon Barbers & Breaking Tradition – expanded their offering and developed their new summer and Christmas live shows in our theatre space.

Young Masters Arts Studio – have gone from strength to strength and delivered arts classes to over 100 children on a weekly basis. We also hosted their annual showcase exhibition and awards ceremony. Crown of Christ Church - have continued to grow their congregation and worship here twice a week with additional celebration events throughout the year.

New Initiatives

KS Gala Fundraising Dinner – this was the first year of our fundraising event and we had fantastic support from the local business community. A great night was had by all as guests enjoyed a sumptuous 3 course meal followed by a charity auction that raised several thousand pounds. KS Kids Arts Camp – ran for the second year and had more children enrolled. Attendees got a chance to try music, dance, drama and visual arts, culminating with a celebration performance at the end of the week.

WOW festival – we were the key venue partner for the inaugural Bradford Women of the World festival. For three days in November we hosted a celebration of women and girls, we helped to connect, challenge and explore ideas around inspirational women. This was the first of a three year commitment.

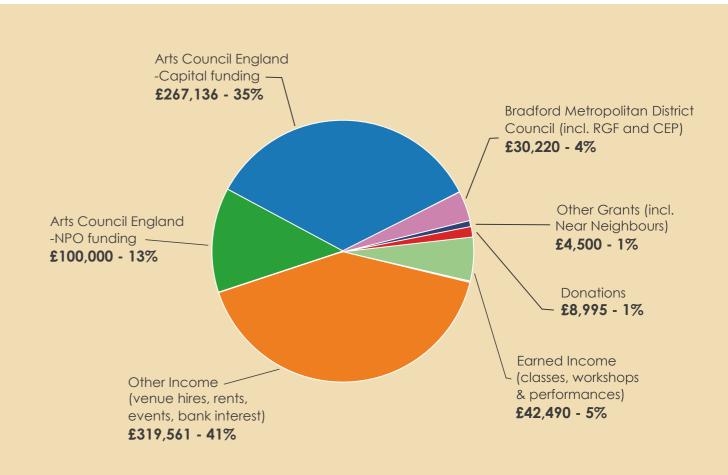

Reference and Administrative Details

Trustees' Report

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 March 2017.

The trustees present their report and the financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2017. The Annual Report and Accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice 2005 (revised July 2008) and in accordance with the special provisions relating to companies' subject to the small companies regime within Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006. Legal and Administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report.

Mission and Vision of the company

Kala Sangam the Academy of South Asian Performing Arts (commonly known as "Kala Sangam") is a Bradford based South Asian performing arts company, which is also a registered charity and an incorporated company limited by guarantee since 8 May 1996. The charity's governing documents are its Memorandum and Articles of Association and the charitable objectives for which the company is established are:

- The advancement of education amongst the public, in particular the appreciation and practice of South Asian performing arts.
- The relief of persons with physical, sensory and learning disabilities, in particular through the performing arts.

Kala Sangam's founding principle is to bring people together of all ages, cultures and abilities, through the appreciation of and participation in South Asian arts including dance, music, creative writing and craft.

Through a variety of innovative, cross cultural, artistic performances and educational, youth arts, arts in health and disability work this year, we continued to achieve our mission of 'bringing people together through South Asian and collaborative arts' working towards the vision of 'establishing a centre of excellence for South Asian arts' in the north of England.

Management

Trustees

The Board consisting of 8 trustees are responsible for the overseeing of the policies, strategic development and growth of the company by drawing on their expertise from the fields of education, finance, architecture and creative industries.

All members of the trustees hold a three year term of office. Elections to positions for those who wish to stand again are held during the relevant Annual General Meeting. Other Trusteeships are made by personal invitation by the Board to those individuals the board feel would enhance the skills base of the organisation or though agency introductions via a range of Board Banks. The election process is open to scrutiny and the composition is based on Charity Commission guidelines.

The Trustees, who are directors for the purpose of company law, who served during the year and up to the date of this report are noted on the charity information page.

The Trustees guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charitable organisation in the event of winding up. The total such guarantees at 31 March 2017 was 8 (2016: 9).

Trustees' Report

The Board meetings are held quarterly and the day to day running of the charity is managed by Mr Ajit Singh, Chief Executive.

Code of Openness

Kala Sangam is committed to being open about its activities and performance. The Board of Trustees meet quarterly, maintain a register of board members' interests and produce a wide range of information for all of its funders and any other interested parties. Information generated includes Project Evaluations; Annual Statement of Accounts; Annual Activity Report and Annual Business Plan which sets out performance expected across a range of appropriate targets and milestones. All trustees' meetings are recorded and comprehensive minutes taken for audit purposes.

Equal Opportunities

Kala Sangam is committed to applying equality and diversity principles in the recruitment and development of its own staff and trustees. We also ensure that all artists who work with us as either visiting performer or who are core members of the company are subject to codes of behaviour which demonstrate these principles. Kala Sangam fundamentally recognises the vital connection between having a representative company and delivering services in a way which is responsive to the diverse needs of the community we serve. Although Kala Sangam is currently only a small employer, it fully accepts its responsibility to lead by demonstrating good working practices and behaviours in its dealings will all individuals, collaborative partners and companies it works with.

We will use this money to deliver on a new creative vision for Kala Sangam, as well as continuing to improve our facilities.

The appointment of a new Creative Producer, Alex Croft, will enable us to build on the successes of the past, and to move forward with renewed purpose.

We would like to thank our core funders, Arts Council England and Bradford Council, as we strive to build upon the tremendous legacy of Dr Geetha Uphadaya.

Public Benefit Reporting

The reports on the preceding pages set out the purposes of the charity and the activities that have been undertaken to deliver those for the public benefit.

The Trustees have had due regard to the Charity Commission public benefit guidance when exercising any powers or duties to which the guidance is relevant.

Reserves Policy and Management Risk

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finance of St Peter's House, and they are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate that exposure.

The trustees have also forecast that the level of unrestricted funds of £233,610 at 31 March 2017 will be sufficient to sustain its current operations. $\pounds 90,838$ of the unrestricted funds has been designated for specific purposes as detailed in note 14.

The principle funding sources for the charity are Arts Council England, City of Bradford Metropolitan District Council, together with Box Office receipts, education workshops, donations and commissioned work.

The net increase in reserves was £263,571 for the year (2016: £127,964). Together with funds brought forward of £1,366,088, the total reserves at the end of the year was £1,629,659 which includes £1,369,049 restricted reserves.

At 31 March 2017, Kala Sangam held general ("free") reserves of £142,772 (2016: £94,990). These reserves provide a 'stop gap' for alternatives to be sought should any major funder withdraw support and also allows for the charity to continue its core activities and cover any short term revenue costs related to the running operations of St Peter's House, not immediately reclaimable against future grant income.

Auditors

The company's auditors, KJA Kilner Johnson Limited, have indicated that they are willing to continue in office and accordingly, a resolution proposing their re-appointment will be put to the Annual General Meeting.

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1 Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006.

Transition to FRS 102

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required.

Prior to the adoption of FRS102, the charity recognised freehold property at unamortised cost.

Under FRS 102 freehold property should be recognised at its fair value or amortised cost. The charity does not have the expertise to calculate the fair value of the freehold property at each year end and believe the cost of getting an independent valuation is not justifiable. Therefore, they have adopted the amortised cost method.

The freehold property is being depreciated over its useful economic life of 100 years. At transition the opening balance sheet figures have been restated by £44,602 to reflect the depreciation which should have been recognised since acquisition in March 2007.

The annual depreciation of £5,575 has been recognised in the statement of financial activity for the year ended 31 March 2016.

Income and endowments

Voluntary income including donations, gifts, legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature is recognised when the Charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Donations and legacies

Donations and legacies are recognised on a receivable basis when receipt is probable and the amount can be reliably measured.

Grants receivable

General purpose grants are credited to the income and expenditure account in the period received. Specific grant income is matched to the associated expenditure and recognised in the accounts in the period when the project expenses are incurred.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2017

Deferred income

Deferred income represents amounts received for future periods and is released to incoming resources in the period for which, it has been received. Such income is only deferred when:

- The donor specifies that the grant or donation must only be used in future accounting periods; or
- The donor has imposed conditions which must be met before the Charity has unconditional entitlement.

Charitable activities

Income from charitable activities relates to fees paid for students to attend classes at the academy and box offices sales in respect of public performances. This income is recognised on a receivables basis when receipt is probable and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

All resources expended are inclusive of irrecoverable VAT.

Raising funds

These are costs incurred in attracting voluntary income, the management of investments and those incurred in trading activities that raise funds.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the Charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Support costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, for example, allocating property costs by floor areas or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Governance costs

These include the costs attributable to the Charity's compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements, including audit, strategic management and Trustee's meetings and reimbursed expenses.

Irrecoverable VAT

Irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 March 2017

Taxation

The Charity is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the Charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by Chapter 3 Part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively to charitable purposes.

Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £250.00 or more are initially recorded at cost.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Fund accounting

Unrestricted income funds are general funds that are available for use at the trustee's discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the Charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds where resources are set aside for specific purposes at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted income funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.
