Structure, governance and management, and governing document:

Tees Valley Arts is a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 5th August 1982, and a registered charity governed by its memorandum and articles of association as amended by special resolutions passed 3rd May 1984, 5th June 1984, 2nd December 1987, 18th March 1996, 4th December 2000, as amended by certificate of incorporation of change of name dated 5th September 2003, as amended by special resolutions passed 5th September 2011, 6th March 2013 and 2nd March 2016.

In the event of the company being wound up, each of the members has pledged to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association of the charity state its principal objects to be "to promote, maintain and encourage for the education of the public, the development of the whole range of arts activity in the area currently known as the Tees Valley and its environs including drama, dance, music, opera, ballet, visual arts, photography, exhibitions, crafts, films, literature and community arts, for all members of the local community, without regard to disability, ethnic background, sexuality, age, gender, ability or religious or other belief."

Mission statement:

Tees Valley Arts is a participatory arts organisation based in Middlesbrough, working across the five boroughs of the Tees Valley: Darlington, Hartlepool, Middlesbrough, Redcar and Cleveland, and Stockton. TVA designs and manages bespoke creative activities which are delivered by freelance artists using many different artforms; we believe that through creative participation, people of all abilities, ages and backgrounds can engage, enjoy, learn and make progress in their lives, and that creative participation can be a transformational tool for improving life and learning for individuals and communities.

Recruitment and appointment of the Directors:

The charity's policy for recruitment of Directors is outlined elsewhere in this document.

Director induction and training:

All new Directors complete an induction and are issued with a role profile clearly setting out their legal responsibilities and what is expected of them. Directors are encouraged to attend at least one project event during the year as well as participate in a strategic away-day.

Risk management:

The charity has produced a three-year strategic plan 2015/18, which outlines the policies, strategies, aims and objectives of the organisation over a 3-year period while fully taking into account external threats and opportunities. An annual business plan is approved by the Board.

Internal risks are minimised by the implementation of a policy framework and procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects and to ensure consistent quality of delivery for all operational aspects of the charitable company. The policy and procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they meet our regulatory and business needs. Board and staff sub-committees are set up to ensure regular periodic review of specific issues such as policy updating, presentation of statistics and financial reporting.

Organisational Structure:

A board of Directors of at least 8 members, who meet quarterly, oversees the charity.

A Chief Executive Officer is appointed by the Directors to manage the day-to-day operations of the charity. Additionally there are two core team roles: Office Co-ordinator and Projects Officer.

Objectives and Activities:

Tees Valley Arts is a small organisation which makes a big impact. TVA is a participatory arts organisation based in Middlesbrough in the North East of England, working across the five boroughs of the Tees Valley (Darlington, Hartlepool, Middlesbrough, Redcar and Cleveland, Stockton) and elsewhere. TVA champions participation in high quality, stimulating creative activities as a tool for improving the quality of life and learning for individuals and communities.

The Memorandum and Articles of Association of the charity state its principal objects to be "to promote, maintain and encourage for the education of the public, the development of the whole range of arts activity in the area currently known as the Tees Valley and its environs including drama, dance, music, opera, ballet, visual arts, photography, exhibitions, crafts, films, literature and community arts, for all members of the local community, without regard to disability, ethnic background, sexuality, age, gender, ability or religious or other belief."

We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

Particular successes in 2016/17

- Our positive working relationship with Teesside University continued. For Refugee Week (June 16) we
 placed Maurice Dezou into three schools to work with school children, and then brought them together
 in a mass drum of 90 pupils! We also delivered a number of creative activities for the Refugee Week
 open day. In October 16 Black History Month we brought in legendary campaigning poet Linton
 Kwesi Johnson. This was very well-attended, and some of the audience who were spellbound had
 travelled considerable distances to be there.
- We designed and delivered CPD to schools to help them plan their arts curriculum, and to explore using the arts to support learning in other subject areas.
- Delightfully, we were commissioned by CF Fertilisers to help them improve the appearance of their (sizeable and heavily industrial) site, which would then lead to workers on the site feeling more positive and taking more personal responsibility for safety procedures. We worked with artist Adrian Moule, and with children from High Clarence Primary School (as lead designers) to decorate some large concrete plinths with rural vistas and wildlife scenes. This was an unusual project because of the nature of the site, and the opportunity to work with some heavy industry – great!
- As the arts partners in the River Tees Rediscovered Landscape Partnership (up until late summer 2016) we delivered a number of projects including one-day events at Tees Barrage and Includfest in Darlington, and longer residencies at Piercebridge (celebrating the Romans, visual and 3D arts, artist Bub Bacon), at South Park, Darlington (visual arts, Vicky Holbrough), at St Joseph's RC Primary in Hartlepool (Tees mythology and folklore, music and song, with Sara Dennis), at Pathways School in Redcar (music with Matthew Jones and Mark Owens, poetry with Matt Abbott), celebrated the Queen's 90th birthday through silk painting with St Cuthbert's Primary School (artist Shirley Wells) and in Middlesbrough we partnered with MIMA to host artist Emily Hesse who worked with people from the Eritrean community to make a pot and vessels for an Eritrean Coffee Ceremony, which garnered a lot of great publicity, including praise from Sir Nicholas Serota!
- The Musicmix 3 project our third consecutive grant from Youth Music Foundation ran throughout 2016 with musicians Maurice Dezou and Gabriel Mulangu. The project finished in late 2016, and some of the young people had been with us for all six years, growing up, growing in skills and confidence, moving on in their lives – lovely stuff!
- We successfully applied to the People's Health Trust Active Communities for two more years' funding to
 work with the lovely ladies of Thorntree Roses, so Thorntree Roses Bloom was born. This has been a
 great project, the women have flourished and the group now includes women from 30 to 70 years of
 age; in September 2017 the group will have a stall at Festival of Thrift, to display and sell their handcrafted wares.
- We successfully tendered for the opportunity to work for the Ministry of Justice, delivering creative sessions to men in Kirklevington Grange and Holme House prisons through the Making Time project, which is in delivery from January until September 2017. This has been a huge learning curve on both sides, and feedback from the men has been terrific, for some it is clearly the highlight of their week. Artists on the project are/will be Jane Kenington, Michael Edwards, Shirley Wells, Jo Colley, Bub Bacon, Andy Croft, Will Lang, and Guy Mitchell. Arts in prisons is a hugely interesting area, and offers real hope of 'redemption' if the activities are properly supported, delivered and followed up on. TVA is really grateful for this opportunity, thanks to the governors for their ambition.

Particular successes in 2016/17 (continued)

- TVA was commissioned by Stockton Council Public Health to work with students at Stockton Riverside
 College to create an animation ('Be You') exploring the pressures the media puts on young people about
 body image too fat, too thin, too muscly, too weedy etc. Artists were Robin Webb (animation) and
 Michael Edwards (creative writing).
- TVA was accepted as a partner in the Step Forward Tees Valley Building Better Opportunities initiative, working with those furthest from the work place.
- A great achievement was that TVA was successful with its application to Arts Council Catalyst Evolve
 Fund, which supports philanthropic fundraising, and can match income raised. While this activity is very
 new for TVA this offers the organisation a great opportunity.
- TVA was part of the collaborative Tees Valley-wide application to Arts Council/ Heritage Lottery Fund
 grant stream 'Great Places', early in 2017. This application was successful and delivery will begin
 summer 2017. TVA has two sub-projects within the overall programme, both of which will work in all five
 boroughs, and will also work with Darlington Borough Council on their intended activity to celebrate the
 Stockton/ Darlington railway trackbed, and Head of Steam Museum.

Review of the Year 2015/16

Ree Collins, TVA Projects Officer, left in April 2016, thus the core team consisted of Chief Executive Officer (0.8FTE) and Office Co-ordinator (0.8FTE), however, Miki Rogers was then appointed as Project Manager for the Thorntree Roses Bloom and Making Time projects. The Wider World Refugee Arts programme, funded by Northern Rock Foundation, came to an end, so Maurice Dezou left the organisation (having relocated away from Teesside) after many years' service.

Zoe Bishop (recent CCAD graduate) came to TVA as a volunteer, and we were able to secure Creative Apprenticeship Programme funding to support us in offering her a six-month internship. She has continued as a volunteer since then, so we can still benefit from her design skills. Other volunteers have included a variety of people at differing stages in their lives, but all wanting to offer some time, and to gain some networking.

In early 2017 we were joined by two third year occupational therapy students from Teesside university, as their 'non-traditional placement'. The two young women were a credit to themselves and the university, and the placement offered them a terrific learning experience, and allowed us to deepen our understanding of measuring and demonstrating the impact made by our interventions.

TVA's Partners and Freelance Artists

Partnerships at all levels remain hugely important for TVA, and allow us to create and deliver all of the work that we do.

During the year Board members Eyv Hardwick and Cllr Josh Mason (Redcar and Cleveland) stepped down, and Cllr Margaret Walters (Middlesbrough) joined. Richard Anderson continued as Chair of Trustees.

A significant development for TVA and for the Tees Valley region has been the creation of a new role at the Tees Valley Combined Authority – the post of Lead for Culture and Tourism. We welcome Linda Tuttiett who was appointed to that role, and we particularly welcome the actions and drive that she and her small team are bringing to strengthening and enriching cultural actions here.

TVA works with a wide variety of freelance arts practitioners, and we thank them for their invaluable contributions.

Review of the year: (continued)

Governance

TVA's Board contains representatives of different sectoral interests and professions. Thanks are due to trustees for their time, interest and support.

Richard Anderson (Group Legal and Compliance Director for Marston Holdings) continued as Chair of Trustees.

Other Directors in 2016/17 were: Jim Ainslie; Tony Campbell; Ged Flanagan; Eyv Hardwick (resigned 07.12.16); Michael Lavery; Josh Mason (resigned 07.12.16); Mike McNulty; Doff Pollard; Margaret Walters (Middlesbrough Councillor, joined 08.06.16)

The Board has been conscious of the greater importance being placed on charity governance. TVA's Board members and staff had discussions about how the Board operates and fulfils its responsibilities, and how the members were involved in TVA's activities and with its staff. The Board has taken account of reports about charity governance such as the draft "Good Governance Code". As a consequence the Board agreed a framework setting out explicitly the basis for how TVA Directors will carry out their activities. This included formally establishing a number of sub-committees to provide increased scope for governance matters to be addressed in detail. The Board also initiated a skills audit of the Directors to inform it about the capacity to fulfil its responsibilities.

Fundraising

TVA maintains its great offer to the Tees Valley through continuous fundraising, grant applications and submission of tenders.

We thank all our funders, and we are particularly grateful to the Esmee Fairbairn Foundation who have awarded us a grant to our core costs over three years.

TVA has begun to address the issue of recruiting philanthropic fundraising from individuals and businesses – which is very new to us. TVA is very grateful for a grant from the Arts Council Catalyst Evolve fund which helps us develop new approaches, and offers match funding to funds raised in this way.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the charity that, in order to maximise the amount of funding available for arts activities, that unrestricted funds not committed or invested in tangible fixed assets ('the free reserves') held by the charity should not exceed £125,000. At 31st March 2017 the level of free reserves was £43,565.

This policy will be regularly reviewed by the Directors in the light of prevailing financial circumstances.

Investment policy

The charity invests its surplus funds according to its anticipated short and medium term needs. At present bank deposit accounts are considered to be the most suitable medium. The Directors will continue to review this policy.

Responsibilities of the Directors

The Directors (who are also charity trustees of Tees Valley Arts as defined by section 177 of the Charities Act 2011) are responsible for preparing the Directors' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Directors to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for the year. In preparing these financial statements, the Directors are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The Directors are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(a) General information and basis of preparation

Tees Valley Arts is a company limited by guarantee and registered in England. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 2 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operations and principal activities are to promote, maintain and encourage for the education of the public, the development of the whole range of arts activity in the area currently known as the Tees Valley and its environs including drama, dance, music, opera, ballet, visual arts, photography, exhibitions, crafts, films, literature and community arts, for all members of the local community, without regard to disability, ethnic background, sexuality, age, gender, ability or religious or other belief.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 (as updated through Update Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2016 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The charity has applied Update Bulletin 1 as published on 2 February 2016 and does not include a cash flow statement on the grounds that it is applying FRS 102 Section 1A.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention, modified to include certain items at fair value. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and rounded to the nearest \pounds .

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

The charity adopted SORP (FRS 102) in the current year but this has not affected the financial position or performance.

(b) Funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(c) Income recognition

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SoFA) when the charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

For donations to be recognised the charity will have been notified of the amounts and the settlement date in writing. If there are conditions attached to the donation and this requires a level of performance before entitlement can be obtained then income is deferred until those conditions are fully met or the fulfilment of those conditions is within the control of the charity and it is probable that they will be fulfilled.

Donated facilities and donated professional services are recognised in income at their fair value when their economic benefit is probable, it can be measured reliably and the charity has control over the item. Fair value is determined on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity. For example the amount the charity would be willing to pay in the open market for such facilities and services. A corresponding amount is recognised in expenditure.

No amount is included in the financial statements for volunteer time in line with the SORP (FRS 102). Further detail is given in the Trustees' Annual Report.

For legacies, entitlement is the earlier of the charity being notified of an impending distribution or the legacy being received. At this point income is recognised. On occasion legacies will be notified to the charity however it is not possible to measure the amount expected to be distributed. On these occasions, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset and disclosed.

Investment income is earned through holding cash in a deposit account and is recognised when it is earned.

(d) Expenditure recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. All direct costs relate to the charity's charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(e) Support costs allocation

Support costs are those that assist the work of the charity but do not directly represent charitable activities and include office costs, governance costs, administrative payroll costs. They are incurred directly in support of expenditure on the objects of the charity and include project management carried out at Headquarters. Where support costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

The analysis of these costs is included in note 3.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as an expense against the activity for which expenditure arose.

(f) Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost (or deemed cost) or valuation less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment losses. Cost includes costs directly attributable to making the asset capable of operating as intended.

Depreciation is provided on all tangible fixed assets, at rates calculated to write off the cost, less estimated residual value, of each asset on a systematic basis over its expected useful life as follows:

Fixtures and fittings

25% reducing balance.

(g) Debtors and creditors receivable / payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

(h) Provisions

Provisions are recognised when the charity has an obligation at the balance sheet date as a result of a past event, it is probable that an outflow of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount can be reliably estimated.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

(i) Employee benefits

When employees have rendered service to the charity, short-term employee benefits to which the employees are entitled are recognised at the undiscounted amount expected to be paid in exchange for that service.

The charity operates a defined contribution plan for the benefit of its employees. Contributions are expensed as they become payable.

(j) Tax

The charity is an exempt charity within the meaning of schedule 3 of the Charities Act 2011 and is considered to pass the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 Finance Act 2010 and therefore it meets the definition of a charitable company for UK corporation tax purposes.

(k) Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.
