### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2017

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Students' Union's charitable objectives are to promote the interests and welfare of its students and representing, supporting and advising students; being the recognised representative channel between students and the universities and other external bodies; providing social, cultural, sporting and recreational activities and forums for discussion and debate for the personal development of its students.

The Union's principal governing document is its Constitution agreed by the members in a General Meeting or in a referendum. It is also ratified by the University Board of Governors. Copies of the Constitution are available from the Union's offices.

The trustees of the Union are the four Officer Trustees; President Exeter, President Falmouth, President Student Experience, President Community & Welfare; two selected student trustees and two selected, independent, external trustees and one other Trustee who will be either a student trustee or an external trustee.

The Officer Trustees are elected annually by a cross-campus ballot of all student members and are full time remunerated officers, as authorised by the Education Acts. The Officer Trustees are only permitted to remain in post for a maximum of two years and receive comprehensive training on appointment. This is organised by a designated staff member with the help of the Union's Senior Management team, the National Union of Students and both Universities. Each officer has specific responsibility for aspects of the Union's activities and is supported by permanent staff who are organised in three departments - Activities, Student Voice and Advice.

Accountability of the Officer Trustees is performed via our Student Council whose members are elected each year in a cross campus ballot for one year only. Council meets on average six times per year and is provided with reports from the Officer Trustees. The Trustee Board meets at least three times each year and is responsible for maintaining legal, financial and reputational integrity and for setting strategic direction. The Chair(s) and a designated external Trustee from the Trustee Board has delegated responsibility from the Board to monitor the performance of the Chief Executive Officer and make recommendations to the board relating to the Chief Executive Officer's annual performance review.

The finances of the Union are also reported to the Universities.

The Officer Trustees and the Senior Management Team meet weekly to discuss on-going operational issues and to provide effective oversight of Union activities. FXU also employs a number of non-student full time staff to ensure effective management of its many activities and to implement the policy decisions made by the Trustees. There is delegated authority through the Chief Executive Officer for operational decision making and accountability within the departments of the Students' Union in accordance with its organisational structure. When reviewing our objectives and planning our activities, we have given due consideration to the Charity Commission's general and relevant supplementary guidance on public benefit.

#### Relationship with Falmouth University and The University of Exeter

The Students' Union receives a block grant from the Universities and part-occupies a building owned by the Universities, which also pays for utilities and any structural maintenance. This support is intrinsic to the relationship between the Universities and the Students' Union and has not been valued. Although the Students' Union runs some minor trading activities, which may be developed, it will always be dependent on the support of the Universities.

There is no reason to believe that this support will not continue for the foreseeable future, as the Education Act 1994 imposes a duty on the Universities to ensure the financial viability of its student representative body. The Universities therefore require notification of any changes in the governance of the Union and regular reports on the Union's activities, management and financial situation.

#### Governing document

FXU gained full charitable status on 11<sup>th</sup> January 2012. Prior to this date FXU continued to operate under its Memorandum of Understanding. From this date the new charitable Constitution was adopted in full. A series of bye-laws have developed to support the implementation of all commitments and legal obligations as outlined in this governing document. All Bye Laws reflect informed good practice in the students' union sector and are developed in consultation with the FXU Trustees and approved by the Student Council as a representative body of the student population.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### **Appointment of Trustees**

In 2012 the FXU Board of Trustees and FXU Student Council approved an FXU Appointments Committee. One key role of this committee is to appoint up to two external trustees, two student trustees and one trustee who may be either a student or external trustee. The Appointments Committee appointed 2 x student trustees and 2 x external trustee from 1<sup>st</sup> July 2016 for 12 months. An additional External Trustee joined the Trustee Board in July 2016.

#### **Trustees Induction & Training**

This year, the Presidential Officer Trustees received training regarding their responsibilities and duties from the NUS and FXU staff.

#### How FXU achieve public benefit

In pursuit of these aims for the public benefit, FXU will ensure the diversity of its membership is recognised, valued and supported and has established departments and services for use by its members and to support its work with the Universities and other organisations on behalf of students. These include the Advice Team, the Student Voice Team, Sports Clubs, Societies, Volunteering and RAD. Trustee and Executive Officers of FXU sit on all relevant committees of both universities and meet regularly with the local authority and other providers of public services affecting students.

FXU continues to represent the students of both universities on relevant local, national and international issues by maintaining a high proportion of student representatives. Student representatives now sit and contribute to many of the universities committees and academic programme forums which allow the union to cater effectively to the needs of students.

#### Related parties

FXU has close relationships with Falmouth University, University of Exeter, Cornwall Campuses and Exeter Guild of Students. In addition, FXU works closely with Falmouth Exeter Plus commonly referred to as FX Plus (known as Tremough Campus Services (TCS) until 2<sup>nd</sup> July 2012) the organisation established to deliver combined services on behalf of the institutions (IT, accommodation, student support services etc.), in order to provide effective services to its membership.

During the year the elected representatives have been involved in consultation, planning and decision-making processes at all levels of both institutions and FX Plus.

#### Risk management

FXU's Trustee Board is responsible for the management of the risks faced by the Union. Detailed considerations of risk are delegated to the heads of each department. Risks are identified, assessed and controls established throughout the year. A risk register has been established and is reviewed and updated by the Board of Trustees annually.

Budgetary and internal control risks are minimised by the implementation of procedures for authorisation of all transactions and projects. Procedures are in place to ensure compliance with health and safety of staff, volunteers and participants on all activities organised by the Union. These procedures are periodically reviewed to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity.

During the course of the year, each service area has worked closely with the Institutions' Health & Safety Advisers and FX Plus staff to ensure that all potential risks involved in activities undertaken by FXU have been considered and appropriately managed. In terms of emergency procedures, FXU complies with those relating to the relevant campus and Institution(s).

All insurance policies are reviewed annually and provide continuous cover.

It is recognised that systems can only provide reasonable but not absolute assurance that major risks have been adequately managed.

#### Health & Safety

Health & Safety Inspection - Falmouth Health and Safety Adviser, Sarah Fuller conducted a Health & Safety inspection audit on 23<sup>rd</sup> June at the Penryn Campus and our score was indicated to be the required 90% (increased from 80% in March). A summary of all Accident Report Forms was presented to the BOT on 3<sup>rd</sup> July.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The Union's objects are the advancement of education of students at Falmouth University & the University of Exeter's Cornwall Campuses for the public benefit by:

- promoting the interests and welfare of Students at Falmouth University & the University of Exeter Cornwall Campuses during their course of study and representing, supporting and advising Students;
- being the recognised representative channel between students and Falmouth University and University of Exeter (Cornwall Campuses), and any other external bodies; and
- Providing social, cultural, sporting and recreational activities and forums for discussions and debate for the personal development of its Students.

#### FXU's key areas of activity are:

- Student representation (e.g. through the work of the Presidents, Executive Officers and Student Council);
- Democratic activities including referenda, general meetings, debates and elections;
- Provision of advice, support and guidance through the FXU Advice Service and Officer Presidents.
- Supporting students in planning and participating in voluntary opportunities and RAD
- Supporting students in planning and participating in sports and recreational activities;
- Co-ordination of social events and entertainments including freshers' activities;

During 2016-2017, FXU's combined student population was as follows:

Falmouth University: 5438 University of Exeter, Penryn Campus: 2389 Total: 7827

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

This year our main social events were again 3 Freshers' gigs, the Garden Party and the Graduation Ball. Sales for the Garden Party and Graduation Ball were considerably down on previous years, it is thought that the introduction of a ballot system and end of term dates not aligning were contributing factors. Large events were delivered by FX Plus under a Memorandum Of Understanding.

This year we again hosted the FXU Awards ceremony (at the Falmouth Campus), providing the opportunity to recognise and celebrate students' achievements outside of their academic studies and the significant contributions of individual staff members to the student experience, as well as raising the profile of FXU in the community. Achievements included sporting prowess and contributions to the community through volunteering and fundraising as well as Academic Rep of the Year, FXU Rep Legend, Best Contribution to Student Voice Activities and Student-Led Campaign or Project of the Year.

This year has seen greater representation in institutional meetings and FXU now have direct input into the governing bodies and senior management teams at both institutions.

FXU continues to feed student opinion into the operational management of the campuses via the Student Experience and Engagement Group and CSLG Liaison Groups.

FXU continues to work hard to ensure that the views of all its members are represented at all relevant University decision making meetings. FXU now sit on all the major board meetings of Falmouth and FX Plus; Exeter Senate and Council; budget scrutiny groups; and stakeholder meetings. It was a challenge to gain access to these meetings but we have lobbied since 2008 and both institutions recognise and appreciate the importance of a successful working partnership. Access to these Boards means that students studying in Cornwall now have a voice within all the institutional decision making groups.

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

#### HR & Staff .

CEO Recruitment - Joff Cooke attended the BOT meeting on 2nd May in advance of his official start date 1st July.

FX Plus Sustainability Intern - FX Plus are not continuing the role due to budgetary constraints and priorities. We will aim to embed sustainability into our work and will continue the Green Fund to support projects and initiatives.

#### **National Student Survey**

Falmouth University:

- 1023 students (76%) replied out of 1351 population.
- Q26 responses about Student's Union were 59%, 2% higher than sector and national responses.
- Q23 responses about Academic feedback were 82%, 2% lower than sector and national responses.

#### **Exeter University:**

- 376 students (75%) replied out of 500 population.
- Q26 responses were 65%, 8% higher than national responses.
- Q23 responses were 92%, 8% higher than sector and national responses.

#### **Student Voice Team**

- The last Union General Meeting (UGM) of 2016/17 took place at Falmouth campus 23<sup>rd</sup> May 2017. The FXU Leadership Team were encouraged to attend with the 'Hot Topic' being the launch of the FXU Impact Report.
- An FXU Impact Report was designed with multiple end users in mind:
  - 1. A visual interactive timeline student facing
  - 2. Infographics for quick executive summary
  - 3. Full written report with infographics for reference
- The Student Voice Director was heavily involved in the logistics of this year's FXU Awards. This additional workload was managed alongside other duties and a successful event was hosted using the Falmouth Campus (Thursday 25<sup>th</sup> May 2017). The saving in venue cost were spent on AMATA technical team and canapés supplied and served by students and staff from Cornwall College.
- A snap General Election resulted in the Student Voice Team co-ordinating both a voter registration drive and a General election debate in conjunction with Cornwall College Students Union (CCSU). Both FXU and CCSU representatives featured on Radio Cornwall's prime time chat show to promote the collaboration. It is felt there is a lot of potential to build a mutually beneficial relationship between FXU and CCSU in the future with the result of raising the profile of student voice in Cornwall.
- Crowdfunding Trial: Following approval from FXU Senior Management Team (SMT) the Student Voice Director implemented an FXU crowdfunding trial using grant funding from Exeter (£600) and contributing £600 from FXU funds. A student intern was recruited and trained using the HUBUB platform. A promotional plan was devised and delivered with students successfully using the platform to raise funds. A report on this trial outlining the strengths/weaknesses of FXU offering access to a crowdfunding platform is to be submitted in late July. Main challenges to this project were setting up the flow of finances as well as student engagement during the summer.

The crowdfunding trial plans to continue in September using the remaining hours allocated to this project. This will allow us to extend the trial and draw some comparisons between student engagement in terms 1 & 3.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2017

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

- Academic Representation: Subject chairs were heavily involved in shortlisting panels for the Guild/FXU Teaching Awards. A number of areas of concern were highlighted in the promotion and communication of this event and following feedback presented by FXU there is scope to reconsider how this event works in the future. Options discussed include:
  - > Separate Guild / FXU awards that recognise staff excellence
  - > FXU to host a Joint Guild/FXU Teaching awards in Cornwall with the expectation that Exeter staff visit Cornwall for the ceremony
  - Continue with a joint event hosted in Exeter due to workload it was felt this may be unmanageable for Guild staff in 2018.

Recruitment of academic reps were recruited in Term 3 with the following positions still to recruit:

A Falmouth student has accepted a summer project (animation brief) with the aim of raising the profile of academic representation structures in Term 1.

- **FXU Leadership Team:** The FXU Leadership Team agreed to discharge Subject Chairs/Dept Reps from attending Leadership Team Meetings with the following aims:
  - > Reducing the meeting expectation of Dept Reps/Subject Chairs and allowing them to focus on representing their academic area of specialism
  - > Supporting and reinforcing accountability of the Executive Officers
  - > Putting more focus on decision making at Leadership Team Meetings
  - > Improving the accountability of FXU Presidents (to be extended to holding all Executive Officers to account)
- Widening Student Participation: The WSP Assistant provided ongoing support for the Faith & Liberation committee which continued throughout the election of their committee roles for 2017/18. Committee roles were contested and 132 students voted.

Norwegian Constitution Day was a successful event on campus with 35 students attending a celebration event organised by FXU.

A new WSP officer has been successfully recruited for 2017/18 with a revised job description, placing increased emphasis on supporting academic representation for flexible/distance learners.

The WSP assistant has undertaken ILM level 3 qualification as part of continuing professional development and is preparing materials for handover & international students' arrival.

#### Activities Team

#### **RAD** (Raising And Donating)

- RAD total raised £81,785.98
- NaSFA: This year we have had two RAD Committee members be elected to committee roles on the National Student Fundraising Committee. Our RAD President was one of two candidates that stood for election to become South West Regional Rep at the National RAG Conference and won. In March, our RAD Events Officer and FXU President Elec was elected to cover the of NaSFA Chair until re-election in August.

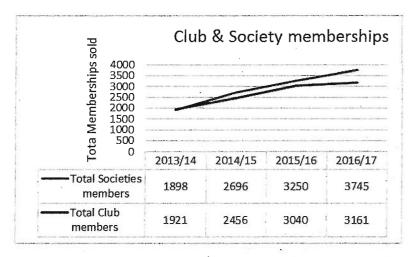

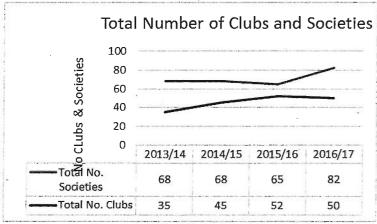

**Advice Service** 

Service use: The figures in the table below demonstrate significant continued growth in the number of appointments attended by students and continues to exceed the proportionate growth in student numbers over the same period.

Service users: Of the students with whom we conducted appointments during the period September 2016 to June 2017:

Falmouth students comprise 68.5% (69%) Exeter students comprise 31.5% (31%)

The figures in brackets indicate each University's share of the total number of students across the Cornwall campuses. The data indicates that the Service continues to engage with the Universities' students in proportions that reflect the composition of the student body.

Case type: Following changes that are to be made to our data recording, from September 2017 the 'case type' data will be more robust. In the meantime, in its current form the data indicates that in the period September 2016 to June 2017:

University-related issues constitute the single largest case type (49%) This includes academic appeals, academic misconduct, complaints, disciplinaries, fitness to study, interrupting studies, withdrawing and extenuating circumstances.

Finance-related issues (36%) Accommodation (12%) Other (3%)

**Review of service delivery:** For the past three years, the Advice Director has focussed on delivering advice on a 1:1 basis by way of face-to-face and telephone appointments. The large majority of those appointments are face-to-face. While the intention will remain focussed on a 1:1 approach, however ways to increase capacity within our existing very modest staffing level will be explored.

Telephone appointments and drop-in sessions were trialled, however, the trial lacked adequate planning and did not deliver any measurable benefit. Nevertheless, other SU's have demonstrated that this can be an effective approach so further planning and implementation will be considered for the start of the new year.

### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2017

#### ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

Measuring service outcomes: Service outcome measures will be introduced as the current approach is not especially sophisticated - relying largely on the advisers' anecdotal recollection.

With this is mind, over the summer I will liaise with similar services in other students' unions with the aim of introducing a more rigorous approach in time for the start of the 2017-18 academic year.

National Association of Student Money Advisers (NASMA): In June Richard Scrase and Jo Barrett attended the annual NASMA conference in Harrogate. Among the conference highlights was FXU receiving the Innovative Activity of the Year Award. Our nomination referred to the Advice Service's use of video and animations to raise the level of engagement with the Service from Falmouth's arts based students.

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Reserves policy

The FXU trustees have set a reserves policy. Reserves are built and maintained at a level which ensures that 3 months of organisation's core activity could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty.

- A proportion of reserves are maintained in a readily realisable form.
- To develop a Designated Reserve for the purpose of:
  - 1. Maintaining the objectives of the Union through the payment to the elected Officer for 3 months.
  - 2. Payment of FXU designated staff for 3 months (non-Falmouth University contracted)
  - 3. Payment of immediate liabilities, creditors control
  - 4. PAYE & NI
  - 5. Accountancy and legal fees
  - 6. Costs in disposal of FXU assets
- A Designated Reserve of £32,700 is set aside for this purpose and is set aside from the unallocated reserves.
   100% of reserves are maintained in cash.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2017

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value.

#### Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemption in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

#### Income

Income from donations and legacies comprises grants that provide core funding or are of general nature, are recognised where there is entitlement, probability of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Income from other trading activities are recognised as earned.

Income from investments is included in the year in which it is receivable.

Income from charitable activities includes income from Freshers, events and sporting activities and are recognised as earned. Grant income included in this category provides funding to support the sporting activities, it is recognised where there is entitlement, probability of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

The value of services provided by volunteers has not been included.

#### Expenditure

Expenses are recognised when a liability is incurred. Costs are analysed as follows:

Expenditure on raising funds are costs associated with generating voluntary income through fund raising.

Charitable activities include, all expenditure associated with student welfare and includes direct, support and governance costs.

Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources e.g. allocating staff costs by time spent and other costs by their usage.

Resources expended are inclusive of any VAT arising, which cannot be recovered.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery

- 20% on cost

Motor vehicles

- 25% on cost

Only assets costing over £250 are capitalised.

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS - CONTINUED FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2017

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Investment income and gains are allocated to the appropriate fund.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### **Designated Funds**

Minibus - funds designated for the purchase of an additional minibus.

**Dartington** - this amount (Dartington's funds pre merger) is to be ring-fenced to develop services and facilities for performance students and is administered through the Dartington Society.

Reserve account - funds designated as a financial reserve in accordance with the reserves policy as detailed in the Report of the Trustees.

**Student Led Event** - funds designated towards particular student events and projects which have been awarded to students but remain unspent at the end of the year.

#### Restricted funds

Active Community Fund - Funds received from Falmouth University, University of Exeter, Cornwall Campus and various other sources to cover costs incurred in supporting students in undertaking volunteering activities.

Activities Fund - Funds received from Falmouth University and University of Exeter, Cornwall Campus, as well as income collected as student memberships, to cover costs incurred in the running of various sporting activities for the students.

**Green Living Project** - Funds received from NUS which are provided with the aim of producing a generation of environmentally aware students through education, engagement and employment.

#### 17. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

#### Falmouth University

During the year Falmouth University (Falmouth) provided total grant funding of £511,324 (2016: £464,290). This includes £30,000 (2016: £30,000) towards sports and the remainder is an unrestricted block grant. Falmouth University recharged staff costs of £439,506 (2016: £435,088) to FXU during the year. An amount of £109,701 (2016: £nil) was included in creditors at the year end.

#### University of Exeter, Cornwall Campus

During the year University of Exeter, Cornwall Campus provided total grant funding of £241,708 (2016: £222,391). This includes £30,000 (2016: £30,000) towards sports and the remainder is an unrestricted block grant. During the year an amount of £10,804 (2016: £10,536) was charged to FXU and £12,894 (2016: £4,869) was charged by FXU. At the end of the year an amount of £5,445 (2016: £550) was owed by the University of Exeter and £702 (2016: £302) was due to the University of Exeter.

#### Falmouth Exeter Plus

FXU have an investment of £10,000 in a cafeteria owned by the above. During the year, the return on this investment was £21,851 (2016: £20,197) and the full amount was outstanding at the year end. In addition to this FXU was charged £44,179 (2016: £27,047) for various items of recharged expenditure and invoiced £1,292 (2016: £918) to Falmouth Exeter Plus. FXU owed £3,503 (2016: £1,131) to Falmouth Exeter Plus at the year end.

#### 18. ULTIMATE CONTROLLING PARTY

During the year the FXU was under the control of the FXU Board. The ultimate decision-making body of FXU is the combined student body.
