Contents of the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 30 June 2017

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Harmony Youth Project continues to serve young people in our local community, and work with people at their pace, on their terms and in their space to help them achieve lasting change. We cherish the whole community's requirements and needs, old and young alike but with a focus on integration we encourage cohesion for the excellence of the community as a whole.

Harmony Youth Project registered charity, we continue in our endeavour to engage our services within the community with outreach projects incorporating exciting, quality and comprehensive projects including all ages and backgrounds.

Our centre has an extended dancefloor along with our amenities such as pool table, table tennis table xbox games area, DJ light disco and musical band stage, these being offered to our Saturday evening Open Access night. Our centre has continued with our Saturday Open Access available to a variety of young people in the area and our main objective is to secure youngsters who may be wandering the streets with nothing to do, we continue to spread the word of our open access by using social media. We hope to attract more young people from minority sectors to be involved and integrate with our mainstream visitors.

As funding is extremely difficult in the current financial environment and finding that we have to fight harder for it compared to other organisations in our area, even though we have a small team of staff, we are proud that we have acquired exciting outreach projects for the future along with in house regular projects.

We are continuing to work closely with Sutton Estate community Centre where we provide outreach projects, we work closely with the National Clarion Housing Association, where we have built a trusting relationship in relation to them being satisfied with previous projects, we have secured two new outreach projects with Clarion, the first being digital communities where we will assist people to be introduced to computers and use, to assist skills that will enable them to search for work more proficiently and help generally, the second being an open access evening on Tuesday nights, to welcome young people and lead them to getting involved with hands on in their community.

Our work with connection to Bolton Wanderers football team has continued whereby they have directed youngsters with issues who have little interest in sport but rather in music to our studio and we have continued sessions whereby the youngsters receive recordings along with lessons and obtaining a professional Compact Disc of their own, this gives them a structure of workflow and a feeling of accomplishment when they receive the final product, we have two young men, one who is making a music video and the other who is attending guitar lessons, both have issues and we are working to inspire and raise their self-confidence.

As funding is extremely difficult in the current financial environment and finding that we have to fight harder for it compared to other organisations in our area, even though we have a small team of staff, we are proud that we can provide quality media projects in film and music, we have produced a song and video about anxiety and depression which at time of writing has been offered to Bolton Newspaper and ITV Granada Reports for news support.

We have acquired a small amount of funding from Children in Need and are utilising funds to make a ten minute quality film production about inclusion, diversity and equality working closely with individuals, from writing the script and storyboard to filming, lighting and of course acting, we are very much looking forward to the final product that will be promoted as strongly as we can.

We continue to have our regular visitors to our studio to record their sounds, along with our Matty DJ and ghost hunting Scott, both with issues who's only quality of life is their visits to Harmony.

We continue to support our local Jobcentre where we receive referrals, and depending on their skill set, we give them tasks such as tidying and reward them with reference letters, help with their CV's and real appreciation where they feel they have some worth and pride. We also assist them in using computers to manage their affairs.

We accommodate on average 25 children from ACIS every two weeks at our centre, providing fun and informative projects that can be a challenge due to the lack of English language, we have been given fantastic feedback and will continue to provide support for these children.



We have other projects at hand, we continue to fulfil our requirements to these projects along with moving forward in acquiring further funding which is difficult with limited staff, we are though fortunate to have staff and volunteers who wear many hats such as photographer, videographer, music producer, artist and musicians. Harmony will continue to further help those in need and our Bolton community and even though this can be challenging we continue with an optimistic approach. Thank you for reading.









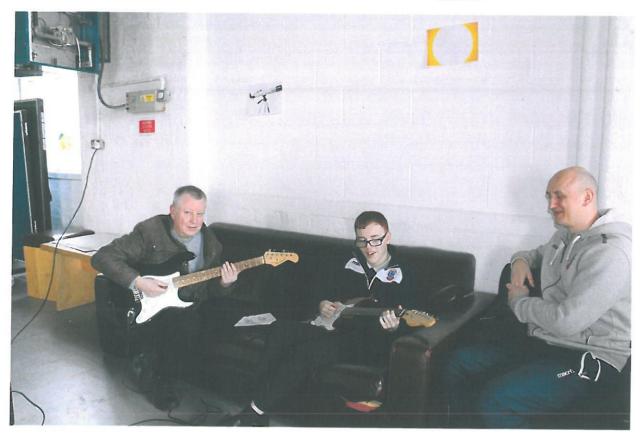

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

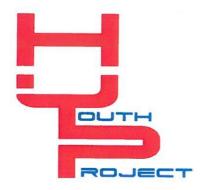

AIMS & OBJECTIVES

Harmony Youth Project is a registered charity (No.1129290), established in May 2001, providing activities, training and facilities ranging from IT, graphics, arts, music and issue based film making, to disadvantaged young people from Bolton and the Greater Manchester area. The aims of Harmony Youth Project are to "Provide equal opportunities and benefits to young people aged 8 and 25.

We work with Local Authorities, Charities, Voluntary groups, Community Voluntary Services, Job Centre Plus, pupil referral units, schools and other organisations in a common effort to advance educate and to provide a safe environment for young people to advance grow and interact with other young people from a wide range of backgrounds and cultures in a positive manor.

Harmony Youth Project operates in Halliwell one of the top 2% most deprived area in the Country-(Source: Bolton Development and Regeneration Department-Feb 2011) area of Bolton Greater Manchester.

Our research and consultation shows young people face multiple issues of deprivation and often classified as NEET (Not in Education Employment or Training), they have a little or nothing to do during the weekends or out of terms time and lack opportunities to find suitable employment. Harmony Youth Project provides opportunities, training and other activities to young people to try to provide a solution to these problems.

Our projects, goals and efforts have been acknowledged and recognised by the local authorities, schools, police and youth offending team, the positive feedback from these agencies show the impact these activities have on young people to address negative, abusive or criminal behaviour

Bolton is a significantly depressed area and to reach all our young people it aims to create satellite centres throughout the Borough eg Great Lever, Little Lever, Farnworth, Breightmet etc. Our Media Centre in Halliwell will remain the Hub and Gateway to these exciting new developments.

Harmony will strive to maintain its cutting edge approach to providing and delivering a service which is totally relevant to the needs of the youth in today's difficult economic and social climate, targeting youth unemployment failure to succeed in education substances and alcohol miss use, negative stereo typing, bullying, hate crime/antisocial behaviour etc.



Chairman's Report 26/03/2018

Following recent budget cuts it has been another tough year. We have managed to secured some funding and as always we remain positive and very optimistic about our future at Wordsworth Street. Improvements are still being made to the premises; work has begun and is progressing smoothly on the new recording studio. It is in the process of being completely refurbished and is almost complete. We have made some very strong links with local schools as well as strengthening our links with Job Centre plus, DWP and Bolton MBC.

We have managed to created links with A.C.I.S (Achievement, Cohesion & Integration Service. Starting Point) which introduces children who have recently arrived in Bolton from outside the United Kingdom to the English education system. Most are refugees from Africa or Asia while others are from countries new to the European Community. Ages range from 4 to 16 years old with more than half of the pupils speaking little or no English. Many have had no previous formal education or have had their schooling severely disrupted. They stay for about six weeks on average, after which they attend mainstream schools. As part of their education we are running projects that involve Art, Music, Photography and fun and games to build confidence and enable tam work.

As part of our work experience program, we have created links with Tailored Education Ltd in which students have the opportunity to spend time in an adult working environment as if they are an employee, with an emphasis on learning about the world of work. Students do not get paid for their time doing work experience, as it is considered to be part of their education. All the students get on well and there are no behavioural issues in school. We have a brief timetable of what the week would entail for each student which has now has been approved.

We are currently running multiple film projects, with funding from Children in Need, on the effects of hate crime and bullying. The projects involve pre production, production and post production. A script has been written and we aim to start filming in the next few weeks.
