#### Structure, governance and management

#### **Governing document**

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitute an unincorporated charity.

#### Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Appointment of trustees is governed by the Trust Deed of the charity. The Board of Trustees is authorised to fill the vacancies arising through resignation death of an existing trustee.

It is not currently the intention of the trustees of the charity to appoint new trustees. Should this situation change in the future, the trustees will apply suitable recruitment and training procedures

#### **Risk management**

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. In this regard the trustees actively review the major risks which the charity faces on a regular basis and have established systems to mitigate such.

The Society is constituted by Trust Deed, and its objects are provision of relief for persons who are housebound, or temporarily for other reasons, unable to provide meals for themselves, by providing kosher meals for such persons.

The trustees meet regularly to manage the affairs of the society. There are no full time staff, most charitable activities and administration are undertaken by volunteers.

## Achievements and Performance:

"Hot Line Meals is a Life-line for kungry individuals and families in need" says Jacob Orzel, founder of the organisation. "The service we offer is personal, practical and preventative, it helps people stay safe, keep well and remain independent at home."

The trustees are gratified to be able to report a consolidation and increase in the activities of Hot Line Meals Services. During 2016-2017, we provided over 1,050 nutritious meals per week, for 50 weeks of the year, to disadvantaged low-income users with a variety of needs.

These included:

- Parents/carers, young adults and children facing food poverty, from dysfunctional or single parent families.
- Frail and elderly people including Holocaust survivors, who have difficulty with shopping, or carrying food home, or are incapable of cooking for themselves. They were supported to remain independent in their own home.
- Convalescent women after childbirth, and their families.
- Temporarily ill people, both physical and emotional
- Physical and learning disabled people who lack the skills or ability to provide nutritious food for themselves
- Those suffering from chronic illness, both physical or mental.

When preparing nutritious meals we take into account the specific needs and wishes of our users, including soft and easily digestible food, specific dietary needs such as diabetes, food allergies and cultural requirements. The meals are cooked daily by 12 volunteer chefs in our purpose built commercial kitchen and packed by 100 volunteers of all ages each week. The meals are delicious, attractive and culturally appropriate, with a different menu each day. The food is delivered daily to the families' homes free of charge, by 59 volunteers, providing recipients with vital physical and emotional support.

Feedback from users and the increase in demand strongly evidenced the great and growing need for this critical service. Eighty five per cent of new callers had heard about Hot Line Meals by word of mouth, and over 14,000 meals per year were provided as a result of referrals from health and social welfare services. Substantial quantities of food were donated by generous local suppliers, who appreciate the need for Hot Line Meals.

Tentatively, I went to answer. What a surprise! Standing there was a friendly Hot Line volunteer delivering a warm meal. The volunteer helped me unpack the meal and asked me about my day. It felt so good to speak to someone. My heartfelt thanks for a job well done!

## Achievements and Performance continued:

Sally, aged 83 had been living alone for the past 25 years, since her husband passed away. She had always remained fiercely independent and had looked after herself. Unfortunately, at the age of 82, she suffered a severe infection in her foot and was hospitalised for 2 months. While in hospital she was diagnosed with type 2 diabetes, and by the time she was discharged, she was disorientated, weak and suffered memory loss. This is where Hot Line Meals Services stepped in! We delivered daily fresh, hot and nutritious meals, thus contributing to the control of her diabetes and enabling her to stay home and recuperate which took 6 months; after that, she had recovered sufficiently to be able to cook again for herself, so that she became independent and safe in her own home once again.

Mrs M had been suffering from clinical depression for 2 years. As a result, she was unable to cook or shop for her family of 5 over this time. Her husband managed to keep the house-hold going, doing the laundry and providing for the emotional needs of their children who were aged between 5 and 11 years. Hot Line Meals delivered daily nutritious meals for the family over this time, ensuring that the family could eat a wholesome healthy meal together in the evenings. This played an important part in keeping the family together, healthy in mind and body.

These examples show Hot Line Meals Service at its best, supporting frail, sick, isolated and vulnerable people, by providing fresh hot nutritious daily meals, for individuals and their families, enabling them to stay in their own homes, when often the prognosis otherwise would be for them to move in to full time care, thus losing their independence, or deteriorating day by day. We have succeeded in accessing more funds this year, which has enabled us to reach more vulnerable users.

The Hot Line Meals Service is regulated by Hackney Food Rating Association, and has achieved a rating of Level 3.

The trustees would like to record their very special thanks to all their faithful volunteers as well as to the generous donors. It is our donors and other generous charitable foundations and trusts who make it possible to continue providing this valuable service of over 52,500 meals annually to people who are struggling to put warm healthy food on the table. We look forward to many more years of providing this vital service to the community, with on-going support from donors and volunteers.

- ⇒ In the long term, we are at the start of planning to move to a bigger, more user friendly and more modern facility. We are envisioning this to be a 5 year project.

#### **Notes to the Financial Statements**

#### Year ended 30 June 2017

#### 1. General information

The charity is registered charity in England and Wales and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is 59 Wellington Avenue, N15 6AX, London.

#### 2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Charities Act 2011.

#### 3. Accounting policies

#### Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

#### Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

#### Disclosure exemptions

The entity satisfies the criteria of being a qualifying entity as defined in FRS 102. As such, advantage has been taken of the following disclosure exemptions available under paragraph 1.12 of FRS 102:

- (a) No cash flow statement has been presented for the company.
- (b) Disclosures in respect of financial instruments have not been presented.

#### Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal within the objects of the charity.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### 3. Accounting policies (continued)

#### Incoming resources

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. Income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.

#### Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

- other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

#### Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

#### Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

#### Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

#### **Financial instruments**

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or paable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Debt instruments are subsequently measured at amortised cost.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

Any reversals of impairment are recognised immediately, to the extent that the reversal does not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.
