CITY OF LONDON CHOIR REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 JULY 2017

The Trustees present their report along with the financial statements of the Charity for the year ended 31st July 2017.

Charitable Incorporated Organisation

A new Charitable Incorporated Organisation (the new Charity) with Charities Reference Number 1164955 was registered with the Charities Commission on 21 December 2015 in the name of the City of London Choir. A full transfer of assets from the old Charity (Reference 265024) to the new Charity took place on 31 January 2017. The old Charity Reference has subsequently been removed from the Register of Charities. These accounts are therefore prepared for the full year in the name of the new Charity. The comparative accounts shown for the year ended 31 July 2016 are those of the old Charity.

Constitution and Objects

The Charity's Governing Document is its Constitution which was last amended on 30 November 2015.

The objects of the CIO are to promote, improve, develop and maintain public education in the application of the art and science of choral music in all its aspects by the presentation of public choral concerts and by such other ways as the trustees shall determine from time to time primarily in and around the City of London.

In pursuing such objects, the City of London Choir aims to provide exciting musical experiences for members and audiences. In particular, it seeks to:

- Encourage amateur singers, especially those based in the City, to develop their musical expertise and enjoy singing together;
- Provide increased opportunities for audiences to hear both established and less well-known works:
- Demonstrate that music of the highest quality can be achieved by amateurs and professionals working together;
- Celebrate and share the fun of music-making and to encourage more people to experience choral music, whatever their age, background or previous musical interest; and
- Support charities and worthy causes.

Development, Activities and Achievements

The City of London Choir is busy and versatile, regularly performing in ensembles from 8-12 singers to our full strength of around 120. We have provided music for a wide range of social and corporate events and we are particularly pleased to support events organised by our sponsors.

In our 2016-17 season, as a sole promoter we promoted one concert during the year, rather than our normal four, our tenth Christmas Carol concert in St. John's, Smith Square, with Stephen Farr at the organ, Timothy End at the piano and Lucy Wakeford on Harp.

As a co-promoter with the RPO, we participated in the third and fourth of our series of six joint Haydn/Mozart concerts at the Cadogan Hall. In October we performed Haydn's *Heiligemesse* and Mozart's *Ave Verum Corpus*, with six student soloists sponsored by the Josephine Baker Trust. Alexandra Dariescu performed Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 20. In March we performed Haydn's *Theresienmesse* and Mozart's *Tantum Ergo*, with soloists Grace Davidson, Catherine Carby, Nicholas Pritchard and Tristan Hambleton. Leon McCawley performed Mozart's Piano Concerto No. 24. Finally, again with the RPO we performed 'A Choral Christmas' at the Cadogan Hall in December.

As usual the choir also participated in several concerts promoted by other organisations. In December we were again invited to sing at VSO's annual fundraising concert held in Methodist Central Hall which, as always, proved to be a popular event for both audience and members of the choir. We also continued our relationship with Raymond Gubbay Ltd, with a group of female singers performing Holst's *Neptune* at the Royal Festival Hall in October, a performance of Mozart's *Requiem* in the Royal Festival Hall in November, the 'The Glory of Christmas' concert in December at the Royal Albert Hall and finally, in February, Orff's *Carmina Burana* in the Royal Festival Hall. In December a small group, along with the Royal Philharmonic Concert Orchestra, sang at a live performance at the Hammersmith Apollo of the music from the *Tomb Raider* video games. Finally, again with the RPO, in May the choir had the great privilege of performing a selection of Eric Whitacre's music at the Royal Albert Hall under the baton of the composer.

Promoting concerts at large venues such as Mendelssohn's Elijah at the Barbican Hall in 2018 requires a significant level of outside support, and we are extremely grateful to all those individuals and organisations that have provided much needed support without which this season would not have been nearly as successful.

Finally, at the end of the season in July, the choir recorded a CD for Decca Records "The Nation's Favourite Christmas Carols", which was released in conjunction with Classic FM in December 2017 and reached the top of the specialist Classical Music charts at Christmas 2017.

The Choir is a member of Making Music, previously the National Federation of Music Societies.

Reserves Policy

The Choir needs to hold reserves for a number of reasons: to provide a cushion against losses in the course of a year, to enable it to commit to expenditure up to a year ahead and to give it flexibility in its long term planning. The Choir's policy is to hold a level of reserves that is broadly equivalent to between one and one and a half year's worth of planned future expenditure.

Trustees' responsibilities in relation to the financial statements

We choose under the constitution of the Charity to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charity and of its financial activities for the period. In preparing these financial statements we:

- make reasonable and prudent judgements and estimates; and
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

31 JULY 2017

1. Accounting policies

Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with applicable United Kingdom accounting standards, the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" issued in March 2005 (SORP 2005) and the Charities Act 2011.

Fund Accounting

The Charity's Unrestricted Funds consist of general funds which the Charity may use for its purposes at its discretion.

Restricted Funds are those where the donor has imposed restrictions on the use of the funds.

Income arising on restricted funds and expenditure incurred in respect of these funds are reflected through the Statement of Financial Activities with any surpluses or deficits being appropriated to/from restricted funds.

Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

2. Income
