Annual Report for the year ended 31st December 2017 (continued)

The members of the church present their annual report and the financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2017. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts and comply with the charity's trust deed, the Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland published on 16th July 2014.

Structure, governance and management

The church is regulated by the Church of England and is now a registered charity (no. 1130491) with the Charity Commissioners under the requirements of the Charities Act 2006. It operates under the guidance of the vicar, the church wardens and the parochial church council. It has the responsibility of promoting the whole mission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. Along with The de Brome Trust, it also has maintenance responsibilities for the Church of St Mary the Virgin.

The PCC has been formed under the Parochial Church Council Rules (Powers) Measure 1956. The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. All church attendees are encouraged to register on the Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC. New PCC members are given induction training by the churchwardens. The PCC makes all decisions corporately except that the Standing Committee has delegated powers to make decisions between PCC meetings subject to keeping the PCC informed as necessary.

Objectives and activities for the public benefit

The objectives of the PCC are defined by the Parochial Church Council (Powers) Measure 1956 as to cooperate with the minister in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical.

The electoral roll now numbers 119.

The Trustees have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers and duties.

Achievements and performance

There have been a number of personnel changes in the course of the year. At the beginning of the year, the church remained in interregnum with the Revd Charlotte Bannister-Parker as Acting Priest-in-Charge, ably assisted by Claire Browes, the Ministerial Assistant. The Revd Dr William Lamb, the new incumbent, was instituted, inducted and installed by the Bishop of Oxford and the Archdeacon of Oxford on Tuesday 2nd May 2017. The Revd Charlotte Bannister-Parker stood down as Acting Priest-in-Charge and continued as an Associate Priest and as a part-time Director of Outreach at St Mary's. The Revd James Crockford was appointed as a full-time Assistant Priest from 1st September 2017.

Claire Browes left St Mary's to commence training at Ripon College, Cuddesdon, in August 2017. Esther Brazil was appointed as Ministerial Assistant to succeed Claire and began in September 2017. The purpose of this role is to contribute to the ministry and mission of St Mary's, by taking responsibility for key aspects of congregational life and the Church's outreach. At the same time, we appointed Dr Mariama Ifode-Blease as a part-time Community Engagement and Outreach Officer. This role involves contributing to the ministry and mission of St Mary's, by taking responsibility for key aspects of the Church's outreach and engagement with the local community.

The PCC extended the contract of the Heritage Education Officer until November 2017. In the course of the year, Penny Boxall continued to run a number of successful lecture series, including 'On Liberalism', 'Architecture and the Medieval Mind', and '1517' marking the 500th anniversary of the Reformation. A commitment to education and learning remains a significant part of our public benefit and we hosted a number of educational visits from schools in the course of the year. St Mary's also hosted a performance of the Oxford Mystery Plays, engaging a number of community organisations in the production.

Annual Report for the year ended 31st December 2017 (continued)

Achievements and performance (continued)

The congregation continues to remain lively and committed, often with visitors from across the world. The usual Sunday attendance is 147. Over 350 people attended on Easter Day, and over 2,000 people attended services during Advent and Christmas.

In September 2017, the Parochial Church Council reviewed our plans for the future on an Away Day. We discussed the development of worship, congregational life, and community engagement. At the December meeting, the PCC approved a Strategic Plan. This document sets out our aims and plans for the next three years. We have articulated our ministry and mission as follows:

The University Church of St Mary the Virgin is a vibrant, welcoming and inclusive church within the Church of England. Standing in the centre of Oxford, St Mary's is the spiritual heart of the oldest university in Britain. With dignified liturgy and beautiful music, we strive to be a community of faithful Christian witness and intelligent debate, unafraid to engage with the modern world.

The PCC continues to employ a Maintenance Officer, Kevin Harris. In the course of the year, we carried out a major overhaul of the underfloor heating system. We also carried out some significant repairs and overdue maintenance to the property owned by the PCC on Stratford Street. Following advice from our insurers, we renewed the Smart Water treatment of all lead roofs and installed a roof alarm system. We were very grateful to the Oxfordshire Historic Churches Trust for their generous grant towards the cost of this system. We continue to seek grant aid for all maintenance of our historic building wherever possible.

Financial review

During the year, the University Church received income of £356,159 (2016: £587,198). The regular income of the church arises from the use of church buildings and donations. Expenditure during the year totalled £426,680 (2016: £339,435) resulting in a deficit of £70,521 (2016: surplus of £247,763). The general fund showed an accumulated surplus of £167,236 (2016: surplus of £125,597).

At 31st December 2017, there were free reserves of £20,417 (unrestricted general funds excluding fixed assets) (201 deficit of £15,230).

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of The University Church of St Mary the Virgin

I report to the charity trustees on my examination of the accounts of the University Church of St Mary the Virgin for the year ended 31st December 2017 which are set out on pages 5 to 15.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31st December 2017

1 Accounting policies

a) Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared on an accruals basis and include income and expenditure as they are earned or incurred, rather than as cash is received or paid. The accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16th July 2014, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The accounts include all the transactions, assets and liabilities for which the Church is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups which owe their main affiliation to another body nor those which are informal gatherings of church members.

The Charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The Trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the Charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

b) Fund accounting

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the members in furtherance of the general objectives of the church and which have not been designated for other purposes.

Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the church for particular purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors or which have been raised by the charity for particular purposes. The cost of raising and administering such funds are charged against the specific fund. The aim and use of each restricted fund is set out in the notes to the financial statements.

c) Income recognition

Donations and legacies

Collections are recognised when received by or on behalf of The University Church. Planned giving receivable under covenant is recognised only when received. Income tax recoverable on covenants or gift aid donations is recognised when the income is recognised. Grants and legacies to The University Church are accounted for as soon as The University Church is notified of its legal entitlement and the amount due.

Charitable activities

Rental income from the letting of The University Church property is recognised when the rental is due.

Investments

Dividends and interest are accounted for when receivable. Tax recoverable on such income is recognised in the same accounting year.

No amounts are included in the financial statements for services donated by volunteers.

Notes to the accounts (continued) for the year ended 31st December 2017

1. Accounting policies (continued)

d) Expenditure recognition

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of the resources.

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the Church as a legal entity and are not connected with generating income or charitable expenditure.

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the Church to the expenditure, it is probable that settlement will be required and te amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

The Church is not registered for VAT and, as such, irrecoverable VAT is included within the expense in which it was incurred.

e) Fixed assets

Consecrated land and buildings and moveable church furnishings

Consecrated and beneficed property is excluded from the accounts by Section 10(2) of the Charities Act 2011. No value is placed on moveable church furnishings held by the churchwardens on special trust for The University Church and which require a faculty for disposal since The University Church considers this to be inalienable property. All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or benefice buildings and movable church furnishings, whether maintenance or improvement, is written off as expenditure in the SOFA.

Freehold buildings (Stratford Street & Mary Price Close)

This is included in the accounts at cost. The members consider that the property is maintained so that any depreciation would be immaterial and is therefore not required.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Equipment used within the church premises is depreciated on a straight line basis over 5 – 10 years.

f) Current assets

Amounts owing to The University Church at 31st December in respect of fees, rents or other income are shown as debtors less provision for amounts that may prove uncollectible.

The Music fund comprises monies received in 2011 to 2013 for the purchase and ongoing maintenance of a new piano for the church. £28,010 of the fund is represented by the book value of the piano, with the balance held as cash for future maintenance costs.

The Mary Price fund comprises of monies received towards the purchase of a new property to house a Church worker. The property is held in the accounts at cost at £403,769. The restricted fund of £310,000 along with unrestricted funds of £93,769 is represented by the cost of the building.
