Trustees' Report

The trustees, who are directors for the purposes of company law, present the annual report together with the financial statements of the charitable company for the year ended 31 August 2017.

Objectives and activities

Objects and aims

The Charity's objectives are to promote, maintain and advance the education of the public by the encouragement of the arts including the art of music, singing, drama, literature, painting and visual arts by the promotion of concerts, performances, exhibitions, workshops and other activities for the benefit of the inhabitants of Ashbourne and surrounding district.

Public benefit

The objects of the Company are to provide opportunities for both professional and non-professional artists and the community of Ashbourne and surrounding areas to come together for the initiation, organisation and promotion of artistic activities, including in particular through an annual festival, and to promote the benefits of the arts generally within this community.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the requirements of section 4 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission for England and Wales.

Achievements and performance

The Trustees of Ashbourne Arts Limited held a review of their activities ahead of planning the 2017 Festival. This enabled them to assess how well the aims and objectives were being met by the existing event formats and tailor proposed new activities. This review led to the idea a carnival on the Sunday of StreetFest which, thanks to funding from Arts Council England, was a great spectacle and enabled many school children to be involved in workshops. The addition of this event, with its income and expenditure, within the 2017 Festival and StreetFest calendar meant that the 16/17 Financial Year had the highest turnover ever.

Financial review

Audiences across the festival were very good, attracting locals as well as people travelling to Ashbourne especially for the Festival.

In addition to the grant from Arts Council England, Ashbourne Town Council once again supported the annual Festival, as did a number of generous individuals and local businesses who have contributed to our Friends, Supporters, Patrons and Sponsorship programme. Also, not shown in the accounts, is the considerable benefit when individuals, companies and councils provide services, equipment or venues without charging. The Festival could not have run without all this support and the Trustees are very grateful.

The financial position of Ashbourne Arts Ltd remains healthy and strong with a surplus of £362 for the year, giving the Trustees the platform to start planning and booking performers and events for Festival 2018.

Trustees' Report

Policy on reserves

The Directors of Ashbourne Arts Limited have set a reserves policy which requires:

- Reserves to be built up and maintained at a level which ensures that our core activity, of an annual festival, could continue during a period of unforeseen difficulty.

- A proportion of reserves be maintained in a readily realisable form.

- The calculation of the required level of reserves be an integral part of the organisation's planning, budget and forecast with consideration being given to the risks associated with each stream of income and expenditure, the planned activity level and the organisation's commitments.

At the end of the financial period the amount of funds held in reserves was £37,430.

Plans for future periods

Aims and key objectives for future periods

The Charity's objectives are to promote, maintain and advance the education of the public by the encouragement of the arts including the art of music, singing, drama, literature, painting and visual arts by the promotion of concerts, performances, exhibitions, workshops and other activities for the benefit of the inhabitants of Ashbourne and surrounding district.

Structure, governance and management

Nature of governing document

The charity is governed by its memorandum and articles of association dated 19th April 2002.

The constitution of the charity is that of a limited company.

Recruitment and appointment of trustees

The Board of Directors when complete consists of at least five and not more than ten individuals, all of whom must be members.

One third (or the number nearest one third) of the Directors must retire at each AGM, those longest in service retiring first and the choice between any of equal service being made by drawing lots. Retiring Directors are eligible for re-election.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2017

1 Charity status

The charity is a charity limited by guarantee and consequently does not have share capital. Each of the trustees is liable to contribute an amount not exceeding $\pounds 1$ towards the assets of the charity in the event of liquidation.

2 Accounting policies

Summary of significant accounting policies and key accounting estimates

The principal accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all the years presented, unless otherwise stated.

Statement of compliance

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Basis of preparation

Ashbourne Arts Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy notes.

Exemption from preparing a cash flow statement

The charity opted to early adopt Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016 and have therefore not included a cash flow statement in these financial statements.

Income and endowments

All income is recognised once the charity has entitlement to the income, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount of the income receivable can be measured reliably.

Donations and legacies

Donations are recognised when the charity has been notified in writing of both the amount and settlement date. In the event that a donation is subject to conditions that require a level of performance by the charity before the charity is entitled to the funds, the income is deferred and not recognised until either those conditions are fully met, or the fulfilment of those conditions is wholly within the control of the charity and it is probable that these conditions will be fulfilled in the reporting period.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 August 2017

Grants receivable

Grants are recognised based on the accrual model and are measured at the fair value of the asset received or receivable. Grants are classified as relating either to revenue or to assets. Grants relating to revenue are recognised in income over the period in which the related costs are recognised. Grants relating to assets are recognised over the expected useful life of the asset. Where part of a grant relating to an asset is deferred, it is recognised as deferred income.

Donated services and facilities

Donated services and facilities are not recognised in the accounts but they are acknowledged in the published material and website.

Expenditure

All expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to that expenditure, it is probable settlement is required and the amount can be measured reliably. All costs are allocated to the applicable expenditure heading that aggregate similar costs to that category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated on a basis consistent with the use of resources, with central staff costs allocated on the basis of time spent, and depreciation charges allocated on the portion of the asset's use. Other support costs are allocated based on the spread of staff costs.

Charitable activities

Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

Depreciation and amortisation

Depreciation is provided on tangible fixed assets so as to write off the cost or valuation, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful economic life as follows:

Fund structure
