# Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document

- (1) For the public benefit, to advance the health of individuals and groups in England and Wales by:
  - (a) representing the needs of the membership of IMHN in improving the provision of mental health services;
  - (b) working collaboratively with commissioners, service providers and other agencies to identify innovative health solutions that will improve the health of local communities;
  - (c) working with individuals and local groups in communities to facilitate the provision of support networks for those that are experiencing a mental health issue;
  - (d) educating the public on the importance of understanding mental health and the need for parity of esteem in how we view this with physical health.
- (2) To promote community capacity building through developing diverse networks of individuals and groups that are able to be involved in improving local mental health services in areas of England and Wales.
- (3) The advancement of citizenship or community development through promoting the efficiency and effectiveness of charities and the effective use of charitable resources by representing a range of views to policy makers and funders on improving mental health services in England and Wales.
- (4) To advance community development through the promotion of volunteering and the voluntary sector in the role it can play for improving mental health services locally and nationally in England and Wales.
- (5) To advance such charitable purposes (according to the law of England and Wales) as the trustees see fit from time to time, in particular but not limited to advancing the education of individuals and groups working in the health sector by making grants and awards to user-led mental health groups.

The trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit and provide the following information in relation to activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to those objects:

- (1) For the public benefit, to advance the health of individuals and groups in England and Wales by:
  - (a) representing the needs of the membership of IMHN in improving the provision of mental health services;

Members of the organisation have been involved in representing those accessing mental health services across Bristol in contract and performance monitoring meetings of services. This has been done through ensuring the voices of those experiencing services "on the ground" are heard by senior leadership in service providers and commissioning, providing opportunities for meaningful service improvement work to take place.

Members were also involved in an initiative to redevelop Bristol's mental health crisis line, helping people to be able to access better support and signposting information.

(b) working collaboratively with commissioners, service providers and other agencies to identify innovative health solutions that will improve the health of local communities;

We have co-produced mental health crisis cards with mental health service providers and commissioners, providing additional information and support for those who may be experiencing a mental health crisis.

> (c) working with individuals and local groups in communities to facilitate the provision of support networks for those that are experiencing a mental health issue;

We run monthly meetings for members to come together and share their lived experiences and feedback on how things could be improved for the future.

We also hosted "PD and Me" meetings, focusing on informal peer support for those experiencing a personality disorder (PD), irrespective of whether there was a formal diagnosis or not. These came about due to a lack of available support for people with PD in Bristol and the South West, and was led by people with lived experience of PD with administrative support from the CIO.

> (d) educating the public on the importance of understanding mental health and the need for parity of esteem in how we view this with physical health.

The organisation proudly supports the work of Time to Change, a national campaign seeking to end mental health stigma and discrimination. Several of our members our Time to Change Champions,

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects (include within this section the statutory declaration that trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit) and have attended public events to engage in social contact techniques to positively challenge people's perceptions and reduce stigma.

#### (2) To promote community capacity building through developing diverse networks of individuals and groups that are able to be involved in improving local mental health services in areas of England and Wales.

Membership of the organisation has increased during this period, with new people becoming involved in improving mental health services both in formal settings and informal settings. This has also included supporting member groups to develop their own capacity with work such as website development.

We have also worker with an existing lived experience led group to setup our second branch: Clarity – NSIMHN. They operate in North Somerset giving a voice to those in more rural settings.

#### (3) The advancement of citizenship or community development through promoting the efficiency and effectiveness of charities and the effective use of charitable resources by representing a range of views to policy makers and funders on improving mental health services in England and Wales.

Members of the organisation have regularly fed back to policy makers and funders about delivering better mental health services based on lived experience perspectives of both those who are members of the organisation and those who are not.

This has included promoting the effective work that lived experience led charitable organisations can carry out when there are opportunities to do so.

#### (4) To advance community development through the promotion of volunteering and the voluntary sector in the role it can play for improving mental health services locally and nationally in England and Wales.

IMHN has promoted the role of the voluntary sector in improving mental health services throughout many of its activities. This has included supporting the creation of a second branch in North Somerset to further enhance this role.

(5) To advance such charitable purposes (according to the law of England and Wales) as the trustees see fit from time to time, in particular but not limited to advancing the education of individuals and groups working in the health sector by making grants and awards to user-led mental health groups.

Whilst no formal awards have been made during the first financial period of the CIO, the organisation has partnered with other user-led groups in order to deliver a national event called Peerfest. Work on this began in April 2017, with the event taking place after the end of the financial year in October 2017. г

This allows us to take more sovereignty of our spending, makes us more accountable to our members and opens the door for fundraising and the diversification of our funding streams.</li> <li>The Independent Mental Health Network is now registered with the Charity Commission. This proves that we fulfil the criteria set by the charity commission. This registration means that we display a standard of professionalism and competence that will be attractive to those who may be able to offer us funding streams.</li> <li>In addition to our first branch (the Bristol Independent Mental Health Network) we have added a second branch the North Somerset Independent Mental Health Network (NSIMHN – Clarity) that operates in North Somerset to our organisation. This we hope is the first of many new branches to the Network.</li> <li>All Board meetings have been quorate in 2017, helping to focus on developing a strong independent voice for those with lived</li> </ul>
	<ul> <li>experience of mental health.</li> <li>We have led inpatient ward visits, seeking to ensure those on mental health wards are empowered to have a voice about their experiences of their mental health care.</li> <li>We have worked with the local clinical commissioning group and mental health service providers to protect the mental health crisis line and improve the support it is able to provide to people experiencing a mental health crisis.</li> <li>We have led on work to re-develop information available to the public about available mental health services in the Bristol area via the Bristol Mental Health website.</li> <li>We have co-produced mental health crisis cards with mental health service providers and commissioners, providing additional information and support for those who may be experiencing a mental health crisis.</li> <li>We have led a review of lived experienced feedback on mental health crisis houses provision in Bristol, making recommendations that are now being implemented. These include the introduction of a Trans* protocol to ensure members of the Trans* community are treated fairly by the houses.</li> </ul>
