From the Chair

There are over 100,000 people in the UK with severe or profound and multiple learning difficulties – 'complex needs' – who find it a lot more challenging than others to learn, understand and interact with the world around them. They are likely to need full time support to be able eat, speak and even move. Yet every one of these people has the ability to engage with music at some level. Indeed, music may be a vital element in their lives, helping with communication and interaction with others and, above all, offering a unique source of pleasure and fulfilment.

Yet the need for appropriate musical activities – the right to have access to music – is often absent.

This is where Soundabout steps in. Our specially trained team of music practitioners work across the UK to empower those working with or caring for people with learning disabilities to use music to help them to interact with the world. Just because someone has a disability doesn't mean that they are disabled musically and our highly successful methods – which we have been using since the charity's inception over 20 years ago – require no musical expertise to use them.

We are a charity that works with people across the whole of their lives, but there are three times of particular challenge for families of children with complex needs, on which we intend to focus. From the moment shortly after birth when diagnosis hits, through the transition out of school when these young people reach 19, and again when they reach middle age and their own parents are no longer able to give them the care that they need.

This year, thanks to incredible work from our team we have trained up 520 teachers, teaching assistants and practitioners across the UK, directly helped 1,343 people with learning disabilities, alongside their families and carers, and reached 108 children via our Youth Music funded Sounds of Intent in the Early Years sessions.

We are very grateful to Mark Smyth for his leadership during this period and are delighted to welcome Clare Cook who has previously held leadership roles at the charities Missing People, Child Bereavement UK and Great Ormond Street Hospital, as Soundabout's new CEO.

The charity's fundraising has also been re-invigorated from a challenging transition year in 2016, creating a stable platform upon which future developments can be built. Nonetheless, our resources are inevitably limited, and there remain many people in need across the UK who are not able to access our help. Under Clare's leadership, we are aiming to continue our recent growth over the next five years to ensure that our vision – that everyone with a severe or profound learning disability can access music as a means of communication – moves closer to becoming a reality.

With the help of our brilliant supporters, funders, partner organisations, staff and volunteers, we believe that this will happen.

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Structure, governance and management

Nature of governing document

Soundabout initially became a registered charity in November 1997 and then registered as a company limited by guarantee without share capital (number 05023067) on 22 January 2004 and registered charity (number 1103002) on 02 April 2004. Its governing document is its Memorandum and Articles of Association dated 22 January 2004.

Organisation

Soundabout is led by an experienced Board of Trustees who, together with the Chief Executive, ensure that the charity delivers its aims. The Board of Trustees has overall responsibility for governing the charity's strategy and finances, and monitoring its performance. Day to day activities are the responsibility of the Chief Executive and managers. The Chief Executive reports to the Trustees, and the managers report to the Chief Executive.

Recruitment and appointment of Trustees.

Trustee candidates are required to submit a CV and undergo an interview with the Chair. The Chair will then invite selected candidates to meet the Chief Executive, and representatives of the other Trustees.

Charity infrastructure: employees and volunteers

Soundabout employs five part-time staff (equating to two FTE) and contracts the services of seven freelance practitioners. Soundabout continues to have a highly motivated and expert staff team.

Our equal opportunities statement

Soundabout is committed to providing equality of opportunity for the children, young people, adults, professional practitioners, families and carers with whom it works. It values and respects their diversity.

Soundabout welcomes difference in its staff and volunteers. Charitable activities of public benefit

Trustees have complied with their duty in Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have paid due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit in deciding which duties the charity should undertake.

Our beneficiaries are of all ages and live in challenging circumstances. They experience a range of conditions such as autism, learning difficulties, social, emotional and behavioural difficulties and neurological, sensory and physical disabilities.

Our charitable activities of public benefit include:

Delivering regular free or partially-funded music making sessions for people with learning disabilities and their families and carers.

Delivering high quality free or partially-funded training to teachers, teaching assistants, parents and carers in Soundabout's interactive communication methods.

Producing/supplying free or partially-funded resources and musical instruments for teachers, teaching assistants, parents and carers to use to interact musically with the people in their care.

The public benefit arising from Soundabout's work is implicit in the services delivered and the assistance given to disabled children, young people and adults to help them reach their full potential, which benefits society as well as the beneficiaries themselves.



Achievements and impact

Making music in the community

Soundabout delivered 239 Community Music Making sessions, reaching out to and engaging with 1,343 children, young people and adults with learning disabilities, and their families and carers.

Making music in "the wild"

The charity provided 22 of our innovative 'Sounds Wild' sessions for seven schools, 174 pupils and 120 teachers and assistants. Sounds Wild is a highly popular music nature based programme, which we deliver for schools in nature reserves, and work with the children to make music in the natural world.

Making music in the early years

Soundabout delivered the last year of a three-year project funded by Youth Music entitled 'Sounds of Intent in the Early Years'. The team delivered 100 sessions to young children in 10 Children's Centres in England, reaching 85 children in 2017.

Empowering others – our extensive training programme

Soundabout provides training to musicians, teaching staff, learning support staff and carers which:

- Enhances the lives and potential of people with disabilities and special needs through music
- Improves the confidence and skills of teaching and support staff in using music, sound and rhythm as a medium for developing communication and learning for young people with learning difficulties
- Improves the confidence and assurance of staff in enabling the pupil to lead the sessions

In 2017, we provided 112 days training to 520 teaching staff and professionals in schools, at conference and early years settings. Two hundred and fifty two pupils were also able to access Soundabout's interactive music sessions.

In addition:

- We developed key work with Essex and Wolverhampton Music Education Hubs, and developed our strategic mapping with Haringey and Lewisham Music Hubs, thanks to funding from the Merchant Taylors' Company in London
- In the second year of our three-year Youth Music funded partnership project in Greater Essex - 'A bright Future for SEND music - we delivered and supported a 20-week project (60 sessions for 45 pupils) in two schools. This is a collaborative project between Soundabout, Greater Essex and Special Schools in Greater Essex including Essex Music Hub, Thurrock Music Hub and Southend Music Hub
- In Wolverhampton, we developed a 39-week placement with our Development Practitioner, Will Taggart, working predominately in two schools with two 'Champions' from the Wolverhampton Music Service
- We continued to provide sustainable training in partnership with Roehampton University through the Post Graduate Certificate in Special Needs: Sounds of Intent, with nine students taking on the course this year
- We provided nine further regional training days as part of the 'Sounds of Intent in the Early Years' project



Fundraising

During 2017 Soundabout was supported by a range of charitable trusts and foundations and we are most grateful for the grants and donations totalling £284,668. The cost of fundraising in 2017 was £6,872.

Corporate and community fundraising highlights included:

- The launch of our Charity of the Year partnership with the New Theatre, Oxford, raising over £2,500.
 The partnership also generated support from Bono, Billy Ocean, Mike and the Mechanics and many more celebrities who signed a Resonance Board for the charity to auction
- Sarah and Trustee John Hall ran their hugely popular annual open-day garden party at Chalkhouse Green Farm in Reading raising over £2,500
- Special thanks to James Redden for his 350-mile solo ski across Norway, raising over £1,500 having been inspired by a young Soundabout participant called Toby
- The charity also had a team of people taking part in the inclusive 'Parallel London' running event at the Olympic Park in London, raising over £2,500.

Moving home

In 2017, after many hours of planning and preparation, we moved to the accessible Cornerstone Arts Centre. We are grateful to the management and staff at Cornerstone for welcoming us into our new home. The staff and visitors now have the benefit of fully accessible lifts, Changing Places toilets and doors, and a vibrant café for families to meet and greet before and after sessions. We are now in a very strong position to develop our community programme in partnership with families and partner organisations.

Plans for the future

GOAL 1:

To increase income generation to £500,000 per year by 2022, with at least 25% unrestricted income, to help achieve the plans for increased reach and impact.

How?

- 1. Develop our already strong relationships with philanthropic funders by offering long-term sustainable projects for their support
- 2. Diversify our income streams to include corporate and community fundraising, major gifts and individual giving
- **3.** Demonstrate the impact of Soundabout's work more clearly to funders

Notes to the financial for the year ended 31 December 2017

1. Accounting policies

Statutory Information

Soundabout Ltd is a private company, limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales. The company's registered number and registered office can be found on the company information page. The presentation currency of the financial statements is the Pound Sterling (£).

Accounting convention

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention and in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice for charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Incoming resources/Turnover

Income has been recognised on the following basis:

- Donations and grants are generally recognised when received.
- Invoiced income is accrued monthly.
- Interest income is recognised on receipt.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis.

Allocation of expenditure

Salary and related staff costs are directly allocated to a charitable activity or other resources expended heading on the basis of time spent. The charity distinguishes between overhead costs in support of its charitable work, for example course administration, marketing and training equipment, and general administration costs. Both categories of overhead are allocated to fundraising, charitable activity and governance costs based on the amount of direct expenditure incurred.

Amortisation

Amortisation is calculated to write off the cost of intangible fixed assets on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives at the following rate:

Website and software: Straight line, 3 years

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated to write off the cost or revalued amount less estimated residual value of fixed assets on a straight line basis over their estimated useful lives at the following rate:

Training equipment: Straight line, 3 years Office equipment: Straight line, 3 years

Fund accounting

Funds held by the charity are:

Unrestricted funds – these are funds which can be used in accordance with the charitable objects at the discretion of the Trustees. Income is recognised as unrestricted income when the charity becomes entitled to the income as a result of activities already performed and any pre-conditions have been met. Where this is not the case the income is deferred and not included in incoming resources until the activities have been performed.

Designated funds - these comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the Trustees for particular purposes. The aim and use of each designated fund is set out in the Trustees Report; any movements are in the notes to the financial statements.

Restricted funds - these are funds that can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes. The Trustees monitor and discuss the restricted funds at meetings to ensure the - restricted expenditure is allocated accordingly.
