Trustees' Report

The Trustees of The Rhema Pentecostal Church-UK (The RPC Family) takes pleasure in submitting their report, and accounts for the year ended 31st December 2017. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out on page 7 and comply with the statement of recommended practice.

Constitution, objective of the charity, principal activity and organisation of our work The charity is constituted under a trust deed dated 25th October 2011 as amended on the 18th February 2012, and registered on 10th April 2012, with UK registered charity no. 1146816 The objectives of the charity as set out in Declaration of trust are:

- The advancement of the Christian faith, the word of God and the full gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ in accordance with the tenets of faith in such ways and in such parts of the United Kingdom and the world as the trustees may from time to time determine.
- 2. Such charitable purposes for the public benefit as are exclusively charitable according to the laws of England and Wales as the trustees may from time to time determine.

The RPC Family in the year of review was involved in both Christian outreach and general charitable programmes in the United Kingdom and parts of Africa as a whole.

✓ The Christian outreach programmes were designed to increase Christian awareness and spread the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ while the general charitable programmes involved education, relief of poverty and community development.

Development activities and achievements:

The trustees are pleased to report that the Church has been successful spiritually by ministering to many people.

Our Achievements:

- 1. The RPC Family in the year under review organised seminars/workshops whereby Christian values and morals were taught with the focus of healthy living (life styles) and good parenting in the society. Parents were advised to keep watch on their children and support them in doing their homework.
- 2. Youth Ministry: The youth ministry activities were awesome, as many families are daily joining our church due to our youth advice services, school homework club programmes and other intervention activities available to them here in Derby both in and outdoor.
- 3. Children Ministry: The Judah generation (Children ministry) at The RPC Family has had a fundamental growth both in the intellectual knowledge of God and the physical and social growth of our children. Our after school and holiday biblical and fun filled activities have encouraged parents to bring their children to church thus a great increase in the church children department.

- 4. Through our Tuesdays and Wednesdays Counselling and Advice services, we have supported the sick, poor, needy and others facing divorce, separation and various crises in life. Through this service, many people were sent to seek GP advice and are now receiving treatment for their diabetes and HIV/Aids status.
- 5. The RPC Family is in partnership with the Organisation for Better Environment and Childcare (OBECC), where we help families with children and young people in Derby, Derbyshire and midlands.
- 6. The Rhema Pentecostal Church-UK has been fully involved in welcoming migrants from all over the world, especially people from Italy, German, Sierra Leone, Kenya, Ghana, Nigeria, Malawi, Zambia, Uganda and Zimbabwe. We developed a welcome pack which helped to introduce Derby and the Midlands to the newly arrival. Through the church Hospitality, Welfare Ministry and our Outreach Ministry, the migrants, asylum seekers and the refugees have been welcomed and supported to settle within the community.
- 7. Welfare Program: Through our Welfare programs, donation has been given in Support of the less privileged within our community. The beneficiaries are those who do not have access to public funds for a variety of reasons and this is a valuable means of support until their financial situation changes. We freely distribute food and household products through our food bank, many of these items were donated by the local church community (with the assistance of individual church and none church members). Rent support and cash donations were given to families.
- 8. Sick and vulnerable people and members have been supported through our volunteer scheme project. Our Charity/volunteer workers assists the sick in washing their clothes (laundry), transporting those who are unable to come for our services due to lack of transport and shopping for them, taking them for a walk, to a recreation centre and church activities.
- Established Church Branches: Through the help of God, new branches of The RPC
 Family were established in Nigeria and Ghana. These branch churches are fully
 registered with the government of Nigeria and Ghana.
 - ✓ Nigeria Branch:

Two years lease agreement was secured for the church premises in Nigeria and one-year lease agreement was secured for the head Pastor as a mission house. The pastorate of The RPC Family in Nigeria has been supported financially to the glory of God.

- ✓ Ghana Branch:
 - Even though the branch church in Ghana is fully registered with the government of Ghana, they are still operating as a satellite branch until we can secure church premises where its charitable purposes, aim and objective can be fulfilled.
- 10. Missionary assignment: The Church through its missionary assignment has established a Welfare funds programme for vulnerable people who are heavy laden and are seeking God but are deprived of spiritual and physical assistance in Ghana,

Nigeria, South Africa, Malawi and in Kenya. Through our financial and aid support to these countries, the Organisation has successfully helped many orphans, widows and the destitute through relief of poverty and community development programmes during the year of review.

✓ The RPC Family supports both the spiritual and physical well-being of the children and young people in these African countries through educational programmes such as after school homework clubs, distribution of learning materials, prayer and counselling sessions.

Through the Year of review, many Christians and non-Christians attended our services and many re-dedicated their lives to our Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ. To God be the Glory.

Review of the financial position

The charity made a deficit for the year amounting to £648.00.
