#### Vicar's Report 2017

March 2018

In preparing to write this report I read last years and was tempted just to copy it as it says all I want to say again - primarily **thank you** to each of you for your help and support and to celebrate all that has happened during the year.

In Matthew's Gospel chapter 6v33 we read, "But seek first his kingdom and his righteousness, and all these things will be given to you as well."

As I reflect on these words of Jesus, as he was encouraging his hearers not to worry, my thoughts turn to the importance of prayer and how I would like to encourage the Church to commit to a greater focus on prayer this coming year.

I found these words from Psalm 5 verse 3 helpful,

"In the morning, O LORD, you hear my voice; in the morning I lay my requests before you and wait in expectation."

The psalmist who penned Psalm 5:3 models the attitude we should have when we pray—that of eager expectation. We should believe God will answer our prayers and diligently watch for his hand at work. The psalmist also shows us that when we pray early in the day, we have the rest of the day to anticipate God's answer. I wonder whether, as we strive to know what God's will for Sprowston is, we could encourage members of the congregation to join the team in prayer. We regularly meet at St. Cuthbert's each weekday at 8.30 in the morning and 5.15 in the evening.

As I encourage you join us I also want to thank you all for all you have done this year. We have achieved a great deal and miraculously have again broken even financially. At the risk of repeating myself I must again warn that the year ahead will be tough, particularly as we seem to have water ingress in the buildings so work will need to be done this year.

I must admit that it is easy to become focused on the wrong things or even the things that go wrong so I am encouraging us all to seek first the kingdom which I believe is through us all spending more time in prayer and bible study.

This year we have welcomed Rev'd Philip to the team as Curate. We look forward to his Priesting on 1 July. This time last year we were about to launch the 'Filling Station' ministry and, a year on, we can report this has been successful, even if it has not quite reached the group of people we had hoped. As you know, we are about to launch an interesting project at the car boot in Sprowston.

Each of you is a marvel and a wonder and I rejoice in God calling Christine and I to serve alongside you. As we embark on a year of more prayer I do want to stress not only how important this is, but to encourage all of you that you all make a difference and the prayers from each of us is honoured by God. Thank you to the PCC, our wonderful wardens Sheila and Sue, to those who clean and those who make coffee and those who lead preach intercede, read and provide the music. The list goes on so it is simpler and safer to thank you all.

Each one of us is important to the kingdom of heaven here in Sprowston – let's make Christ known in our community.

#### **REVIEW OF THE YEAR 2017**

The PCC met six times during the year for evening meetings and the Standing Committee met in between these meetings. The various sub committees – Site, Children Youth & Family, Social, Fundraising and Communications – met regularly during the year reporting to the PCC as well as being asked to do certain things by the PCC.

The clergy staff team of Canon Simon, Revd Dean, Revd Melanie and student minister Andy Bunter was further boosted by the arrival of Revd Phillip, our Curate. Amongst other things the Filling Station group continues to meet at Sprowston Hall, there have been Exploring Christianity courses running in conjunction with Sprowston Churches Together and work with SYEP is progressing well, plus we will shortly have a regular presence at the Sprowston Car Boot Sale. Andy has now been accepted as a Pioneer Trainee Minister. Ashley Williams has begun Lay Reader training.

Improvement and updating of our website and parish magazine continue, with our Communications group always looking to expand and improve on the ways we promote the parish in general along with events and services.

The church finances ended in the black (just) despite a difficult year. This was due to much prayer and hard work by many and our thanks to you all, especially Amanda Hunt for her work as Treasurer. We have again had to set a deficit budget and with the urgent repairs required to both St Mary and St Margaret's roof and St Cuthbert's roof we need your prayers and any help you can offer in order to fulfil our commitments this year.

Fire Risk Assessments have taken place at each church and some alterations made following recommendations. The main heater in the Annexe has had to be replaced & asbestos removed at same time. A meeting/gathering area has been created quite simply at SM & SM and has received good feedback. There are various other plans to improve areas at each church, but obviously running repairs take priority. The new Fundraising Committee is working on obtaining large grants for repairs & future projects, but it can be quite a long process from initial application to receiving any monies.

There has been training held for those who welcome people on a Sunday, along with awareness of duties in the event of any emergency. Updates in safeguarding and data protection have been discussed and implications accepted. All PCC members will be DBS checked and GDPR (General Data Protection Regulations) will require rethinking in a number of areas including new forms for making contact with people, holding information and using photos and details.

The bore hole next to the church we support in India has been completed and is in use – the community there are very grateful.

The Messy Church events have been expanded to include a Messy Harvest which went very well last autumn. Although it would be nice to offer Messy Church monthly we are not ready to do that presently.

Possible parish boundary changes have been proposed by the Diocese which were discussed at length and a reply sent explaining that we are unhappy about the majority of the changes to Sprowston parish. We await further developments about this.

A Lindisfarne Pilgrimage has been organised and booked to take place at the end of this summer, which will involve visiting various places relating to St Cuthbert. We plan to share thoughts and pictures with the congregations afterwards.

#### **CHURCHWARDENS REPORT 2017**

#### February 2018

Simon McFarlane, our longstanding church warden, stood down at the annual meeting in April 2017 and we would like to begin by paying tribute to Simon, and to Jane, for their contribution to the life of our churches. We hope that they will enjoy their "retirement" in north Norfolk and we look forward to them joining us as and when possible in the future. Sue Ellingham was elected to serve alongside Sheila but could not officially start her role until licensed at the Cathedral in June. Sue is extremely grateful to Sheila, Canon Simon and the clergy and lay team, Julie Hagan-Palmer, all PCC members and the congregations for their continued support and guidance as she has begun learning about the myriad complexities of the warden role.

During 2017, we have begun to address many pressing issues identified in the quinquennial reports (St Cuthbert's 2016 and St Mary and St Margaret's 2015) on both churches. Whilst the general fabric of both buildings remains in a generally reasonable state of repair, substantial work will be required as a matter of urgency to maintain the buildings for their longer term future. We have prioritised as the starting point, major work required on both roofs, alongside the need for a new heating system at St Mary and St Margaret's. To address these repairs, we will need to raise very large sums of money, likely to be in excess of £100,000 before moving on to other identified needs. Consequently, we have set up a grants and fundraising committee and you will be hearing much more about this as 2018 progresses.

The day to day maintenance of both churches complexes remains the responsibility of the site committee who continue to deal with problems as they arise. During 2017, an asbestos survey and testing where necessary was completed on both churches. This is to be used whenever any work is considered at either site so that the presence and location of any asbestos is taken fully into account by contractors or church volunteers.

We are also required to present and report on the Terrier, Inventory and Log Book for both churches. These are kept in the church office and are available to be seen by any member of the congregation upon request. Our sacristans ensure that our silverware and ornaments remain in excellent condition. We would like to place on record our thanks to Pauline Richards at St Cuthbert's Church for her hard work in maintaining these items. At St Mary and St Margaret's, Liz Marsden retired as sacristan part way through 2017 and Tony Ashley-Griffiths has stepped up to replace her. Our thanks to both Liz and Tony, not only for caring for our silver and ornaments there but for working together to enable a seamless transition of responsibilities.

Bishop Graham undertook his 4 yearly visitation to the parish in 2017 which included being able to join us at a combined service followed by lunch. As well as speaking with members of the congregation, he held a formal meeting with wardens, readers and others with official duties, probing and astutely challenging us on our mission and vision for the parish in coming years. With the development of the Northern Distributor Road, changes are inevitable as housing and commercial developments continue to grow towards this new road. After these meetings, he spent time with Canon Simon and the rest of the clergy. We were very pleased to receive a positive assessment from him after his visit.

May 2018 will see the introduction of new data protection regulations, already commonly referred to as GDPR. These regulations apply to all organisations and have required us to undertake an audit of all personal data held within the church. Where necessary, we will need to be able to evidence that we have explicit consent for the data we hold and how we use it. Therefore, in line with guidance from the Church of England, the churchwardens and PCC have decided to ask everyone to sign a new data consent form. We hope that you will feel able to support us and Canon Simon by completing and returning any consent requests as quickly as possible.

Looking after both churches, attached land and buildings and all of the contents, as well as welcoming everyone who enters our churches, is not down to just the wardens, PCC and clergy teams. We would once again like to thank everyone who help to ensure that things run smoothly, from those who open and close the buildings, steward at services or act as vergers, arrange flowers or provide music, organise refreshments, who do cleaning or gardening, run events, contribute to the magazine, visit the sick, bereaved or those in need, to those who answer the calls for help, notice when someone isn't at their best, and just get on with things.

Finally, thank you for your support to us as we continue to serve you and the parish to the best of our ability.

# INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL OF SPROWSTON WITH BEESTON ST ANDREW

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2017 which comprise the Receipts and Payments Account, the Statement of Assets and Liabilities and the related notes.

#### Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 ("the Charities Act") and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

- examine the accounts under section 145 of the Charities Act;

#### Basis of independent examiner's statement

It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from the trustees concerning any such matters. # Stewardship and Gift Aid Report

During 2017, 46 donors gave via the Stewardship envelope scheme (the same number as in 2016), and 23 by Standing Order (up from 21 in 2016). This includes 4 who used both methods (as in 2016). Stewardship Renewal Sunday in September 2017 resulted in 41 responses (45 in 2016).

We again benefited from the "Gift Aid Small Donations" scheme (GASD), which enables charities to claim the equivalent of a tax refund in respect of cash donations that are not made under "Gift Aid" arrangements. For the year beginning 6<sup>th</sup> April 2016 the maximum amount claimable under GASD rose from £1,250 to £2,000 for each church building (though the level of our donation income did not qualify us to receive the full amount).

We continue to be grateful to those who do donate under "Gift Aid" arrangements (42 in 2017, from 43 in 2016) under which a refund of the tax which they have already paid can be claimed by the Church. This continues to be worthwhile, as it means the Church benefits from amounts that would not fall within the GASD arrangements already mentioned. These include payments of more than £20 on one occasion, or amounts paid via cheque or Standing Order.

#### **COMMITTEES AND TEAMS**

Most of the practical work of the PCC is carried out by small teams. They have some devolved responsibility but where wider policy issues are involved or more than routine expenditure is involved, they bring proposals to a meeting of the PCC. The teams are able to co-opt any member of the church who wishes to be involved in a specific sphere of work.

#### Site Management Committees - St Cuthbert's and St Mary & St Margaret's

Members of these committees take on the responsibility of ensuring the day to day maintenance of the church buildings. This also involves monitoring health and safety and ensuring access for people with disabilities.

The team prepares proposals for larger scale maintenance and for developing our buildings as more effective tools for mission.

St Cuthbert's site committee incorporates responsibilities for the Church Centre and Annexe.

#### Children, Youth and Family Team

This team brings together those who are concerned for, or working with, children and young people in church. It aims to make the church more inclusive of younger people and families.

#### **Standing Committee**

This is the only committee required by law and meets before PCC meetings to set the agenda. It has the power, when necessary, to transact the business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the Council.

This committee works with the Treasurer to monitor income and expenditure, budgeting, preparing the annual accounts and report for the Annual Parochial Church meeting and with the staff team to ensure regular teaching about Christian giving.

The Standing Committee consists of Reverend Canon Simon Stokes, Reverend Melanie Hider, churchwardens, treasurer, secretary and two other members of the PCC (Robert Huntly and Bryan Carpenter).

# **TEAM AND COMMITTEE REPORTS**

#### NORWICH NORTH DEANERY SYNOD REPORT

The Synod met three times, gathering at a different church in the Deanery each time. All Deanery clergy can attend meetings and each parish has elected Deanery Synod representatives who attend. The Deanery Synod discusses issues from Diocesan and General Synods as well as choosing relevant subjects to look at. Representatives then report back to their PCCs and seek views on certain matters.

We had a presentation on Work with refugees and asylum seekers by Carrie Sante. We learned that Norwich is a dispersal city for asylum seekers with support in place to help people integrate, find somewhere to live and make proper application to stay. In 2016 there were 91 new asylum seekers who arrived in Norwich. Several different agencies are involved – City Saints, City Reach Health Services, New Routes, English Plus, Bridge Plus, and House to Home. It is important to remember that refugees and asylum seekers are not just poor people, they are often educated people who have had to move away from their homes and countries at very short notice. It is best to go through an organisation to get help for someone rather than to try and help someone on your own.

Social Media - A largely positive discussion that recognised that many younger people look to social media as a key means of communication. Although it was not exclusively the province of the younger members, the challenge was to "bridge this gap" and understand how the inspiring work of the church could be broadcast to a wider audience. The parishes were encouraged to share examples of their experiences of using social media, eg websites, Facebook, Twitter, etc. This provoked a useful discussion over what worked well and how much time and effort might be involved and the best methods to use.

Same sex relationships and marriages - In a nut shell the current position is that we accept civil partnerships for clergy and laity but clergy partnerships Must be celibate. Clergy can bless a relationship between 2 people of the opposite sex, but can't bless a relationship between 2 people of the same sex. A number of people from the gay community no longer attend church because of the response they have had within the church. A lot of the way we think about sexual ethics comes from the middle ages and Thomas Aquinas. Rejection is hard whatever that rejection is/involves & we shouldn't reject love within the church. We are all blessed every Sunday so rules for blessing a relationship seem odd. It is important to be informed in our thinking and our praying.

A Deanery Pilgrimage Day with Bishop Jonathan was organised in September. A number of people from the Deanery accompanied the Bishop as he visited a variety of different sites, offering prayers and being a witness to the public.

A Deanery Handbook has been produced plus each meeting we have a "Who's Who" section when we hear a personal resume from a member of the clergy and a member of the lay representatives, which is helping us to know each other better.

#### JOINT SITE COMMITTEE

Early in 2017 the Site committees for the two church sites re-combined, and now hold a joint meeting each month to deal with matters relating to the maintenance, repair and management of our premises. Additionally, during 2017, monitoring of the progress of the Parish Church Development plan has been incorporated under this committee.

Following the Fire Inspection of both sites, a joint meeting for stewards/welcomers was held to highlight fire and evacuation procedures and precautions at both churches.

In 2017 Jerry Duncombe, the Annexe cleaner and site gardener for many years, retired due to ill-health (and sadly has subsequently died).

#### St. Mary & St. Margaret's

items dealt with during 2017/18 included:

- An asbestos survey of the site identified 4 items, 3 of them requiring attention.
- Floor deterioration in the kitchen/toilet extension led to installation of ventilation grilles to alleviate dampness.
- Installation of a bench (donated in memory of John and Joan Lindsay) in the Churchyard, incorporating re-burial of the old font remnants beneath.
- Adaptation of part of the north aisle to form a hospitality area.

Matters currently under consideration (as at March 2018) include:

- Installation of a galley kitchen at the west end of the north aisle, to enable the present kitchen to become a meeting room.
- Improvement and addition to Churchyard pathways.
- Roof and guttering repairs, arising from the Quinquennial Inspection.
- · Consideration of long term improvements to the heating system.

## St. Cuthbert's Site

items dealt with during 2017/18 included:

- Adapting two fire exit doors leading from church into corridor, and fitting an additional emergency exit light, following the Fire Inspection.
- Updating of Conditions of Hire, following Quinquennial and Fire reports.
- Security of the gallery, following the theft of radio microphone equipment.
- Replacement of the Annexe gas heater (through insurance claim), following an asbestos survey which identified 7 items, 2 of them requiring attention.
- Remedial work to the Annexe electrical supply, following a power failure.
- Replacement of the Centre kitchen wall-boiler, courtesy of Sprowston Daycentre.
- Repair of the roof gulley between the St. Cuthbert's and Centre roofs.
- Redecoration of the former "Snug", thanks to Dennis Chettleborough.
- Redecoration of the Annexe, thanks to Andy Bunter (SYEP) and helpers.

Matters currently under consideration (as at March 2018) include:

- Extending the fire alarm system to cover the whole site.
- Roof repairs as highlighted by the Quinquennial Report.
- Refurbishment of Centre kitchen.
- Improvements to the grounds.

NB: The committee works in conjunction with the Grant-finding team, as external funding will be necessary for much of the work under consideration.

#### ANNEXE DEVELOPMENT GROUP

This group continues to meet to progress plans for improvement of the Annexe, as detailed in last year's report. The items identified as "first priority" for attention are currently:

- The deteriorated eastern boundary fence, and grassed area.
- Improved (ramp) access to the former "Snug" outer door, in anticipation that this will become the new entrance to the Annexe (the old entrance lobby then becoming a cupboard space).
- Toilet area to be refurbished and adapted for disabled accessibility, in accordance with the requirements of current Building Regulations etc.

(NB: Funding for this project also is dependent sourcing appropriate grants etc.)

# **Funding Committee**

The group has reviewed the quinquennial report for Sprowston Parish and from that document and a consultation with the Church architect have created a job description for the immediate works that need doing to St Cuthbert's and St Mary's and Margaret's Churches. Having received quotes we are now in the process of sifting through the possible places where we can apply for funding and creating the applications.

This group would like to thank the PCC for giving them the room to explore funding opportunities and are looking forward to creating our applications and exploring the possibility of obtaining funding for our Church.

Funding isn't going to replace people's contributions through giving and any funding received will go along side the faithful giving of people in our Church to concurrently support our Church life and missional aims.

We would ask for you prayers specifically for guidance on which applications to submit, for bravery in going for them and for God's grace and guidance through the awarding of grants, or not as God would will it.

Over the Christmas period we saw shepherds at the Brickmakers Carol concert, and some pretty rough and ready Angels at the Christingle services; Revd Philip shone as outback Angel Bruce!

Following the Christmas period I was able to focus on this year's alternative Pasion Play. Another self-written production, this time adopting ideas and themes from C.S Lewis' Narnia stories, and placing them in a contemporary context. "Beyond the wardrobe" followed three "grown up" children negotiating the complex world of relationships, gender politics, love and sacrifice, through the timeless world of childhood dreams and nightmares. The Play explored the Passion story through the Character's relationship with the "lion" and borrowed some of the imagery from the book of Revelation in their encounters with a "Dragon" who seeks power and control. Ultimately the Lion turns into a Lamb and overcomes the darkness through sacrificial love; revealing to the "children" what adulthood really means. I wish to thank the cast and technical crew on what was an ambitious production; it was well received, not least by Bishop Graham and the Archdeacon who happened to drop by. # Enabling churches to house the homeless

#### **Working with Hope into Action**

Hope into Action (HIA) was founded by a group of Christians in 2010 who believe in the local church and want to see Christians and Church at the forefront of social reform and provides homes for the homeless for two years until they can find alternative provision. Homelessness comes about for a variety of reasons, relationship break up, mental health problems, loss of job and it could happen to anyone. It has no government funding but approaches investors to buy the houses and then makes them suitable for at least 2 residents, each having their own bedroom and lounge and sharing the other facilities. They are supported by the staff at H. I. A. to enable them to cope with their difficulties and hopefully turn their lives around. HIA then work with a team of volunteers from a local church who support and befriend the residents.

In Sprowston we have been working with HIA since 2014 and our house "Salthouse", The "Friendship and Support" team offer a listening ear, help with transport to various appointments and other general good neighbour support.

#### SYEP YOUTH DROP-IN CAFE

(Sprowston Youth Engagement Project)



This has been another great year in terms of engagement and development for SYEP. The project has engaged with over 100 young people through the various different opportunities we provide for young people.

#### Community Green House Project -

Our joint intergenerational gardening project has been running successfully for a year and we have engaged with 13 young people. Although numbers have not been high, the quality of the work that has been delivered with this group has been brilliant. The project would not have been as successful in terms of outcomes for our young people if we had worked with large groups. This is why the project works really well for young people who struggle with confidence, self-esteem, mental health issues and learning difficulties. It's a nice, friendly and relaxed environment, where young can be themselves and learn how to grow plants. It's been amazing to see the positive relationships formed between the young people and our older volunteers, who have worked in a collaborative way to ensure the green houses can continue to run.

#### Sprowston Teen Café -

Sessions have been well attended over the past year with 70 young people attend the project. We have a core group of around 50 young people who attend on a regular basis and sessions are accessed by between 35 and 45 young people weekly. We have run a number activities which includes - indoor and outdoor sports, cake making sessions, music sessions, pizza nights, sumo suits and lots more. Sessions have also been delivered by outside organisations, including the Matthew Project, Know your Pride, The Sprowston Dementia community, the Fire and rescue centre and Lola Stafford. A high number of our young people are now year 11 students so we are currently in the process of advertising to attract a new younger young people.

#### Old Catton Teen Café -

Again sessions have been well attended and we have engaged with 45 young people over the year. The projects has been run from two venues which works well. Again we have run a number of activities similar or the same as above. During the summer there has been more of a focus on outside sports activities, including football and rounders. Sessions are accessed by between 20 and 25 young people and we have a core group of around 35 young people.

#### YSA Young Volunteer Programme/ Young Committee -

This year we merged our young committee and young volunteer programme. 14 young people have taken part in these activities. Our volunteers programme involves young people designing and delivering two events over the funding year. The first event our young people joined forces with the Sprowston Dementia Community and held a 1950's tea dance for people living with dementia and their families, which was attend by over a 100 people. The young people visited another 1950's tea dance in Sheringham for research purposes, attended planning meetings, designed posters and completed the risk assessments, so was an opportunity to learn new skills as well as doing something positive for their community. They also completed Dementia Friends training and are now

Dementia Friends. They're now in the process of planning and holding a teddy bears picnic for children and families who have been struggling in some kind of way. They have involved the Spixworth and Sprowston Sure Start Centre and the Norwich Food bank and is looking to be a great day.

Over the summer the young people accessing our projects have taken part in a number of positive activities which includes - paintballing, quasar, tubing and three visits to Bitten Meadow with Ascend Adventure where young people took part in a number of outdoor activities. 8 young people, Judy Leggett, PC Nick Roberts, volunteers and workers took part in a 26 mile sponsored walk to raise money for SYEP.

#### SYEP FC -

This year we set up a football team at the request of some of the boys who attend our youth groups and is managed by Andy Bunter. These boys are some of our more challenging young people in terms of behaviour. By giving them something positive to focus on, in turn has had a positive impact on their behaviour. They play in the Christian League and have played some amazing games of football, winning matches with scores of 11-1, 12-1 and are close to winning the league.

#### **Open Youth Awards**

Both SYEP FC and our volunteers have been nominated and shortlisted for Team of the Year at the Open Youth Awards. The award ceremony was cancelled due to the bad weather and has been rescheduled for the 25<sup>th</sup> of April.

#### Feedback from a young person -

'At the beginning of this year I had a break down and I had to drop out of college and stopped seeing friends and went in on myself. For a few months I was agoraphobic and only went outside when I only really needed to but for many of the time I would just stay in my house but more than likely I would just stay in my room. I heard of syep through my old youth worker Clare and she brought me along to the gardening club, at first I was terrified, I didn't know what to expect and was shaking; when i arrived there that was the first and last time I have ever felt like that. I looked and still look forward to getting there because it has given me a space to grow independent again without feeling pressured. It is always a calm fun time going there, never have I once felt judged or felt any negativity while being there. It's given me a life again where I don't need to constantly depend on other people, it's given me the opportunity to feel a part of something again. I enjoy the fact I have something to focus on, the enjoyment of giving back to community and the enjoyment of just going there every Monday when I always know I'm wanted and missed if I'm not there. It's made me feel stable and alive again and i can't help but thank syep for that'.. Rachel


#### Safeguarding

# The Child Protection and Vulnerable Adult Policy Statement for Sprowston Parish

Members of this church commit themselves to the nurturing, protection and safekeeping of all, especially children, young people and vulnerable adults in their care.

- It is the responsibility of each one of us to prevent the physical, sexual and emotional abuse of children, young people and vulnerable adults and to report any abuse.
   Discovered or suspected.
- We recognise that our work with children, young people and vulnerable adults is the responsibility of the whole church.
- We undertake to exercise proper care in the selection and appointment of those working with children, young people and vulnerable adults, whether paid or volunteer.
- The church is committed to supporting, resourcing and training those who work with children, young people and vulnerable adults and to providing supervision. It is our aim to encourage these workers to undertake any relevant and necessary training.
- The church is committed to the guidelines and procedures published by the Diocese of Norwich dated 2014 (Safe Haven, the Protection of Children, Young People and Vulnerable Adults), a reference copy of which is kept in the church office.
- Our intention is to ensure that each worker with children, young people and vulnerable adults knows the recommendations of the Church's policy and undertakes to observe them. Each worker is expected to be familiar with the church's agreed procedures. Copies of these will be distributed to those who require them for their work either paid or voluntary capacity.
- As part of our commitment to children, young people and vulnerable adults, the church has appointed Claire Akrill to be the Named Person (contact number 01603 482360). This role will be regularly explained to children. She is responsible for ensuring all church workers have the necessary Disclosure and Barring Service (DBS, formerly CRB) clearance and complete a self-declaration form tri-annually.
