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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES for the year ended 31 December 2017

Background

St James PCC has the responsibility of co-operating with the Rector, the Rev'd Mark Pickett in promoting in the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelical, social and ecumenical. It also has the maintenance responsibilities for the Church Centre complex of St James', St James' Street, Clitheroe. It has responsibility in the employment of a part time Youth Worker, a Christians Against Poverty centre manager, a Church Administrator and a full time Children's and family worker. Finally, it has an important role to play in the support of St James' C of E Primary School.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Church Attendance

At the AGM in 2017 the electoral role membership stood at 239. The average adult Sunday attendance, counted during October 2017 was 155. The average Sunday Attendance of those aged 3-16 was 32. The number of children and young people attending mid-week activities was 35. Attendance on a 'normal' Sunday was 37 children and young people and 145 adults.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE Charitable activities Review of the Year.

A full review of all the activities at St James' can be found in the Annual Reports to the APCM.

This year we have continued to seek to fulfil our vision to know Jesus and make Jesus known. Sunday Worship and teaching are the springboard from which we witness in our community whether that be our locality or our network of relationships.

Preaching subjects this year have included:

Who is Jesus - a series on the book of Hebrews

A five weeks series on Money

Lent series on calling and vocation

10 homegroups meet weekly or fortnightly for discipleship, fellowship and support and often use the Sunday sermon as the basis for applying Christian truth to daily life.

We now stream our sermons live on Youtube and this is accessed regularly by members of the congregation and further afield.

Outreach to our community has remained a church focus with a monthly lunch club, weekly children and youth events.

Our partnership with our primary school continues with early intervention mentoring, after school clubs, regular assemblies. Our children and family worker continues to spend at least 10 hours a week in the school.

Outreach to the community amongst children continues with rockin', a weekly children's club.

A fresh expression for families called superheroes is held monthly reaching those that never attend church at any other time. This year we had our first baptism at this event.

The eighth On the Move Barbecue took place in June, where we joined with other Christians in the town to host a town wide barbecue on the Castle field.

Alpha groups have met throughout the year attracting many new to faith. 6 people have reaffirmed their baptismal vows this year.

We continue to partner mission at home and abroad with our mission tithe.

Our partnership with Kings Highway Church in Eldoret, Kenya has developed this year and we welcomed their chuch leaders; Henry, Francis and Fred to St James for two weeks in June.

We employed a new CAP centre manager in February but she left her post at the end of the calendar year. A new CAP centre manager begins work on May 1st 2018.

We have continued to support the Ribble Valley Foodbank.

United Network, a fresh expression of church continues to engage with those who do not relate to traditional church.

The rector took a three and a half month sabbatical this year and the Leadership Team stepped up admirably in his absence ably supported by a very good PCC and Readers.

The formation of a Joshua Group in September of those with leadership roles within the church has helped in shaping and influencing vision.

Our pioneer ordinand left us on ordination in July.

We continue to have a variety of worship styles in the church, from a traditional 9am service to more informal, contemporary worship.

We continue to employ a number of full and part-time staff. Jo Pellet is our part time youth pastor Nick Schumann works 15 hours as Church Administrator Helen Potts works as our full time children and family worker At present we have a vacancy in the CAP centre worker role.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

At the end of 2017 the total income received for the year into the PCC account was \pounds 313,667. Total expenditure was \pounds 285,021.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The PCC operates through one committee with a number of teams that meet between full meetings of the PCC. The Standing Committee, the only committee required by law, has power to transact the business of the PCC between its meetings subject to any directions given by the Council.

In order for the PCC to carry out its function of leadership, development and decision making a number of teams have been set up with the following terms of reference

Leadership Team

To receive vision - directly from God and via others

To distil and clarify vision

To communicate vision so as to inspire others

To ensure implementation of vision (including determining and modifying strategy). Setting strategic, measurable and time quantifiable goals and then monitoring progress

Fabric Team

To oversee the day to day maintenance of the church buildings

To work closely with the Church Administrator and Development Officer in the carrying out of work to the building.

To ensure the work from the Quinquennial Inspection is carried out.

To report to the PCC work needed, planned and completed.

Finance Team

To oversee the finances of the church.

To support the Treasurer in the setting of yearly budgets.

To ensure the church is kept informed about Christian Stewardship including the envelope scheme, direct debit giving, legacies etc.

To bring a financial report to each PCC meeting

Ministry Team

To find ways to support these areas and agencies

To allocate money from the annual mission tythe to be given to each area or agency

To report regularly to the PCC

To review annually areas and agencies supported

Each team reports to the PCC where decisions are made. The PCC has met 5 times during the year. Minutes or written or verbal reports of meetings or groups were received by the PCC and discussed where necessary.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS for the year ended 31 December 2017

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention with the exception of investments which are included at market value, as modified by the revaluation of certain assets.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Church equipment	- 10% on cost
Plant and machinery	- 15% on cost
Motor vehicles	- 25% on reducing balance
Computer equipment	- Straight line over 3 years

Consecrated land and buildings and moveable church furnishings

- Consecrated and beneficed property is excluded from the accounts by s.96(2)(a) of the Charities Act 1993.

- No value is placed on moveable church furnishings held by the churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal since the PCC considers this to be inalienable property. All expenditure incurred during the year on consecrated or benefice buildings and moveable church furnishings, whether new or improvement, is written off as expenditure in the SOFA and separately disclosed.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

General funds represent the funds of the PCC that are not subject to any restrictions regarding their use and are available for application on the general purposes of the PCC. Funds designated for a particular purpose by the PCC are also unrestricted.

The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe their main affiliation to another body nor those that are informal gatherings of the Church members.

Investments

Investments are stated at their market value.

Rector's Report

The AGM, although it does come at a very strange time of the year, is an opportunity first of all to look back and celebrate.

Celebrate God's faithfulness and goodness, although this should be a daily activity! Celebrate our Church family. Where else in society do you find such a diverse group of people, who love and care for one another? Because of this we need to address some of the operational issues so that thinking is joined up, things don't get missed and we stay on track with the vision God has given us.

Whilst we may have a NIMBY attitude to the housing development in our town we believe that the Standen Estate development gives us a wonderful outreach opportunity and we will seek ways to form community and congregations in that location.

The partnership with our school is one of the highlights for me and I am so excited to see us engaging with children and families through that partnership, through TLG and superheroes. It is important that we do not lose what we have now built in terms of our relationship with children as they become young people. So we will be looking as to how we can partner with the schools the Grand and other churches in this.

A more detailed explanation of the vision, the reasons behind that vision and the first steps we need to take will be outlined on Celebration Sunday and will be available on the website. It is a big vision. It will take us beyond ourselves. It will cost in terms of time and money. But someone once said that if your vision doesn't scare you it probably isn't from God!

Thank you for being God's people in this place at this time as we continue to know Jesus and make Jesus known in our networks and neighbourhood.

Each zone is manned by helpers, ready to have fun, but also ready to listen and support the Rockin children. The zones give everybody time to arrive, ready for the night ahead.

We say Rockin is about,' having fun as we find out more about Jesus' and this applies whether we have an established faith and are used to worshipping or whether prayer and praise is a new experience. Not forgetting Thomas who always moves the chairs for us!

Kingdom Kids

Kingdom Kids is the age appropriate teaching for school age children, during the 10.30 service on a Sunday. The vision and challenge for Kingdom Kids is so much more than a time of teaching, but rather to be a time when we grow closer and get better connected to our mighty God and a time when we experience his love first hand and allow him to transform our hearts; a space to speak to God and to listen to God. It is hoped that our children can be 'God connected and not just God smart'. (Rachel Turner, Parenting For Faith) Then we hope that our Kingdom Kids can go and transform their classes, friendship groups and town, empowered by their amazing helper the Holy Spirit.

How do we do this? Well we start together in the Oasis room, where we have opportunities to connect with God in creative prayer, through Bible verses and by listening to God. Then we split into our age groups. Each group leader develops the theme in their own unique way, with creativity and dedication. Carefully choosing activities that help the children learn in age appropriate ways. In different groups from week to week you will find games, craft, DVDs, stories, drama, children reading the Bible, treasure hunts, food and many more wonderful activities. Since Christmas we have been using the same teaching theme as the adults and GRO. Hopefully this gives families the chance to talk about faith and have God conversations in the time after church. The family is the main place that children's faith will grow and so it is good for us in Kingdom Kids to support families as they do faith together.

This year has seen Kingdom Kids, Tiddlers and GRO continue to pray for Clitheroe and their friends, by going out on prayer walks. The castle has been our favourite spot to pray...blowing bubbles from the top as we pray for the spirit to fall on Clitheroe.

Once a month Kingdom Kids get to take part in Stompin. A lively session of worship, fun, games(thank you Andrew Stevens) and truths with a video clip and refreshments! And of course our special guest Mr Harry Bow, the owner of a sweet factory, who happens to love Jesus! (Further information on Mr Harry Bow can be obtained from his good friend, Tim Lynas) We have a cake or snake feature, that has morphed into a healthier boot or fruit feature and we still try and 'Beat the Boffin'.

Children move up to GRO after Easter. We have a special session where the other GRO young people and Kingdom Kids pray for them as they go through a prayer tunnel and we present them with a small present and a special word for them from God.

We hope that even our youngest children can enjoy being loved by God and enjoy being in His presence on a Sunday morning. We hope that being part of the St James' family, part of God's family is special for them. They are his children, his treasured possessions and so this year we have developed the crèche into Kingdom Tiddlers. A place where the under 5's can start to connect with God. Again they follow the same teaching theme as the adults and other children and young people, but this theme is developed with appropriate toys, play doh mats, prayer times, praise times, bubbles, stories, craft and colouring. All this enabled by a wonderful team of Tiddler leaders, who are so gifted in the conversations they have we these wonderful children.

An enormous thank you to every Kingdom Kids and Kingdom Tiddlers leader, you are amazing! Thank you for preparing wonderful activities for your age group to connect with God and for ministering to these wonderful children. Thank you for your dedication and ministry. You are appreciated and a blessing.

Friday Superheroes.

'This is amazing! It is so good for the children, my daughter loves it! I feel so comfortable in church with this.'

This was a comment made to me by one of the Friday Superhero dads and he really blessed me with the comment! We want families. Families can mean anything...we welcome grandparents, grown up siblings, single parents, one parent, two parents extended families with cousins attached we love you and welcome you and want to bless you. It is a chance to the families who come to Friday Superheroes to feel at home, to feel comfortable and welcome. We want them to know that St James' is their church and a place where they belong and can be blessed.

Friday Superheroes is an opportunity to share God's love with families. It is a chance for all families to explore faith and God's truths together, whether families who wouldn't usually come to church on a Sunday morning, church families, food bank families, CAP families, Rockin families or families from St. James' School. It is an opportunity to be invitational and invite along friends, neighbours or family who wouldn't do Sunday church, it is a chance to introduce them to God, to have conversations about God.

Over the last year we have explored many themes; Bible Superheroes, parables, advent, fruit of the Spirit, Christmas and Easter. We have celebrated our first baptism and held a summer BBQ. We have welcomed and made friends with many more families. There are always at least 50 of us eating tea, but at times there have been 100 of us. At times we have run out of tables and chairs and knives and forks!

On a typical Superhero Friday the guests arrive and help themselves to drinks, colouring and games, then we might watch a DVD, listen to a short talk or act out a story. We have enjoyed having guest story tellers (thank you Mr Filder) Next we head into church to explore the theme in lots of different activities such as craft, experiments, challenges, quizzes, physical activities and games and cold cooking. There is always a Prayer Zone where our guests can quietly sit and use creative prayers to talk to God. Then we stop, we sit at the front of church and share what we have done and learnt and perhaps have a few quiet moments to reflect or respond to God if we want. Last of all we eat together! A couple of the children pray to thank God for our food and then we all head into the Oasis Room for a delicious tea!!

During these nights I love to just look around and see what God is doing. I love it when an opportunity arises to pray with a family. It is a lovely feeling to know you are helpless and this is all God's handiwork!! I keep praying, asking God about the next step. How to help these families to connect, change and transform. We are trying to encourage the families to keep talking about faith at home, to pray between events, We have introduced take home bags to encourage faith at home.

This year Friday Superheroes has developed even more into a team ministry. I am so grateful to Jill Ivison for organising and managing a rota of people to cook, serve, tidy and help, this has made a massive difference and really increased the number of St James 'superheroes' helping to bless our Friday Superhero families. Debbie Smith and Pauline Nurse have helped me plan the activities, which is such a blessing! Ali and Lisa Campbell have shared some of their experiences of similar events that has really helped us develop Friday Superheroes. A massive thank you to all the amazing people who have enabled Superheroes to happen. You all know who you are!! To those of you who turn up to every event or every other month to serve in your special ways. You have set out tables, you have washed up, you have loaded the dishwasher, you have cooked and chopped, you have chatted and cared, you have taught craft and games, you have invited families, you have made jelly and cake, you have prayed and encouraged, you have given wise advice, you have set the room up, you have done tech stuff!!! You have been amazing and allowed Superheroes to happen!! You are Superheroes!!!

Helen in St James School

TLG. (Transforming Lives for Good)

This is a Christian charity that some people from church have trained to be coaches with, so that now they can go into school to work with certain children to help them achieve their potential. There are currently three children in school who receive an hour's mentoring each week, for different reasons. This mentoring aims to build up self esteem and confidence; to help talk the children through emotions that might be hindering them from reaching their God given potential. The scheme is another link between the church and the school. It is another way of hopefully blessing families.

A massive thank you to Nina, Peter and Kirsty, for giving up your time each week to encourage and support these children in school. Please chat to any of these people, to me or Lisa Campbell, if you want to know more. The school is always after more mentors!

Hanging Around with Helen

Just playing in the yard and talking to children. I like to pray and ask God to show me which children need encouragement; I have children who always make a bee line over to me to share something. Sometimes I take a giant skipping rope, sometimes I just sit on a bench and chat. Sometimes children share a problem and we pray. A culture of prayer is starting to develop through the staff and me, so when they hurt they might suggest we pray!!

Assemblies

I love taking assemblies once a week, alternating between KS1 and KS2. It is amazing to ask God what he wants to say to the children and to take that truth to them. Angie Blackburn does a wonderful job as the worship coordinator at school and she puts a great list of assembly themes together for us to follow.

Year 6 Communion

Over the last year we have started bringing the Year 6 children up to church once a term to share communion with the Wednesday morning congregation. This has been a really special time! A family communion liturgy is used with the children reading some parts. The children and adults sit next to each other and chat! The peace is always shared, and as the young and old mingle to share God's love it is hard for the service leader to get everyone back in their seats! After the service there are refreshments when there is more mingling and chatting and friendships forming! It is a very wonderful occasion. A big thank you goes to the Wednesday morning congregation for welcoming Year 6 in such an amazing way. We all look forward to the summer, when the school are looking forward to having the service down at the school in their outside worship area and welcoming the Wednesday congregation!

Special Services

At Harvest time, Christmas, Easter and at the end of the school year, the children all come up to church for special services that Mark, Andy and me all take part in. It is always wonderful to welcome parents and grandparents to the church, to serve them refreshments and chat with them.

Outside Worship Area

This year the school has developed an outside worship area, it is a very special place. I spent Golden Time with a few children painting truths and sayings onto slates, to use as reflections in this beautiful area.

Bible Diggers

This is an after school club that Klaine (the children's worker at CCC) and myself run together. It has been really special planning and running the sessions together. We play games, listen to a Bible Story, do craft, pray and have fun. About 26 children come every week. The club is a great opportunity to encourage the children to connect with God and discover more His love for them.

Parents

On a Friday morning once every half term I make tea and coffee for the parents attending class assemblies. I sometimes attend parent's evenings to make drinks and to hopefully meet more parents!

SATs week breakfast

During SATs week, myself, John and Jennifer Butler go into school every morning and make breakfast for the children. Toast, croissants, copious amounts of Nutella, fruit and fruit juice are all served to the Year 6 children and helped them relax and get their brains well fed before the task of the dreaded SATs. There is always a chance to pray with them, to show God is always there to listen. The school really felt this benefitted the children over the last two years and so we will be repeating the event again this year.

Youth work

Overview

I continue to be utterly privileged to still be serving as youth pastor for our 11-18's! Young people are such a joy and a privilege to walk alongside in life and faith, and I continue to be humbled by their presence and participation in what we offer. As I reflect on another year of overseeing the discipleship of all of our young people within church I am filled with excitement as well as plenty of challenges. My desire is to champion our young people, and to keep finding new ways of sharing how incredible they are, and how much they have to offer, with you all.

Thank you so much for your ongoing support and encouragement of me and our young people. Thank you especially to all our youth leaders who inspire, encourage and challenge our young people and love them week in week out as they give and share of themselves so wonderfully. It takes a whole church to disciple our young people and is definitely not something that I could, or should, do on my own.

GRO

Our Sunday morning group for Years 6 (from Easter) upwards, continues to meet weekly and is a special place of sharing together as we explore what it means to be a disciple of Christ together. We are excited to have started following the main teaching series, with an aim to join up all the ages to be able to learn and respond as one family.

Our monthly youth breakfasts continue to serve the bellies of hungry teenagers before church on a Sunday morning – we share copious amounts of toast together, and enjoy each others company at the same time! These times continue to be special as we 'just be' with one another, sharing with each other and as we, as facilitators, grab hold of further opportunities to invest and pour more of Jesus into our young people.

At Easter our Year 6's once again made their transition to GRO from Kingdom Kids to remove one more big change that comes to them as they make the transition to secondary school in September. We had a special time of commissioning for them, where they received gifts and prophetic words from Helen, as she reluctantly but graciously released them to join the young people upstairs, to begin the important process of finding their favourite sofa seat or beanbag to claim each week!

We have a wonderful group of young people who vary in their energy levels on a Sunday morning! They are never without amazing, thought provoking, big questions which can often lead us off on quite a tangent...which I love! My sincere thanks go to John Filder and Clive Watson, and Kathryn Weston who joined our team last year, as they selflessly continue to give of themselves and their time as they demonstrate God's love and model what it means to be a disciple of Christ to the youth.

11-14's youth group

This large group of dynamic and energetic young people continues to meet on Sunday evenings during term time at church. We have a varied programme, and whatever it is we're doing each week there is a beautiful expectancy about meeting with each other and God, whether we're engaging in an activity, bible study, on a prayer walk, playing manhunt around church or exhausting ourselves at an giant inflatable theme park.

This is our midweek group for our older youth (Years 10-13), who meet in our home each Wednesday as we choose to 'do life' together. We have created a very relaxed, informal space for young people to come and 'be'. I love this opportunity to invest in, encourage and challenge one another in the experiences and challenge life brings each of us. We were sad to say goodbye to a handful of our group in the summer, but were able to welcome a new bunch of friends to join our special times together.

We continue to enjoy our tradition of regularly sharing a meal together, which we call Dinner Church. It is a special time of being family together in Christ, and it has evolved to be one of our favourite times together...yes because of the yummy food that we take turns in preparing, but also the sharing in the teaching, prayer and worship aspects of these evenings. It is a team effort where everyone has something to offer and brings that to share with one another.

Thank you to Naomi Williams who continues to serve this group and is an essential part of our team. Annual Report House Groups 2017-18

I'd like to begin by thanking our magnificent group leaders on behalf of all the group members and myself. They are a very talented, committed and dedicated group. We are blessed by your service to God and us.

This year has seen two new groups form, one led by Jonathan and Diana Frank over in Tosside. As with so many of St James' House groups, its members come from the wider church community as well as St James. Neighbours and local church leaders are a welcome part of this new community. The other new group is a post Alpha group led by Alistair and Jilly MacDonald to provide and maintain the fellowship shared by thee group members during alpha. And it is already full!

In response from the leaders with the desire to go deeper and be better equipped as small group leaders, termly leaders' meetings are now training meetings. Of which we have had two.

Using our inhouse expertise and experience we have focused our training around a small group book. Volunteers have chaired the training and given us a variety of ways to engage with the material. This has really brought the leaders together in a deeper and more helpful way and given them opportunities to share and learn from each other's broad expertise.

We continue with a situation of many of our groups being at capacity. Alphas and new enquires, continue to create the need for new groups to develop and so group leaders are actively looking for people who have the heart and skills to take on leadership of a group.

We have really appreciated Mark and other leaders of the leadership team coming and sharing the churches vision with us so that it can be part of group development. Leaders have also been given the opportunity to voice opinions and be heard at these times. Thank you to Mark and his team.

All groups have taken stock of where their emphasis and vision lies, be it service to specific sectors of their local community, prayer support for church ministries and for people around the world or social action to name a few that come to mind. This has enabled the groups to refocus their energies and consciousness and has also given chance for group members to feed back to leaders about their vision for the group.

We are blessed indeed that our house groups serve approximately 150 members.

SOZO Sozo AGM Report for 2017

In 2017, we have ministered to 7 people who applied through the Bethel Sozo UK or St James's websites, and to 5 others who have connections with St James', whom have travelled from places like Blackpool, the Lake District and The Wirral to gain a better connection to God and more freedom in their lives by having a Sozo session. We have continued to go into Kirkham Prison and have ministered to 2 more prisoners there. It is so wonderful hearing about the fruitful and lasting impact

these sessions have made on these men, with testimonies from both as to the radical difference those 2 hours with each man has made, because they met with Jesus.

We have held an additional 11 sessions in 2017 for members of St James', which brings us to a total of over 100 since we began the Sozo Ministry here.

Some have given testimony as to the difference a Sozo session has made to them, either directly, or as part of wider input and therefore transformation in their lives. Specific testimonies include "lifting of a great burden"; "being set free from the bondage of lies from past abuse"; "improved relationships with my family"; "it's driven my time in prayer to a deeper level".

Sozo clients have come for a variety of reasons:- to have specific issues or symptoms dealt with; to address a sense of "staleness" in their relationship with God or simply wanting to go to a deeper place with God; some are just starting out on their journey with God and have come on the recommendation of a close friend or mentor.

All have met with our Loving Father God, Jesus and Holy Spirit in a unique way which is very personal to them.

SUPPORTED PROJECTS

Gideons International

Once again we can testify to God's blessing in the local Gideon ministry.

Gaining entry to schools is becoming increasingly difficult but prayer and persistence usually succeed and all schools in the valley remain open. Not so in Blackburn where increasing number of Asian students makes it very difficult.

In our school presentations in closing, the students are invited to accept a testament. There are usually a small number of refusals and during the previous visit to Ribblesdale High School these

were about thirty. At our most recent visit, however, we were overjoyed to have 100% acceptance, truly a highlight.

The Gideon stand at Blackburn College Freshers' Fair was well received as it was at the Grand Christmas Fair trade event. The Good Friday United Service and procession to the Castle Gate witness were also good opportunities for testament distribution.

Our annual hospital visit is always as every bedside locker is checked to ensure the Word of God is at hand. Nursing and Care Homes, Hotels, Boarding Houses and fire stations have also been visited.

Our mission is wide and varied and we give thanks that we are able to continue God's work.

Uganda Women Concern Ministry (Website <uganda concern uk>)

It is due, in part, to the fundraising of the organization Uganda Concern UK that UWCM has been able to continue its amazing work. Church members in Clevedon and Kent have funded the annual Children's Conference (now in its 12th year), which is a five day residential experience for about seventy disadvantaged children. Such is the positive feedback that it is thought worthwhile to continue with it. The estimated cost for the 2017 conference was £2,250.00. St James' Church has sent generous donations from the Mission Tithe for several years now and this money goes through Uganda Concern UK, helping to support the work of UWCM in Mbale, Eastern Uganda. Community groups, in which women outnumber men, carry out most of the projects.

1. Harvesting Rainwater

This is a new project. Some of the community groups are keen to learn how to do this and how to build effective water tanks. Contact has been made with a TEARFUND partner in West Uganda and discussions are underway to work out the most cost effective ways of acquiring these skills.

2. Shelter Building

Some all-women groups have been building 'homes' for the vulnerable and elderly. One grandfather, who looks after several grandchildren, was delighted to have a new home (just a simple mud structure with a corrugated roof). Blankets and mattresses were also provided for this extended family who had previously slept on a heap of rags.

3. Sakiya Prayer and Porridge

Over 200 children are registered in this community project. They receive teaching, games and porridge at the church plus books and pencils to enable them to attend primary school. Seventeen students received help with school fees. One of the students, now training as a Nursery teacher, thanks God for the Sakiya project and encourages the children not to lose hope in life but to trust God for help.

Christian Child Welfare Ministries (CCWM) Uganda

John Sitati is a Pentecostal pastor who is a father figure to a number of children from disadvantaged backgrounds.

John says he thanks God for the children who are still alive and studying. *"We appreciate your kindness and timely support each year. We bless the Lord for that."* Fortunately, he and children he supports have been well, apart from a few bouts of malaria from which, thankfully, they recovered. It's good to hear of successes amongst John's children that St James' has supported: two of his students

have graduated in secretarial studies, and another in teaching. Two more are now married with children of their own.

However, as so often in Africa, payment of school fees is a major problem. John tells us there have been challenges: *"There are times when I have had to borrow money to cover expenses, using my car log book and land title as security. Last year, I nearly had to sell my car as interest on borrowing increased."* John suffered a burglary in September and lost many treasured possessions. Chas and Ruth kindly sent money for a security fence. He has asked for prayer regarding the political confusion, food shortages, rising prices of scholastic materials and increased school fees. He has also updated us on political situations in Kenya, Zimbabwe and Uganda, requesting prayer for these.

John has become closely connected to a group of 300 pastors in the Mbale region and has recently been made its secretary. He finishes his letter to us saying:-"Regards to you all faithful servants of the most high God and may God bless you."

Please keep John and the children he supports in your prayers.

The Turi Micah Project

"Act justly, love mercy, walk humbly with your God" (Micah 6:8)

Progress Report: February 2018

1. Project Growth

The Turi Micah Project has had a very exciting year. From our small start in September 2016, feeding around 200 children daily, we are now so grateful to be providing breakfast to all of the children at Turi Sulgwita Primary School. This can be anything up to 1200 children each day, though it varies depending on attendance. Breakfast now involves two sessions, one first thing in the morning for the younger years and another at morning break for the older children.

Earlier this autumn, we very sadly had to dismiss two members of our cooking team due to ongoing dishonesty and stealing. This was a difficult time and it was with great sadness that the decision was taken to terminate Anne and Iscah's employment. We took this experience as an opportunity to review our systems and to improve things so that temptation is reduced. We now use a regular supplier for the millet and maize, who delivers what is needed every two weeks, pre-milled. This cuts out some of the opportunity for resources to go missing, as well as making it easier to regulate how much is being used. We have also introduced a small personal allowance of milk and sugar so that the team can make themselves tea at work.

We have employed a further two local women (Anne and Janeth) to join the team and it has been a delight to see them integrate well and grow into their roles alongside Beth and Nancy. We continue to also value the involvement of Nelson, one of the teachers at the school who has helps to manage the logistics of getting the children through each morning.

We hope to repeat a team training event this year following the success of last year, especially now that we have two new team members. We continue to believe that building the confidence and skills or our team as well as spending time in prayer together and seeking God's vision for the project is really important going forward.

Food supplies have continued to be wonderfully provided over this year, even as the need has increased so dramatically. The price of sugar was greatly elevated for some months as a result of the elections, but has returned to much lower levels. Our milk has been supplied locally and reliably. Our contract with the supplier for maize and millet has enabled us to predict our monthly outgoings more reliably and to spread our costs over the year.

Our early attempts at gathering some data to benchmark nutrition levels of the children last year helped us to identify 30% mild to medium malnutrition amongst the children at Sulgwita. We hope to be able to work on our awareness of the specific needs as the project progresses, and possibly to develop a fortified version for those children who are of serious concern.

We recently welcomed a group of volunteers from Guernsey who gave of their time to paint the kitchen and serving room. This was a real improvement and has been helpful in terms of demonstrating to the school our commitment to staying there and to investing in it. We were also delighted to receive a visit from Katy and John Holden in the very early stages of the project, even before we had begun to serve the porridge, and then from Anna Lancaster who was able to see it in action. Our committee had the wonderful opportunity to accompany her to Eldoret where we observed a number of different Mary's Meals initiatives in schools and learnt a lot from meeting with their organisers as well as seeing how they run these projects.

Finally, this year we have been so grateful to have such a strong team on our committee and we are excited that a number of new members have joined us, bringing their expertise and support. We have additionally been able to involve the pupils from St Andrew's School in a more regular and formal capacity, welcoming small groups of students from both the Senior and Prep Schools as they seek to help with serving and also to support with fundraising projects. This is exciting in terms of sustainability for the future.

2. Improved relationships

Our relationship with the Headmaster and staff at Turi Sulgwita has improved so much over this year and we thank God for this. The Headmaster has now agreed to supply all the firewood needed for the project, as a gesture of good will and commitment, and so far this has been happening well. It is an area where we continue to seek God's wisdom and help. We are also seeking to build stronger relationships with the wider staff at the school and build trust and support.

3. Fundraising and financial report

We have been so encouraged by the continuing support we have received for the project, receiving donations at key moments and being able to do everything we have hoped. Over this year we have managed to pay four salaries (including health insurance and Social Security contributions), install a water tank and two new wood-fired stoves, purchase all the milk, millet, maize and sugar, improve our serving capacity with equipment and flat surfaces, and most recently to paint both rooms.

The support from St James' Church has been absolutely vital to this progress and gave us the confidence to push ahead with our vision of serving the whole school.

This month we formally signed a partnership agreement with International Teams, a UK based mission organization supporting over 1000 missionaries in 60 countries. This means that, as a registered charity (No. 1089864) with an established UK presence, they can provide financial services and accountability for the Turi Micah Project, making it much easier for us to receive UK support.

A full set of audited accounts for this year is available on request. Please feel free to ask if you would like us to send one.

Priority actions for the next period:

1. Continuing to build relationships with Turi Sulgwita staff, parents and children

This will always be a priority for us. Anne, Janeth, Nancy and Beth are key to this as they provide a link to the local community. However, we would love to build more trust and cooperation between us and the teaching staff and the parents as our project develops. Please do join us in continuing to pray for this aspect of what we are doing.

2. Strategic planning

Our current priority is to settle and establish the Turi Micah Project within the school, fine tuning our systems and growing our local team, both in terms of numbers but also in terms of commitment and skills. We are constantly seeking to build the project's sustainability and its local presence for the long term.

3. Building work

Possible work for the next period includes: Connecting the rooms to the electricity supply and putting in lights. Putting glass in the windows to reduce dust/ flies etc. Closing up some of the gaps between the walls and roof

All work on infrastructure needs to be carefully considered and negotiated with the school so we will have to pray about the timing of these improvements.

4. Fundraising/ support

Our new website is nearly ready to launch and we have a new Facebook page. We are hoping that these will help us to communicate when there are needs, and to generate interest and support.

We are delighted that we have now gathered a small number of regular, committed individual supporters and we will seek to maintain and grow this more regular support base. Our links with International Teams has already greatly facilitated this. The support from St James' Church has been incredible in these early stages of developing the project and has allowed us to grow and develop so much more effectively than we thought possible. We remain forever grateful.

Arc – Asylum, Refugee Community – Blackburn



"How many disciples did Jesus have? Name them."

"What is Ash Wednesday?"

"How many chapters are in the book of John?"

These are actual questions asked by UK immigration officers to decide if asylum seekers are genuine converts to Christianity. This year at ARC we had a Christian couple refused leave to remain in the UK because they couldn't answer them. They're involved in the Farsi Church (in Blackburn) and Blackburn Community Church as well as ARC, Kingdom Outreach & a homeless charity. However, when their case went to appeal, it wasn't the testimony of local Christians or all the activities they're involved in that most convinced the judge that they are genuine – it was his Facebook account. Facebook posts over time, dating from before they left their country, sharing faith and worship songs they'd written clearly showed their love for Jesus. They now have refugee status and are continuing to build a new life in Blackburn.

Other news from ARC this year:

- We've seen more refugees getting work, especially helping new asylum seekers in other areas.
- English club now has 3 different classes/levels and runs twice a week.
- We have a maths club too.
- Funding has been obtained to start a job club to help people looking for work.
- Stephen left to lead Blackburn Community Church. (Although he maintains links with ARC as BCC meets at Wesley Hall.)
- After many years, Emily Jones left to travel and Rachel Culshaw joined the team.

As always, there have been many little highlights: helping a refugee find a home; the relief when a financial problem is solved; the smile when an interpreter explains a letter; seeing a new arrival finding friends and the joy when a family is reunited.

Christian Solidarity Worldwide(CSW)

CSW has launched a campaign named Faith and a Future which aims to stop hatred before it starts, in the belief that many of the injustices we see in our world today are rooted in hatred that is learned in a child's early years. Thank you to members of home groups who have signed and posted these petitions which will be presented to the relevant government ministers at the end of May. We hope and pray that the authorities in Pakistan cooperate in this matter.

CSW is working around the world in Iran, Nepal, Eritrea and Burma to name but a few areas. The Burmese army is guilty of shocking violence, especially to the thousands of Rohingya who live in squalid conditions where access to humanitarian aid is severely restricted. CSW asks for prayers for this desperate situation.

Thank you as usual for signing cards not only at Christmas and Easter but throughout the year as well, thereby establishing an ongoing link with the Persecuted. Thanks also for gifts of children's clothing which have been sent to the Christian orphanage on the borders of Thailand and Burma. I am deeply grateful to all those people who donate towards postage and who help in any way.
