During the year, The Trustees carried out a review of its policies and completed major revisions to its Procurement, Risk Management and Safeguarding policies. The review of the Safeguarding policy, completed in March 2018, introduced new procedures for partners to follow and a new system for reporting concerns.

To relieve sickness and preserve health, to relieve poverty, financial hardship and unemployment, to advance education and the Christian religion for the public benefit primarily within South Sudan and its adjoining countries, in particular, but not exclusively, by the provision of grants of financial assistance to organisations and individuals.

In the 2017/18 financial year, apart from bank charges and administrative costs of £495, all the remainder was spent within South Sudan and Uganda. The principal work of the charity was:

- 1. To support the work of the Martha Clinic in Yei, South Sudan.
- 2. To provide financial support to three Diocesan primary schools in Yei and to a new primary school in Koboko.
- 3. To support four "under-tree" schools in the Palorinya refugee camp in northern Uganda, to which tens of thousands of South Sudanese have fled.
- 4. To fund 48 Christian radio programmes that were broadcast in local languages to those in refugee camps in northern Uganda.
- To make grants to several individuals to cover their fees and living expenses while they pursue degree or diploma courses at the International Health Sciences University, Kampala, Uganda or at other health training institutions in Uganda.
- 6. To make grants to 3 teachers to assist them with their study for the Diploma in Education or Bachelor of Education.
- 7. To support the on-going work of the health link between Royal Hampshire County Hospital, Winchester and Yei Civil Hospital and Martha PHCC in Yei, South Sudan.

The Trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission and can confirm that all these grants were within the objects of the Trust.

Summary of the main achievements of the charity during the year

This year the Trustees adopted a new strategy in order to respond appropriately to the crisis in Central Equatoria in South Sudan. Thus, while it continued to assist the Diocese of Yei to maintain the Martha Health Clinic and Immanuel Model Primary School in Yei, it also began to support the Diocese of KajoKeji which is now operating out of temporary offices in Moyo, Uganda. In particular, the Trustees have provided assistance to the Diocese of KajoKeji to support four of its the under-tree schools. One goal that we are near to achieving is to find four active primary schools in England that like to have a link with one of the under tree schools.

In addition to assisting four schools in the refugee camps, we provided funding to FAITH Uganda to produce Christian radio programmes to be broadcast to those now living in refugee camps in Uganda. We also funded a Mothers Union programme for women to be trained to make their own dignity kits and we funded training for church youth leaders.

Meanwhile, The Brickworks has continued to provide scholarships for those undertaking health training, teacher training or theological training and has increased its investment in this area by sponsoring several students whose training would otherwise have to be discontinued as a result of the conflict.

The Winchester Hospital Link redirected its energies in a year when travel to Yei and KajoKeji was impossible and a small team spent two very fruitful weeks teaching health students in the relocated KajoKeji Health Training Institute in Arua, Uganda.

We were particularly pleased to receive some major grants from The Allen Trust, which enabled us to part-fund the construction of a new primary school in Koboko, Uganda and the payment of teachers in the Diocesan schools in Yei and in the refugee camps in Uganda.

We made several grants to the Bishop Alison Theological College to enable it to re-locate to Arua and to re-open in temporary premises so that the students could complete their diploma courses and to graduate.

Financially, it was a very good year for The Brickworks. Income generated was £123,668. This included several grants from trusts as well as from some churches and individual donors. We are very grateful for their generous support.

The Trustees decided at the start of the year that it would be appropriate to draw on balances in order to assist the church in responding to some of the needs that arose as a result of the insecurity in South Sudan. The amount spent in total in South Sudan and Uganda was £160,930. Of this, only 0.3% was spent on administration.
