Charity structure and recruitment and appointment of Trustees

Infosound reduced its number of trustees from four to three in 2017 with Mrs Marian Myers stepping down at the end of March to take a part-time paid role as Administrator for the charity. The role of the Managing Editor was unchanged as far as overseeing all editorial policy, audio production and day-to-day running of the charity is concerned. However, the role was reduced from full-time to part-time at the same time as the part-time administrator started work with this administrative role also encompassing publicity and fundraising.

Infosound has retained its small number of volunteers, who help in a variety of practical ways, including fundraising, publicity, audio work and advising, as appropriate.

All of the charity's trustees are appointed, or reappointed, by the members at Infosound's annual general meeting, which is held in May each year or, if necessary, at a Trustees' meeting convened for that purpose.

Governing document

The Association is a charitable unincorporated association and the purposes and administration arrangements are set out in our constitution.

Charitable purposes

The charity's purposes, as recorded in our constitution, are to serve the needs of any person resident in the United Kingdom who is blind (severely sight-impaired) or partially-sighted (sight-impaired) or labouring under some temporary or permanent incapacity or disability which makes reading print material inaccessible to them, by the provision of information in audio and other accessible formats.

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Activities and achievements

2017 was a year of change for Infosound. We started the year by only producing a monthly audio magazine on CD with a limited online presence as well. During the year we successfully piloted the delivery of information for blind and partially-sighted people in a more immediate way as an "audio library" that could be refreshed with new content far more frequently; and by the end of 2017, we were poised to be able to evolve that idea into a live rolling stream broadcast over the Internet 24 hours a day; it could also be heard on any phone and in a variety of other ways. This metamorphosis from audio magazine producer to broadcaster will serve us well in the future and will enable us to be a more immediate and relevant information provider for those in Great Britain who live with sight loss. The trustees are very aware that Infosound would also need to offer an 'on-demand 'service alongside this live rolling information stream, enabling listeners to choose individual audio items to hear whenever they choose, rather than having to listen to the rolling "broadcast" for extended periods of time. And this too was established and was ready to launch at the start of 2018.

The CD service was completely phased out by the later Summer of 2017 with, before that, a lot of development work being undertaken to establish a way for listeners to access Infosound over any landline (or mobile) phone, controlling the selection and playback of the audio using just the phone's keypad. This was to avoid listeners needing Internet access or having one of the more specialist audio players, designed for vision-impaired people, where Infosound can also be heard.

Inclusivity, for Infosound, means ease of access to hear us in a way that suits blind and partiallysighted people, irrespective of their technical knowledge or ability to purchase more "hi-tech" equipment.

The trustees are pleased that so much was achieved in 2017.

Trustee remuneration and expenses

The trustees did not receive any remuneration or expenses during the year.

Financial review and reserves policy

In 2016, the trustees mapped-out a three-year funding requirement as part of an overall five-year funding strategy to calculate the level of reserves the charity would need to fulfil its core aims. This was mainly because it was known that the charity's core funder, British Wireless for the Blind Fund (BWBF) would be tapering its annual donations to zero by April 2020. Infosound's trustees are extremely grateful not only for BWBF's long-standing support, but also for the lengthy notice Infosound had been given about these changes, which allowed time to plan ahead. Infosound was also given some practical support with fundraising by BWBF for part of the year and that enabled Infosound to raise nearly £12,000 from trust funds during the year, with a further £5,860 being raised independently toward replacing much of the charity's aging studio and computing equipment.

Thomas Pocklington Trust has been another loyal contributor to Infosound and discussions are ongoing about their level of financial support in the future. Changing from employing one person full-time to two staff members on a part-time basis helped cost-saving as did replacing the monthly CD production with more immediate information delivery on the phone and via various online services and specialist audio players.

The new structure of delivering information costs roughly £4,000 per month. Infosound's trustees aim to keep at least six months of running costs (£24,000) in reserve at all times. By the end of 2017, following the cost-savings measures mentioned, Infosound closed the year with £64,410 in the bank. In theory, this would mean the service should be secure until the end of April 2019, even if no further income were forthcoming. However, with editorial planning already looking ahead as far as 2021, the trustees are keen that the charity should build a more robust fundraising strategy, directly coupled with building a greater awareness of the free and impartial Infosound service.

Medical Insurance Scheme account

Infosound runs a private group medical insurance scheme, offered by medical insurers WPA, which is available to the charity's Trustees, staff and volunteer members who wish to join. It is run on a zerobalance basis with group members paying their individual premiums to Infosound, which in turn pays WPA for the group premium. In this way, there is no cost to the charity for running this scheme. This scheme is run entirely separately from the charity's work and accounting and all funds are held in a separate bank account from the charity's operational current and savings accounts, with premiums being collected into, and paid out from, this account.

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Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees of Infosound

I report on the accounts of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2017 which are set out on pages 3 to 4.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed.
